## Sen. Harrison Schmitt To Speak At Banquet

U.S. Senator Harrison (Jack) Schmitt, a former astronaut, will be the featured speaker at the April 6 Texico Chamber of Commerce annual awards banquet at Texico school at 7 p.m. MST.

Tickets to the annual affair, which will also feature the naming of Texico's Man and Woman of the Year, are \$7.50 each, and are available from any chamber member.

Schmitt, a Republican from New Mexico, will speak to the banquet audience about his experiences as an astronaut.

The last man to have stepped

on the moon, Schmitt was Apollo 17 Lunar Module Pilot in December 1972. He was a NASA Scientist-Astronaut from 1965 to 1973, serving as chief of

scientists-astronauts in 1973. He is a graduate of Western High School, Silver City, N.M., receiving his BS degree from the California Institute of Technology in 1957. Schmitt holds a masters degree from the University of Oslo, Norway, and a doctorate of geology from Harvard University.

He received his jet pilot wings from USN Ellison Field in Florida in 1967.

During his career as an astronaut, Schmitt also served as assistant administrator for NASA Energy Affairs. He was project chief for Lunar Field Geological Methods, and in 1970 received the Johnson Space Center Achievement Award.

He also was awarded the NASA Distinguished Service Medal.

He was inducted into the In-

ternational Space Hall of Fame in 1977, and in 1981 he received the National Security Award, which is the highest Civil Defense Award given.

The senator is a familiar face around the Twin Cities as last year he came to the official grand opening and open house of Texico's new Volunteer Fire Department facility.

He was born in Santa Rita, N.M., but calls Silver City his permanent residence. He still maintains a membership in the Albuquerque Chamber of Commerce and is a member of the New Mexico Geological Society.

Introduction of the chamber's 1982-83 officers will also take place at the banquet. The officers include John R. Hadley, president; A.D. McDonald, vice-president; and Louise En-

### Harding As Counselor - -

## Kenneth Shaw Hired As Texico H.S. Principal

Texico Junior High School Principal Kenneth Shaw will assume the added duties as Texico High School principal beginning with the next school year, following action taken at a meeting of the Texico School Board last week.

Shaw will serve as the junior high school principal and the high school principal, said school Superintendent James Pierce, but will not continue as head varsity boys basketball coach.

Current high school principal James Harding has been hired by the board as a full-time guidance counselor for the next school year.

A new varsity boys basketball coach has not been hired, Pierce said.

"It is an impossible task to be a full-time principal and guidance counselor at the same time," said Pierce referring to Harding's job the past couple of years. "I think this will be a real advantage to our students. Now we'll have someone working full time for their benefit and I think we'll be able to offer more things, such as scholarships, for them."

Pierce pointed out that "It has to be a difficult job to be disciplinarian and guidance counselor both at the same time. With the change, Shaw can act as full-time principal and disciplinarian, fulfilling the academic duties, and Harding can serve the students

as guidance counselor and vocational advisor."

Elementary school principal George Herrington had his contract renewed by the board for the coming school year.

Pierce said that a high school boys' basketball coach probably will be hired at the April 13 board meeting.

In other action taken at the March meeting, the board discussed the possibility of using solar energy in the proposed multi-purpose room facility.

"We have been told that the state would probably give top consideration to providing capital outlay funding for the building if the building were to contain some solar energy equipment," Pierce said. "The cost would be \$7.50 per square foot more if we went with the solar energy." He said no decision was made by the board on this matter.

Pierce said that a representative from the state's Capital Outlay committee will meet with the school administration at the budget hearing May 18. "They will take some time and look at our facilities determining our need for the new multi-purpose room," he said.

The board adopted a resolution for the open meeting law, and accepted Title I funding for certain school projects.

It was announced that a budget planning meeting will be April 5.

Those attending the meeting

included board members Herman Gerles, Mike Spearman, Greg Martin, Roy Thornton, and Aryle Crooks. Also present were Superintendent Pierce, principals Harding, Shaw, and Herrington; Marcia Leavell, and Paula Leighton.

## Several Thefts Reported To Parmer County Sheriff's Dept.

Parmer County Sheriff's office has been busy over the past two weeks investigating several reported thefts, according to Bill Morgan, sheriff. James Haseloff of Farwell reported that on March 11, a 40-foot television antenna tower and a telephone was taken from a vacant farm house, saying the missing tower is valued at \$150.

