Help prevent fires

October is National Fire Prevention Month and wife Judy had some thoughts on the subject:

Fire kills close to 5,500 people each year - more than any other natural disaster. And Parmer County has had some spectacular fires over the years.

Back in 1906 the XIT ranch was only a small part of the area affected by prairie fires. Prairie fires swept across eastern New Mexico and Texas in spite of the fact that ranchers had burned off the grass and plowed fire guards in many places. Fire destroyed herds, grasslands and homes in an area from Taiban, New Mexico to Hereford, Texas.

In those days there were neither fire departments nor water works to supply fire hydrants. Settlers had to try to beat out the flames before their homes were destroyed.

Parmer County's first courthouse was a wooden structure which housed several small stores in Parmerton. It was destroyed by fire in 1914-1915. The county records were saved and brought to Farwell.

During the winter of 1919-1920 the Farwell Inn, the hotel built by the Capitol Freehold Land Syndicate, was destroyed by fire. Faulty wiring was blamed. The hotel was located next door to the waterworks, but the waterworks was completely frozen, so there was no water to fight the fire.

Reports say that a small fire began near the roof on the south side of the building at about 9 a.m. one morning. Residents spent the entire morning leisurely carrying out everything - even doors and window frames in spite of a howling wind.

More from Judy:

I was really impressed by some of the playing I saw at the Roadrunner Conference Tournament this year. Texico's Lady Spikers, were much, much better volleyball players than the girls in my gym class back in the days before girls' sports became popular. We were lucky if we could get the ball over the net.

Today, girls use the overhand serve instead of the underhand serve that we used back in the dark ages. We were told that overhand serves didn't afford sufficient control to place the ball where we wanted it. The Texico Lady Spikers did a great job of placing the ball, and they had far more power behind their serves than we had.

Our gym teachers used to tell us to set the ball up with our fingertips. The girls today often use two handed returns that have lots of power behind them. They aren't afraid to spike the ball down into the other team's court, or to jump up to kill their opponent's shot.

The Lady Spikers covered the court with great speed and agility. They dove for many balls. For us, volleyball was a relaxed, easy game. Today's girls have to really work.

The most important change in the game is that the girls played with their heads as well as their bodies. We just went out and did what the coach had said to do in practice. The Lady Spikers worked together as a unit.

No action was taken.

- Discussed bushes and trees at two intersections that are hampering motorists' sight. The property owners will be asked to clear the area.

- Heard councilman Ronnie Warmuth say that the Texico Chamber of Commerce is considering putting in 1 or 2 10- to 15 ft. trees around the fountain at KKR Park.

Cochran nabs 4th grid tilt

It's been an up-and-down Area Merchants Football Contest so far this year.

The first week saw soaring scores. The next week, the average was way down. The third week saw "12's" once again. But last week "10" was tops as upsets dominated the schedule.

Five participants in last week's contest got 10 correct. By virtue of being closest to the tie breaker - Whiteface 29, Farwell 6 - the winner of the \$10 cash prize for first place was Cristy Cochran. She was 9 off the tie breaker.

Winner of the second place cash prize of \$5 was Anna Marie Castaneda. She was 10 off the tie breaker.

Although college games held pretty much true to form, the upsets continued at the pro level. Indianapolis knocked Cleveland from the unbeaten ranks, Miami punted Buffalo at Bills' stadium, and the L.A. Rams stunned the Houston Oilers.

Other results were: Sudan over Plains, SMU over TCU, Baylor over Texas Tech, Miami over Colorado, New Mexico over New Mexico State, Chicago over Tampa Bay, and Minnesota kicked a field goal with 1 second left in the game to nip Green Bay.

County's ag offices' site is Farwell Chamber focus

Thomas Reed, director of the Soil Conservation Service (SCS) office in Friona, has responded to a letter sent to him the Farwell Chamber of Commerce's agriculture committee concerning the Madigan Plan which would consolidate three government agricultural offices.

The letter was signed by committee chairman Ralph Franse, Anne Norton, Jerry Don Glover, Tom Nichols and Bert Williams.

