School, Hosp. Board Elections Saturday

Elections for the Farwell School Board and the Farwell Hospital District Board will take place Saturday, April 5.

Polis will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. in the county courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse for registered voters to cast their ballots to elect two persons to the school board and four persons to the hospital district board.

Running uncontested in the school board election for three-year terms are Jim Walker and Billy Mayfield, incumbents. The five board members whose terms are not expiring are Wilbert Kalbas, Joe Hughes, Doyle Ford, Caroline Anderson and Bill Martin.

Incumbents Gwen Hughes, Bert Williams, Ralph Franse and Troy Christian are running unopposed for re-election to the hospital board. Term of a hospital district board member is two years.

Voters may cast their ballot for the above candidates, or may write in candidates in the spaces provided on the ballot.

Hospital Board members currently serving unexpired terms are Pudge Rose, Jim Berry, LaMoin Williams, Lee Hutchins and Robert White.

Registered voters in the Lazbuddie Independent School District will go to the polls to elect two members to the Board of Education. Voters will cast their ballots in the lobby of the auditorium of Lazbuddie School between the

hours of 7 a.m. and 7 p.m.

Six persons have filed for the two places vacated by Gene Paul Jarman and L.M. Smith who are not running for re-election. Candidates on the ballot are Jerry Engelking, Robert Ivy, Ronald Elliott, Larry Jesko, Mike S. Miller and Glenn Lusk.

Persons may vote for any of the above candidates or may write in candidates of their choice in the spaces provided on the ballot.

Voters in Muleshoe will go to the polls to elect two councilmen and two school board members, all for three-year terms.

Incumbent Robert Finney is running unopposed for place one on the council, and incumbent A.V. Wood is running unopposed for the place two position.

In the school board election, Ronnie Holt and R.D. Angeley are both running unopposed for re-election.

In Bovina, city council and school board elections will also be held. The mayor and three alderman seats are up for election, each for a two-year term. The three school board positions are for three-year terms.

Mayor R.R. Lusk is running unopposed for re-election. Incumbent Dale Gober is vying for re-election to one of the three alderman positions. Also running for three of the five alderman posts are Tom Griffith, Billy J. Charles, Gary

Carson, Royce Grissom and Dean Hastings. The terms of E.B. Caldwell and Larry Webb are expiring but they are not seeking re-election. Aldermen Fred O'Hare and Rouel Barron are not up for election at this time.

Running for the three positions open on the Bovina School Board are Thomas Ware and Keith Garner, incumbents, and Richard Steelman, Larry Webb, Jon Lin Riddle and Wayne McClaran. James Clayton is not seeking

re-election.

Friona voters will elect a mayor and two aldermen on the city council and two at-large positions on the school board. Each position is for a two-year term.

Mayor B.K. Buske is unopposed in his candidacy and Aldermen Clarence Monroe and Mike Chaney are also unopposed.

Jerry Hinkle and Jerry London, both unopposed, are seeking re-election.

set them back for a few days as the shock of the cold air struck.

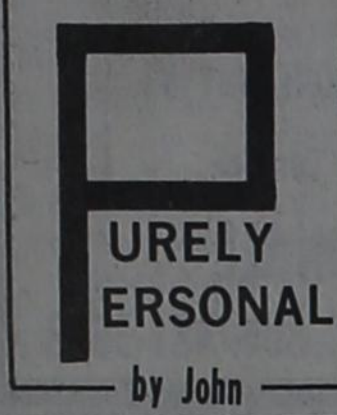

The snow was short-lived as 'ol' Sol came out and soon melted away what residents hope was winter's last fling. These pictures show how deep the snow accumulated atop tree limbs, car tops and houses as there was virtually no wind to accompany the storm to cause drifting.

This twaddle from the media that is currently featuring Three Mile Island plus one year. Try as we might we have not ever seen a massive hole in the ground attributable to the TMI accident. We have not seen hordes of maimed people; in fact, we have not even heard of anybody drowning.

Yet the "catastrophe" of TMI has been ballyhooed by television as a major disaster. Film coverage of demonstrations are played nightly and somber, long-faced commentators are still frightening the young and stupid with horror tales concerning the havoc wreaked on the community.

Who is being served by this continual flood of "hype"? Certainly not the country or the people, only the television networks in search of audience rating points -- urk.