On March 15, Phyllis Coburn of Farwell reported that a boy's bicycle was stolen from her property. Mrs. Coburn said the bike has homemade "Sissy" bars, a black banana seat with grey tape, and has a red frame.

Parmer County Liquid Fertilizer Co. of Bovina told the sheriff's office that on the night of March 13, approximately 10 gallons of gasoline were stolen from one of the company's trucks, which was parked at the plant.

Oakley Stevenson of Bovina reported that sometime within the last month, a 12-volt battery and a set of wires were taken off of a well motor. Stevenson said the missing items are valued at \$55.

Gloria Orozco of Bovina reported that someone entered her home on March 8, but said that nothing was missing.

In arrests this week, Sheriff Morgan said that John Henry Kuper, 32, and Steve Vigil, 30, both of Hereford, were arrested on a charge of theft of cattle. The men posted a \$1,000 cash bond each and are

awaiting a grand jury hearing. Sheriff Morgan also reported that Victor Duran, 41, of Hereford was sentenced to 10 days in Parmer County jail by District Judge Jack Young on a contempt of court charge.

Five prisoners from Randall County jail while Randall County officials try to take care of their jail problems.

Morgan said that the Randall County inmates "arrive at various times," and that the Parmer jail has had as few as one and as many as six of the Randall inmates.

## Farwell Man Charged In 3-Car Collision

James Rance Williams, 20, of Farwell, was released on \$2,200 bond after being taken into Curry County custody Saturday night following charges relating to a three-car accident which took place at the railroad crossing near the intersection of U.S. Highways 60-70 and 84 in Texico.

According to investigating officer, Mickey Fenn of Texico, Williams was charged with reckless driving, driving while intoxicated, and driving on revocation of license, following the incident which occurred at 9:10 p.m. MST.

Fenn explained that two vehicles were stopped at the railroad crossing, and when the rail gates lifted the two cars began to move when the vehicle driven by Williams rammed into the rear of one of the vehicles, forcing it into the rear of the other car.

The driver and two pas-

sengers in the middle vehicle all received injuries in the accident and were transported by Texico and Farwell ambulances to Clovis High Plains Hospital, Fenn said.

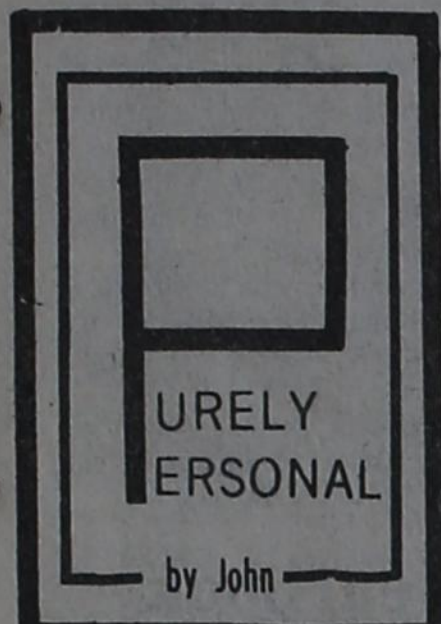
Neither Williams nor the driver of the first car were injured, Fenn said.

Taken to Clovis High Plains Hospital were Richard Lindeed, driver, and passengers Richard Penrod and Bob Tate, all of San Antonio. The three were in a 1978 Subaru station wagon.

The driver of the first car, a 1978 Oldsmobile, was Kenneth Powell of Muleshoe.

Fenn said that the Subaru received extensive damage to both the front and rear and the Oldsmobile received "over \$100 worth of damage to the rear."

He said Williams was driving a 1973 Ford pickup which received "extensive damage" to its front end.

More people have been slain in the most horrible ways, including by poison gas and chemical agents by kindly North Vietnam than ever suffered under the government of South Vietnam while we were defending that regime.

Why aren't the big moguls to TV covering a much bigger war than El Salvador? There is a real good size war going on in Afghanistan since December 1979. However, in this case, the "rebels" are fighting a communist government. In this case it is a government supported with genuine Russian troops using the most modern weapons.

This horribly embarrassing fact is swept under the TV news rug and largely ignored. Heavens to Betsy, think of the catering that ABC, CBS, and NBC would be doing if our government sent a well-armed expeditionary force to El Salvador.

Is this bias in any way related to the study that showed that 80 percent of the Washington news media is very liberal in their politics?

