Anyway, I hope the new year is a good one for you and your family. And be optimistic. It keeps wrinkles off your face.



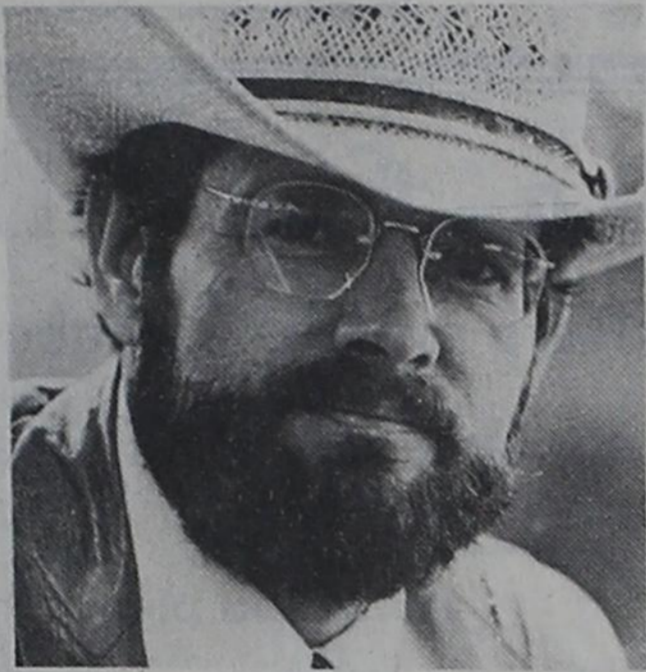
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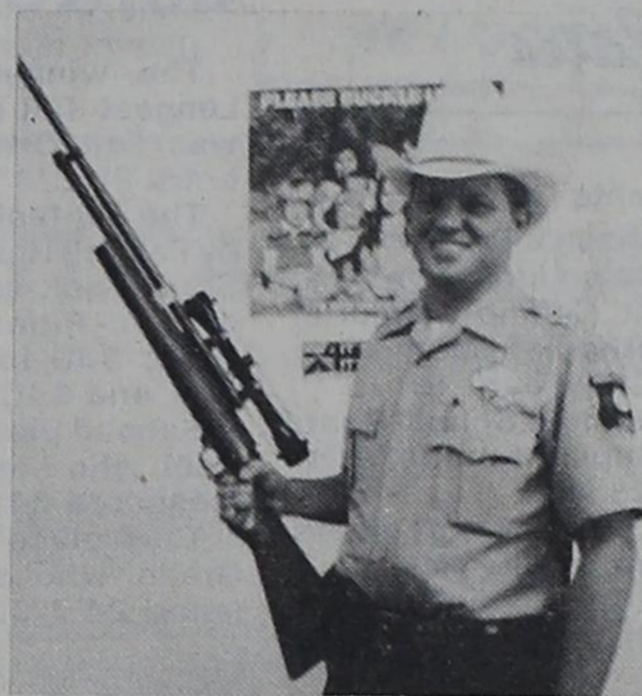
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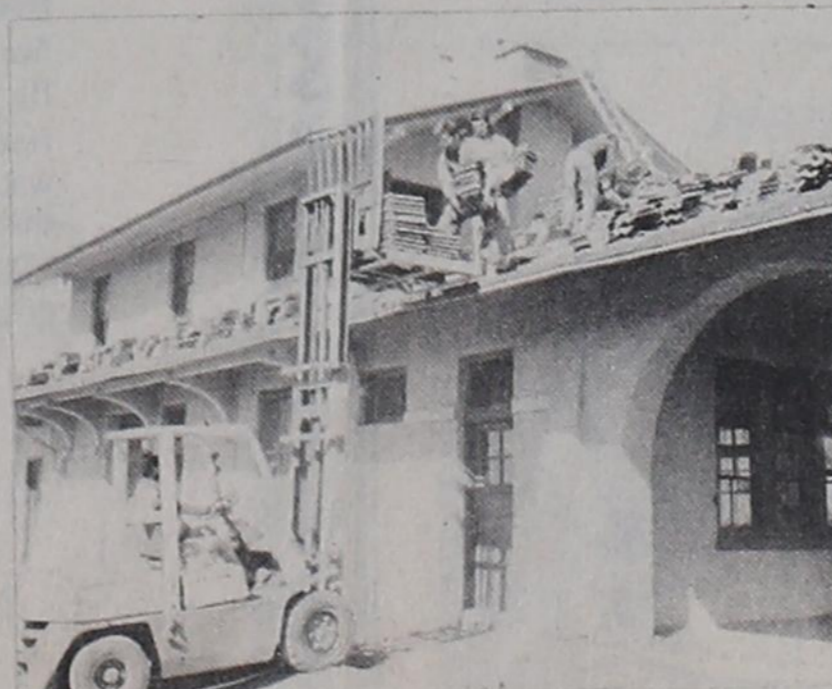