Reed said the Madigan plan called for the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), SCS, and Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) offices to be relocated in one building. This is a nationwide plan.

In Parmer County, the SCS office is housed in Friona in

County ends Friona 'crisis'

The Parmer County Commissioners Monday amended its recent decision involving funds to the county's volunteer fire departments so as to accept a request from Friona - which ends the recent crisis.

Last week, the Friona City Council discussed the county commissioners' decision on how to split up its \$50,000 budgeted for fire protection in 1994. That decision included payment of funds in December 1994.

Friona's council then sent a letter to the county commissioners asking that the county's payments to the fire departments begin sooner than December 1994.

The county commissioners voted unanimously Monday to give each fire department a \$5,000 advance in January 1994.

The crisis had come about when the City of Friona gave the Parmer County Commissioners a deadline of Oct. 1 for the county commissioners to sign Friona's proposed contract dealing with fire protection, or Friona would not make rural calls after that date. The county commissioners rejected that contract in August.

On Sept. 13, the county commissioners met with representatives of the county's fire departments, plus Friona officials. This is how the county commissioners voted to split up its \$50,000 budget:

Rhea-Hollene Fire Department would get a flat \$5,000. The remaining \$45,000 would be pro-rated to the other four departments - Friona, Farwell, Bovina and Lazbuddie, based on the percent of total rural calls made in 1994.

Also, Johnny Mars, the Friona's area representative on the county commissioners, reportedly pledged some funds from his county account toward Friona's fire department.

In other business Monday, the county commissioners approved the county tax rate for 1994 - up 3 percent, from .3113 to .3181.

No county residents spoke at the annual budget hearing and the new tax rate was passed unanimously.

Afterward, county commissioner Robert White, representing the Farwell area, asked if property owners could get lower taxes on their land since water levels have dropped.

He was told a water drop-page makes the land less valuable. A property owner needs to contact the Parmer County Soil & Water Conservation District to get the statistics needed for presentation to the Parmer County Appraisal District, to see if that government unit would lower the taxable appraisal on it.

The commissioners also:

- Named the election judges. The only change involves the alternate for the Farwell box - Bernice Pennington replaces Phil Garrett. The judge remains Billie Blaine.

Consolidation

a building owned by the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District. The ASCS and FmHA agencies are located in a building they lease in Farwell.

The Friona building isn't large enough to house all three agencies. If the Madigan Plan is approved, it's likely bids will be sought for a building in Parmer County to house all three agencies.

According to Reed, "Secretary of Agriculture, (Michael) Espy has proposed a total re-organization of these agencies which goes far beyond the original Madigan plan. Some details of this plan were released last week and it looks like the ASCS and part of the FmHA will be combined to form a new agency and the SCS will become the Natural Resource and Conservation Service. All this is still subject to Congressional approval, but regardless of what the agencies will be called, co-location (moving into one building) of all 3 agencies will be required. The USDA is forcing all offices serving an area to be co-located to provide one-stop shopping to better serve the farmers.

"The decision to place USDA offices in communities is made by the State FAC Committee which consists of the SCS State Conservationist, ASCS State Director and the FmHA State Director. This committee will advertise and will consider office space in Farwell and Friona. The decision of where to locate USDA offices will be determined by the quality of space and an economical price. This plan will probably be implemented in the next 3 to 5 years."

Following is the letter sent by the Farwell Chamber's agricultural committee to Reed:

"This letter is in relation to the proposed Madigan Plan that is calling for a Farm Services Agency. The reorganization would combine the functions of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Services (ASCS), Soil Conservation Service (SCS), and Farmers Home Administration (FHA). The committee agrees with the concept of re-organization and especially with the ideal of saving the taxpayer money.

"Currently the ASCS and FHA offices are located in Farwell that is the county seat of Parmer County. The SCS is in Friona that is 25 miles from Farwell. The ASCS and FmHA offices are housed in a 4,911-sq.-ft. building. The ASCS complex was built in 1986 with an addition for the FmHA office completed in 1991. These two agencies in Farwell employ a work force of 14 with the agency in Friona employing four 4. The committee feels the most feasible solution to the co-location of agencies is to have the SCS office move to Farwell.

