Deaf Smith re-elects Christian, Roberts


Both incumbent directors were re-elected at the 72nd annual meeting of Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative in Hereford Tuesday night.

Mrs. Teachout and the girls have competed in six tourneys this year to get ready for the State Meet. Brook and Kayla have spent numerous hours working toward that goal.


What makes their accomplishments so special is that the two girls didn't even debate together for a full year and it's Kayla's first year to debate as a freshman. And Brooke is a junior.







The enterprise has signed a letter of intent to work with a New Mexico grid system named Tres Amigas that is being developed.

Last week, the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission granted Tres Amigas permission to start negotiating the price of its transmission servic-It's neat to hear that es with regulations to ensure those prices are fair.

This ruling allows Tres Amigas to proceed on its project although other approvals are needed down the road.

Live Cattle prices rallied to sharply higher levels on ooth Thursday and Friday. The market backed off their open on Friday, but did not turn short term trends down. Cash trade topped out at \$98 last week which was also in line with the April futures contract. Funds continue to drive the cattle prices, but packers are becoming much more selective in their buying at current levels Seasonal tendencies are leaning towards a strong sell into the late June time frame?

Feeder prices also got a big boost behind the Live Cattle late last week and were also able to hold their uptrend's in tact. Cash prices are becoming more relucant to keep up the pace with futures prices. We've seen the large two days range on the upside since bottoming last December. This pace will be hard pressed to continue until the market has time to catch it's breath?

Soybean prices also got a little boost up last week out ended the week around mid range of the last months trading range. Private forecaster's indicated bean acres to increase between 1-1,6 million acres this season. The USDA Planting Intention report will be released at the end of March. We don't expect to see much movement in prices until after the report.

Corn prices also got a boost last week as short term rends were able to turn back higher. The weakness in the U.S. Dollar was though to have helped, but early estimates coming in from private forecaster's indicated that planted acres would increase between 1-3 million this year. Corn also closed in the mid range of the last four weeks and isn't expected to see much movement until after the Planting Intention report.

Wheat prices also drifted back higher to some degree, but much less than the rest of the grain complex Improving prospects for a great winter wheat harvest has some analysts concerned that lower prices are just ahead, but the market has had little reaction up to this point. Wheat may be waiting to for the Planting Intention reports to see have it may impact the rest of the grain complex?

Cotton prices rebounded along with the grain complex. Some support was due to the declining U.S. Dollar but once again, cotton prices also closed around mid range of the last four weeks. Short term trends were able to turn higher, but any significant move may not take place until after the




