1983 In Review

The year 1983 may not go down in history as a great year but it did mark several trends which will have long term significance for this country. It was the first year in several decades that saw a marked reduction in the rate of inflation. With the decline in inflation, the country also saw a much better economy return for the first time in several years.

The economic picture was also significant in that the segments of business that did not show growth were more in the traditional "smokestack" field while the industries that registered the greatest gains were those associated with "high tech" areas.

With the return of a more general prosperity, the fields of recreation, music and the arts experienced a general revival. All was not this prosperous in agriculture where the problems that have plagued the nation's farmers were still largely unresolved. The much heralded PIK program provided relief to some segments of the agriculture business while doing nothing for other areas.

A part of the farm problem has been attributed to the lack of uniformity among those who spoke for agriculture. As 1984 looms in the near future, the government is again looking at different programs to offer to the nation's producers of food and fiber.

The past year also marked a trend of the United States to take a tougher stand toward communist countries and to actively take pre-emptive measures to prevent communist aggression in the Western Hemisphere. Again this was a stance not altogether popular, either at home or abroad.

Only history will write the final pages to the trends begun

in the past 12 months. While we may not look back on 1983 as a banner year, we can brag to our grandchildren that we survived the record shattering cold wave that enveloped the nation during Christmas of 1983, the year of the big cold.

JANUARY

Construction began for the new educational complex for Texico Schools when ground breaking ceremonies were held on January 10. Construction was scheduled to be completed in 300 days, depending on the weather. The projected completion date was mid-November. Texico voters had approved a \$320,000 bond issue plus a two mill tax levy by a large margin about a year ago.

Top winners of the Oklahoma Lane 4-H Livestock Show were Lucretia Foster who showed the Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Barrow. Carl Hutchins won two Showmanship trophies for both his steer and swine.

Three Farwell youth groups began fund-raising activities to collect monies for the Carlos Nicolas Fund. Carlos, a student at Farwell High School, has been diagnosed as having bone cancer, and the monies will go to assist with his medical expenses. Farwell High School and Junior High Student Councils set a Walk-a-thon, and the Boy Scout Troop collected funds by placing donation cans in local businesses.

The long dormant Farwell Development Corporation met for reorganization, setting up committees and developing plans for the betterment of the City of Farwell. Three committees were established to coordinate plans for cleaning up the town and enticing industrial development.

Tammy Powell and Tobin

Tate were crowned basketball Homecoming Queen and King at Texico Schools. "Spirit of '83" was the theme for the week-long festivities.

During January, another snow storm passed through the Twin Cities dumping about nine inches of snow in its path, turning the area into a winter wonderland.

Area farmers began signing up for the Payment in Kind (PIK) program, and Farmer ASCS office reported that 90 percent of the farmers who came to the office signed up the first week.

Texico Wolverine basketball boys won the EPAC tournament, and the Lady Wolverines placed second. Six players, Ruth Scott, Cheryl Scott, Tammy Powell, Brad Steward, Kevin West, and Joe Steward were named to the all-tourney team.

FEBRUARY

Icy roads were the cause of an automobile accident northeast of Farwell which claimed the lives of three members and injured two other members of the Rodriguez family of Farwell and injured the driver of the other car.

Area residents had just gotten dug out from the previous nine-inch snow when more than two inches of the powdery white stuff fell, accompanied by high winds causing drifting.

Incumbents Herman Geries and Johnnie Rucker were re-elected to the Texico School Board.

The Walk-a-thon for the Carlos Nicolas Fund conducted by Farwell High School and Farwell Junior High School Student Councils netted \$1162 in pledges.

Parmer County 4-H'ers exhibited their animals at the Hereford livestock show, and Geretta Hutchins, Farwell 4-H, had the first place heavyweight in the Berkshire division which was also named Breed Champion; and Roger Billingsley, Oklahoma 4-H, had the second place heavyweight.