Paul Harvey had an excellent observation on the masses of young people demanding an end to nuclear power generation. He said if they succeed in cutting off power by curtailment of nuclear generators, then to conserve the fuel oil for power generation we should raise the driving age to at least 26 years.

Well, at our advanced age we would not be too badly misput if they also cut the use of electric energy for discos, amplifiers and assorted youthful frivolities. We're joking, of course -- or are we?

We are confused about the so-called balanced budget. In fact we are so befuddled we cannot understand how spending more money next fiscal year than we spent last fiscal year will cool down galloping inflation.

In the mish-mash of figures we have gleaned this picture of our financial situation: This fiscal year we were budgeted to spend approximately \$590 billion. We will overspend this by approximately \$30 billion this year. The President's original 1981 budget called for us to spend approximately \$660 billion. When the inflation spiral took off in a wild dash he cut back approximately \$20 billion of projected spending.

This is still over what we spent this year, so the balance comes from whacking on ADDITIONAL thirty to forty billion bucks out of the taxpayer's already depleted pocketbook. He may be fighting the fires of inflation but we think he is using napalm to do it with.

Junior smashed the clock and lamp. Junior hacked the tree: (Destructive trends are treated in chapter II and III).

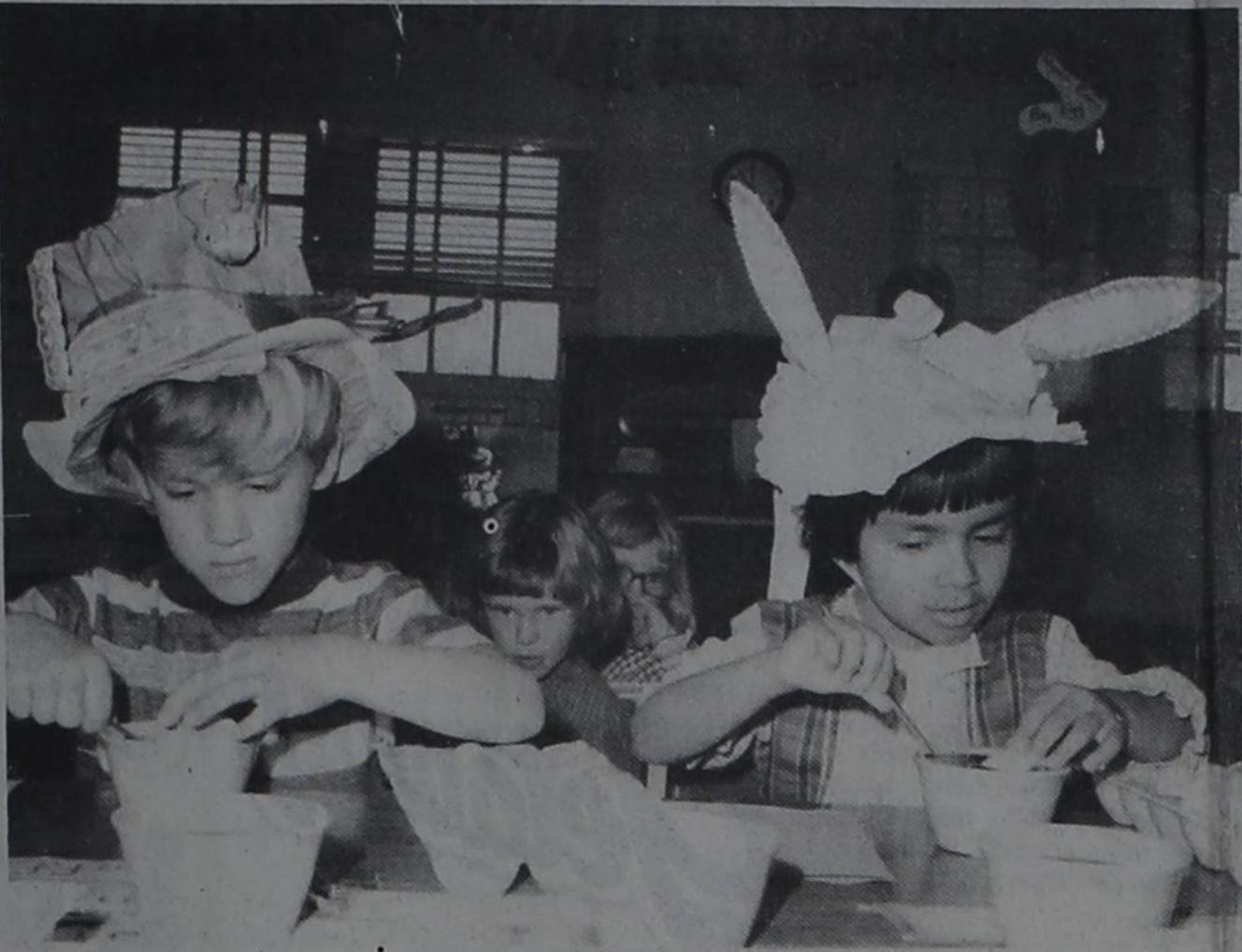
Junior threw his milk at Mom. Junior screamed for more: (Notes on self assertiveness are found in chapter IV).

