Kress roundballers Jeff McClure and Tim Williams, and Jim Gonzales of Springlake-Earth also made the all-dis-

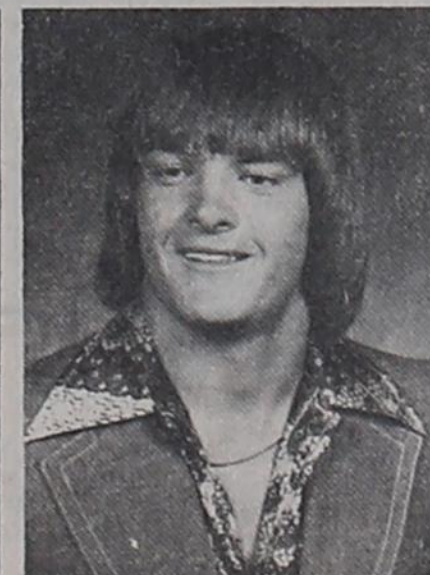
trict team. Hart failed to place any players on this year's squad.

**PURELY PERSONAL**

A breath of common sense blew out of Washington last week and the source of the wind was our U.S. Congressman Kent Hance. Hance strongly criticized California's Governor Jerry Brown. Kent gave him both barrels when he said, "Gov. Brown should quit running for President and start running his own state if he cares anything about the consumers of America. He and the bureaucracy of his administrative agencies have killed a project which would have saved consumers more than \$500 million a year in energy costs."

Rep. Hance, of course, was referring to the termination of the Sohio Oil Company's plan to transport Alaska oil from Long Beach to Midland, Texas, via an existing pipeline. According to the Sohio spokesman, the company had vainly tried to unravel a maze of over 700 various state and federal permits necessary for the plan to work.

Stupidity has got to be running rampant in the halls of our various governmental bodies when a nation starving for energy puts this many obstacles in the way of a plan to help alleviate our shortage.

Of course these insane actions by our government are nothing new. By incomprehensible laws and regulations we have been more than five years wallowing in the morass of dependence upon foreign sources for our energy. We are actually worse off today than we were right after the Arab oil embargo years ago.

Actually, the world is not short of oil, now or in the foreseeable future. There is a shortage of oil in the United States. The nations that produce oil are exacting a terrible toll upon the United States and all industrial nations. It may well wreck the western economy as we know it today.

In the face of this our government has consistently taken measures to inhibit domestic production of oil and the development of alternative sources of energy. We continue to pay the rapacious OPEC cartel countries many times more for their oil than we pay our domestic producers. Our government officials act as if they would prefer that we continue to run a hemorrhage of money to these countries rather than to take the necessary steps to free the United States from this international banditry and blackmail.

If some foreign power were to blockade our ports and force our industry into idleness and cause great economic stagnation in this country it would be construed as an act of war and we would retaliate. In effect the OPEC gouging is war and we should react in a like manner to protect our vital national economy. We do not propose using our armed forces, but we could, as they are, wage economic warfare against the offending countries while we were taking sensible steps at home to free ourselves from dependency upon these countries for our energy requirements.

The people of this country must force our spineless leaders to take the appropriate steps to free us from the onerous oppression of OPEC and to rapidly develop our own resources at home. It sounds to us like a good place to start is by writing our Congressman Kent Hance. He seems to have a level head and the guts to tell it like it is. It's a tragedy that too few of his ilk have been elected to Congress.

While we are throwing kudos Hance's way we will also mention that he has introduced legislation that would provide "congressional vetoes" over arbitrary rules and regulations by the bureaucrats and a bill that would allow congressional oversight to make sure Federal programs are meeting their intended goals.

Sic em Kent - we're with you.

**On The Farm In Parmer County**

Fertilizer and weed killer combinations are designed to appeal to the inherent lazy streak present in almost all home gardeners. The idea of fertilizing the lawn and killing the weeds all in one application is difficult to resist.

Weed killers when used properly can be great time-savers and eliminate a lot of back-breaking work. However, they must be used according to the directions given on the container if they are to be effective and not endanger valuable plants in the landscape.

