# Moseley reminisces about Parmer County

A longtime Parmer County resident, Hugh Moseley, is moving to South Texas within the next several months. Before he leaves, I had the privilege of talking to him about what his life was like here.

Hugh was born and raised in Parmer County on a homestead out by Hub. He went through school in Friona, and joined the Marines one year short of graduating. After finishing his duties as a Marine, he went back to school to finish his high school degree, then went to Texas Tech University where he majored in Ag Education.

After finishing college, he became the county clerk in 1955, where he served for eight years. "I think we filled up 21 vol-

umes of deed records while I was there," he said.

He met his wife, Wilma, at the old Farwell post office, and they had one son, David. Wilma

passed away in 1997.

He then worked for his friend, building the feed yard near Friona for nine months. Finally, he began his work in the tax

office, where he worked for 25 years before retiring. "I liked the tax office better because I had more freedom to move and do things, instead of being cooped up in an office," he explained.

Hugh also had a few memories and reminiscences from living here all these years. He and his family lived through the Dust Bowl.

He said, "I can remember Black Sunday in 1935. My brother and I were playing outside, and we saw this huge cloud coming towards the house so we went inside. We weren't frightened because our parents weren't, but that was the beginning of the Dust Bowl."

Another fun memory Hugh had took place in middle school. When he was in 8th grade, he had a man for a homeroom teacher, which was the first time he and his classmates had had a man for a teacher. His name was R.L. Bates, and he said he learned more as an 8th grader than he did in any other grade in

school.

Eighth grade wasn't the only time that Hugh saw Mr. Bates. After he got back from the Philippines while he was in the Marines, he caught a train from San Francisco to home. When he got off the train, he was surprised to see Mr. Bates working at the station.

"I wanted to come home so bad, just because I wanted some of my mother's home cooking," Hugh said. "After I stayed for about two weeks, and caught up on my mom's food, I caught another train back to New Orleans, where I boarded another ship and headed out to sea."

Hugh has traveled all over the world with the Marines. He's been to China and back.

He can also remember what the old town of Farwell used to look like. Where the Security State Bank is now, there used to be a blacksmith shop, a café where the city hall is, and a skating rink next to Mike Camp Insurance.

When I asked Hugh what he loved about this town he simply said, "Good people and good food."

He never thought that he'd be leaving Parmer County, but he's excited and ready for this next step in his life.