Wasn't Walter Cronkite toying with the idea of running on the same ticket as liberal John Anderson? Now remember, Uncle Walter is reputed to be the most highly believed news commentator in his day and time.

Oh yes, speaking of bias. It is odd that Jack Lemmon is starring in another picture of very doubtful authenticity. This one also casts a cloud on the government of the United States. Is he gunning for a place in the sun along with Ed Asner?

At least three national columnists have severely criticized the movie "Missing" for its gross errors of fact that it purports to be truth.

Yet the drums roll on and Uncle Sam takes a beating.

A body would almost conclude that a re-incarnated Benedict Arnold was directing news and entertainment in this country.

## Fire Safety Tips

Most fatal home fires begin in rooms other than the bedroom.

Therefore, it is a good idea to close the doors to bedrooms when you go to bed at night. Fire produces deadly heated gases and smoke that can kill you long before the flames reach you.

A closed door will keep out gases and heat for some time if a fire should occur in another part of the house. The simple procedure of closing your door can retard the spread of fire and give you more than four times as long to escape.

If a fire should start inside a bedroom, a closed door can help to prevent its rapid spread to the rest of the house.

## Tornado Season Warnings Noted

Tornadic winds do not strike the Twin Cities area often, but this area does receive the main weather element from which tornadoes are formed: thunderstorms.

According to weather officials at Cannon Air Force Base, the Texico, Farwell, Clovis vicinity averages two thunderstorms a month during April; and in May through August, the area averages from six to nine.

During the next few months, hardly an evening will go by without a tornado warning being placed on television screens and over the radio air-waves.

In the Twin Cities, tornado warnings are sounded by the Volunteer Fire Department dispatchers with sirens.

Texico's tornado signal consists of two full cycles with no pause in between, according to Nadine Edge of the Texico Volunteer Fire Department. "The signal will sound like one continuous wail," Mrs. Edge said.

Farwell's tornado alarm also consists of one full cycle of the regular five-blast signal, followed by another complete cycle.

It should be noted that neither Texico or Farwell sirens will be sounded for fire or ambulance calls as mem-

bers of the fire departments now have pagers.

The only time the sirens will sound will be on Thursday nights for the regular department meetings, or as a tornado warning.

Farwell Fire Chief Joel White advises that there are no designated tornado shelters in Farwell, and the same goes for Texico, says City Clerk Marie Christian.

At the sound of the tornado sirens, Twin Cities residents are advised to take cover in the nearest basement or other suitable shelter.

Persons in trailer houses and mobile homes should vacate immediately and find suitable shelter.

If driving, one should drive away from the direction of the tornado in a right angle, or get out of the vehicle and take shelter in a ditch or ravine.

There is a difference between a tornado watch and a tornado warning.

A watch is initiated when a tornado is forecasted to be in the area, and when a warning is issued, it means a tornado has been sighted and danger is in the area.



## New Conservationist

## County Accepts Bid To Purchase Pickup

Parmer County Commissioners Court met Monday and accepted a bid submitted by Friona Ford Sales for a new pickup truck for the Parmer County Extension Agent for Agriculture.

Two bids were received by the Court, one from Reeve Chevrolet-Olds of Friona and one from Friona Ford Sales. The Court approved unanimously to accept the Friona Ford Sales, Inc., bid with a 3.73 to 1 rear axle at a price of \$11,488.70.

In other action, the Court approved the payment of boarding care bills for five Parmer County children for the month of February in the amount of \$1,036. The amount is to be reimbursed to the county.

Lonnie McFarland of Lariat met with the Court and re-

quested repairs on a county road near the Sherley-Anderson grain elevator. The Court turned the matter over to Commissioner Archie Tarter since the road is in his precinct.

It was also decided to send a representative to the Texas Association of Counties convention in Austin, August 18 and 19.

The court voted to order a probate book from the Texas College of Probate Judges for the county judge's office. The request for this book was made by County Judge Porter Roberts.

At the suggestion of County Treasurer Benna Felts, the Court voted to reinvest \$100,000 of General Fund money into a certificate of deposit (CD), to mature June 25, 1982, and to invest \$18,000 of ROW money

into another CD to mature April 30, 1982.

Judge Roberts is to be reimbursed \$20.74, the amount he spent for maps and supplies for the reappointment of the Commissioner Precincts.

