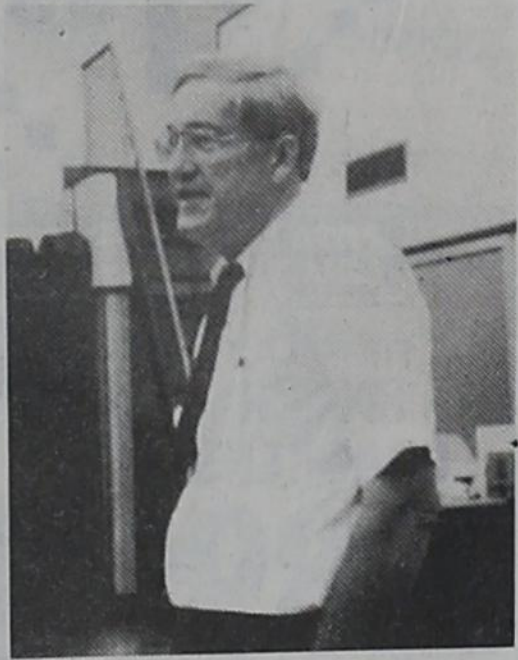

Sabine Zeller is Farwell High School's Rotary Club foreign exchange student. She comes to the U.S. from Pepinster, Belgium, a town of about 10,000.

Sabine first will be living near Farwell on the Darrell Stephens farm. Her host family includes Darrell, Eva Dean, Kaci, Kendra, and Chantse Stephens (although Kaci and Kendra will be away at college most of the year).

At home, her family consists of her father, Leon, a marketing manager for IBM Computers; her mother, Claire, a homemaker, and a brother, Laurent, 21.

Sabine's home town is located near Liege, and is about 1 1/2 hours from Brussels - depending upon traffic.

Her home country is more densely populated than Texas. According to Sabine, Belgium is about 1/20th the size of Texas. It is known for lace making, chocolate, cheese manufacturing, and crystal.

The Stephens family was really impressed by the wonderful chocolates that Sabine brought with her from Belgium. And Sabine is learning to enjoy some simple American favorites such as "sloppy joes," and Rice Krispie squares while she is here.

Sabine's first impressions of West Texas included the smell of the feed lots, and the intense heat.

When she returns to Belgium, Sabine will study chemistry and biology.

German girl attends FHS

Mona Schenk, 17, is one of Farwell High School's foreign exchange students. She comes to us from Coburg, Germany.

Coburg is a city of about 42,000 people located in the hills of northern Bavaria. The lovely historic city is about 930 years old. It is an insurance center and a manufacturing center where auto parts and windows are

manufactured.

Some of the first differences Mona noticed between her homeland and West Texas were: round fields, flat landscape, and the way that houses look.

"Here they have little roofs (indicating a low pitched roof with her hands as she spoke) and they are all on one floor. All the houses

here have nice back yards and basketball hoops and garages," she noticed. Unlike many Europeans, Mona and her parents live in a home of their own.

Mona's father, Klaus, is a teacher. Her mother, Waltraud, is a housewife who gives private lessons in Latin and English.

Mona will be staying with the Richard Miller family while she is in Farwell. Because she has no brothers or sisters in Germany, she is looking forward to the experience of liv-

ing in a family that includes Richard and Nancy Miller and their children: Molly, Steven, Jason, and Megan.

Mona enjoys playing basketball, reading, swimming, and horseback riding. She has played piano for 10 years, and this year she will learn to play the saxophone at Farwell High School.

When she returns to her homeland she will have two more years of schooling ahead of her. She plans to study Latin, Greek and German so that she can become a teacher.

Danish girl staying with the Austins

Kristina Kruse comes to Farwell from a small town near Hamlet's hometown, Elsinore, Denmark.

"I'd spell it (the town's name) for you, but you don't have all the letters in your language," she noted. Her hometown of about 8,000 people is nestled in the rolling countryside of Denmark.

To get to Farwell, Kristina traveled from her hometown to Copenhagen, Denmark, and then to Manchester, England. From there she flew to New York for two days of orientation.

"I didn't like the air," she says of New York. Then she quickly added something positive, "It's an impressive city with big buildings, it makes you feel so small." She thought for a moment and then added, "It was hard to get to sleep; there was so much noise."

From New York she flew to Dallas on Aug. 8, and then on to Lubbock where she was met by her host family, the Stan Austins.

Her first reaction to the weather in these parts was "it was really hot."