The same chemicals that will kill the weeds are frequently harmful to the trees, shrubs and vines used in the landscape. Since tree roots invade the lawn area and usually extend beyond the branch spread it is difficult to apply a fertilizer-herbicide mixture to the lawn area without danger of damage to the desirable plants in the lawn.

All too often the time to apply fertilizer is not the correct time for effective weed control. Each type of herbicide must be used at specific rates and at a certain critical time to be effective for killing weeds.

While fertilizer should be applied at the recommended rate, there is usually little harm if the homeowner fails to calibrate his distributor correctly and makes a slightly heavier application. If herbicides are contained in the mixture, this error can be very damaging to the desirable vegetation. Another difficulty which frequently arises is the part of a sack of the mixture left over after the lawn has been fertilized. Frequently this is left in the garage or tool shed until fertilizer is needed for a flower garden or rose bed. The fact that the fertilizer contains a herbicide is forgotten, and irreparable damage is done to a favorite beauty spot in the garden.

Many of the more popular

landscape trees including oaks, mulberry, sycamore, and others are highly susceptible to weed killers. When contemplating the use of a herbicide or herbicide and fertilizer mixture, always read all of the precautions given on the label. The information contained on the label was developed through expensive research and the manufacturer provides this information for your protection.

Remember weeds in a lawn are usually an indication of poor management practices. Through proper fertilization, correct mowing practices, adequate moisture, and good soil drainage, the grass will be vigorous enough to crown out the weeds.

In those areas beneath trees where excessive shade weakens the grass and is invaded by weeds, the use of herbicides is extremely risky. It is better to replace the grass with a shade-tolerant ground cover such as English Ivy.

Remember when using any type of herbicide, it is the misuse of these materials that usually cause problems.

Ralston said many farmers are engaged in land preparation and might have to delay their operations for awhile, but he added that "we can always use the rain."

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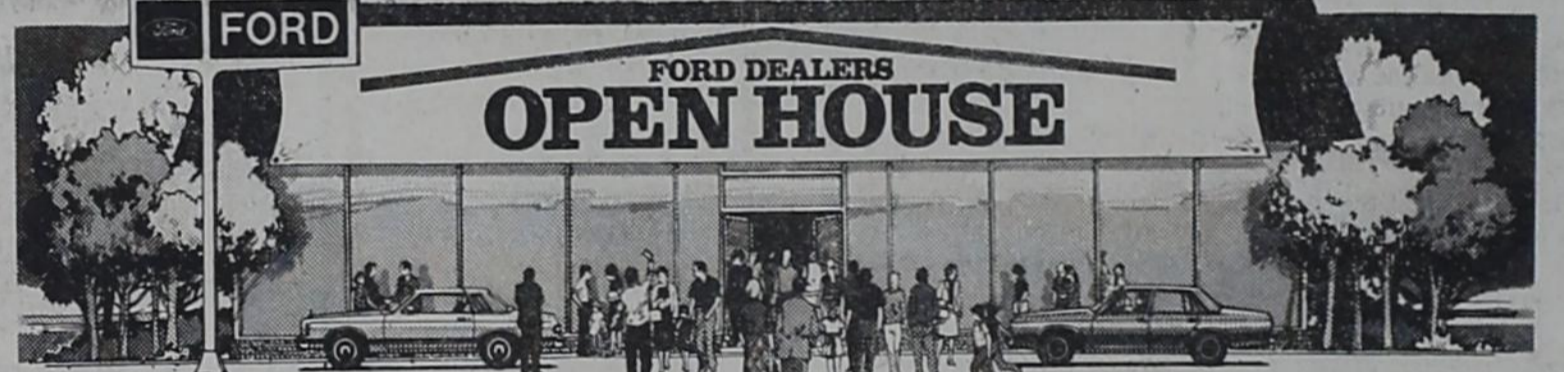
**Station Now Open**

Recently, Southwestern Public Service sponsored a Cake Bake-Off at Farwell High School. The nine contestants were either members of Future Homemakers of America or else were enrolled in a home economics course. The following recipes were those baked by the entrants:

### PLAIN CAKE

Ruth Ann Whitesides  
First Place \$25

**Cream:**  
1 c. Crisco  
2 c. sugar  
4 eggs (add one at a time)  
Sift together:  
3 c. flour  
1/2 t. salt  
1 t. vanilla  
1 t. baking powder  
1 t. nutmeg  
ADD TO SUGAR MIXTURE SLOWLY ALTERNATELY WITH 1 CUP MILK.  
Bake 30-40 minutes at 350 degrees.  
**Icing:**  
2 c. sugar  
3 T. light corn syrup  
1/4 t. salt  
2/3 c. water  
2 unbeaten egg whites - large eggs  
Bring everything but eggs to a boil. Cook until sugar is COMPLETELY dissolved. Add sugar mixture, gradually to unbeaten egg whites, beating steadily.  
JUST KEEP BEATING!!!

### ITALIAN CREAM CAKE

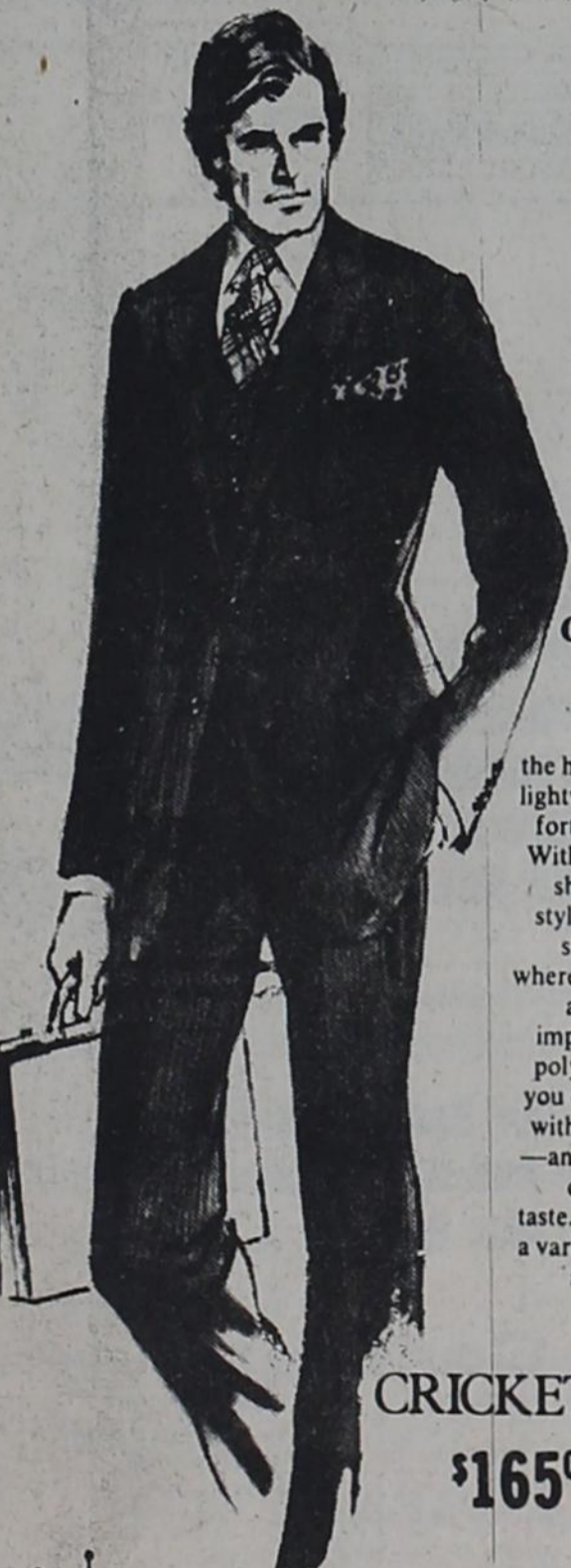

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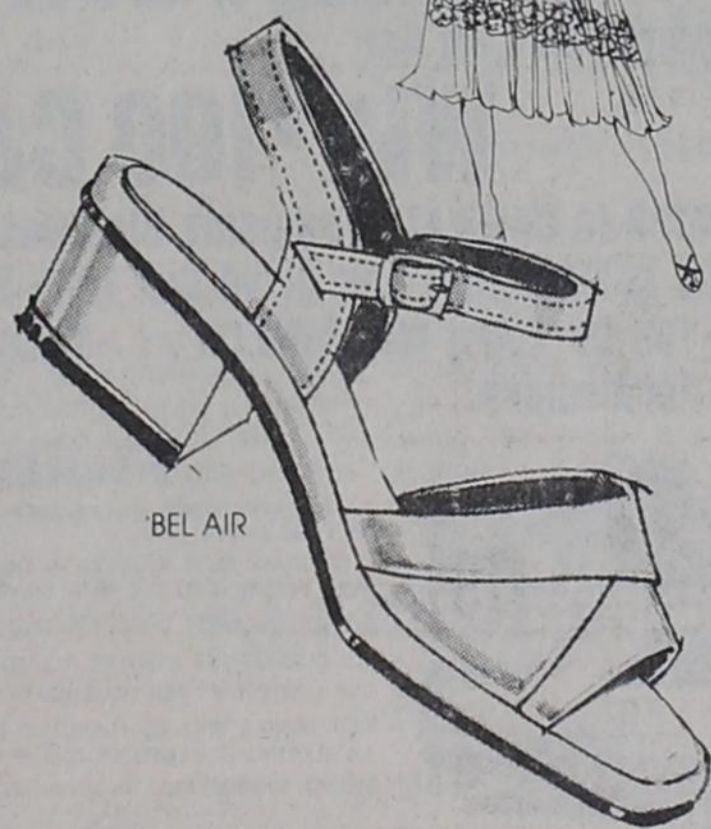

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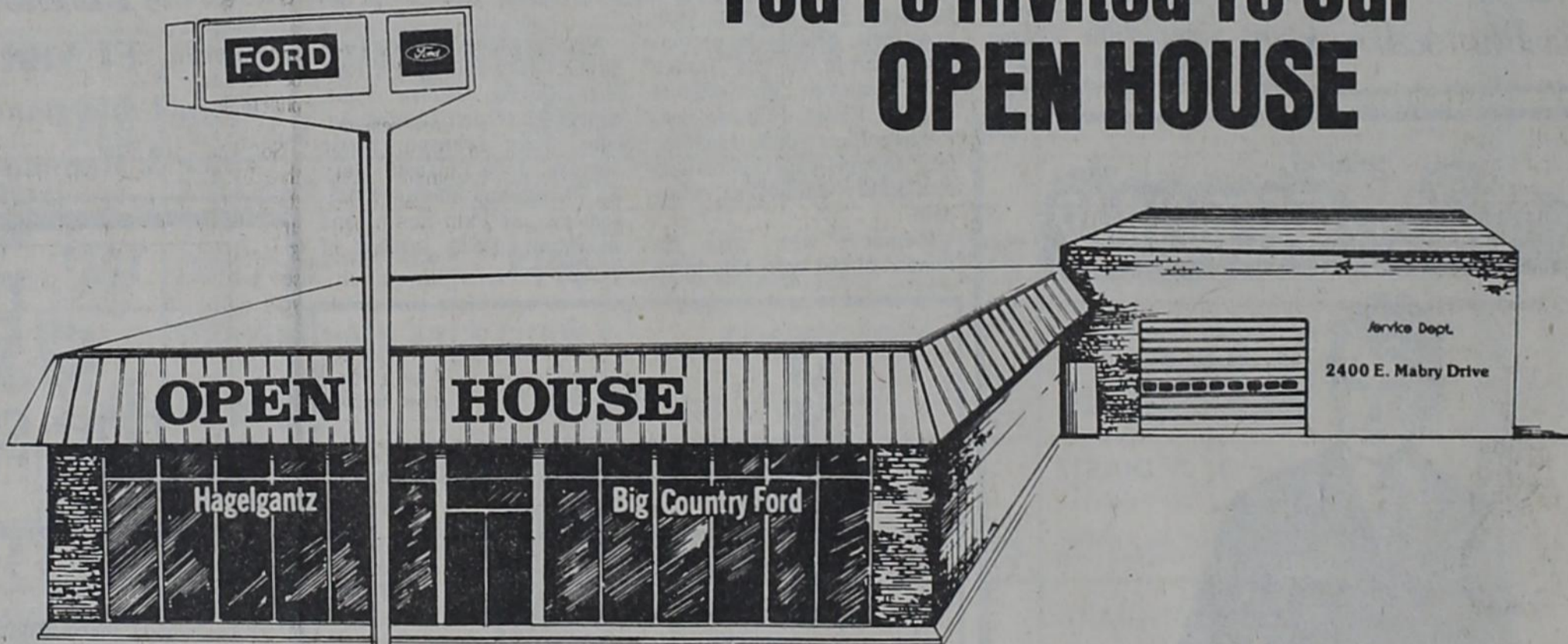