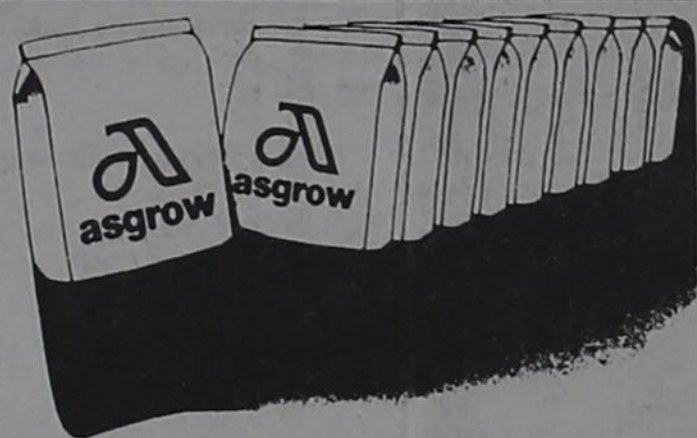

## Agriculture Yearbook Is Available Now

The 1981 Yearbook of Agriculture published annually by the U.S. Department of Agriculture is off the press, announces Seth Ralston, Parmer County Agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Titled "Will There Be Enough Food?" the yearbook addresses the concern of feeding a hungry world and the importance of safeguarding this nation's soil and water and other natural resources.

Featured in the 344-page yearbook is a 32-page color section and more than 100 black and white photos.

"Will There Be Enough Food?" is the 82nd volume to

self-governing citizens. At Girls and Boys State, the youth form their own senate and city councils where they

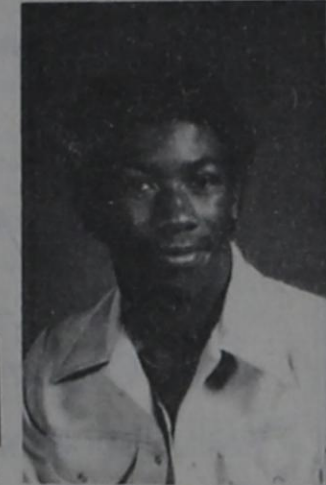

**TWO MINUTES WITH THE BIBLE**

**THE NAME OF THE LORD**

Many people use the name of the Lord very lightly. They are quick to exclaim, "My God!" or to use the name of the Lord Jesus Christ in vain.

We should all understand that the Bible declares that "God will not hold him guiltless that taketh His name in vain" (Ex. 20:7). This is one of the Ten Commandments which too many people forget or ignore. But it is more than a commandment. It does not merely forbid taking the Lord's name on our lips carelessly; it adds the warning, "Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord thy God in vain; FOR the Lord will not hold him guiltless that taketh His name in vain." Don't commit this sin. He warns, for if you do you will have to face God Himself for it and He will not overlook it.

Now, probably many of our readers have used the name of God and Christ in vain again and again. They have gotten into the habit and find it difficult to stop. Now what? How can such escape the condemnation of God upon this sin?

First, one of the principal reasons for not using God's name in vain is because of His infinite greatness. We should all bow and worship before Him. The second reason is because He—the infinite God—took upon Him human form and, as God the Son, died for our sins at Calvary. Now would you want to curse and swear in His name? You wouldn't want people to curse and swear in your mother's name, would you? How much less should we curse and swear in Christ's name or God's name?

Those who have this problem, invariably have never trusted Christ as their own Savior—as the One who died for their sins. Those who have trusted Him as Savior usually never are tempted to use His name in vain again. Rather, like St. Paul, who once was "a blasphemer and a persecutor," they exclaim with deepest gratitude: "He loved me and gave Himself for me" (Gal. 2:20).

on the part of the Company in the construction or maintenance of its telephone system in the City. The City shall notify the Company representative within ten days after the presentation of any claim or demand either by suit or otherwise made against the City on account of any negligence as aforesaid on the part of the Company.

**SECTION 4. Housemoving and Other Unusual Use.** Any person or corporation desiring to move a building or other structure along, or to make any unusual use of, the streets, alleys and public ways of the City which shall interfere with the poles, wires or fixtures of the Company or the City, shall first give notice to the Company or the City, as the case may be, and shall pay to the Company or the City, as the case may be, a sum sufficient to cover the expense and damage incident to the cutting, altering and moving of the wires or other fixtures of the Company or the City, and before a permit is given by the City therefore, the applicant shall present a receipt from the Company showing the payment. Thereupon the Company, upon presentation of said permit, shall within a reasonable time thereafter provide for and do such cutting, altering and moving of said wires and fixtures as may be necessary to allow such moving or other unusual use of the streets, alleys and public ways of the City.

