Fertilizer and weed killer combinations are designed to appeal to the inherent lazy streak present in almost all home gardeners. The idea of fertilizing the lawn and killing the weeds all in one application is difficult to resist.

Weed killers when used properly can be great timesavers and eliminate a lot of back-breaking work. However, they must be used according to the directions given on the container if they are to be effective and not endanger valuable plants in the land-

The same chemicals that will kill the weeds are frequently harmful to the trees, shrubs and vines used in the landscape. Since tree roots invade the lawn area and usually extend beyond the branch spread it is difficult to apply a fertilizer-herbicide mixture to the lawn area without danger of damage to the desirable plants in the

All too often the time to apply fertilizer is not the correct time for effective weed control. Each type of herbicide must be used at specific rates

Many of the more popular

landscape trees including oaks, mulberry, sycamore, and others are highly susceptible to weed killers. When contemplating the use of a herbicide or herbicide and fertilizer mixture, always read all of the precautions given on the label. The information contained on the label was developed through expensive research and the manufacturer provides this information for your protection.

Remember weeds in a lawn are usually an indication of poor management practices. Through proper fertilization, correct mowing practices, adequate moisture, and good soil drainage, the grass will be vigorous enough to crown out the weeds.

In those areas beneath trees where excessive shade weakens the grass and is invaded by weeds, the use of herbicides is extremely risky. It is better to replace the grass with a shade-tolerant ground cover such as English Ivy.

Remember when using any type of herbicide, it is the misuse of these materials that usually cause problems.



Typical Tornado-Producing Cloud

The form of the usual tornadoproducing cloud is anvilshaped at its crest with a rougher overshooting top at the dome. Mamma, which appear to be balloon-shaped formations, may drop from the anvil shape. At groundlevel the common appearance is rain falling from a shelf cloud, usually in the northeastern portion of the parent cloud. Southwest of this there will be a wall cloud, sometimes with a horizontal tail cloud at the forward or northeast lower portion of it. This tail cloud is not the tornado. The tornado itself forms typically at the southwest lower edge of this wall

cloud. Behind the tornado





When we come upon the phrase "the gospel" without any qualifying title, we should immediately ask: context will provide the answer. Luke to the riches of His grace" (Eph. 1:7).

the twelve disciples went about "preaching the gospel," but Verse 2 of the same chapter explains how the Lord had sent them "to preach THE KINGDOM OF GOD" - not the cross, but the kingdom, since He, the King, was in their midst. These disciples could not have engaged in "the preaching of the cross," as Paul later did, for it was not until at least two years after that the Lord "began" to tell them how He must suffer and die (Matt. 16:21) and then Peter "began to rebuke Him" (Ver. 22) and none of the twelve even understood what He was talking about (See Luke

But whereas "the gospel of the kingdom" had been committed to the twelve while Christ was on earth, 'the preaching of the cross" (as good news) and "the gospel of the grace of God' was later committed to the Apostle Paul and to us (I Cor. 1:18; Acts 20:24).

Today we do not proclaim the kingdom rights of Christ. Rather we proclaim "redemption through His blood, "Which gospel?" and invariably the the foregiveness of sins, according


