Ute Water Project official: Estimates show Portales has less than 10 years of water left to pump

The Texico City Council on April 9 met with Ute Water Project manager Paul van Gulick and engineer Barbara Crocket for an update on the project.

Work has begun on the intake facility at Ute

Lake, and current estimates are to have the first phase done by the end of 2014.

From there, pipe will need to be connected from Logan to San Jon, then to the member cities of Grady, Clovis,

Cannon, Texico, Elida, Melrose and Portales.

Pumping stations will also have to be put in, as well as a water cleaning facility.

There is currently no timeline set for the other

One of the few interesting things about becoming really old is that you sometimes see that folks you grew up with or worked with early on "make the news."

Others than the obituaries, I might add.

Thus, the other day I smiled when I read that the Associated Press had banished the phrase "illegal immigrant" from its famous stylebook.

Those decisions are made by a two-member AP staff, which includes a fella named David Minthorn.

Dave and I served in the same public information office in the 3rd Infantry Division from 1966 to 1968.

It was fun to see his name crop up in the news stories last week. I had last seen him when my old Army outfit had a reunion in Washington, D.C., a few years back.

Another fella who makes the news often is Peter Overby, a major reporter for National Public Radio. I've heard him during newscasts.

Pete called me several years ago to thank me for giving him his start in journalism. I had hired him as a young reporter at the Potomac News in Woodbridge, Va., when I was managing editor there before heading out west.

Another friend from yesteryear who made the news was a fella I went to high school with named Murray Edelman.

Murray was a good

friend but I lost track of him after college. Then one day I was sitting on the couch at home in Farwell channel surfing and came across the CNN station that was broadcasting House of Representative hearings.

The year was 2001 and a hearing was being held on the goof-up reporting the presidential election results from Florida, when George Bush was elected over Al Gore.

That was when the Voter News Service, which provided election results to the major TV networks, on election night first predicted that Gore would win the Sunshine State.

But that prediction was made before some heavily-Republican counties were counted, so that later in the evening the VNS predicted Bush would win. And still later, the VNS said it was too close to call.

In fact, Bush won the state by just more than 500 votes.

Anyway, when I watched the panel on TV, it had four spokesmen, representing ABC, NBC, CBS and the VNS.

And there was Murray, who headed the Voter News Service.

I called Murray, who now lives in New Jersey, a few years ago just to say hello and see how his life had gone. He gave me the exact minute when the VNS had sent its info that Gore had won Florida to the major networks.

That was the end of his political prediction career.

One sad note on someone I knew -- national film critic Roger Ebert, who died a couple of weeks back.

Ebert was the editor of

the Daily Illini newspaper at the University of Illinois when I worked there as a sports writer.

The one story I have told over the years involving Ebert goes like this:

Ebert was famed for giving his "thumbs up" sign when he liked a movie and "thumbs

down" when he didn't. This was during his years of having a TV show with other movie critics, such as Gene Siskel.

Anyway, I will always remember the night when Ebert came over to my desk at the Daily Illini while I was drinking Jack straight from the bottle, and whispered in my ear,

"You will never live to see 25." I wasn't in a very good mental state at the time.

I guess that was a "thumbs down."

Another nutcase last week stabbed a bunch of young people at a Texas junior college.

I'm waiting for con-

gressmen to loudly call for a ban on all knives.