Threet and Jaquess are now in Parmer County jail awaiting arraignment and setting of bonds. The juvenile girl has been released to her parents and will appear in Curry County juvenile court for

"There are still stolen items being recovered in the case and I feel that a lot more burglaries will be cleared up before we are through," said Sheriff Lovelace. "I think these people were responsible for the biggest part of the thefts that have been going on around here," he added.

Other investigation by the sheriff's department included a report by Chuck's Spraying Service in Bovina that someone had driven all over a slab of wet cement at that business.

Bill Bourlon, who lives seven miles north of Farwell, reported the entry of his barn where a two-way Motorola radio was taken. The radio recently had been removed

from a vehicle and placed in the barn. Bourlon said it could have been missing from the barn two or three days before it was discovered.

Gasohol Hearing Set

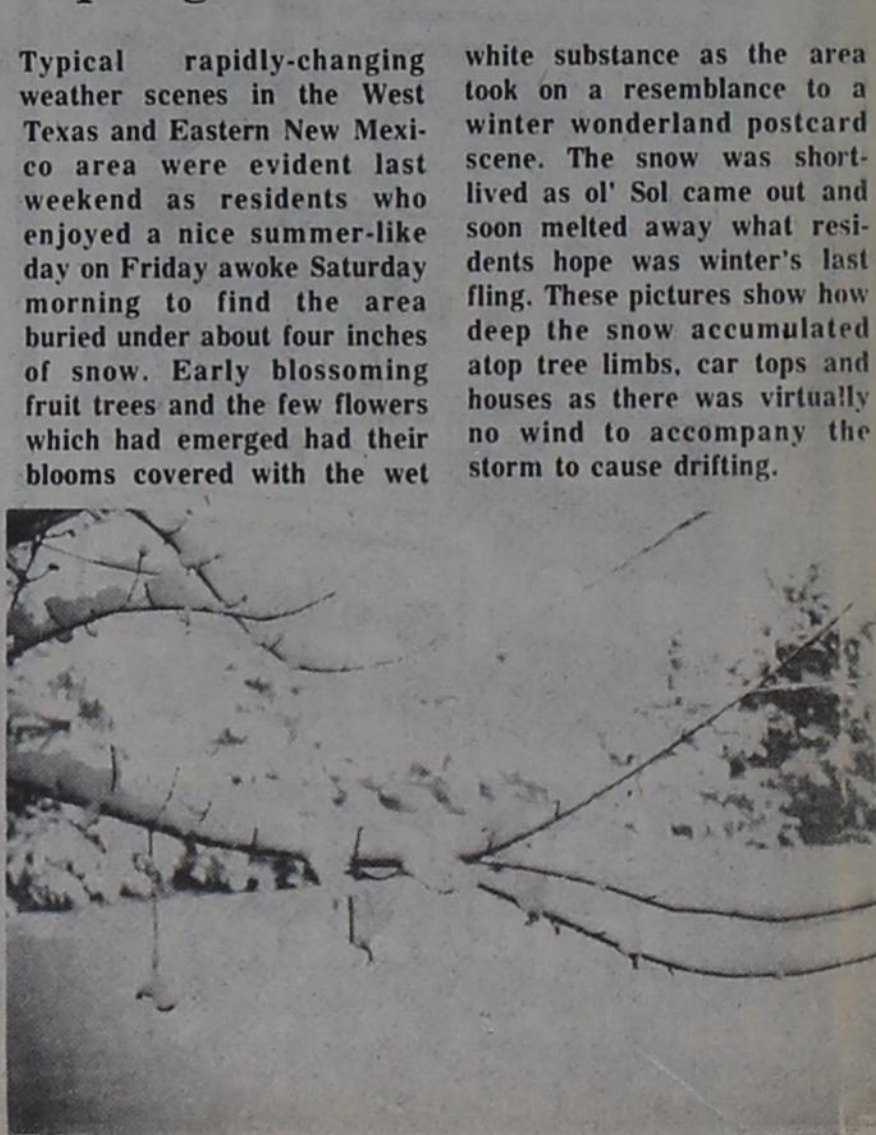

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Services Held Tuesday For Judge E. Stone

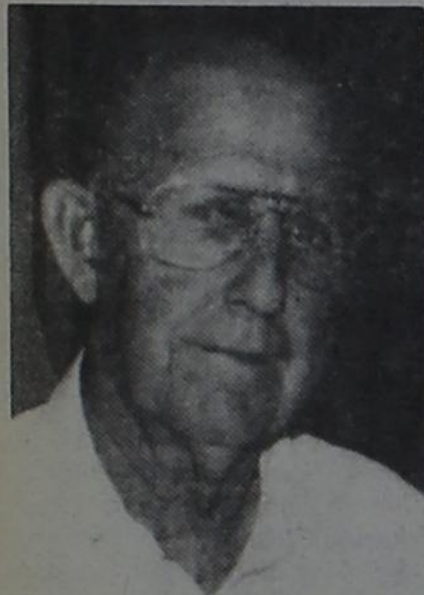

SBA Loan Information Available To Farmers

