# Health Notes By Texas Dopartment of Boalth

Austin, Texas: Some timely advice to vacationists concerning the proper precautions to be used in water sports now that swimming pools are opening, was released from the State Health Department today by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Vacation days are apt to include excursions and picnics at nearby lakes, rivers, and ponds of unfamiliar depths and currents, and sometimes without the usual lifeguard supervision associated with bathing beaches and commercial swimming pools.


"Swimming and water sports are beneficial to good health provided one's physical condition justifies this type of exercse," Dr. Cox asserted: "neverthleds, they possess dangerous possibilities if the rules of safety, through carelessness or thoughtlessness, are disregarded."

The State Health Officer outlined the following simple rules for bathing and swimmng in safety: when swimming, be alert and careful of unknown depths and currents; at least one hour should elapse after a meal before entering the water; upon the first indication of fatigue, come ashore and call it a day; if you become chilled, leave the water immediately; do not enter the water when overheated; learn to float, this is most important; never attempt to rock a boat in a spirit of fun; never swim in water that may be polluted. Swimming close to or even a few miles below a sewage outlets is inviting the possibility of acquiring

"Excursions, picnics, and swimming parties contribute to a healthy, happy, normal life, which is always desirable," Dr. Cox said. "It is by no means advisable to iliminate these excursions from our summer program, but it is important that they prove beneficial and not disastrous."





### To Conduct Health Class In Lubbock Public School

LUBBOCK,-Enthusiasm for eating by children is being used by Miss Meryl Cline, Home Economics graduate student of Texas Technological College, to conduct a health class in a Lubbock public grade school.

Each week Miss Cline, working in cooperation with the Red Cross, conducts a class on "Food for the Growing Boys and Girls at Roscoe Wilson school. In the nutrition lesson she whole wheat bread, fruits and vegeeat proper foods.

Two white rats, "Mr. Coffee" and 'Mr. Milk," also are used in the teaching. The first gets coffee and white bread, the second milk and whole wheat bread. "Mr. Milk" has gained weight and has soft shiny fur, while "Mr. Coffee" hasn't gained as much and his fur isn't as pretty.

The children, feeling sorry for the poor rat, have asked Miss Cline to let him have some milk and whole wheat bread. Children of the other rooms of the school and from other schools have requested they be included in the nutrition classeswhich include some eating.


COLLEGE STATION—Some of the best feed insurance a West Texas farmer can have is a few tons of good silage, says Bailey County Agricultural Agent D. W. Sherrill.

The type insurance the county agent is talking about is well-illustrated by the eye-to-the-future policy of Herschel L. Thomason, farmer of the Pettit community, Bailey County, Last fall, Thomason bought 200 tons of hegari from a neighbor and dug a trench silo that would hold it. Over-all cost of the silo full of good feed was \$1000.

Feed prices being what they are now, Thomason estimates his "feed insurance" silage to be worth at least \$2000, or \$10 a ton. County Agent Sherrill says that the stockman now has the choice of selling the feed at a good profit, or buying more cattle and feeding it out. At any rate. he has the hegari where it won't spoil, won't burn, be eaten by rats nor peppered wth West Texas sand.

Sherill believes that more farmers "would do well" to plan a feed crop that will give them a silo full of in surance next fall.