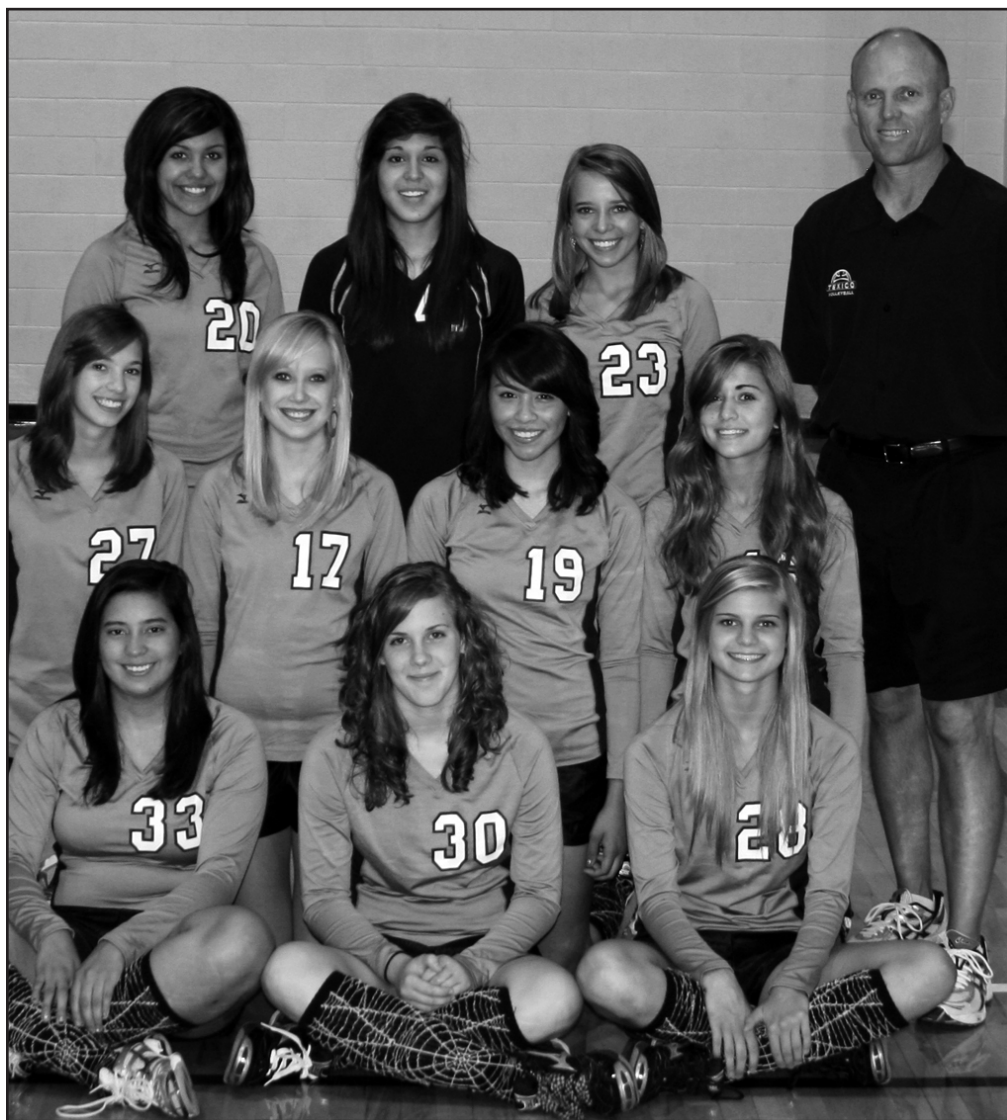

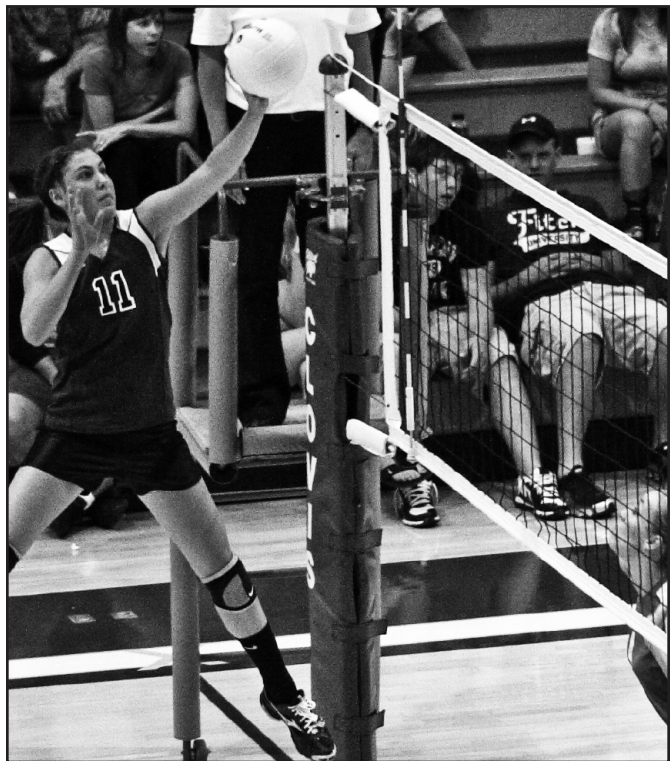

# Band receives Rotary donation

Farwell Band Director reports that the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club has donated \$500 to the Lynn Burton Fine Arts Scholarship.

"We are grateful for donations from all our supporters," he said, "but this was certainly the largest donation we've received."

# Vandiver: Cotton crop more mature than last year

From Monti Vandiver, Parmer County extension agent - IPM:

Corn silage harvest is running at "full bore"; with all the activity one should be particularly aware especially when driving on rural roads.