Texas farmers and ranchers who want information about the disaster recovery loan program of the U.S. Small Business Administration now have a toll-free number they may call, says Seth Ralston, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

SBA has already assisted more than 10,000 agricultural producers in Texas, and this

toll-free number will make it easier for farmers throughout Texas to receive information about the SBA program.

Farmers who have questions about being eligible or how to apply for an agricultural disaster loan may receive a brief explanation by calling, toll-free, 1-800-692-4296 from anywhere within Texas. If a farmer has already applied to SBA for assistance, he may leave his name, address and

phone number with the receptionist and a loan officer familiar with the application will call back at once using another line rather than tying up the toll-free number for any length of time.

SBA physical disaster loans are available in counties recommended by the governor and subsequently designated by the SBA administrator. Loans are made only for crop losses not already covered by insurance or other disaster or deficiency payments.

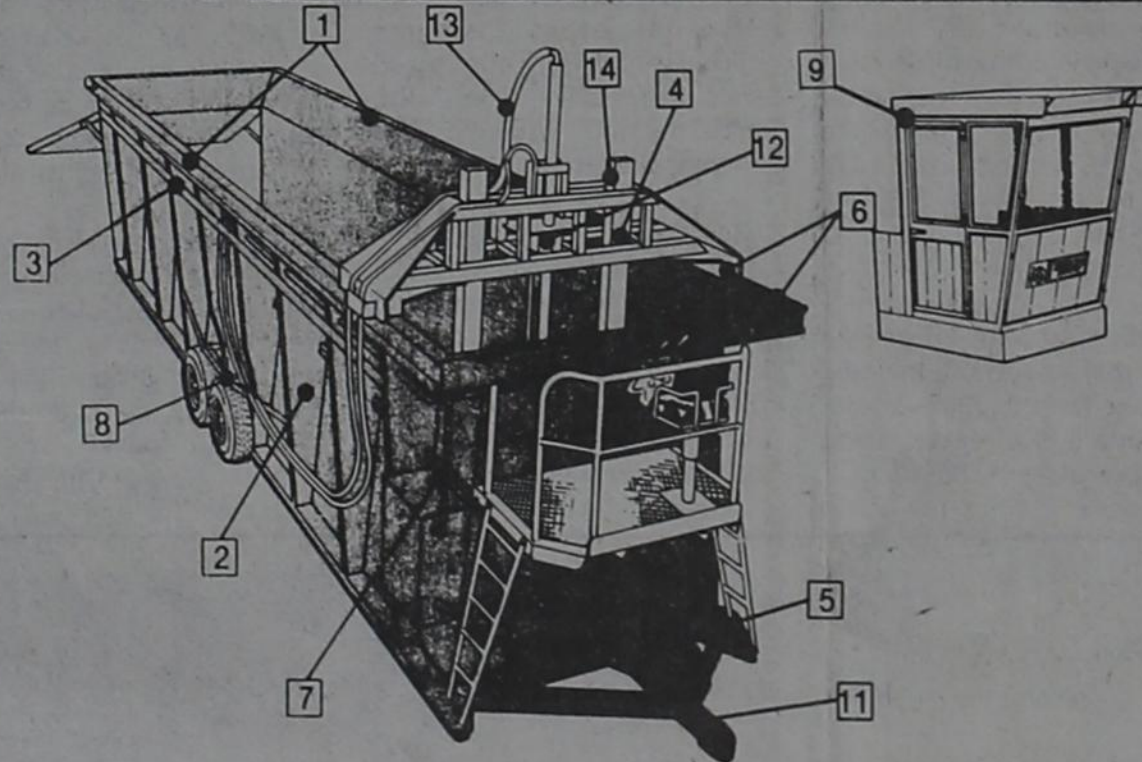
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Promoted To M/Sergeant