"The same landlords of the Farwell building own enough land adjoining the building for an addition to accommodate the SCS office plus enough for parking. The landlords are willing to work with the government in building anything suitable for the SCS office.

"Should the co-location of agencies be in Friona, it would

impose a hardship on the 14 employees of the ASCS and FmHA. Some of these employees are single parents and during adverse weather conditions the 50 mile trip could be hazardous.

"Farwell is a small agriculture community and with the loss of these two offices it would pose a calamitous economic impact.

"We ask your strong consideration in leaving the existing offices in Farwell and relocating the SCS office in Farwell.

"We would certainly appreciate your advising us as to the progress in enacting the Madigan Plan and desire the opportunity in the future to elaborate on and document further the compelling reasons for combining the SCS office with the existing ASCS and FHA office in Farwell.

Longhorns whip Christoval

The Lazbuddie Longhorns improved their record to 3-1 with a victory last Saturday over Christoval at Sands, 49-26.

The Longhorns host El Paso Jesus Chapel tonight (Friday) for Homecoming.

Once again, quarterback Brett Thomas had a big day, hitting on 19 of 25 passes for 319 yards and 4 TDs.

The scoring opened in the first period when Thomas threw a 19-yard TD pass to Jonas Hernandez for a 6-0

lead. After Christoval tied it up on a 13-yard TD run, Jon Colby Miller scored on a 49-yard TD jaunt. Matt Elliott kicked the points after for a 14-6 lead at the end of the quarter.



Only one score was recorded in the second period, when Hernandez scored on a 66-yard pass from Thomas. The Elliott kick was good again and Lazbuddie went into the half with a 22-6 lead.

The lead expanded for the Longhorns in the third period. First Hernandez scored his third TD, this time on a 14-yard run. Then Troy McBroom tallied on a 35-yard pass play from Thomas. - Heard city marshal Gil Holguin say he is hearing complaints about stray dogs running loose. One idea broached was to hire a dog catcher. Holguin said the dog catcher doesn't have to be police certified but dog catcher certified.

Holguin said he has cited some animal owners for allowing their pets to run loose, but there are too many strays without owners. It's illegal to shoot dogs, he said. The city used to have a tranquilizer gun but officials don't know what happened to it.

The problem with a dog pound was noted. Sharp said laws say a pound must be heated and air conditioned.

Last year, Texico connected Farwell about using its pound, but Texico let the matter drop although Farwell indicated it would be of assistance.

Councilmen Warmuth and Carolyn Burrows will meet with Holguin to discuss the problem and report back to the council at its next meeting.

Whiteface stops Steers

Turnovers once again plagued the Farwell Steers as they fell to the Whiteface Antelopes at Homecoming here last Friday, 29-6.

Farwell, 0-4, plays at Anton at 8 p.m. today (Friday).

Brent Harrison returned Whiteface's kick 25 yards to the Steer 44. A penalty nullified a 10-yard pass from Jason Taylor to Harrison and Farwell had to punt to the Antelope 30.

Michael Phillips had a strong solo tackle, and Whiteface punted to the Steer 43. Farwell lost a fumble at its 48.

On defense, Jon Sullivan, Kip Atwell, Reace Bennett and Jeremy Ortiz had good tackles. But Whiteface hit two long passes to get to the Steer 11. At 4:33 of the first quarter, Whiteface scored on a 28-yard field goal to lead 3-0.

Farwell started at its own 33 but lost a fumble on its second play at its 35. On defense, tackles were recorded by Brock Anderson, Chanse Stephens and Justin Mahaney. Again, Whiteface struck through the air, to the Farwell 1. Atwell got a quarterback sack for a 4-yard loss. But Whiteface scored on a 5-yard end run. The kick made it 10-0.

Early in the second quarter, the Steers got on the scoreboard when Harrison tallied on a 57-yard run, in which he broke two tackles. The kick failed and Farwell was behind 10-6.