Farwell School Board voted that Farwell Independent School District will operate during the 1983-84 school year with three fewer secondary teachers and one less elementary teacher. The board also decided that the school will operate with only four coaches. These decisions to lower the faculty number were made primarily for budgetary reasons.

Farwell Convalescent Center Auxiliary and other area residents and friends hosted a special Valentine's Day party for the Center residents and their families. Several local persons entertained with musical numbers and led group singing.

Clint Kelley, Farwell 4-H Club member, was recipient of a registered Hampshire gilt as the result of submitting the

Earl Booth Services Thursday In Clovis

Funeral services for Earl Booth, 82, of Clovis were scheduled for Thursday, Dec. 29, at 2 p.m. MST at the First United Methodist Church in Clovis, with Rev. David Shaw, church pastor, officiating.

Interment was to be in Sunset Terrace Cemetery in Farwell, with Steed-Todd Funeral Home in charge.

Mr. Booth died Tuesday, Dec. 27, at Farwell Convalescent Center. He was born April 27, 1901, near Rising Star, Tex.

His early schooling was spent in Rising Star and Vernon, and he attended Wayland College. Following a time of raising cattle at the Ayres Ranch in New Mexico, he came to Farwell to farm with his parents.

In 1926, Mr. Booth married Bess Walker, an English teacher at Farwell Schools, and in 1933 he was elected Parmer County Tax Assessor-Collector. On January 1, 1935, he was

elected to the office of Parmer County Sheriff and still served as tax assessor-collector. He served both positions until December 31, 1948.

Following a move to Clovis, Mr. Booth became associated with the New Mexico Bureau of Revenue, and was later elected as Municipal Judge.

Mr. Booth was a member of Farwell Lodge No. 977, AF&AM and was a 32nd degree mason.

Survivors include his wife, Bess, of the home; three sons, Ronald of Charlotte, N.C., Robert "Toby" of Lazbuddie, and Michael of New York; two daughters, Joan McDonald of Oklahoma City, Okla., and Rosamond Hatch of Los Angeles, Calif.; 12 grandchildren and one great-grandson.

Casket bearers were Harold Russell, Bob Anderson, James Barrows, Rueben Sandoval, Carroll Pyle, and Perry Mason.

Texico Council Reviews Curry Co. Tax Increase

Texico City Council met in regular session Tuesday, Dec. 27. The main item of discussion was the increase in Curry County taxes, which will be raised 0.4625 percent as of January 1st. The tax increase was authorized by the 1983 State Legislature.

Curry County is among 16 counties in New Mexico which will impose a one-eighth percent gross receipts tax. Taxes are being raised in Curry because of the county hospital indigent receipts tax, according to the City Council. The local option taxes include a county gross receipts tax, county fire protection excise tax, county sales tax, and municipal gross receipts tax.

Jay Martin, representative from NTS Communications, was present at the meeting to inform the council on the use and savings of the NTS service. The service is a long distance telephone service which pro-

vides its customers with low rates for long distance phone use. After meeting with the council and discussing all options, the council decided to take the service under consideration.

It was announced that Marshal Mickey Fenn will be attending a Law Enforcement Protection Seminar in Santa Fe, January 24. This seminar is for New Mexico Law officials to learn new techniques of personal and citizen safety.

Present at the meeting were Mayor John R. Hadley, councilmen Lewis Cooper, and Vane Doshier, and city employees Mickey Fenn, Billy Hammitt, Glenda Thigpen, and Marie Christian, and Jay Martin.

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Commissioners Court Agrees To Try New Phone Service

Parmer County Commissioners Court met Tuesday, Dec. 20, and among the items on the agenda was the meeting with a representative from NTS Communications of Clovis who explained its service and the savings realized by using the service for long distance calls. After much discussion with the representative, the commissioners agreed to try the NTS service for 90 days, and to pay \$179.70 for returnable adaptors for the present phones.