The sergeant is a 1964 graduate of Lebanon Senior High School, Lebanon, N.H.

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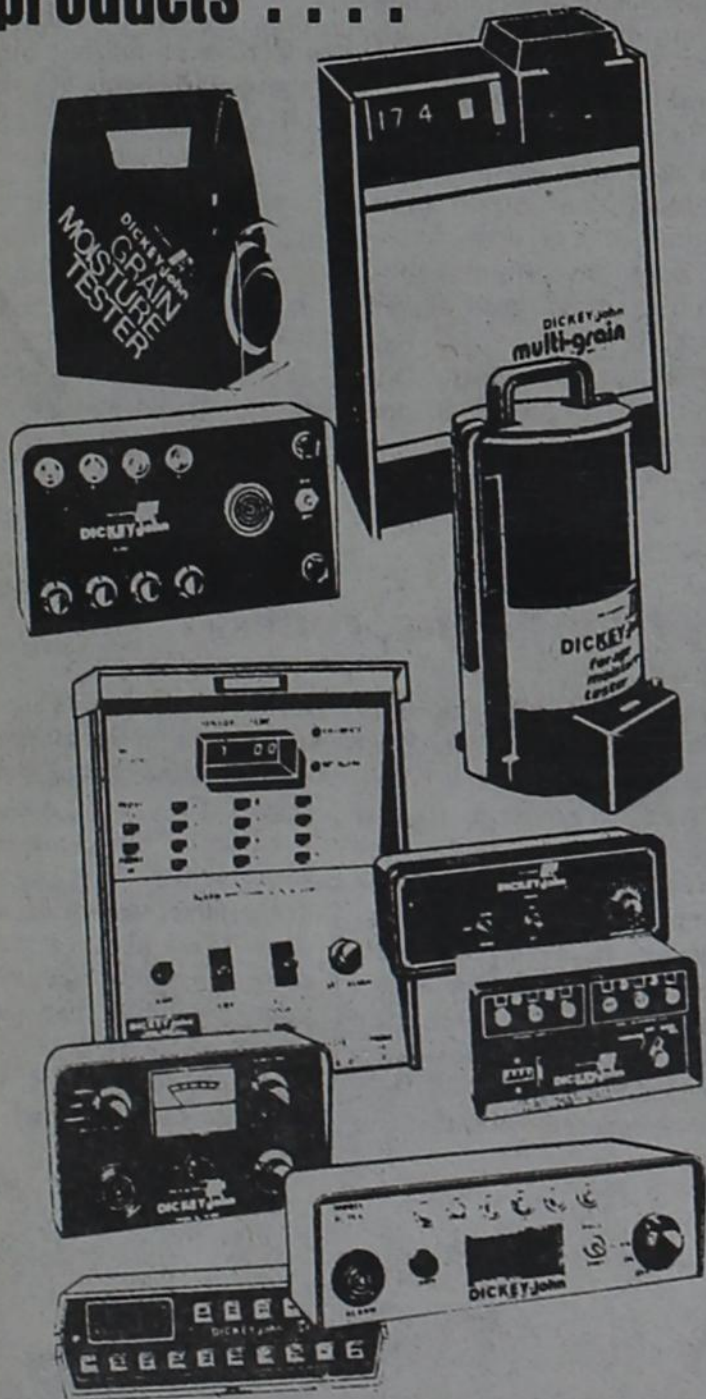
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Farwell And Vega Win District Play Contest

New tax laws help homeowners

COLLEGE STATION — Homeowners and potential homeowners may be losing money by not taking advantage of new tax laws, says Dr. Jack Friedman of the Texas Real Estate Research Center at Texas A&M University.

