Texico Chamber Names Three Top Citizens



Texico's 1984 Honorees

Honored as Texico's top citizens for 1984 were Evelyn Hadley, center, Woman of the Year, and Scott Parker, left, and Dave Lynn, Men of the Year, at Tues-

day night's annual Chamber of Commerce Banquet. Each received an engraved plaque for the honor, presented to them on behalf of the Chamber by last

year's honorees, Oneta Luce and Ray Pritchett. This year's top citizens were cited for their many contributions to the Texico community and school.

A large crowd was on hand Tuesday night at the annual Texico Chamber of Commerce Banquet in the school gymnasium when Evelyn Hadley was named Texico's Woman of the Year, and Coaches Dave Lynn and Scott Parker were jointly named Texico's Men of the Year.

Last year's honorees, Oneta Luce and Ray Pritchett, introduced the 1984 top citizens and presented them each with a plaque.

Mrs. Hadley received the honor for her service to the community, to her church, and to her family. Texico coaches Lynn and Parker were honored jointly for leading the Wolverine football team and the Wolverine basketball team to the Class A State championships in 1983-84.

Keynote speaker was Larry S. Milner, vice-president of communication and public affairs for Southwestern Public Service Company in Amarillo. He spoke on the topic "Winners of '84," and he emphasized that Texico was a winner in 1984.

Milner compared a winning community to a filing cabinet, saying that all kinds of knowledge and data in a filing cabinet depends on how much or what is put into it.

To be a winning community or a winning athletic team, Milner said that three things must be present: winners must have optimism and enthusiasm, must project a positive image, and must accept and deal with change, as change is inevitable.

In keeping with the "winning" theme, the gym was decorated in the Texico colors of green and white. The tables were covered in white with green streamers down the center and spaced with inflated green balloons with the words "We're #1" on them.

The head table held a basketball and a football both signed with the players' and coaches' names, and behind the head table on the wall were displayed large color photographs of both the basketball and football state

champion teams. Between the photos were green inflated balloons inscribed with the banquet theme "Community Teamwork Works."

Special guests at the banquet were all members of the basketball and football teams, the cheerleaders, and the four coaches.

Chamber president John R. Hadley was master of ceremonies, and A.D. McDonald introduced the special guests including Chamber representatives from area towns, political candidates running for election this year, Border Town Days

Queen Valda Cavallero, and many others from around the area.

Incoming President Bill Christian gave the progress report for Texico which included the new educational complex at the school, the \$266,000 water improvement project, three new homes and several extensively remodeled homes, five new mobile homes, one new business, and two business ownership changes. He reported that Texico had 14 additional water meters this year and progress is continuing on the city park as well as street

improvements. Providing pre-dinner and dinner music were Jill and Johnny Mulhair of Clovis, as guests enjoyed a meal of roast beef and trimmings.

Rev. Joel Horne of the First Baptist Church in Texico gave the invocation and the benediction.

President Hadley recognized the 1984 officers and directors who are Bill Christian, president; James Milsap, vice-president; Louise Tidwell, secretary-treasurer; and Lewis Cooper, James Pierce, A.D. McDonald, and John Hadley, directors.

Hadley, Lynn, Parker Chosen Texico's Best

For their many contributions to the Texico community and school, Evelyn Hadley was selected as Woman of the Year, and Texico coaches, Dave Lynn and Scott Parker, were chosen jointly as Men of the Year.

In introducing Mrs. Hadley, Oneta Luce, last year's recipient of the top honor, said:

"Our honoree this year has been a member of the Texico Women's Club and the Fairfield Extension Club. She is also a member of the Texico Baptist Church where she taught primary age children and played the organ and piano for many years. She graduated from Texico High School in 1940.

"She is the mother of six children, and all of them graduated from Texico High School. She has 15 grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

"This lady was one of ten children born to Bro. and Mrs. W.T. North. He was a Baptist minister for 35 years. She moved here with her family in 1934, and her father preached at the First Baptist Church in Texico.

"Our honoree married John Hadley on June 16, 1940 in Texico, and they still live in this great community.

"It's my pleasure to present to you the Texico Chamber of Commerce 1984 Woman of the Year, Evelyn Hadley."

The 1984 Men of the Year, Dave Lynn and Scott Parker, were introduced by Ray Pritchett, last year's honoree, who said that he had two typewritten pages about the accomplishments of these two men, but time permitted him to name only a few.

However, he said that these Texico coaches were best known for leading the 1983-84 Wolverine football team and Wolverine basketball team to the State championships.