Recent cool weather has raised many questions about cotton maturity; especially after a year like 2009 where many, if not most, fields did not adequately mature. Currently the Northwest Plains cotton crop is much more mature compared to this same time in 2009.

We have accumulated more heat units, which is a measurement of available energy to produce a crop, and more timely precipitation and better growing conditions in general have enhanced the crop's ability efficiently utilize that energy. I continue to be very optimistic about the area cotton crop.

But our economists continually predict big improvements. They are probably being paid to do so by President Obama.

It makes me want to throw up.

The only way to improve our economy is to take strong measures to increase the middle class and to ease the way for small business to expand.

Neither one is being done. Instead, government is strangling small business more than ever.

The folks in Washington, D.C., live in a fantasy world. And they make the decisions that affect you and me.

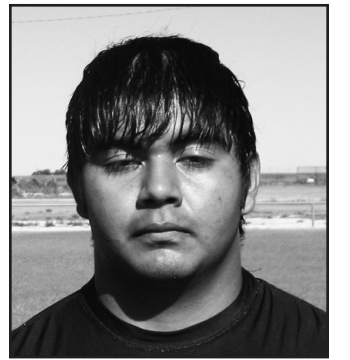
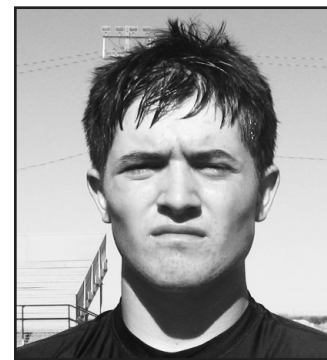

players. "Our kids got tired at the end, but it was a true testament to them to stick in there and keep playing hard.," said the coach.

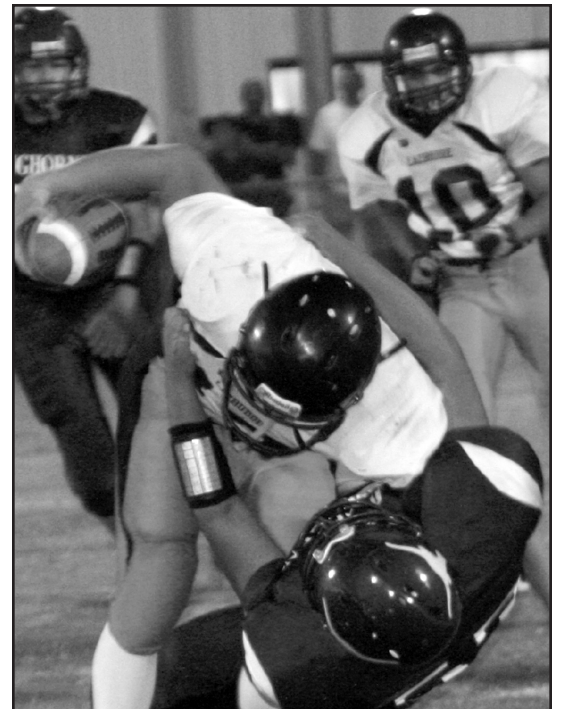
Lazbuddie had three TDs. The first came on a 10-yard fumble recovery by Trevor Hill. The fumble was caused by Josh McIntosh.

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**Just Passing Through**

As Americans prepare to commemorate Constitution Day on Sept. 17, they may wish to reflect on its six principles that have made our nation a blessing to the other nations in the world, the "shining city on the hill" in terms of freedom, achievement, and quality of life.

These six are consent of the governed, limited government, separation of powers, checks and balances, federalism, and judicial review.

These principles are brief, quickly understood, and readily embraced but in the 18th Century they were radical concepts, rejected by the ruling elite of Europe.

Remarkable as it may seem, it appears that these principles are still being rejected today, particularly the first two, but this time it is by the ruling elite of both our Republican and Democratic parties.

The first two of these six principles are like two sides of the same coin. On one hand, "the consent of the governed" declares that free citizens create a government to function as their servant, not as their master.