# Residents Alerted For Tornado Season

Spring and summer, the seasons to which everyone usually looks ahead after a long, cold winter, can mean danger, death and destruction as well as long, sunny days, picnics in the park and camping out.

Lurking in the midst of these two usually enjoyable seasons in certain parts of the United States are the ever-present threats of tornadoes. Thunderstorms, complete with electrical displays, booming thunder and sheets of rain may well be the harbinger of worse things to come if the conditions are "right" and the storm spawns a tornado - one of Mother Nature's more destructive tools.

Even though West Texans normally expect tornadoes in May, June and early July, as early as last weekend, parts of the Panhandle and South Plains areas were under severe weather watches with several tornadoes causing damage in the Lubbock area.

Actually, from now until late summer it is possible for tornadoes to form although it is somewhat unusual for them to occur this early in the year.

Should either Texico or Farwell be in eminent danger of a tornado, the volunteer fire departments of both communities will sound warnings with the sirens. Texico's tornado signal consists of one full cycle followed by another full cycle with no pause in between. The signal sounds like one continuous wail. Farwell's tornado alarm also consists of one full cycle of the regular five-blast signal followed by another complete cycle.

At the sound of either or both alarms residents in the Twin Cities should take cover immediately in the nearest basement or other suitable shelter. Designated sites in Farwell are Farwell Elementary School building, the county courthouse, Sherley-Anderson-Pitman elevator and Worley Mills elevator.

Since no designated shelters exist in Texico, residents without basements or other suitable shelters would have to travel to Farwell's shelters.

Golden West Seed Company and the old hotel building were designated shelters in Texico at one time.

Several designated shelters also exist in other parts of Parmer County. The following list was provided by the office of County Judge Paul Fortenberry.

Designated shelters in Bovina are Sherley Grain elevator and Macon Grain elevator. Official sites in Lariat and Lazbuddie are the Sherley-Anderson grain elevators. Friona has four sites: Friona Wheat Growers elevator, Continental Grain Company elevator, Friona Junior High and Friona State Bank.

Black has two shelter sites, Black Grain elevator and Tri-County elevator.

During the months of February March and April tornadoes usually move through Alabama, Georgia and Mississippi, and in June and July they hit Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas. In the fall they usually travel across the Midwest.

Typical tornado weather consists of moist air near the ground, dry air above, and a wind disturbance moving through the upper atmosphere.

Most tornadoes occur in the section of the United States known as "Tornado Alley." That area extends from Texas through eastern Kansas, then southeast through the South. More tornadoes per square mile are reported in Oklahoma than in any other state.

The most destructive tornadoes occur in Texas and across the south in an area

known as "Dixie Alley." In Alabama the average length of a tornado's path is five miles.

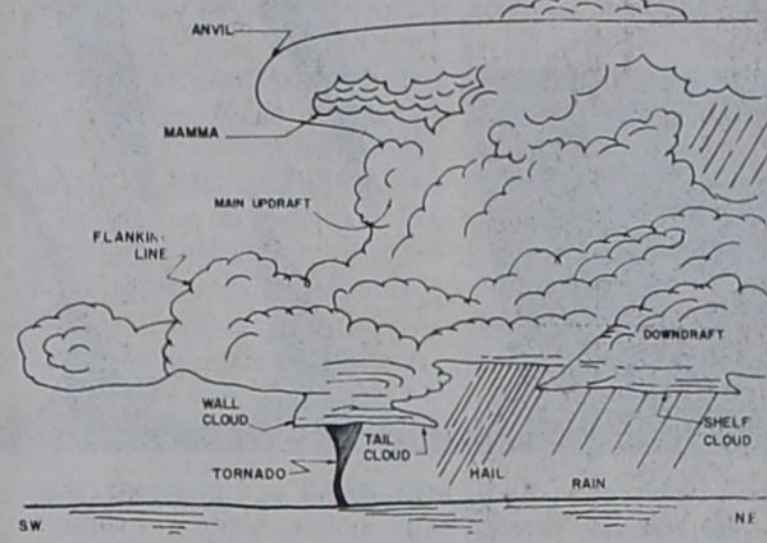
Tornadoes usually occur at night in the south, killing more people than in other parts of the country. According to figures, approximately 100 persons die every year in tornadoes, 70 percent in areas where a tornado watch has been issued.