County Treasurer Benna Felts met with the Court and suggested the C.D.s maturing December 30, 1983 for various

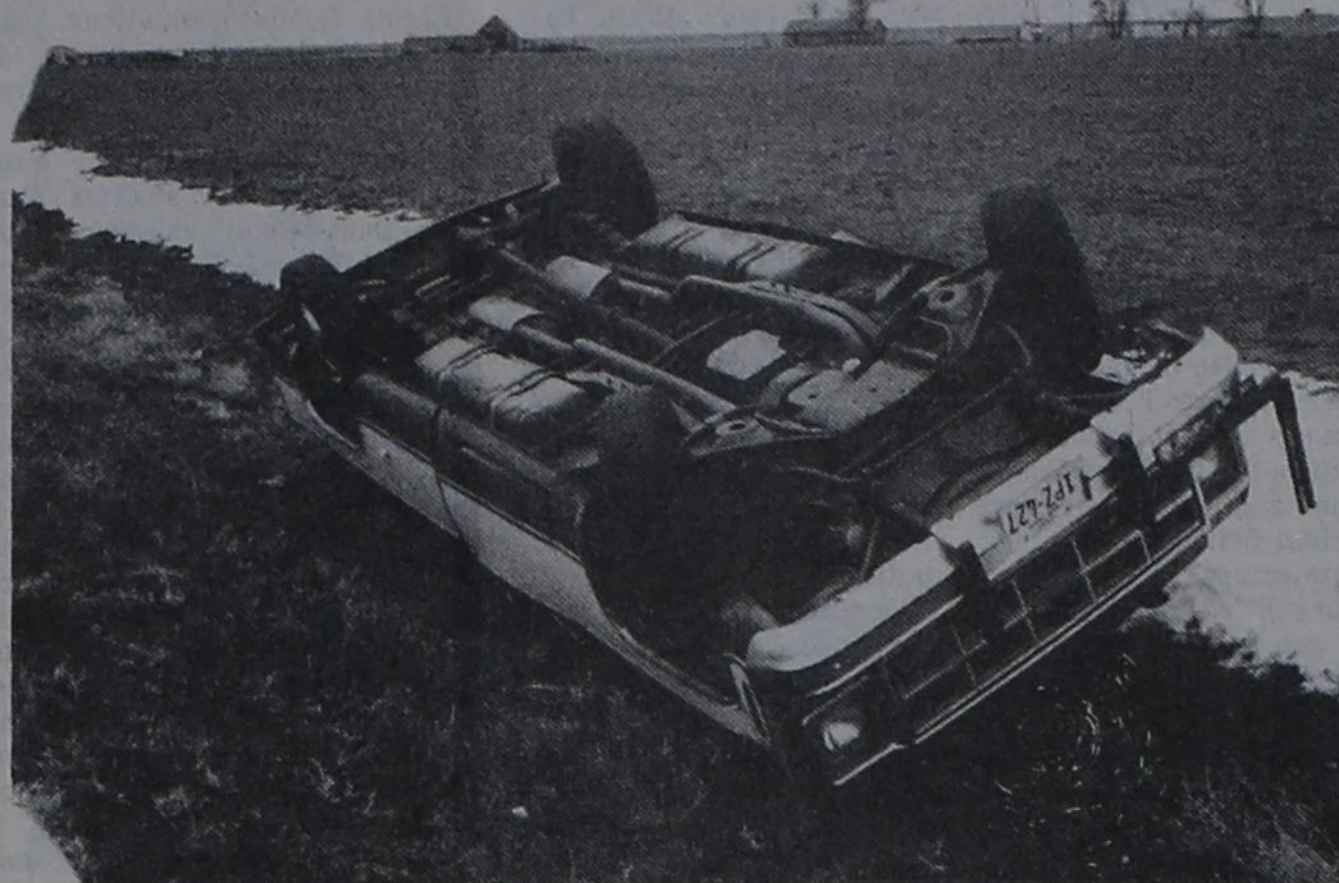
accounts be reinvested as follows: \$150,000 General Fund C.D. be reinvested to mature January 24, 1984; \$240,000 of Farm-to-Market Fund C.D. be reinvested to mature January 31, 1984; and \$25,000 Right-of-Way Fund C.D. be reinvested to mature September 28, 1984. The commissioners approved all of these reinvestments. These monies are being reinvested to accumulate interest and will still be available on short notice.