The second concept of "limited government" springs naturally from that foundation, forbidding government from overstepping the powers it can possess and employ, after all, only through the consent of those free citizens.

American politics over the decades have produced times of crisis for the Constitution, to be sure, but through it all the Constitution has traditionally been held in the reverence it is due. That is no longer true in Washington D.C.

Both parties have ignored the demands of a majority of America's voters at different times on different issues. In one example, this year's vote to establish a European style of socialized medicine in America came from a Congress in which almost none of our elected officials had read even one word of its 2,309 page bulk.

In one remarkable slip-up, our speaker of the House revealed that she herself was unclear on how the measure would affect the American

economy or the quality of health care but she was anxious to pass it anyway so we could all find out together.

Something like, "Do you think this might be a grenade? Let's pull the pin and find out!"

Elected officials justified the seizure of one-sixth of the U.S. economy using figures from the Congressional Budget Office that were debunked and discarded only weeks after the vote.

They trumpeted the advantages of the European medical systems at the same time that many European countries are scaling them back as hideously expensive failures, a point they fail to mention.

It is often observed that the production of law, like the production of sausage, will turn the stomach, and that was certainly true in the cloak-room arm-twisting, bribery, and extortion that passed this bill.

Despite the fact that repeated polls showed at least 56 percent of Americans demanded the bill be rejected, our politicians passed it anyway, consoling themselves that the American people would grow to love it.

The most recent polls indicate that now something like 60 percent of Americans are opposed to it.

In August, 71 percent of those who voted on

the referendum in Missouri rejected the health care plan provision that requires every American to buy into it or pay a fine.

Similar provisions will be on the ballot this November in Arizona and Oklahoma and it appears they will produce similar opposition percentages. Colorado voters are in the process of putting it on their ballot this November as well.

Florida's voters are pressing their opposition through the federal courts and at last count, 20 other states have joined them.

The critical point right now is not to argue for or against socialized medicine, nor is it to throw darts at one party or the other. The critical point is that our elected officials in Washington D.C. brought us to this stand-off because they either do not understand the first two principles of our Constitution (which is not unlikely) or that they just don't care (which is frightening).

This is just one example over the last several years in which it appears our political elite do indeed see themselves as our masters rather than our servants. On Constitution Day this year, perhaps the best thing that could happen would be for the political elite to actually read the Constitution and take it to heart.