In listing some of the attributes of Football Coach Dave Lynn, he said that "this honoree was born in Eunice, N.M., and graduated from Eunice High School where he participated in track and field events. He held the state shot put record in New Mexico until last year at the state track meet.

ASCS Reports Change In Nongrazing

Parmer County ASCS Committee has announced a change in the nongrazing period, according to Martin Chandler, executive director.

The nongrazing period is a continuous six-month period

between the dates of February 28 and November 1. During this period, the Acreage Conserving Reduction (ACR) or lay-out may not be grazed.

In a review, considering changes in the weather, mois-

ture conditions, and feed supplies, the ASCS Committee has designated the nongrazing period to be between May 1 and November 1.

This nongrazing designation is effective for 1984 only.

PCG Director To Be Elected From Parmer

Parmer County cotton producers and agribusinessmen will elect a Businessman Director to Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. at an 8 a.m. breakfast meeting on Tuesday, April 10, at Luce's restaurant in Farwell.

Announcement of the election comes from Bert Williams of Farwell, Parmer County Producer Director to the 25-county cotton organization, and Donald Christian, also of Farwell, current Businessman Director.

Each of the counties in PCG territory has two directors, one a businessman and the other a

cotton producer. They are elected on alternate years for two-year terms. Each is eligible for re-election every second year.

All producers and businessmen are invited to the meeting. However, under PCG by-laws, only current dues-paying members of PCG will be eligible to be elected a director or to vote in the election. This provision of the by-laws will be fully explained at the meeting.

A PCG staff member will conduct the election, review and answer questions about recent and planned PCG activities.

In between is a wealth of religious and patriotic thought. We found it absorbing to read, and it has given us good food for thought in our daily activities.

Three cheers for her, it is something we would expect to find in a community such as our Twin Cities. We would be amazed to find anything similar to it in the newsrooms of the big media.

For ye of short memories, we would remind you that last year the area received five inches of snow during the nighttime of April 5th. Spring has not totally sprung for us on the Golden Spread.

Ah, the national budget, it grows like Topsy. It provides almost as much conversation as the weather, and like the weather, nobody does anything about it. One good reason that nothing is done about it is because somewhere in that massive monument to fiscal irresponsibility and human greed is some goodie for practically everybody and everywhere.

An example that might be pointed to is the continuing news story about the City of Canyon, and its attempt to get a new sewage facility funded by the Federal Government. This is the immorality of our present situation, the charging of today's necessities to generations yet unborn.