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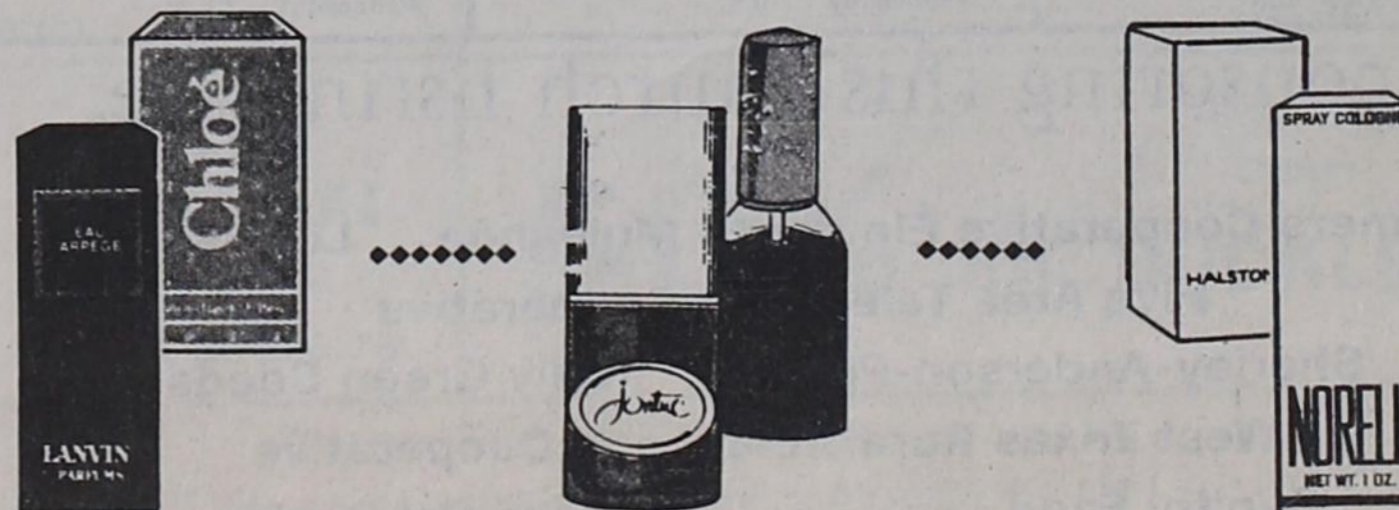


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Steers, 18-1, capture Sudan Tournament

Recipe of Week

Crunchy Chicken Italia

- 1 C. ground pecans
 - 1/2 C. grated Parmesan cheese
 - 1/2 tsp. garlic salt
 - 1/2 tsp. dried basil
 - 1 lb. boneless, skinless chicken breasts
 - Lemon juice
 - 2 T. olive oil
- Combine pecans, Parmesan cheese, garlic salt and basil (extra coating may be stored in airtight container in dry, cool location). Dip chicken in lemon juice and coat with pecan coating. Heat 1 tablespoon oil in non-stick skillet over medium heat. Add half of chicken. Cook 3 to 5 minutes on each side or until done. Place chicken on platter, cover to keep warm. Repeat with remaining oil and chicken. Makes 4 servings.

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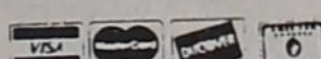
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State picks Farris



Anne R. Farris, principal of Lazbuddie Elementary School is among 250 Texas elementary school principals chosen by the Texas Education Agency to participate in the Texas School Improvement Initiative.

Established by Commissioner of Education W.N. Kirby, the Texas School Improvement Initiative is a statewide program to promote high performance standards of educational quality at the campus level.

"This goal will be accomplished by involving elementary school principals in the new performance-based accreditation process," says Dr. Ruben D. Olivarez, assistant commissioner for accreditation at the Agency. "Each school district in the state is required to receive a full accreditation review every three years. This review includes a comprehensive on-site performance evaluation of school campuses."

To prepare the principals to accompany Texas Education Agency accreditation teams for on-site visits during the 1988-89 school year, a summer training program was carried out in Austin.

"The focus of the training is on characteristics and implementation strategies of effective schools," Olivarez explains. "The principals will also receive training on the accreditation process."