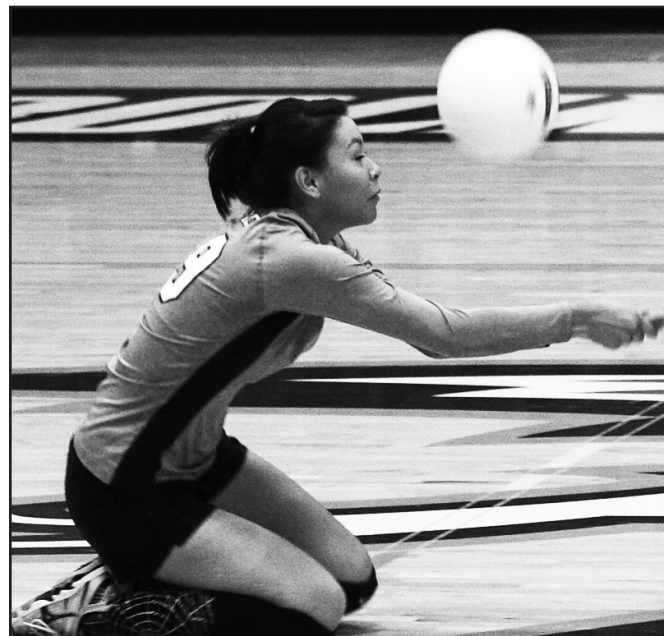
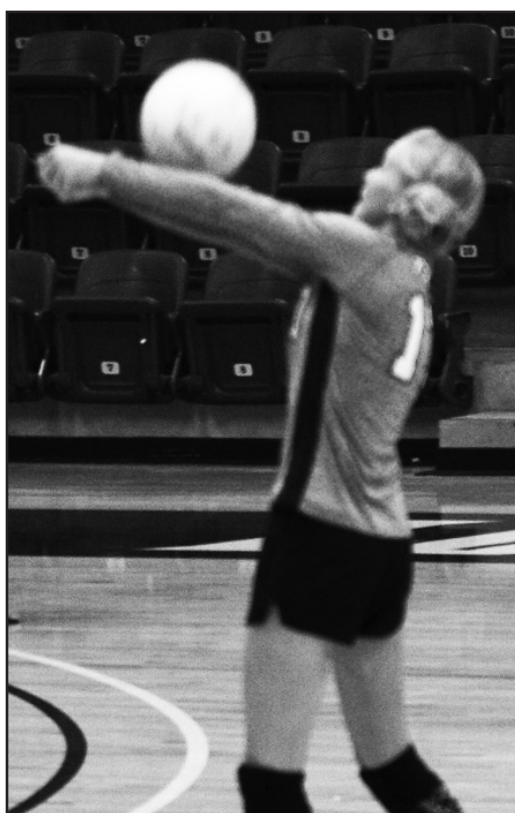
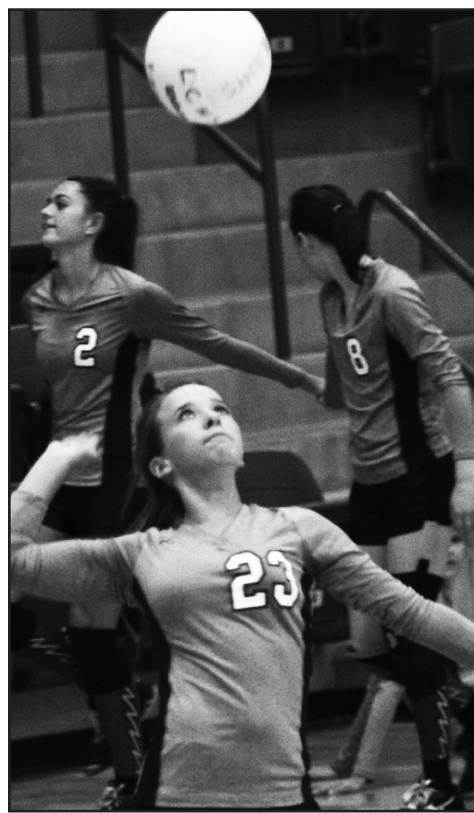
**The bell is back and better than ever**

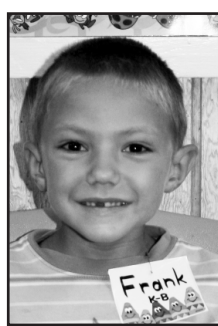

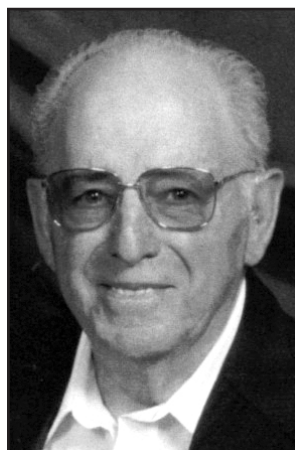
Bill served in the Army from early 1944 through 1946, serving first in the final battles of the Pacific islands and then re-upping to go to Germany where he served with the transportation security.

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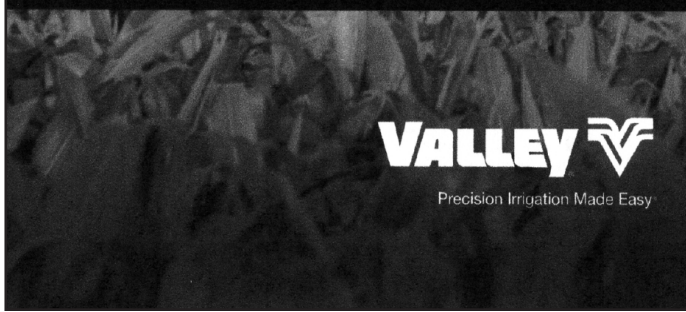

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## Parmer County man's name removed from memorial

A Parmer County soldier whose name is listed on the Parmer County Veterans Memorial in Farwell city park was the subject of a major story in area newspapers on Monday.