Friedman cites the little known tax advantage of home ownership that allows the individual buying water and sewage services from a township or municipality to deduct a portion of the monthly bill from income tax. The portion of the bill which represents assessment for maintenance, repairs or interest is deductible. Friedman suggests municipal services users contact the billing authority for information.

Another tax savings the homeowner might consider is the reduction of fuel costs through improvements. Energy laws allow tax credits for money spent on insulation, storm windows, caulking and other energy-saving features. This would result in lower utility costs as well as allow partial recovery of costs through tax credits.

Coach Paul Topliff, head football coach at Texico High School, announced last Thursday that he has accepted the position of athletic director and head football coach at Bovina High School. Topliff tendered his resignation to the Texico School last Friday.

Coach Topliff said he had too nice an offer from Bovina to turn it down, and welcomed the opportunity to go to the school and try to build up its athletic program as he did the one in Texico.

The THS football team's overall record for the four years that Topliff has been coach at Texico stands at 28-14. The record for the last two years is 21-3.

He is the only coach that ever led the Wolverines to win back to back football titles, and is credited with building the football program at Texico. "I feel that I'm leaving the program in good shape. Next year will be a rebuilding year for the team but they have some good stock to work

with," stated Topliff.

"I would especially like to thank the school administration, Mr. Pierce and Mr. Harding, for all the excellent cooperation and help that they gave to me while I was here. Without their help and the help of the school boards that have served while I coached, I would have been unable to build the program they now have. Texico has one of the superior athletic programs in the state at the present time, as far as I am concerned," Topliff added.

Topliff said he got a good feeling from talking to the Bovina administration and members of the Bovina School Board and thinks that with that type of cooperation he can build up the athletic program to its fullest potential.

ST. PAUL AND THE RESURRECTION

The Apostle Paul, in discussing the resurrection of the dead, came to the simple and valid conclusion: "If there be no resurrection of the dead, then is Christ not risen" (1 Cor. 15:13). But the Apostle does not stop here. Hear him as he presses a further argument home: "And if Christ be not risen, THEN IS OUR PREACHING VAIN, AND YOUR FAITH IS ALSO VAIN" (Vers. 14). And this leads to yet another conclusion: "If Christ be not raised, your faith is vain; YE ARE YET IN YOUR SINS. Then they also which are fallen asleep in Christ are perished" (Vers. 17, 18). These are frank words about stern realities. If there is no such thing as bodily resurrection of the dead, then Christ has not been raised from the dead, and if this is the case, we have no living Savior. But, granting all this, can we believe in what is palpably impossible? Ah, but is resurrection palpably impossible? Paul answers this question quite simply in this same discussion in 1 Corinthians 15: "But some man will say, 'how are the dead raised up? And with what body do they come?' (Ver. 35). This is not an interested question, but a challenge meant to prove that resurrection is possible, and the Apostle answers it as such: "Thou fool, that which thou sowest is not quickened except it die" (Ver. 36). What a devastating reply! We may point out all the reasons why resurrection is "impossible," but after all is said and done we are still surrounded by overwhelming evidence that it is a fact. Every blade of grass, every ear of corn, every beautiful flower bears witness to the fact of resurrection. Yes, Christ is alive from the dead, and "able to save them to the uttermost that come unto God by Him..." (Heb. 7:25).

Many of the things they learned about Easter were centered on spring such as Easter signifying the new birth of all things that have been dead.