A bill was received by the Court covering more pre-adoption physical examinations for three county foster children.

The bill in the amount of \$95.50 was approved. These three children have been adopted and will no longer be county foster children.

A request was received asking for an easement to cross a county road with a gas line, and this request was approved.

The Court approved and ratified the following soil conservation work, and that the work be performed as soon as the machines are in that area and not demanded for use on the roads: Precinct No. 3: Joe Haseloff, John Jones, Gary Foster, and James Haseloff.



Early Morning Accident

A pickup driven by Leslie Arnold Dudley of Farwell overturned early Tuesday morning when Dudley apparently hit a patch of icy road about two miles east of Farwell on U.S. Highway 70-84. According to investigating officer, Texas High-

way Patrolman Jim Bishop, Dudley apparently lost control of the vehicle while traveling west and it overturned and landed upside down on the edge of the north side of the highway, with Dudley still inside. He escaped with no apparent in-

juries. Only five minutes after this accident, another one occurred on the icy highway a mile farther east involving a Clovis family and friends, who escaped with minor scratches and bruises, according to Officer Bishop.

Icy Roads Apparent Cause Of Accidents

In the morning hours of Tuesday, Dec. 27, icy roads and a slow drizzle of rain was the cause of two separate accidents only five minutes apart on U.S. Highway 70-84, according to Texas Highway Patrolman Jim Bishop, the investigating officer.

The first accident occurred two miles east of Farwell at 8:45, when Leslie Arnold Dudley of Farwell, while driving a 1978

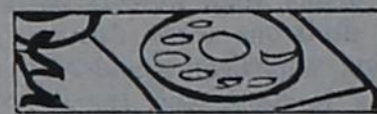
GMC pickup headed west on U.S. 70-84, apparently lost control of the vehicle, according to Patrolman Bishop. The vehicle skidded on the highway and overturned once, landing upside down. Dudley escaped the accident with no apparent injuries, said Officer Bishop.

At 8:50 a.m. only a mile farther east on the highway, a 1983 Ford Bronco driven by Vestna K. Watson of Clovis, apparently lost control of his vehicle on the icy road. The vehicle also overturned and rolled over three times coming to rest on its side on the left side of the highway, according to Officer Bishop.

Passengers in the vehicle were Leslie Watson, Jaime Watson, and Beverly and Gary Stamps, all of Clovis, who were transported to Clovis High Plains Hospital by the Farwell Volunteer Fire Department ambulance, where they were all treated and released with minor scratches and bruises, said THP Bishop.