Mrs. Farris is one of 250 principals selected from a pool of 800 applicants statewide. Selection criteria included recommendations by their superintendents, responses to questions related to instructional programs in their schools, and their philosophy on educational improvement.

In addition to the summer training, the principals will also become members of the Academy for Instructional Leadership. This membership will provide them with additional opportunities for future training in the Effective Schools concept, Olivarez concludes.

New sheriff wants some night patrols

One change that new Parmer County Sheriff Rex Williams looks forward to is re-arranging the schedule of his deputies so that some night patrolling can be done in the county.

Williams took over his new post Jan. 1 after 8 years as a police officer in Friona, seven of which were as deputy police chief. He succeeds Bill Morgan.

In an interview with the State Line Tribune, Williams said he will keep the current four deputies: Pat Howard, Jerry Atchley, Bob Davis and Don Pennington.

All four deputies are assigned to Parmer County as a whole, but Davis, who lives in Friona, will be stationed there, and Pennington, who lives in Bovina, will be stationed there. Howard and Atchley, both of Farwell, will be stationed in Farwell with Williams.

Williams said he plans to take his time and get oriented with his new post before he starts making changes. He plans to meet with the county commissioners and county attorney Charles Aycock, also.

But he feels strongly some night patrolling is needed in the county. And he feels his present staff is sufficient to handle this. "It may be a month or two before we get

organized on this, but I plan to change the shifts with the men I have now," Williams said.

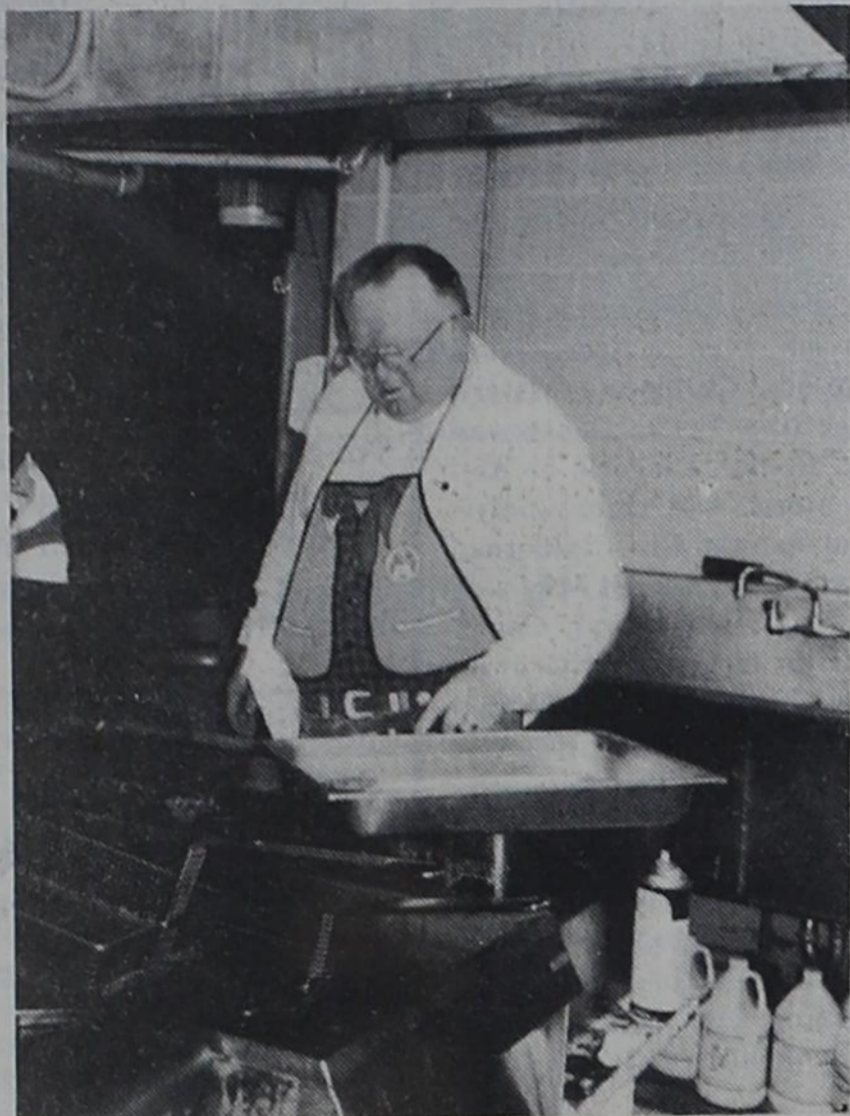
He was pragmatic in saying that night patrolling couldn't be done on a nightly basis, but felt that some night patrolling would be better than none.