Whiteface was held and punted to the Farwell 45. But Whiteface intercepted and returned it to the Steer 9. Derrick Haseloff and Mahaney combined on a good tackle. Whiteface scored on a 24-yard field goal to hike their lead to 13-6.

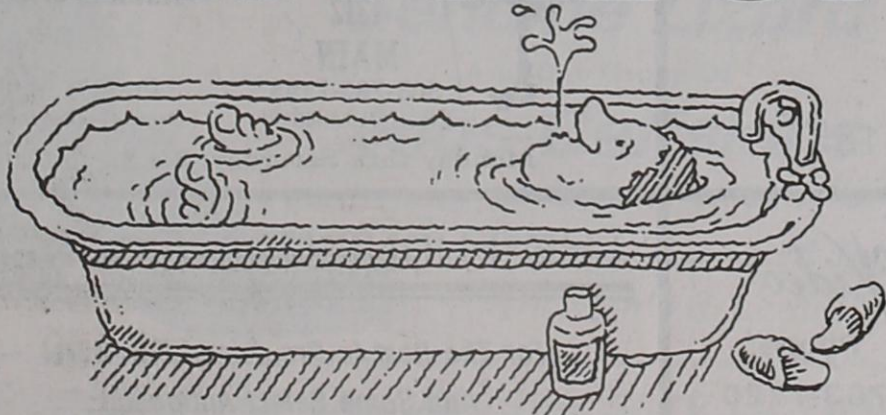

It stopped the corn harvest for a while, but was good for the wheat farmers.

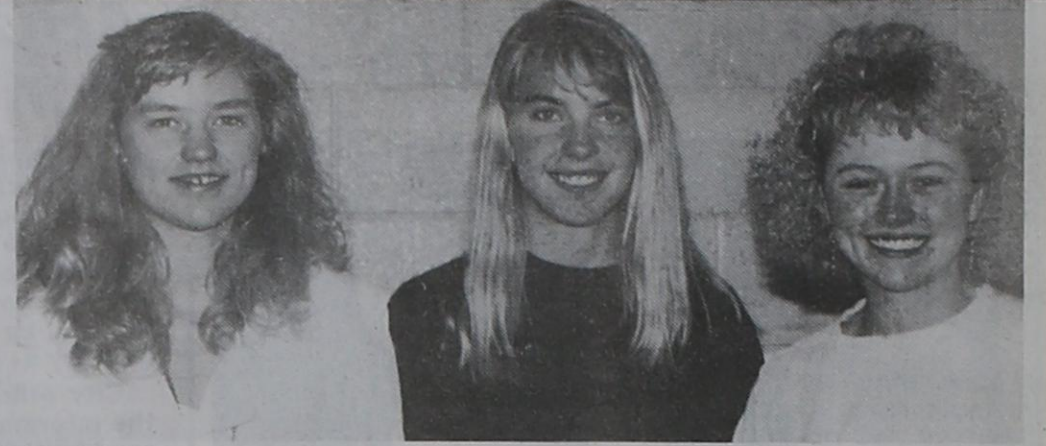

ABC TV channel is in question

The Farwell City Council Tuesday held a public hearing on its proposed 7.99 tax rate hike for the coming year.

No residents attended. A vote on the proposed tax hike will be held at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday at City Hall.

City officials also clarified the information printed in the tax legal ad that appeared in last week's Tribune:

"The last sentence in the city's tax notice should have read as follows:

"Comparing tax rates without adjusting for changes in property value, the tax rate would increase by \$6.28 per \$100 of taxable value or 6.6 percent compared to last year's tax rate. These tax rate figures are not adjusted for changes in the taxable value of property.

"The \$55.12 per \$100 was the total overall increase for the city."

After the vote, the council met with Gordon Smith, manager of TCA Cable, to discuss recent changes in government regulations involving

the cable industry.

Smith said the new law, which went into effect Sept. 1, said cable companies can only charge one fee to customers regardless of how many cable outlets they have in their home.

He said current rates are frozen until mid-November. The rates TCA charge are based on FCC bench marks for basic packages.