Weather information for this area is usually dispatched through the radio and television stations located in Amarillo and relayed to the Twin Cities via cable. The National Weather Service, which provides the latest news in weather is located on the grounds of the Amarillo International Airport complex.

According to the NWS, hundreds of small funnel clouds are seen each year, but most never are reported and few cause damage.

Three percent of all twisters, known as maxi tornadoes, cause 90 percent of all tornado deaths. Maxi tornadoes can remain on the ground for more than 30 miles and can attain wind speeds of 200 mph.

Regardless, for the next several weeks West Texans should keep an eye and ear tuned to weather reports at the first site or sound of a thunderstorm which might turn into something bigger and more destructive.



## Typical Tornado-Producing Cloud

The form of the usual tornado-producing cloud is anvil-shaped at its crest with a rougher overshooting top at the dome. Mamma, which appear to be balloon-shaped formations, may drop from the anvil shape. At ground-level the common appearance is rain falling from a shelf cloud, usually in the northeastern portion of the parent cloud. Southwest of this there will be a wall cloud, sometimes with a horizontal tail cloud at the forward or northeast lower portion of it. This tail cloud is not the tornado. The tornado itself forms typically at the southwest lower edge of this wall cloud. Behind the tornado

there is not likely to be rain, but, instead, a precipitation-free cloud base. (DRAWING COURTESY TEXAS TECH UNIVERSITY INSTITUTE FOR DISASTER RESEARCH)