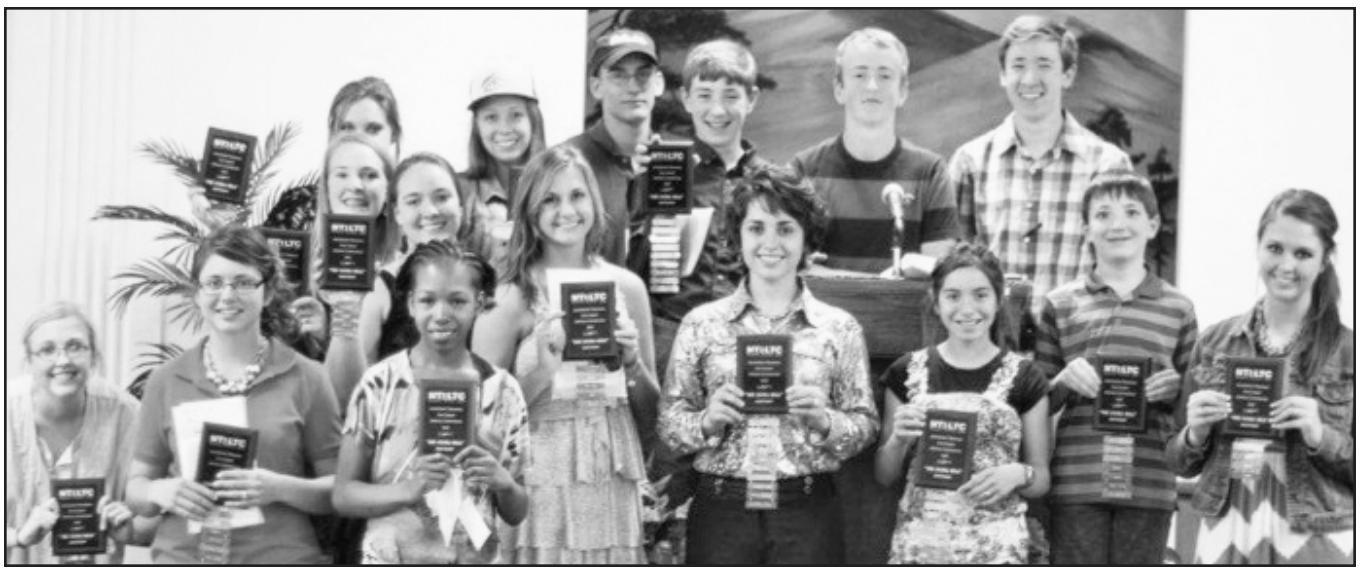

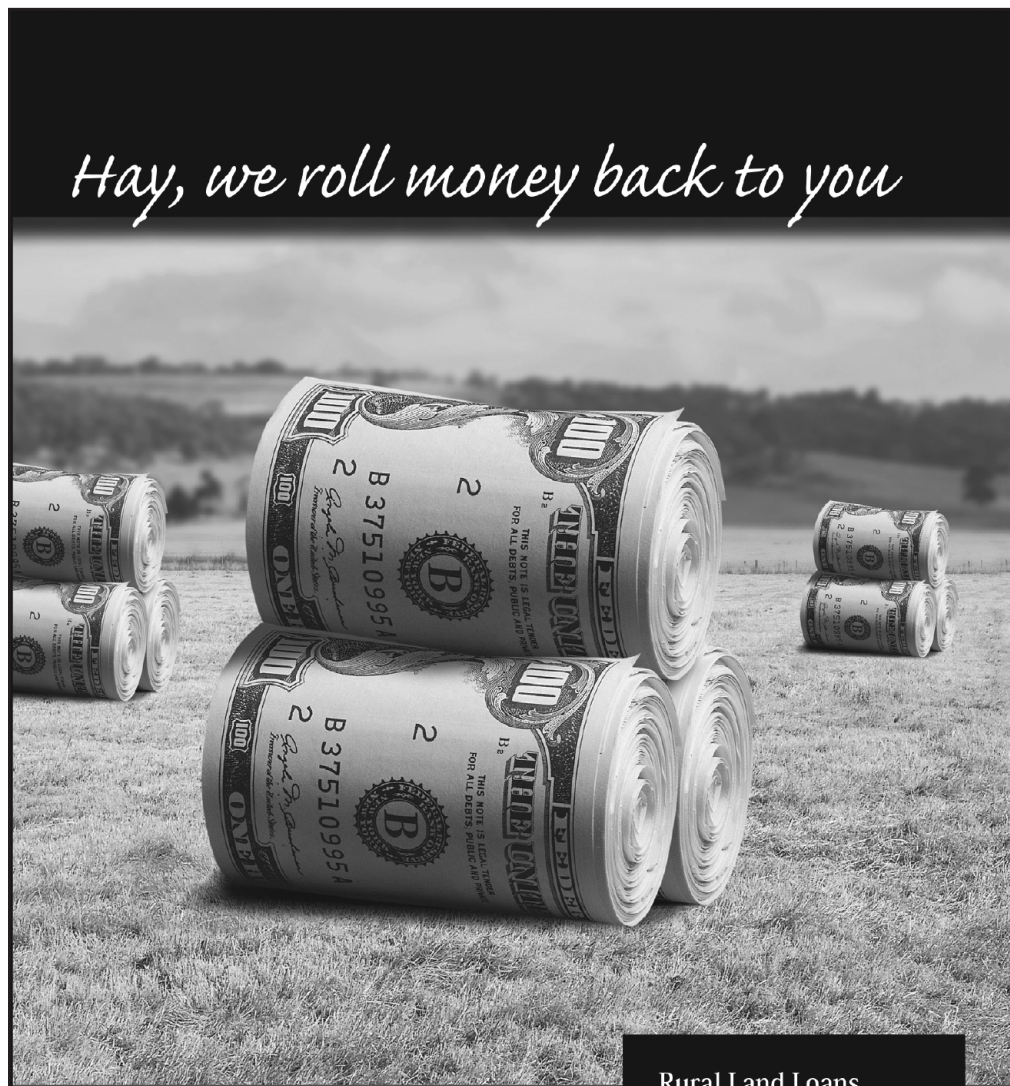
The first line of the cover comments says, "First and foremost, thanks to God for giving us such a great opportunity and for leading us and being with us every step of the way."