He said Farwell gets back about \$1,000 per quarter in franchise tax from TCA Cable, and Texico gets back about \$500 per quarter.

Smith said the ABC network may be lost to TCA, and a decision will be known next week. The area man who "owns the right" to that channel wants \$1 per customer per month from TCA to allow TCA to include it in this system.

Smith said the Hereford Cable TV company already has walked away from negotiations with this individual.

Smith talked about other ways to try and receive ABC, such as by using rabbit ears or a satellite dish.

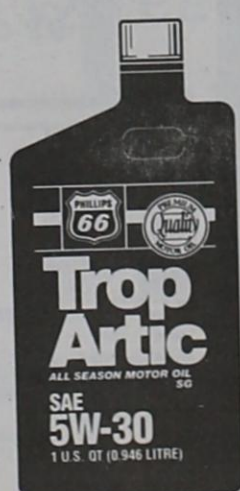

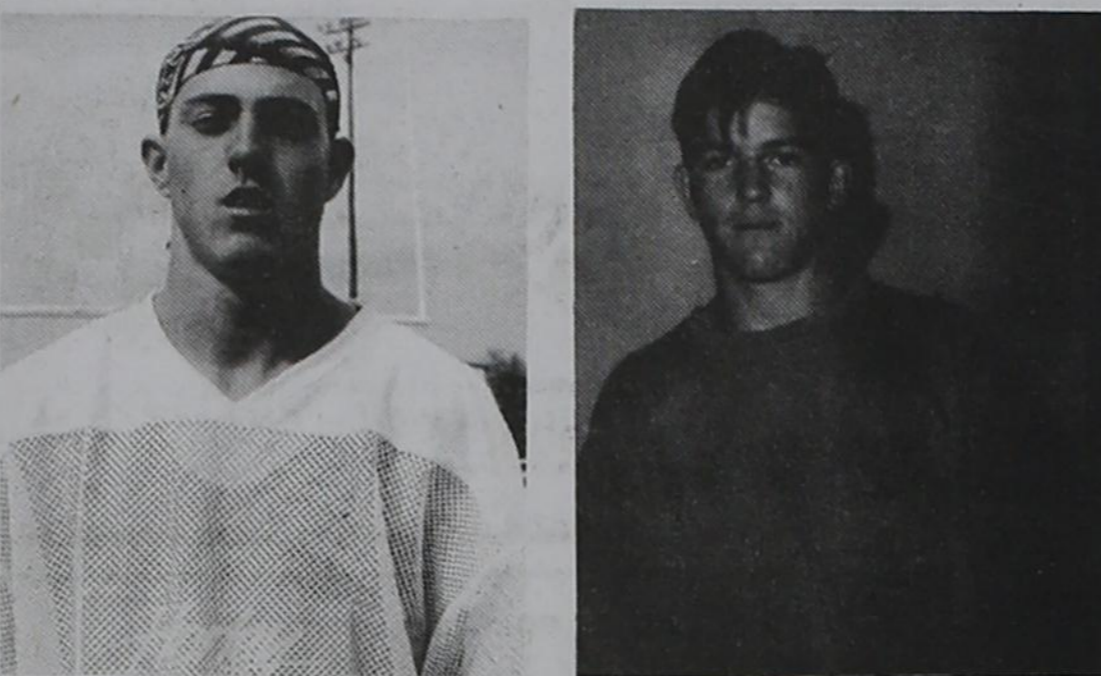
Both teams received several penalties. The Wolverines

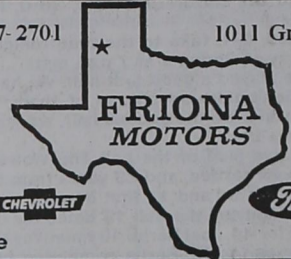

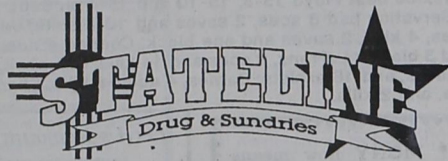

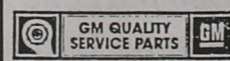