**SECTION 5. Consideration.** As a further consideration for this franchise, the Company shall pay to the City an amount equal to two percent (2%) of the gross revenues, exclusive of all federal and state excise taxes, received for local exchange service furnished to subscribers to the Company, not including uncollectable revenues related to that service, within the City of Texico. Payment shall be made in quarterly installments within sixty (60) days after the end of each calendar quarter during the term of this franchise.

**SECTION 6. Inspection of Books.** The City shall have the right, at all reasonable times, to inspect the books and records of the Company pertaining to the Company's gross revenues for local exchange service received from telephone subscribers located within the limits of the City.

**SECTION 7. Services Provided to City.** The City agrees to pay to the Company in accordance with standard tariff schedules the rates and charges for all telephone service of any description whatsoever rendered by the Company to the City, except the cost, value or rental of attachments made by the City to the poles of the Company as provided in Section 2 hereof.

**SECTION 8. Payment in Lieu of Other Taxes.** In consideration of the payments hereinabove provided for, it is expressly understood and agreed by the Company and the City that the payments above specified shall be in lieu of any and all franchise, license, occupation, or any other form of excise or revenue tax (except general ad valorem property taxes, sales or gross receipts taxes, special assessments for local improvements, standby charges, fees for trench excavation permits, sidewalks permits, and curb and gutter permits) based upon or measured by the revenue, employees, payroll, property, poles, wires, instruments, conduits, pipes, fixtures or other appurtenances of the Company, and all other property or equipment of the Company or any part thereof. Said payments shall continue only so long as the Company is not prohibited from making the same by any lawful authority having jurisdiction in the premises, and so

long as the City does not charge, levy or collect, or attempt to charge, levy or collect any of the forms of taxes specified above in this paragraph; and if any lawful authority having jurisdiction in the premises shall hereafter prohibit such payment or payments, or if the City does levy, charge or collect or attempt to levy, charge or collect any of the forms of taxes specified in this paragraph, the obligation to make such payments as hereinabove provided shall be abated to the extent such other forms of taxes are levied, charged or collected by the City.

**SECTION 9. Non-waiver of Other Rights.** It is expressly understood and agreed by and between the City and the Company that neither the grant nor acceptance of this franchise shall constitute a waiver, either upon the part of the Company or the City, of any rights or claims had or made by either with respect to the occupancy of the streets, alleys, and public places of the City, under the laws of the Territory of New Mexico and under the Constitution and general statutes of the State of New Mexico, nor shall anything herein in anywise prejudice or impair any rights or claims existing independently of this franchise of the City or the Company, or its predecessors or successors, with respect to the construction, operation, and maintenance, either before or after the life of this franchise of a telephone system in the City.

**SECTION 10. Term of Franchise.** The franchise and rights herein granted shall continue in force and effect for ten years.

**SECTION 11. Effective Date.** This Ordinance shall become effective thirty (30) days after its enactment; provided the Company, within said thirty (30) days, shall have filed with the City Clerk of the City of Texico an unconditional acceptance thereof. Within ten (10) days after the filing of said acceptance the City Clerk shall acknowledge in writing the receipt of said acceptance.

**SECTION 12. Severability Clause.** If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, word or phrase of this ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or otherwise invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance. The Council, the Governing Body of the City of Texico, hereby declares that it would have passed this ordinance and each section, subsection, sentence, clause, word or phrase thereof irrespective of any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, words or phrases being declared unconstitutional or otherwise invalid.

ORDINANCE NO. 218

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING CERTAIN RIGHTS AND PRIVILEGES TO THE MOUNTAIN STATES TELEPHONE AND TELEGRAPH COMPANY, ITS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Commission of the City of Texico, State of New Mexico:

**SECTION 1. Grant of Authority.** There is hereby granted by the City of Texico, hereinafter called the "City," to The Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company, its successors and assigns, hereinafter called the "Company," the non-exclusive right and privilege to construct, erect, operate and maintain, in, upon, along, across, above, over and under the streets, alleys, public ways and public places now in use or dedicated, and all extensions thereof, and additions thereto, in said City, poles, wires, cables, underground conduits, manholes and other communications fixtures necessary or proper for the maintenance and operation in said city of the Company's communications business; provided, however, that no poles or other fixtures shall be placed where the same will interfere with sewers, electric lights, traffic control devices, water hydrants or water mains and shall be placed in such a manner as to cause a minimum interference with the rights or reasonable convenience of property owners who adjoin any of said streets, alleys or public ways and places.