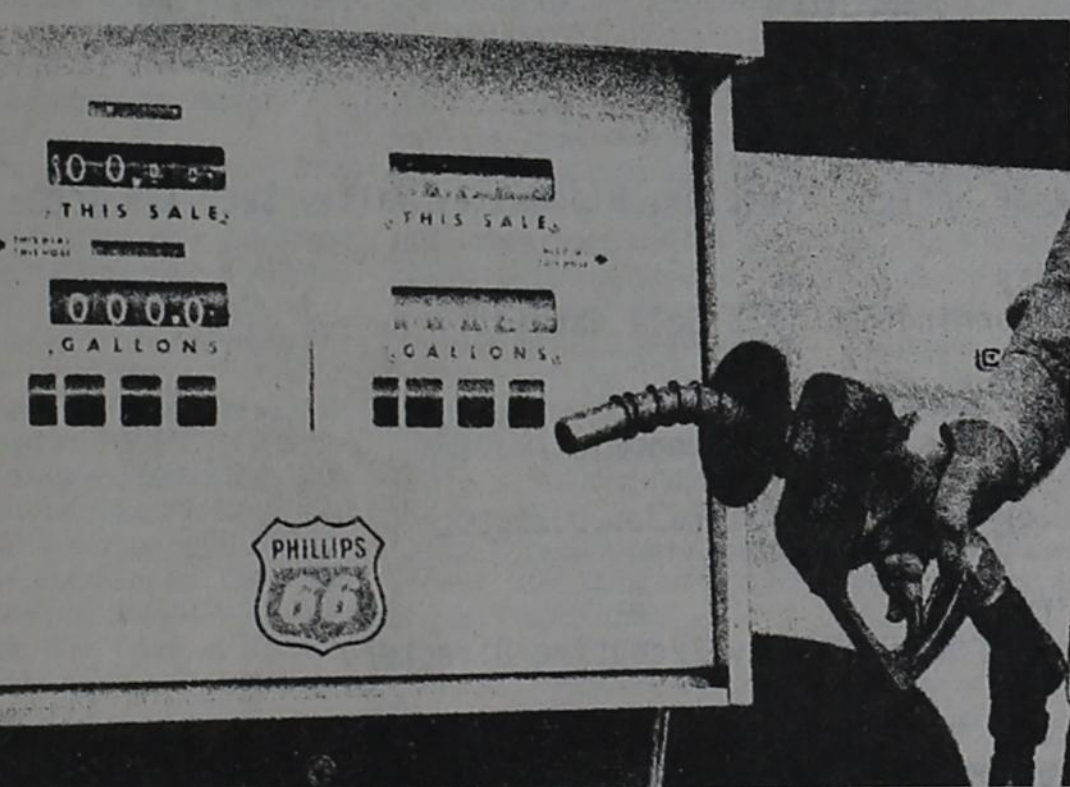

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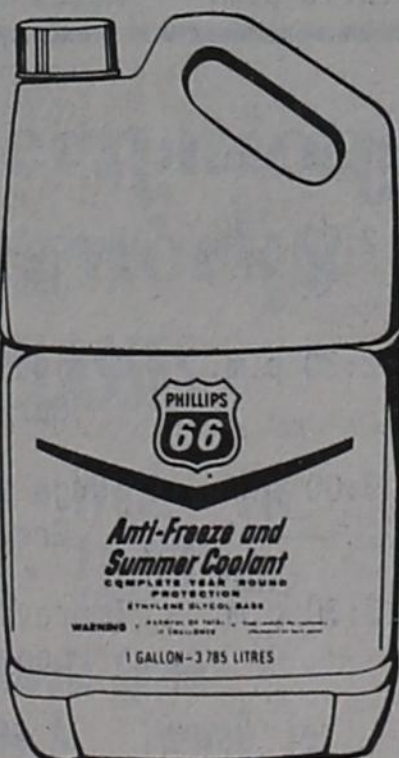

W. N. Fosters Celebrate 63rd Anniversary

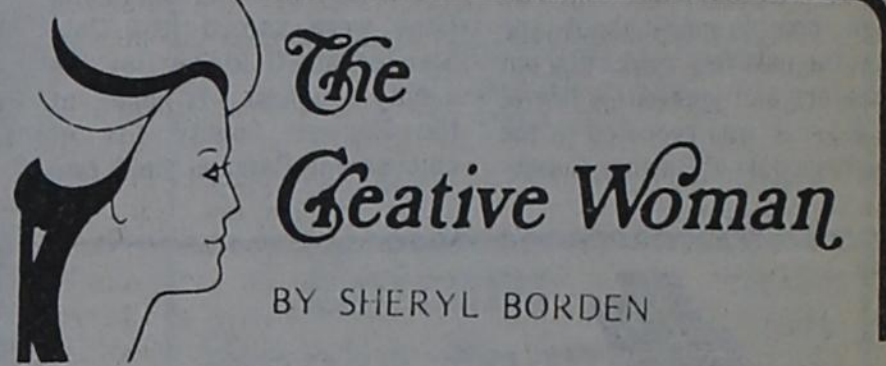

Twelve Wolverines were selected to the All-District 2-A teams.