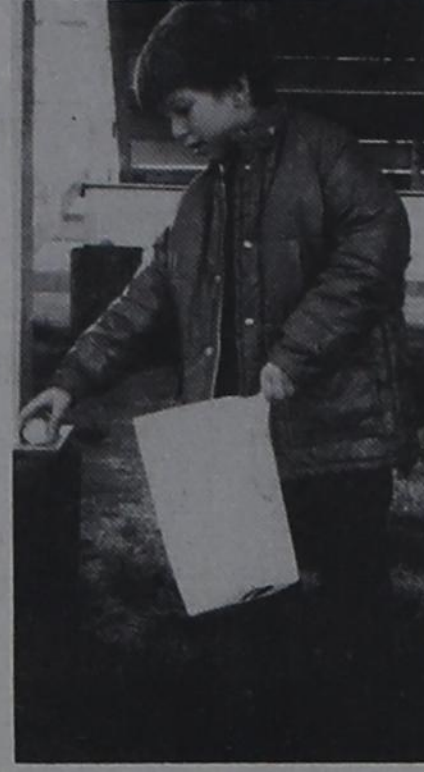

Short Course To Aid Swine Producers

New techniques to help improve production and management in a changing swine industry will be provided West Texas pork producers at the annual Texas A&M University Swine Shortcourse at Plainview, Wednesday, April 9.

Leading animal scientists and producers from Texas, Kentucky, Kansas and Missouri will conduct the daylong program at the Hale County Agricultural Center south of Plainview. Seth Ralston, Parmer County Extension agent, said. There is a \$7 registration fee for the course and lunch is provided. Dr. Robert S. Cohen, area swine specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said.

The course begins at 8 a.m. and adjourns at 4:05 p.m. It is organized and sponsored by the Extension service. Cooperating with it are the department of animal science at A&M, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas Pork Producers Assn., and

Texas Pork Producers Board.

The changing swine industry, including an outlook for hog and feed prices and hog numbers, will be presented by Glenn Grimes. He is a professor and livestock marketing specialist in the department of agricultural economics at the University of Missouri, Columbia, MO.

A practical swine herd health program will be outlined by Dr. David A. Schone-weis, veterinarian and associate professor in the department of surgery and medicine at Kansas State University, Manhattan, Kan.

Ways they have improved their swine production system will be explained by Lawrence, Tommy and Don Berend, swine producers from Windthorst. Charles Axtell, co-owner of Sunny Side Pork Producers at Springlake, will report on his triple-deck swine nursery.

Swine production costs in various systems will be discus-

sed by Dr. Gary R. Parker, Extension swine specialist with the University of Kentucky.

The economics of fresh pork plants will be discussed by Dr. Gene Mathia, chairman of the department of agricultural economics at Texas Tech University, Lubbock.

Reports on swine research being conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station will be given by Dr. D.A. Knabe and Dr. T.D. Tanksley Jr. Knabe is an assistant professor of animal science with the Experiment Station. Tanksley is a professor and swine specialist with the Experiment station and the Extension service. Both are from College Station.

Bryan Ashburn, a swine and grain producer at Plains, will tell how he uses his 80-sow swine operation to sell grain he produces.

Moderators for the short-course will be Cohen and Dr. William B. Thomas, Extension swine specialist from College Station.

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Oklahoma Lane Exchange --

WT Rural Tele. To Offer New Services

A new building which will house a new digital switch telephone system is being constructed five miles east of Farwell to improve on the present telephone system in the Oklahoma Lane exchange area. According to Tom Hyer,

representative of West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative of Hereford, the building should be completed during the latter part of April and the new equipment should arrive during the next two weeks.

"The total operation is scheduled to be completed and effective by September 20," stated Hyer.

Indications are that the new system will provide better local and long distance service for the customers, and the new long distance lines which will route the calls through Amarillo instead of Clovis should cut down on problems, according to Hyer. The new equipment will also allow touch-tone (push button) dialing and other customer calling features. The switch-over will not change the calling pattern for the customers and there will not be any change in either long distance or local service rates because of the new system.

Soon to be available to the customers is the touch-tone dialing and other features. "The new equipment is the only way we could offer these new services to our customers," Hyer said.



New Telephone Building

Workers were busy this week on construction of a new building which will house more modern, up-to-date equipment for Oklahoma Lane telephone customers. The building is scheduled to be completed the latter part of this month. According to representatives of West Texas Rural Telephone the new system should be operative by September 20. Site of the new building is five miles east of Farwell on Highway 70-81.
