Proposed water restrictions draw negative response

Area agriculturalists met at the Farwell Community Center on March 9 to discuss the proposed rules that will be shortly enforced restricting the use of the Ogallala Aquifer waters they pump from under their own land.

Mark Howard, a Farwell resident on the Texas Corn Producers Board (TCPB), started the meeting by noting the short time-line the High Plains Underground Water District No. 1 (HPWD) has mandated for these changes to take effect.

"A lot of us feel that this is going way too fast," he said. "The HPWD put out these draft rules on Feb. 25 and they are required to hear public responses prior to April. 1 but they will start swinging into action almost immediately after that."

These water use restrictions include:

-- A limit of 15 acre-inches of water per contiguous control acre per year, beginning Jan. 1, 2012.

-- Identification by May 31, 2011, of "high decline areas" in the aquifer's level. In these areas, meters are required to be installed on all wells by Jan. 1, 2012 and annual reports of water usage must be submitted beginning the 2012 growing season.

-- A reduction in allowable water use by an additional 5 percent each year that an area of aquifer high decline exceeds an allowable decline.

The TCPB conducted meetings in Dimmitt, Olton, and Plainview, as well as Farwell, to provide a forum for the agricultural communities to get facts on the new regulations, to compare their perspectives, and to coordinate the responses they will make at the *district board*. "Bankers will have to factor in the restrictions in their consideration of ag loans. Well drilling companies and irrigation companies will clearly be hit. The tax base that support our schools and local services will be affected as will the amount of commerce in the region's stores for every kind of item."

"It goes beyond that," Howard added. "Somewhere between 80 to 90 percent of the world's sorghum seed is grown within 45 miles of here. Countries like Pakistan, India, and Sudan depend on how much we harvest every year, too."

Johnny Merritt, an attorney from Austin with experience in water law and adjudication, cautioned folks against dealing with the HPWD as if it were an enemy instead of a potential ally on this issue.

"The HPWD is responding to directives from Austin," he said. "All the water Continued on Page 2

The High Underground Conservation (HPWD) has been a friend of this area's farmers and ranchers since 1951. As one farmer noted, at least they have kept Austin away.

However, the HPWD restrictions proposed on Feb. 24 to limit the amount of water that our farmers and ranchers can pump from the aquifer beneath their own lands have a lot of problems.

The first concern has to be the response that Jeff Actkinson received to his question as to whether the HPWD had considered conducting an economic impact study to forecast how these restrictions are going to hit the region's that other districts allow economy.

Yes, that study had been ordered, he was told, and yes, it had been received, but no, it is not available for citizens to read, at least, not yet.

Current planning is for the economic impact study to be released on May 31, more than two months after the HPWD's mandated hearings are closed to receive the response and counterproposals of the people, and long after after the new restrictions are to be placed into effect.

That defies all logic. The study is a vital part of any response the region's citizens will submit to the HPWD but it is being withheld until

Plains the "damn the torpe-Water does" manner in which District these restrictions are being enacted. When other Texas water districts have installed restrictions, they have done so over periods of two to three years, allowing residents time to study methods to achieve the same goals.

> **Restrictions for our** region, in comparison, will go from proposal to closure in about six weeks. The falling level of the aquifer has been recognized for years and if other districts have dealt with it incrementally and rationally, why must our restrictions begin so severely, so immediately, and with so little public input?

The third concern is "banking" of water allowances. If Mother Nature blesses them one year with rains and agriculturalists pump only a fraction of their allowance, they can carry that surplus into the next year that may bring drought instead. Our district rules do not allow that.

A fourth and broader concern is the imprecise definitions in the proposed restrictions. When calculating whether water level decline is above or below allowable goals, is it for a one year period or a five year period? The restrictions currently define it both ways in its different clauses.



districts have to rearrange their management to preserve more water and the HPWD has set a goal that 50 percent of the aquifer would still be preserved 50 years from now."

"When you go to the HPWD meetings this month, take a friend or two, the more voices the better. But don't be belligerent. Document how these restrictions will affect your and your community. Recommend measures that can be taken that will be less severe or can be phased in more gradually."

"Restrictions are going to come to this region and there's nothing you can do to stop that," he continued. "You would rather have the rules being made locally by the HPWD than by some bureaucrat in Austin and the HPWD can be on your side on these issues."

"Can you form your own committee in this region to prepare your case?" he asked. "Could you consider hiring a hydrologist to make his own, more detailed, analysis in response to the models the bureaucrats are using that may not be very accurate?"

Farwell's Mark Williams proposed that just such a committee be created with representatives from all the region's farming communities.





To start the second guarter, Crist hit on a layup, but cold shooting and the Navajo Pine press pulled them to a 22-15 lead.

Navajo Pine extended their lead to 7 again, although Jordyn Cooper hit a couple of 3-pointers.

With less than a minute left on the clock Texico got the ball, trailing by 2, and had shots under the basket, but couldn't convert.

The Lady Wolverines finished the campaign with a sparkling 27-3 mark. Navajo Pine, which lost to Texico in last year's state title game, was 25-6.

The Texico Lady Wolverines beat the Dulce Hawks, 53-38, in the State Semifinal game on March 10.

The Lady Wolverines started with a lead when Anderson hit a layup before the clock had time to start. Jordyn Cooper followed up with a 3-pointer.

Texico went 1 for 6 from behind the arc as the Hawks came back and took a 3 point lead.

Good defense by Lucero and Crist forced turnovers and the Cooper twins pulled Texico to a one point lead at the end of the first quarter.

Dulce was outmatched in the second quarter, scoring only 3 points. Texico, meanwhile, went on a 17 point run to increase their lead to 27-12.

Jaylyn Cooper and Lucero both hit 3-pointers and Anderson went to the free throw line twice after making buckets.

Things were more even one-sided in Texico's favor in the 3rd quarter as Anderson blocked 3 shots and good rebounding led to shots under the basket.

Dulce went on a run and closed the gap to 9 points in the 4th quarter.

A timeout centered the team and Crist and the Cooper twins sparked Texico to a 9-point run.

Anderson sealed the game by blocking another Dulce shot.

Don't get hit with a penalty! "Render" your taxable property by April 15th.

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1st of this year.

Who must file a rendition?

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income - such as the inventory and equipment used by a business. If you render late, don't render or file an incomplete or false rendition, a 10% to 50% penalty may be imposed.

Are there any advantages to you?

The advantages of filing a rendition are:

• You give your opinion of your property's value. The appraisal district must notify you in writing of any value to the appraisal review board.

• You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.

· You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 2009. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 2010.

What's the deadline?

The last day for filing 2010 renditions is April 15. You can get an automatic extension to May 15 if you ask for it in writing on or before the April 15 deadline. The chief appraiser may grant an additional 15 days after May 15 for an owner who shows good cause in writing.