I have been traveling life's road for 73 years now, and know of countless acts of violence during that span.

Today, "gun control" is in the news. Do we the American people believe for one minute that guns create violence? I pray not.

I heard on a news program that there had been just over 5,200 murders by guns in the past year. Then the man said there had been over 3,700 murders by hammers, hatchets and other blunt instruments.

Does this justify only gun control? Of course not.

In my earlier years, societal violence was relatively rare, and condemned by society. Guns were not at the forefront of the discussion.

I believe that parents teaching children personal responsibility, moral standards and self respect, will have a controlling effect on violence.

There are hundreds of corrective actions that could be named, but it would require books to explain them. So I shall list what I believe are the most obvious:

Husbands who will take their God-intended responsibilities. Women who will follow God's leadership in serving family requirements.

Men and women wedding and supporting one another until death imparts.

Churches teaching

and preaching about sin and where it takes communities, states and nations.

Yes, violence by guns needs to be condemned. But guns, gun ownership and high round ammunition clips do not create violence.

A morally bankrupt society, a God rejecting nation, shacking up instead of marital commitments, murdering fetuses, and all the immoral human decisions are the wheels on which violence of any kind rides so easily and speedily on.

Control violence in society ... and the use of guns to kill, wound, and disable will be greatly reduced.

Ag teacher Sid Morris reports that Farwell will host the District banquet and competitions April 29-30.

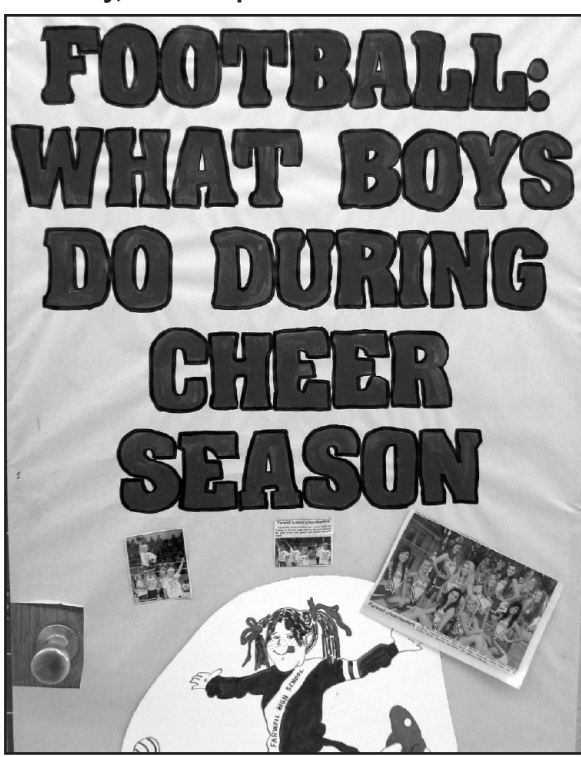

phases of the project, but the Ute Water Project is working on securing federal money as quickly as possible.