He also pointed out that this could save the county some money on overtime pay. Currently, since the deputies work day shifts, when they are called out at night it counts as overtime.

Williams noted that since

the sheriff's office runs the jail, a deputy is always needed in the courthouse, or close to it. "But I'm going to have deputies out as much as I can. All I need in the office is one man," he added.

As for recent Farwell problems with traffic violations, before he takes a stand on this issue Williams plans to talk with Aycock on what parameters the sheriff's office has, and also to study the problem in more depth. He said he hasn't talked with Farwell Mayor Chris Gikas about it yet.

Kassahn ordered to pay feedlot

Last week, 108th state District Judge Jairl Dowell ordered Parmer County cattleman Jim Kassahn and his wife to pay Barrett-Crofoot Inc., a Deaf Smith County feedlot company, about \$5 million, reports the Amarillo Daily News.

The Amarillo newspaper said the feedlot inherited claims of First National Bank against the Kassahns in a settlement with the bank, a lawyer for the bank stated. The bank had sued Barrett-Crofoot to prevent the company from selling cattle the bank claimed was collateral for a loan it made to the Kassahns.

The Amarillo newspaper said other rulings by Dowell dismissed the Kassahns' pleadings regarding a financial note and denied objections they filed to pleadings of Barrett-Crofoot. Also, claims of conversion, fraudulent concealment and other wrongdoings by the Kassahns were ordered stricken unless they are re-pleaded to state a cause of action.

First National had sued

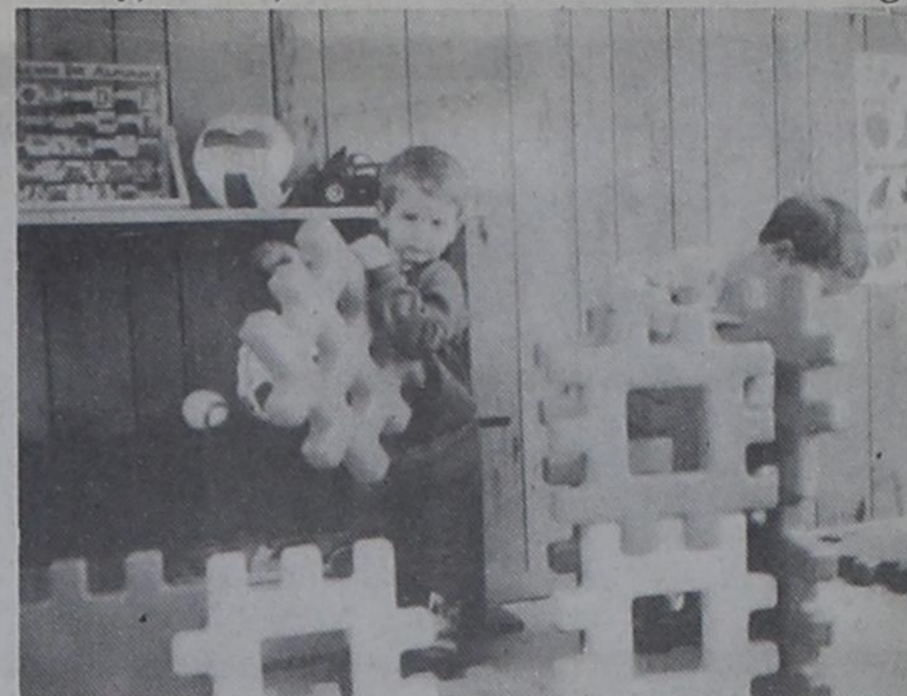
the cattle company owned by the Kassahns in August 1987, seeking payment of a multi-million dollar loan. Kassahn was accused of misrepresenting his ownership of 37,000 head of cattle.

Claiming Kassahn didn't abide by loan requirements, the bank declared its loan in default and called in the reported \$12 million of guaranteed principal balance on the outstanding note, about \$5 million which was owed to a Dallas bank.

Kassahn filed for bankruptcy reorganization in September 1987.

On Nov. 21, 1988, Kassahn entered a guilty plea in U.S. District Court in Lubbock to a fraud charge, the Amarillo newspaper said. He admitted defrauding Hale County State Bank in Plainview by using the same securities as collateral for loans at that bank and a Dallas bank in 1987.

The maximum punishment for the crime is five years in prison, a \$250,000 fine and possible double restitution.

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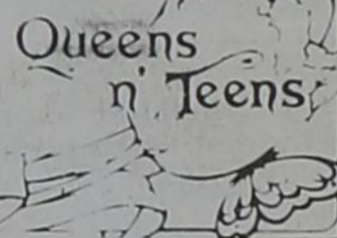