The community-wide Box Supper and Jamboree to benefit the remodeling of the community center building realized \$4775 from the auction of the food boxes and another \$1018 in donations, making the build-

ing's remodeling fund to go over the \$29,000 mark.

Ruth Scott of Texico and student at ENMU, won the Tribune's Merchants Football Contest and was awarded the contest's Grand Prize. She held on to her one-point lead the last week of the contest to beat out second place finisher Dale Sikes of Farwell.

Gary D. Patterson was named the new County Extension Agent for Agriculture for Parmer County to fill the post vacated by Seth Ralston. The new agent will take over his

duties on January 16.

Area churches had special Christmas services, programs, and cantatas in celebration of the Christmas season, and Oklahoma Lane hosted its annual Christmas Tree celebration on Christmas Eve.

And the longest cold streak in many years occurred when a blast of Arctic air came barreling in the weekend before Christmas, setting record low temperatures and record low highs throughout the area, as well as throughout the United States. Snow and ice accompanying the cold made holiday travel to visit relatives and friends impossible for most of the country.

"BE YE RECONCILED"

Reconciliation postulates alienation. Only enemies can be reconciled. Thus God's message of reconciliation takes us back to Adam, the father of the human race, who first rebelled against God, and explains why God must deal with us all on the same level, as sinners who need salvation.

In Romans 5:12 we read: "By one man sin entered into the world, and death by sin; and so death passed upon all men, for that all have sinned."

Thank God, though, the message of reconciliation is not concerned exclusively with the "one man" by whom sin entered into the world. Indeed, it is chiefly concerned with the "one Mediator between God and men, the Man Christ Jesus" (1 Tim. 2:5).

"Therefore as by the offense of one, judgment came upon all men unto condemnation; even so by the righteousness of one, the free gift [of salvation] came upon all men to justification of life."

"For as by one man's

disobedience many were made sinners, so by the obedience of one shall many be made righteous" (Rom. 5:18,19).