James Richard Fortenberry, son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Fortenberry, was born in Amarillo. His parents moved to Friona where he was raised. He graduated from the Oklahoma Military Academy in 1968 and joined the U.S. Army in September 1969.

He was assigned to the 15th Medical Battalion of the 1st Cavalry in Vietnam. He was crew chief on a "MEDEVAC" helicopter when he died in a helicopter crash on Sept. 24, 1970 at the age of 24.

He was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Air Medal with 7 through 8 Award, the Army Commendation Medal, Good Conduct Medal, National Defense Service Medal, Vietnam Campaign Medal, Aircraft Crewman Badge (Wings), and Republic of Vietnam Armed Forced Honor Medal.

Fortenberry's name has been listed the last couple of years among hundreds of servicemen and servicewomen on the Lubbock Area Veterans Memorial wall.

But his name recently has been removed from the Lubbock memorial because his death occurred in a non-combat action between two U.S. helicopters. The Department of Defense ruled his death as "accidental."

The Lubbock memorial was set up to only honor servicemen and servicewomen who were killed in action.

As a sidenote, Fortenberry's name was initially listed on the Lubbock memorial under the area "Operation Iraqi Freedom." When this error was found, it was then placed under the Vietnam War section.

The fact that Fortenberry was not "killed in action" recently came to the Lubbock memorial's organizer, thus bringing about his name's removal.

Fortenberry's name will continue to be listed on the Parmer County memorial because this memorial was set up to honor all Parmer County servicemen and servicewomen who died during wartime.

## Scandia Wind plans progress

The Scandia Wind Southwest office in Bovina recently hosted a meeting with its European associates, Havgul Clean Energy, of Norway and Alpha Wind America, of Denmark.

The collaborative organization rotates its board meetings between their separate headquarters in Copenhagen, Oslo, and Bovina.

Jim Swafford, of the Bovina office, has gathered data for one year on wind conditions at heights of 50, 75 and 100 meters above the ground. The data collected at 100 meters is particularly important because that is the approximate height of the hub of the newest generation of 3 megawatt wind generators.

Existing wind farms in the Panhandle consist primarily of 1.5 to 2 megawatt models but prevailing wind conditions in this region's CREZ band (Competitive Renewable Energy Zone) can support the 3 megawatt model, the greatest electrical generating capacity available.

In the program underway to establish wind farms in Parmer, Sherman, and Dalham counties, 550 land owners have thus far enrolled about 450,000 of their acres.

Swafford said the goal is to complete all the foundational studies and administrative requirements. With all the detail-work completed in advance, construction and activation of the system can accelerate quickly once it has been initiated.

The inaugural goal is to offer a capacity of 1,200 megawatts (400 of the 3 megawatt generators). A wealth of electrical power that great would be directed to markets external to the Panhandle large enough to demand it.

The first power line link carrying electricity to the population of 20-million people and the industrial centers of south Texas could be completed between late 2013 and mid 2014.

Swafford said he had been assured that power line link will be designed with the full intention of never having to invoke "eminent domain" on the property of private owners. He noted that there is also potential to provide power to electrical grids on the East Coast, West Coast, and to other grids in Texas.

One of the prerequisite requirements of a project of this scope is the Environmental Impact Study to predict the effect that will it might have on wildlife. Swafford said he does not envision the results of these EIS to impact the wind farm project.

One concern has been about the prairie chickens once common throughout Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Kansas, and Colorado. Their habitat in the wild, now drastically reduced to only about 12,000 acres, is mostly in New Mexico. The destruction of raptors (hawks and eagles) is predicted to be minimal because the 3 megawatt blades move through the atmosphere at a height greater than they typically fly.

Swafford said since the High Plains are on the migratory path of the whooping cranes, new radar technology has been designed. In this system, the wind farms would be equipped with a radar system to detect the approach of the whooping crane formations in flight.

The fans would be shut down and stopped automatically as the cranes flew through and would