Their haste is needed as current estimates show Portales has less than 10 years of water left to pump out.

If the project is not completed by then, the city could face shortages in drinking water.

Crocket showed a water table map for this area, and the aquifer under Curry County was essentially all showing to have less than 14 feet of water available. More importantly, that number was the lowest level they measured, so any area that was dry still fell in this category.

The biggest problem is that water wells are no longer pumping as much water as they used to.

In 2000, the member cities had a total of 28 wells that averaged 375 gallons per minute, for a total of 10,000 gpm.

In 2012, the member cities had 64 wells averaging just over 100 gpm.

In that 12-year time frame, the cities spent \$30 million drilling wells just to try to keep the same level of water for their residents.

As the wells yield less water, that number will continue to rise.

Portales faces the worst situation, as new wells aren't offering more water, it was said.

A water study done at Cannon Air Force Base showed that the aquifer is declining at such a rate that they believed that the base might face substantial impacts by the end of this decade.

Ute Lake was started in 1951 to hold municipal water for Eastern New Mexico. Even back in the '50s, the water table was dropping and there was no question that this area would need water.

The lake can hold up to 200,000 acre/feet of water. Anything over that must be discharged to Texas.

After 10 years of sustained drought, and three years of extreme drought, there is currently around 120,000 acre/feet of water in the lake.

The Ute Pipeline facility, if it was currently in operation, could pump water as long as there was at least 50,000 acre/feet of water available, as the intakes are around 60' below where the lake would be if it was full.

Fire Chief Lewis Cooper asked if Texico didn't use their entire allotment, could they "store" water for future use.

Van Gulick said it should be possible as a drought prevention method. He said that Texico, should it not use its entire allotment, could leave some water to be used in future years.

He also said that Texico would be able to sell their rights to other New Mexico municipalities if they wanted. Clovis will be doing this with Cannon.

Other options they discussed included possibly putting in livestock taps for ranchers around where the pipeline runs and allowing folks on the outskirts of Texico to tie into the water system.

In other news, the council:

- Heard that the fire department's thermal imaging camera has broken and they are looking into getting it fixed or replaced. The department uses it to search for people trapped in a building during a fire, or for places where a fire hasn't been completely put out.

Cooper said it could cost between \$3,500 and \$7,000 to repair or replace the camera.

- Heard that New Mexico law will now require Texico to post the City Council agenda 72 hours before the meeting. In the past, it could be posted 24 hours early, meaning folks could wait until the Monday to ask for the Council to discuss an issue.

Now all items to be considered have to be in by Friday.

Mayor Jimmie Mace said Farwell currently has 5 wells east of town with one well that is about to be connected.

Mace said there are an additional 4 wells working in town, but they are not pumping as much water as they used to.

Water conservation rules are still in effect.

Residents with even numbered street addresses are asked to only water their lawns on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday; odd numbered street addresses are asked to only water on Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday.

Mace also said the City Council has recently voted to raise the cost of water for businesses in town to encourage some businesses to cut back on watering their lawns.

He also pointed out that the schools have begun a xeriscape project. This type of landscaping is designed to make properties more water-efficient. School Supt. Mike Read will be reporting details in an upcoming Tribune issue.

Live Cattle prices continued to move lower last week even with a fairly strong cash trade at \$127.00. The nearby contacts moved back down to retest the March low and held even though the back months all made new lows. If the nearby's can hold then this should be positive, but short term trends will need to turn higher to give this market any technical support. This week will be important if prices are to hold. The March lows have held, but new lows would reset the counter and it will take more weeks to confirm another low. The length of time and prices the market has corrected down from its December highs is within the normal historical time frame. Any further decline from here could change some very long trends. Feeder prices are following the Live Cattle price. Corn had very little impact on feeder prices and they too are in a position to test their March lows once again.