Living on a farm will be a new experience for Kristina, but she thinks that she will enjoy it. English style riding has been her hobby for the past 10 years, and she hopes to learn Western style riding here. The fact that the Austins have room for a horse was very appealing to her.

The Austin family: Stan, Karen, Clint, and Lyndi are active in 4-H activities here. Kristina will probably learn a few things about 4-H, farming, and hog raising while she lives on the Austin farm.

Kristina has registered for

her classes at Farwell High School: physics, athletics, history, biology, English, Spanish I, and photo journalism, and she is looking forward to the start of the school year.

"She is only required to take English and history, but she chose to take a full load," said Mrs. Austin of her new daughter. Kristina hopes to be a veterinarian, and she knows that she will have to make the most of the opportunity to study while she is here.

Kristina is accustomed to taking a full load of classes in Denmark and working at a part time job as well. She worked in a bakery/ cafe where customers could get a cup of coffee, a sandwich or a piece of cake.

When she returns to Denmark she will attend the gymnasium, which is something like junior college, and then she will take 7 years of veterinary training. About half of her veterinarian training will be classroom training, and the other half will be practical work with animals. She will be in school until she is nearly 27 years old.

The Kruse family consists of Kristina, parents Karsten and Alice, and one brother, Frederik, 21. Both of her parents work. Her father is a self-employed electrician. Her mother keeps the books for her dad's business; she is an auditor.

Kristina's brother, Frederik is in the Danish army. He will soon finish training to become a guard at the palace. Denmark is ruled by Queen Magrethe and Prince Henrik. Frederik will probably go into police work when he completes his military tour.

Mrs. Hodnett returned to teach at Farwell this fall because she had a "good experience here."

"Farwell is really working hard to improve its school," she notes. "Everybody here give 110% of their time and energy to school. I appreciate that."

Nancy Miller will be a music para-professional this fall, or as she says "Just call me the 'Band-Aide.'" Nancy has been playing piano since she was in the first grade. Most folks here have heard this talented lady sing and play the piano at the Baptist Church or at Border Town Days. She will assist the band director and help with the junior high drama classes.

Nancy and her husband Richard have four children: Molly, Steven, Jason, and Megan, plus a new "daughter," Mona Schenk of Coburg, Germany.

Terry Hunt will teach 2nd grade at Farwell Elementary School this year. She is a graduate of Elida High School, and attended New Mexico State University and Texas Tech. She and her husband, Chris, lived in Seminole the past 11 years. They have two children: Ashlee, 8, and Keith, 6.

Sheryl Taylor will be an aide at Farwell Elementary School this year. She is working toward a degree in elementary education major with language arts minor at ENMU. She did her practicum at Farwell Elementary School last year.

Sheryl is a local girl. She is married to Greg Taylor; they have three children: Brock, 13; Matthew, 11; and Shara, 8.

Jimmy Taylor will be coaching girls sports and teaching world history and government at Farwell High School this fall.

The Plains native is a graduate of Baylor University, and has worked in Goliad, Coleman and Lubbock. He moved here to be closer to his family in the Plains area.

Larry Smith will teach physical science, physics, trigonometry, and consumer math at Farwell High School this year.

The Portales native received his bachelor's degree from Eastern New Mexico University, and he has done most of his work towards his master's degree there.

Candis and her husband, Lyndon, are expecting their first child.



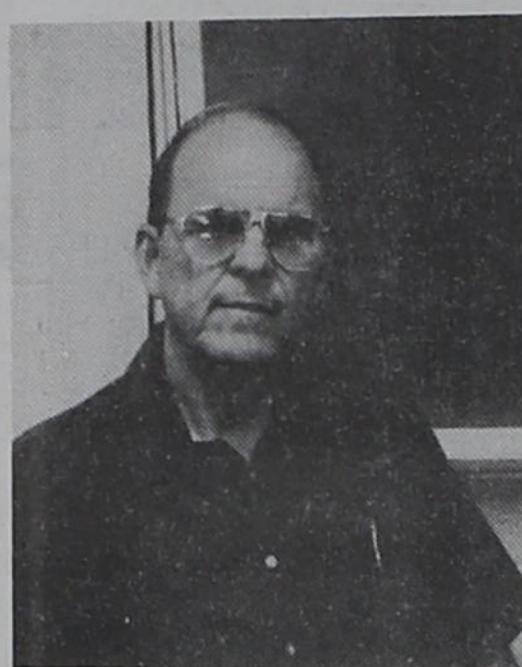

Texico groups involved in recycling projects

Three different Texico groups are engaged in recycling projects.