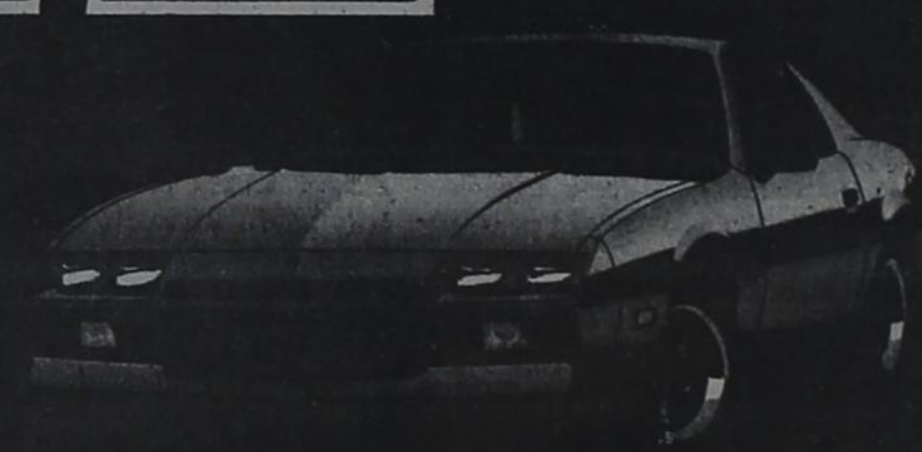

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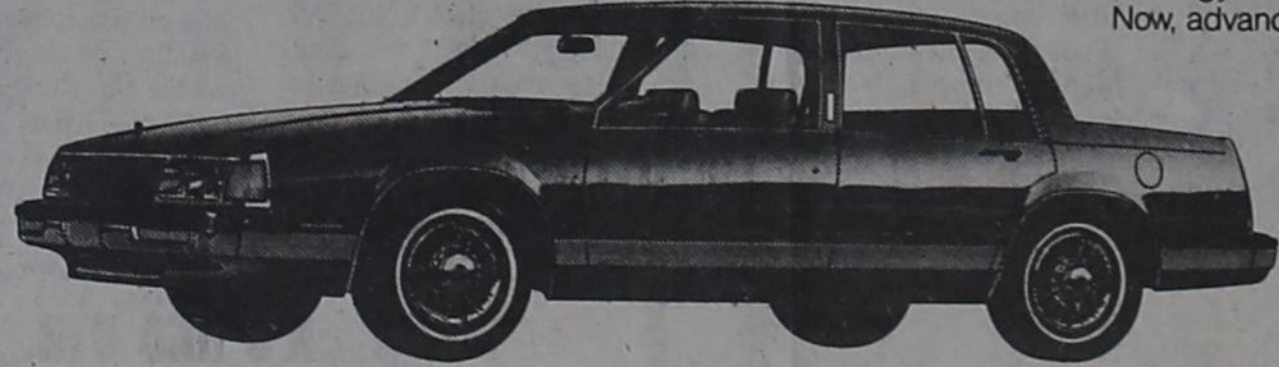
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BTD, July 27 & 28 - -

Committee Begins Plans For Annual Celebration

Border Town Days may still be three months away, but the BTD Committee has begun plans for the annual Twin Cities celebration.

In its initial session of this year, the group met Monday night at Luce's restaurant, with 12 members representing the civic and social organizations in Texico and Farwell.

"Holidays On Parade" is the theme of this year's festivities which will take place July 27 and 28. The dates coincide with the two-night High Plains Junior Rodeo to be sponsored by the JCCAs.

Included in the planning stages are the annual BTD parade sponsored by the Texico-Farwell Lions Club, the barbecue meal sponsored by the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club, park concessions, arts and crafts show, a woolly beard contest, and the BTD Queen Contest.

The Committee will begin seeking area, Texas, and New Mexico talent or attractions to appear at the BTD park activities, and everyone in the Twin Cities is invited to submit suggestions to the Committee for these.

Area organizations, businesses, churches, and school groups are asked to begin thinking of making floats, using the BTD theme, to be entered in the parade. Three cash prizes will be awarded to the best floats, and will be furnished by the Farwell Chamber of Commerce and the BTD Committee.

First place in the parade float contest will be \$75, second will be \$50, and third place will be \$30.

Texico Chamber of Commerce will furnish the old car trophies, and Tedson Trailers of Texico will furnish the monetary prizes for the kid's decorated bike contest. The BTD Committee will provide trophies to best riding clubs entered in the parade.

A change has been made in the beard contest this year. There will not be a clean-shaven date, and anyone with a beard may enter the contest, no matter when the beard growing began. So if you already have a

beard, or begin growing one now, you are eligible to enter. Shave permits will be available for those gents who do not wish to grow a beard.

Plans are also underway for the annual area Merchants Giveaway promotion, and the Texico Volunteer Fire Department will also give away a new pickup at the Saturday afternoon park activities.

In addition to the 1984 GMC Sierra pickup, the fireboys will also give away a half beef, a 19-inch color television set, and

two dinners.

Lubbock To Host Extension Swine Short Course Apr. 11

Show pig production and a discussion of important factors in buying and selling boars will highlight the annual Texas A&M University Swine Short Course for producers on the High and Rolling Plains. The course, April 11, will be at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center, just east of I-27 on FM 1294, at the Shallowater exit.

It is one of three which A&M will present across the state, said Dr. Robert S. Cohen, Texas Agricultural Extension Service swine specialist at Lubbock. Cohen noted that the Lubbock course differs entirely from those to be presented April 10 at

Stephenville and April 13 at Luling.

The Lubbock course was developed by the swine task force of the South Plains Development Program to meet special interests of producers and breeders in the Rolling and High Plains, Cohen said.

Registration begins at 8:30 a.m., followed by a morning session on production, selection, marketing and feeding of show pigs. This will include facilities for small swine operations, boar and sow management to optimize pig production, the influence of the show date on the farrowing date, and ration selection for show pigs.

Also to be covered will be preventive vaccination programs for show pigs, preparing show pigs for sale, insuring that the new boar is a success in your operation, and a panel discussion of qualities to seek in a pig show.

Following lunch, a panel of commercial producers and purebred breeders will discuss qualities they consider important in buying and selling boars.

Other topics in the afternoon will include benefits of a computer in swine operations, results of the Houston barrow show, report on the test station sale, and an update on swine research.