Soybean prices held their 6 month lows and have now rallied back into the \$14.00 level basis the July contract. This level could slow the trend down, but the six month trading range has continued to stop advances and hold declines. Expect this to continue over the near term.

Corn prices were volatile on last Wednesday's USDA report with the market jumping up about 20 cents right after the report was released. The USDA shocked the trade again when they dropped the U.S. ending stocks number after having raised it just two weeks ago which generated a short collapse in prices. Once the market rallied about 20 cents, the World Stocks number came out and there was a sharp increase in the world stocks which dropped corn about 30 cents in short order. Prices closed about a nickel higher and last Wednesday's high and low will now be pivot points which will determine whether or not trends continue to move higher or turn back down. Short term trends are up at this time.

Wheat prices also moved higher for most of last week and made new highs on the week into Friday. Much of the support has come from winter wheat damage even though it may take more time to actually access the overall impact on this years production. Technically, prices are now within the pre-Planting Intention reports high. If \$7.84 is taken out basis the July KC contract, long term trends could turn higher.

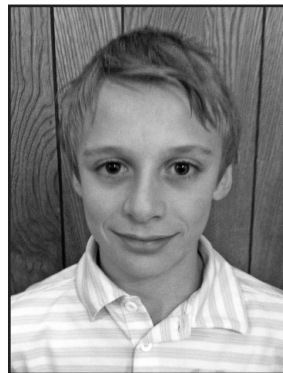
Cotton prices have continued to hold support above the \$85.60 level basis the December contract. There have been several times in which prices traded below this level, but never closed below. There was a two-thirds retracement level around \$84.85 which held on Friday, but prices saw a strong close back towards their highs. Another strong close and short term trends will turn higher opening the door to retest their contract highs just above \$89.00. This would project another leg up if it were to occur.

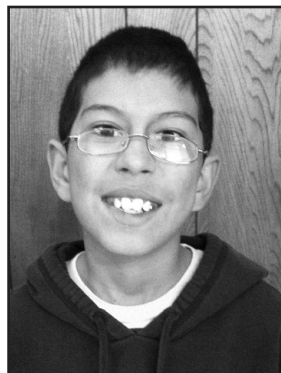

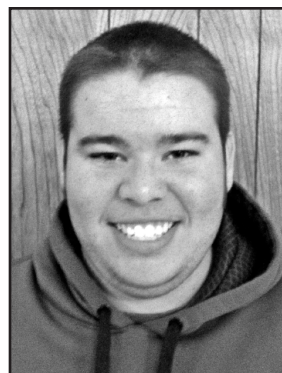

Aspyn qualified to swim in 11 events this year at the State competition in Albuquerque. This was her 4th year to qualify for State and she won a medal and 3 ribbons. She improved her times greatly at this meet; in one event, she improved by 12 seconds.

Clovis swim coach Vince DeMaio describes Aspyn as “focused and coachable. It takes a certain kind of athlete to be able to train for swimming at such a young age. Swimming is an

endurance sport and a large amount of training is required. An athlete’s body and muscles must be retained. They have to have an aerobic base and good stroke mechanics.”

Currently, she is on the “True Blue” section of the team which is the step right before training with the high school team. As a 6th grader, that is a significant accomplishment.

The Clovis swim team is an 8-year program that steps swimmers up to prepare for collegiate teams. Even though this program is “1st generation,” meaning that it is a new program for Clovis, there are already 2 athletes swimming on scholarship in college and about 10 more that could be eligible soon.

DeMaio predicts that due to Aspyn’s “immense focus,” she could be in line to get a college scholarship down the road.

Aspyn’s focus comes from her personality. Whether it’s school work or other sports, Aspyn gives the proverbial 110 percent effort.

Besies swimming, Aspyn also was involved in competitive gymnastics for years. She competed at three USA

Gymnastics national competitions and won countless medals.

At one point, she was practicing gymnastics for 2 hours, then going straight to swimming where she would stay in the pool for another 1 1/2-hour workout each night.

After her practices, Aspyn would still have to do her homework. Yet, she also carves out time in her day to run several miles for training. Part of the swim team conditioning is to compete in triathlons. So, Aspyn runs each day on her own and has completed five 5k races already.