National Honor Society recycles glass, aluminum cans, tin cans, and recyclable plastic.

"This is our only money making project," said sponsor Juanita Hadley. Folks may drop off recyclable materials at her home or take it to Archie's Recycling in Clovis and ask that the items be credited to the Texico National Honor Society.

- Please bundle newspapers.
- Computer paper must be free of carbon paper.
- There is a #1 or #2 recyclable symbol on all recyclable plastics except milk cartons and soft drink bottles which are also recyclable.
- Glass items must be clean, unbroken glass vessels which have been used to store food items; please don't try to recycle jars that have been used to store toxic materials such as paint, or gasoline.
- Just about any metal object may be recycled.

These projects not only help our community to be a cleaner, neater place. They also help the organizations to raise money for the children in the organizations.

Farwell's Cole to study in Liechtenstein

Mark Cole of Farwell will participate in a legal internship program that will take him to Europe.

Cole will get three months of intensive language study and 5 months of work in a legal council's office in Liechtenstein through the Martin Hilti Foundation for International Professional Development.

The Hilti Foundation is for

young adults who wish to gain international experience in their occupations or fields of study. The program covers orientation, improvement in language skills and relevant work in the particular host country.

Cole will receive several months of study courses in the host country with a focus on the following key areas: improvement in foreign language skills, and introduction to sectors of the economy, the culture, and the politics of the respective host country.

In the U.S., this will be done at the University of Tulsa. In Germany, this will be done at the Carl Duisberg Company, Radolfszell. Subsequently, practical work for approximately 12 months will take place in a business in the respective host country; in Cole's case it will be Liechtenstein.

Cole is a 1985 Farwell High School graduate. He received a bachelor's degree from Baylor University, worked as a legislative aide in Washington, D.C., and participated in a Rotary foreign exchange program at Trinity College in Ireland.

Cole plans to begin law school at Yale in 1992.

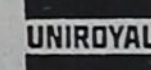

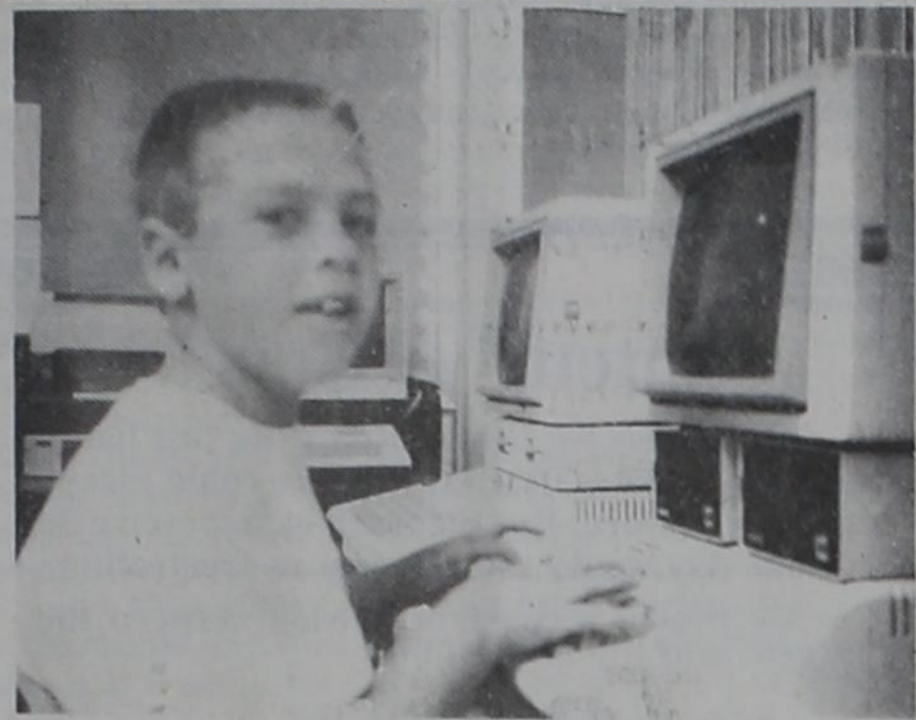

County raises approved

The Parmer County Commissioners are proposing a 1992 budget of \$2,554,000.

This total is down from 1991's \$2,565,033. The 1991 total included funds for courthouse remodeling.