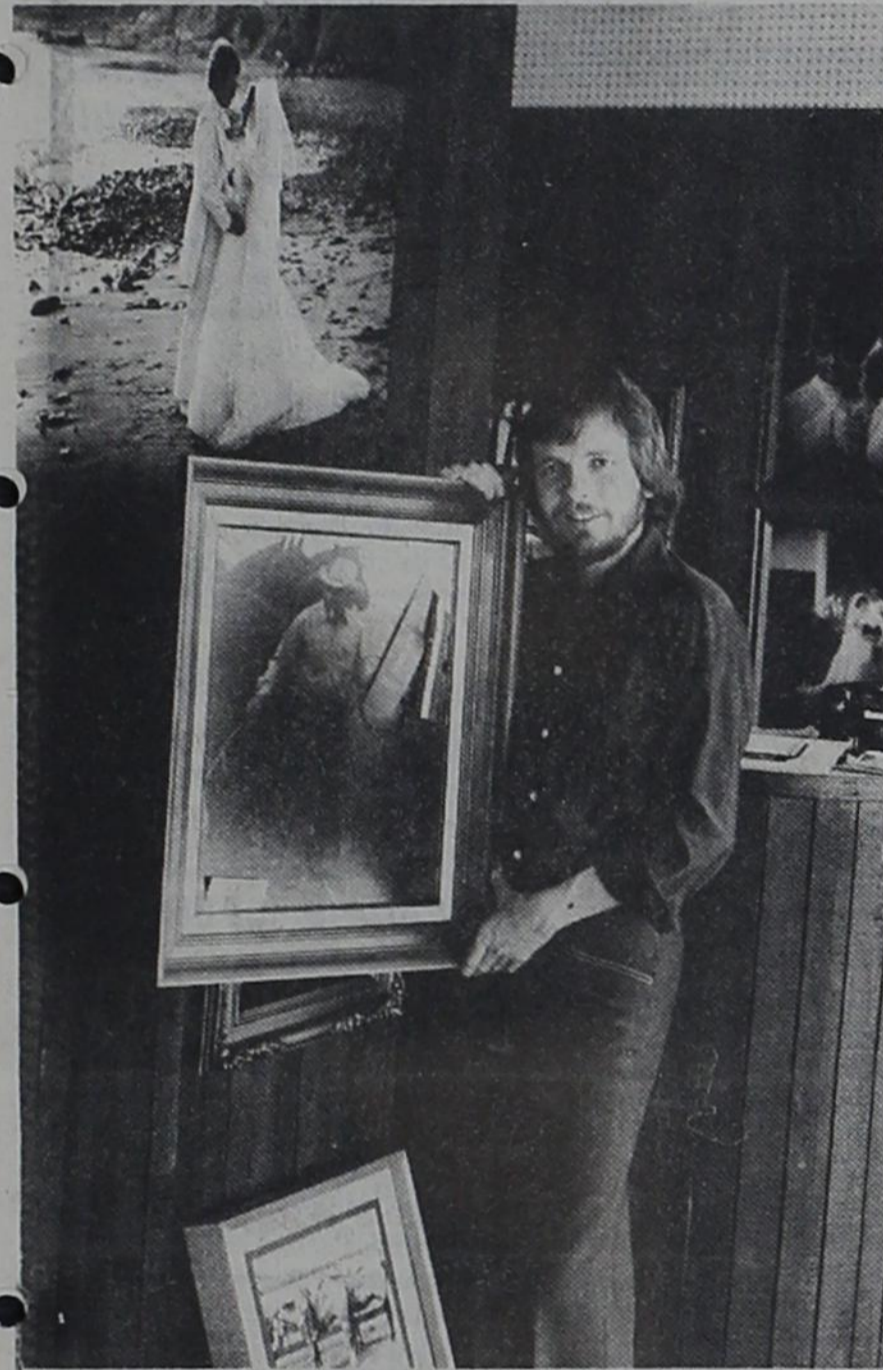

**TWO MINUTES WITH THE BIBLE**

**WHICH GOSPEL?**

A friend asks: "Have you heard the good news?" and you reply: "What good news?" Naturally! All good news is not the same. Yet few people follow this procedure when they read in the Bible the phrase "the gospel" - which simply means "the good news." They have been taught that "the gospel is the gospel" and "there is only one gospel," but this is simply not so in the light of the Bible itself.

God has not proclaimed only one gospel, one item of good news, down through the ages, but many. He has qualified the word "gospel" by distinctive titles, just as a woman labels her preserves to distinguish the different goodies she has put up for the winter.

The "gospel of the kingdom" and the "gospel of the grace of God" are not the same, and certainly the "gospel of the circumcision" and the "gospel of the uncircumcision" are not the same.

When we come upon the phrase "the gospel" without any qualifying title, we should immediately ask: "Which gospel?" and invariably the context will provide the answer. Luke 9:6, for example, simply states that the twelve disciples went about "preaching the gospel," but Verse 2 of the same chapter explains how the Lord had sent them "to preach THE KINGDOM OF GOD" - not the cross, but the kingdom, since He, the King, was in their midst. These disciples could not have engaged in "the preaching of the cross," as Paul later did, for it was not until at least two years after that the Lord "began" to tell them how He must suffer and die (Matt. 16:21) and then Peter "began to rebuke Him" (Ver. 22) and none of the twelve even understood what He was talking about (See Luke 18:34).

But whereas "the gospel of the kingdom" had been committed to the twelve while Christ was on earth, "the preaching of the cross" (as good news) and "the gospel of the grace of God" was later committed to the Apostle Paul and to us (1 Cor. 1:18; Acts 20:24).

Today we do not proclaim the kingdom rights of Christ. Rather we proclaim "redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of sins, according to the riches of His grace" (Eph. 1:7).

3. That said election shall be held at the following places, and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers for said election:

(a) In election precincts numbered 4 & 5 at School Auditorium Building, in Lazbuddie, Texas, in said School District, with Don McDonald, as Presiding Judge and Francis Jennings and Judy Brockman, Clerks.