**SECTION 2. Use of System by Municipality.** The City shall have the privilege, during the life of this franchise, free of charge, where aerial construction exists, of maintaining upon the poles of the Company within the City limits wire and pole fixtures necessary for a police and fire alarm system, such wires and fixtures to be placed and maintained under the supervision of the Company. The City in its use and maintenance of such wires and fixtures shall at all times

comply with the rules and regulations of the Company, and the provisions of the latest edition of the National Electrical Safety Code, so that there may be minimum danger of contact or conflict between the wires and fixtures of the Company and the wires and fixtures of the City. It is further agreed, in order to avoid danger to life and property, that said police or fire alarm wires or other fixtures will not be exposed, without the consent of the Company, to the danger of contact with any conductor carrying a voltage greater than the normal telephone voltage. The City shall be solely responsible for all injury to persons or damage to property arising out of the construction or maintenance of said police and fire alarm fixtures, or arising out of the attachment, maintenance or removal of said wires and fixtures to the poles of the Company. In cases of rearrangement of the Company's plant, or removal of poles or fixtures, the City shall care for or remove its own fixtures, and shall save the Company harmless from any damage or injury to persons or property, including property of the City, arising out of the removal or construction of its wires or other fixtures.

It is understood and agreed that if and when the City or the Company design underground facilities, they will consult with each other as to including each other's facilities in proposed underground installation.

**SECTION 3. Company Liability.** The Company shall, at all times during the life of this franchise, be subject to all lawful exercise of the police power by the City and to such reasonable regulations as the City may, by resolution or ordinance, hereafter provide. It is expressly understood and agreed by and between the Company and the City that the Company shall save the City harmless from all loss sustained by the City on account of any suit, judgment, execution, claim or demand whatsoever, resulting from negligence

Explains H.B. 885

Homeowners who are 65 years of age or older and failed to receive their school district homestead exemptions in 1979 have until April 1 of this year to do so. In this way, elderly homeowners will be able to take advantage of the tax freeze associated with the \$10,000.00 homestead exemption.

According to a law passed by the Special Session of the 67th Legislature, over-65 homeowners who qualified for the school homestead "tax freeze" in 1979, but did not apply for the limitation, may file an application with the chief appraiser of the appraisal district in which the home is located.

Applications must be made with Mrs. Patsy Nance before April 1, 1982.

To qualify for the tax limitation, on January 1, 1979 a homeowner must have satisfied these requirements:

- Be 65 years or older
- Own his home
- Use that home as his principal residence

The chief appraiser will consider all applications and notify each applicant before April 15, 1982. If the appli-

cation is approved, the chief appraiser will make an entry on the appropriate school district's 1982 appraisal records.

This entry will indicate the amount of tax the over-65 taxpayer should have paid in 1979, had he been granted the \$5,000.00 general homestead exemption and the \$10,000.00 over-65 homestead exemption. No refunds of taxes paid will be given for 1979, 1980, or 1981.

For 1982, the taxpayer's amount of homestead taxes paid may not exceed the amount of taxes the school district would have imposed on the homestead for 1979, had the taxpayer been granted his homestead exemptions. This frozen tax amount will remain in effect as long as the homestead remains the same.

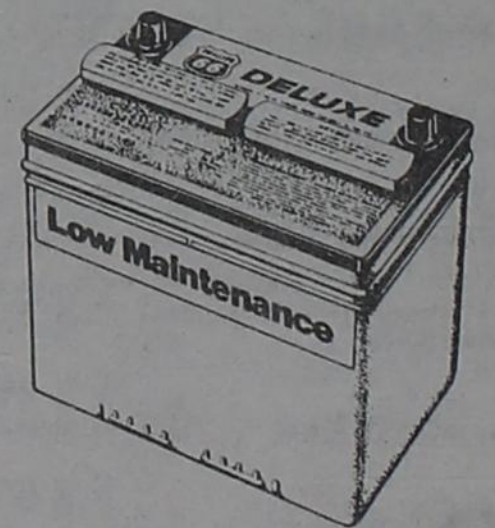