The proposal includes suggested across the board salary raises of 7 percent for elected officials and 5 percent for county employees.

The proposed raises were okayed on a 3-2 vote.

In favor were Tom Ware, Robert White and County Judge Bonnie Clayton. Opposed were Raymond McGehee and Ernest Anthony.

A citizens advisory committee was set up by Clayton, consisting of residents throughout the county.

At Bovina were county commissioners White and Tom Ware, Clayton, and Vi and Gene Hutto. Vi Hutto is Justice of the Peace.

At Friona were county commissioner Ernest Anthony, Clayton, citizens advisory group members Pat Fleming and Carol Ellis, Friona Star publisher Bill Ellis, J'Don Gallman and Elizabeth McClellan.

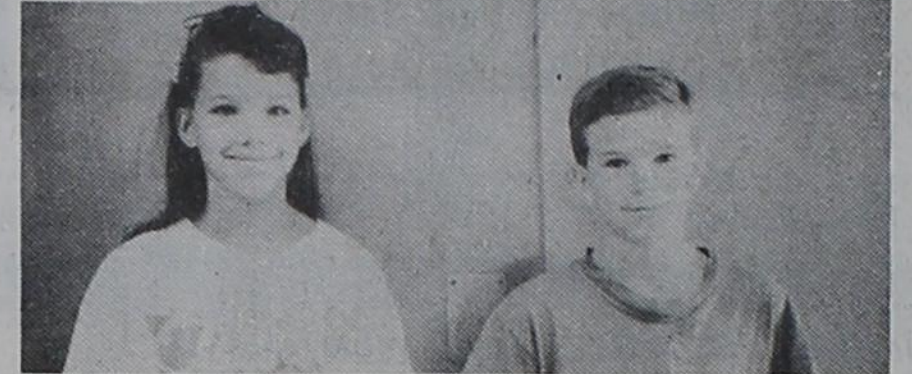

Texico smashes past Dexter, 26-6

Defending state champion Texico got off to a roaring start last Friday with a 26-6 pounding of Dexter, a Class 2A school, in an away game.

The Wolverines have an open date this weekend. Before Dexter knew what was happening, Texico's Josefe Gonzales threw two TD passes in less than a minute.

On the Wolverines' first possession, Gonzales led the team on a 59-yard scoring stretch. Kenny Shaw made two big plays in the drive. First, he ran for 21 yards on a 3rd and 11 play, giving Texico a first down on Dexter's 11 yard line. Then Shaw gained 5 yards on a 3rd and 5 for another first down on the 1 yard line.

Two plays later, Gonzales tossed a TD pass to Charles Williams. Cody Drager kicked the point after and Texico led 7-0.

Dexter took the ensuing kickoff but fumbled almost immediately. Gonzales quickly threw a nifty pass to Johnny Salinas, who raced down the left sideline for a 38-yard TD. Drager's kick was off to the right and Texico led 13-0.

Kelvin Gooden ran in untouched for a TD from 37 yards out in the middle of the second quarter, boosting Texico to a 20-0 halftime lead.

In the second half, Dexter's defense forced Texico to punt on the Wolverines' first possession. But Texico's defense then reciprocated and the Wolverines regained possession on their own 11 yard line.

A clipping penalty against Dexter picked up 15 yards. Four plays later, Gonzales hit Greg Akers with a 60-yard scoring bomb - called back due to illegal procedure. Texico was

making some mental mistakes that cost them a lot of yardage but they never weakened.

Gooden ran 15 yards for a first down to Texico's 44 yard line. Two plays later, Shaw scrambled until he found a hole and raced 46 yards for a TD. Texico now led 26-0. Gooden carried 9 times for 89 yards and Shaw 19 times for 160.

In the 3rd quarter, Dexter threatened to score but its quarterback Delipe Sosa fumbled the ball at midfield. In the final period, Dexter recovered a fumble but their drive was stopped when Gonzales intercepted a pass in the Texico end zone.

Texico's defense played tough and gave the offense time to make big plays. But Texico had another score called back when a holding penalty negated an 82-yard scoring run by Salinas.

Dexter got a break on the next play when they recovered a fumble at the 4 yard line. On the next play, Ramirez ran in for the Demons' only score with 2:5' left in the game.

Dexter tried an onside kick but the ball didn't travel the required 10 yards and Texico got the ball in good field position. But Texico fumbled again with 1:30 left. Dexter got to the Wolverine 20 when time ran out.
