



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

COLLEGE STATION -Although recent computer studies indicate that national centers of tornado activity are shifting or expanding, Texans along the Red River and in the Panhandle still live in the middle of Tornado Alley, according to two Texas A&M University meteorologists.

In fact, all Texans - particularly the 1.3 million newcomers - are potential victims of the killer storms, say Dr. A. H. Thompson and Jim Lynch, a graduate student.

According to the State Climatologist's Office headquartered at Texas A&M, an average of 109 "confirmed" twisters touch Texas soil each year. It is feared that many more form but are not counted because they go unseen by authorities or trained spotters.

Partly due to its size, more tornadoes have been recorded in Texas than any other state, although Texas ranks 11th among states in tornadoes per 10,000 square miles, with 3.9.







PEACH SHERBET POPSICLES

2 egg whites Pinch salt

6 T. sugar 1/8 tsp. almond flavoring

3 C. pureed fresh peaches 1/2 C. sugar

1 C. milk

Beat egg whites until foamy, add salt and continue beating until soft peaks begin to form. Add sugar, 1 tablespoon at a time, beating well after each addition. Add almond flavoring.

To puree peaches, wash and peel or leave peeling on as desired, and cut peaches into a blender. Blend at high speed for a few seconds until peaches are pureed. Approximately 1-2 medium peaches will make 1 cup pureed. Mix pureed peaches, 1/2 cup sugar and milk. Fold into egg white mixture. Pour into popsicle forms or into small paper cups. Insert popsicle sticks and freeze.

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



First Time Canner

Dear First:

needed for safe home canning includes a water bath canner for acid foods (tomatoes and fruits) and a steam pressure canner for low acid foods. Meat, poultry, fish and all vegetables, except tomatoes and pickles are low

The pressure canner should always be equipped with a safety valve and an accurate pressure gauge. Weighted gauges indicate five, 10 and 15 pounds of pressure while dial gauges can be used with intermediate settings.

jars and lids. Only jars and The cost of 20 grams of lids made especially for home protein from dry beans was canning should be used. Commerical jars, such as those containing mayonnaise or peanut butter, are not The minimum equipment suitable for home canning.

Adequate and suitable storage space must be available for canned products. For maximum quality, canned foods should be stored in a cool, dry place and used within the period between canning seasons.

Canned food stored near a source of heat, such as a furnace or hot water pipes, or in direct sunlight will spoil a





DYCUS FAMILY HISTORY

Charles Toliver Dycus was born in 1873, one of nine children of Toliver Lafayette Dycus and his wife Sarah Catherine, in Georgetown, Lampasas County, East Texas. Charlie Dycus, as he came to be called, migrated in early manhood to Farwell, Texas and was elected in 1907 as the First U.S. Marshal to serve the newly organized town of Farwell. He married Ella Stroud and they had six children ... Ralph, Mildred, Johnnie, Tol, Connell and Andy. At the birth of Andy, Ella died in 1910, and a couple living in rural Farwell, Mr. and Mrs. Sam F. 
