



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

> If dishes are to stand for some time before being washed, do pre-rinse them before loading into the washer. In loading, alternate large and small dishes in the rack. If dishes are too crowded they will not

For best results place pans and dishes to avoid water blockage. Load flatware handles down, alternating knives, forks, and spoons. Try to avoid "nesting" or stacking forks or spoons together to avoid blockage of water for all flatware.

If dishes are not dry, next time check that cups, glasses, and bowls were turned to permit drainage. Another reason for wet dishes is the water temperature may be set below

the 140 degrees. There are certain articles that are not suitable for machine dishwashing in all washers. Colored and anodized aluminum should not be washed by the machine. Other articles include wooden salad bowls, china patterns that are not glazed, nonheat resistant plastic and rubber, soft leaded glass or crystal that may streak or etch, and highly polished decorative aluminum ware such as soft them. metals and pewter.







ning Water Draw is a feasible project, according to the preliminary investigations made by the Soil Conservation Service team from the state office in This was the information pre-

sented at a meeting of Soil Conservation District Supervisors, county commissioners, local farmers and interested business men in Dimmitt. All of this came as result of an application submitted to the Soil Conservation Service by the board of supervisors of the Hale County Soil Conservation District. The soil conservation districts in Lamb, Swisher, Castro and Parmer Counties have agreed to co-sponsor this application with Hale County, Curry County in New Mexico has been asked to join in the project since Running Water Draw heads in that county.

For a project like this to be justifiable under the Watershed and Flood Detention Act, the damage that has been inflicted to property, both on farms and in towns, must equal or exceed the cost of such a project. The damage to the city of Plainview along with the damage to farms along the draw well exceeds the cost of 10 to 12 structures that would be needed to halt another flood like the one in 1960.

Even though there is very little damage from flood water here in Parmer County, this is an excellent opportunity to build structures and impound water for recreation, irrigation or even municipal water supply if the people of this county want it.

Let's say that a land owner has an ideal site for construction of a dam on his land. If he does not want the structure on his land, then other sites Price Supports will be sought for either upstream or downstream. After construction is completed this land owner still has full rights of the land as before, with exception that qualified persons would come in occasionally to inspect and maintain the structure as needed. 