The polls at the above designated polling places shall on election day be open from 7:00 o'clock a.m. to 7:00 o'clock p.m.

4. Larry Widner is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee

voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at Lazbuddie School Administrative Office within the boundaries of the above named School District and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. on each day for said absentee voting. The above described place for absentee voting is also the absentee Clerk's mailing address to which ballot applications and ballots voted by mail shall be sent.

Absentee voting, both by personal appearance and by mail, shall be by paper ballots and shall be canvassed by a special canvassing board, and Don McDonald, as Presiding Judge, Francis Jennings and Judy Brockman, as Clerks, are hereby appointed the Special Canvassing Board for said election.

6. The manner of holding said election shall be governed, as nearly as may be, by the Election Code of this state, and this Board of Trustees will furnish all necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election.

7. Immediately after the votes have been counted, the officers holding said election shall make and deliver the returns of said election and perform all other duties as provided by the Election Code.

8. The Board of Trustees shall give notice of said election, and this combined Election Order and Notice shall serve as Notice for said election. The President of the Board of Trustees is hereby authorized and instructed to post or cause to have posted said combined Election Order and Notice at three public places where notices are customarily posted in this school district, and said posting shall be made at least 20 days before the date of said election.

The President shall also cause a copy of this combined Election Order and Notice to be published one time in a newspaper of general circulation in the county where this school district is located. Said publication shall be not more than 30 days nor less than 10 days before the date of said election.

It is further found and determined that in accordance with an order of the Board of Trustees, the Secretary posted written notice of the date, place and subject of this meeting on the bulletin board located in the central administrative office of this school district, a place convenient and readily accessible to the general public, and said notice, having been so posted, remained posted for at least 72 hours preceding the scheduled time of said meeting.

It is further found and determined that in accordance with an order of the Board of Trustees, the Secretary furnished a notice of the date, place and subject of this

meeting to the county clerk of Parmer County, Texas, the county in which most, if not all, of this school district's pupils reside.

The above order being read, it was moved and seconded that the same do pass. Thereupon, the question being called for, the following members of the Board voted AYE: Jerry Don Glover, Gene Paul Jarman, L.M. Smith, Marvin Mimms, Alfred Hicks, Max Steinbock, and the following voted NO: none.

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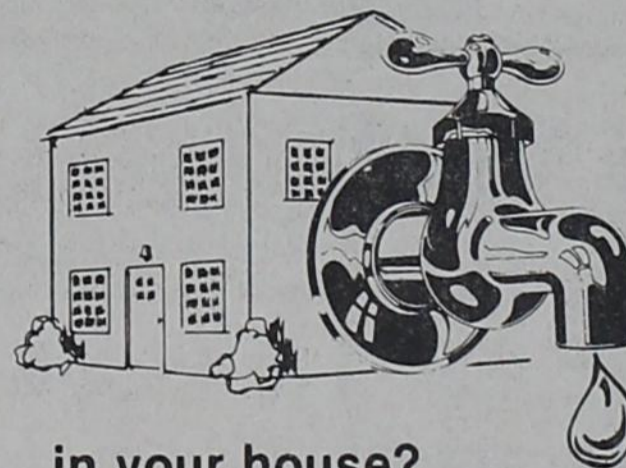

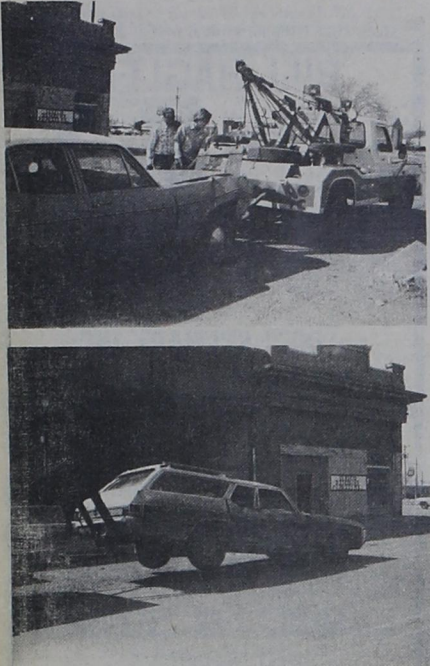