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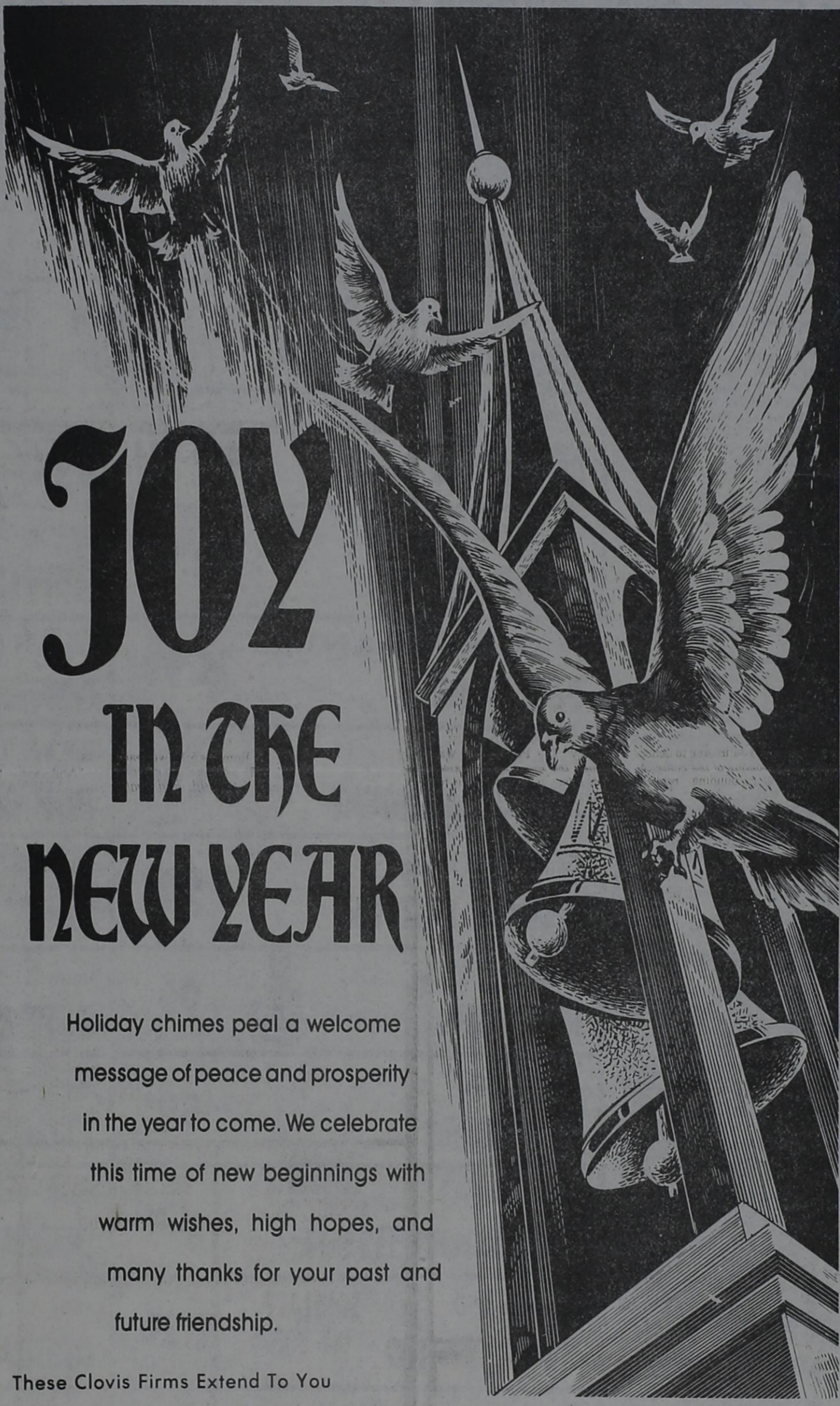
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Texico's Lynn To Coach; Steward To Quarterback

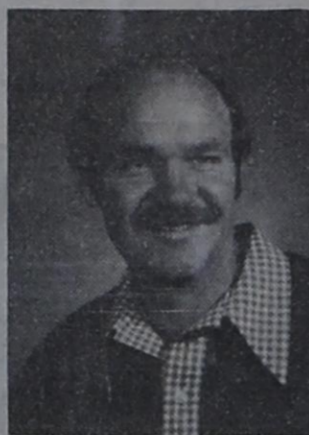
wide end Josh O'Byrne of Animas.

Windbreak trees are provided to Parmer County residents through the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District. The District is offering pecan trees in addition to (evergreen trees) Austrian Pine, Ponderosa Pine, Eastern Red Cedar, Rocky Mountain Juniper, and Colorado Blue Spruce; Also, (Deciduous trees) Ash, Cottonwood, Golden Willow, Honeylocust, Russian Olive, and Poplar; (Shrubs) Caragana, Cotoneaster, Honey-suckle, Lilac Plum, Sumac, Nanking Cherry, Sand Cherry, and Sage.

The District plans to offer trickle or drip materials to participants who are interested in installing efficient watering

systems for their trees.

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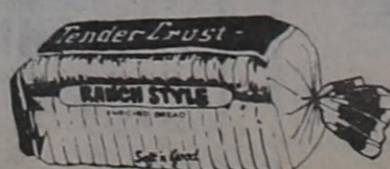