Aspyn enjoys swimming because it’s a sport she can do for the rest of her life.

Improving her scores is one thing that motivates her to put in all this

hard work and time. The idea of a college scholarship is another motivating factor.

Aspyn enjoyed watching the Olympic swimmers and says Katie Ledecky was her role model because she was the youngest Olympic swimmer at age 15. Katie also swims long distance races, which Aspyn prefers as well.

She has competed in the 500-meter and 1-mile races at State competitions.

Aspyn wants to work toward Olympic swimming, but plans to concentrate on a college scholarship right now.

With her work ethic, focus and dedication, Aspyn Osburn may very well be a role model to other young girls one day.

The Wolverines were held to 2 hits -- singles by Hill and Rafael Maldonado.

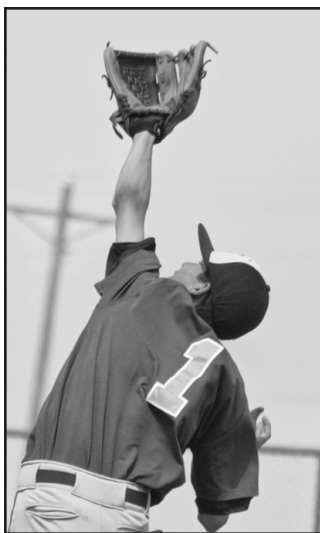
Texico began district play vs. Santa Rosa.

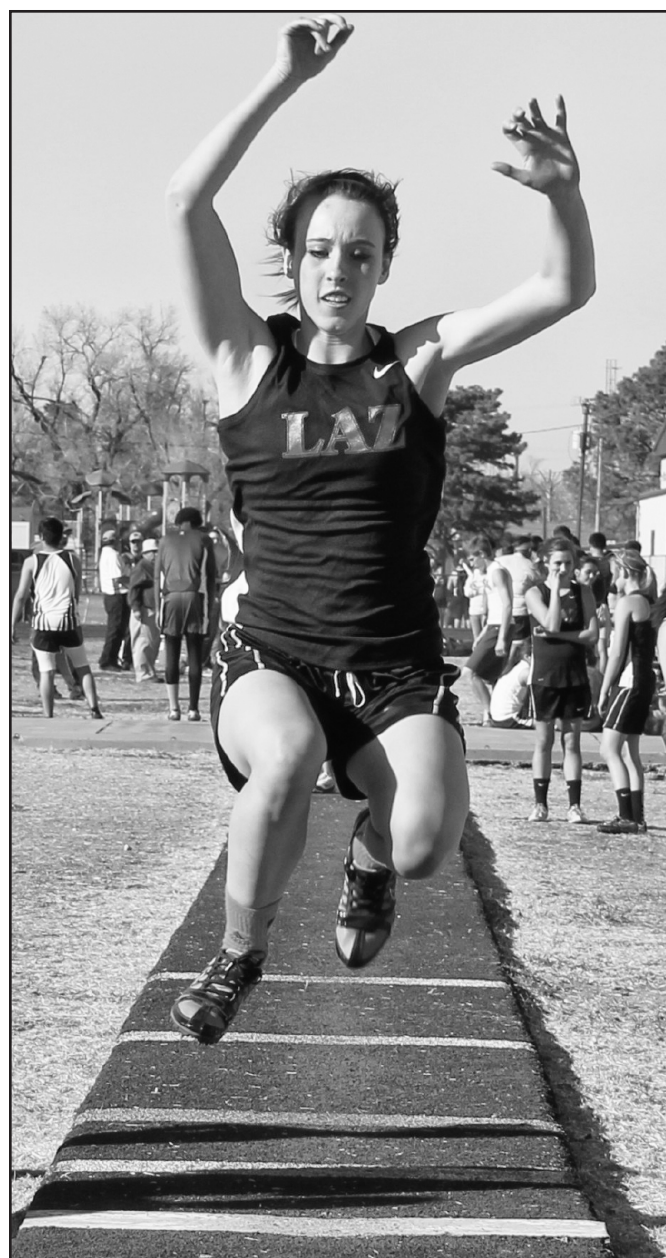

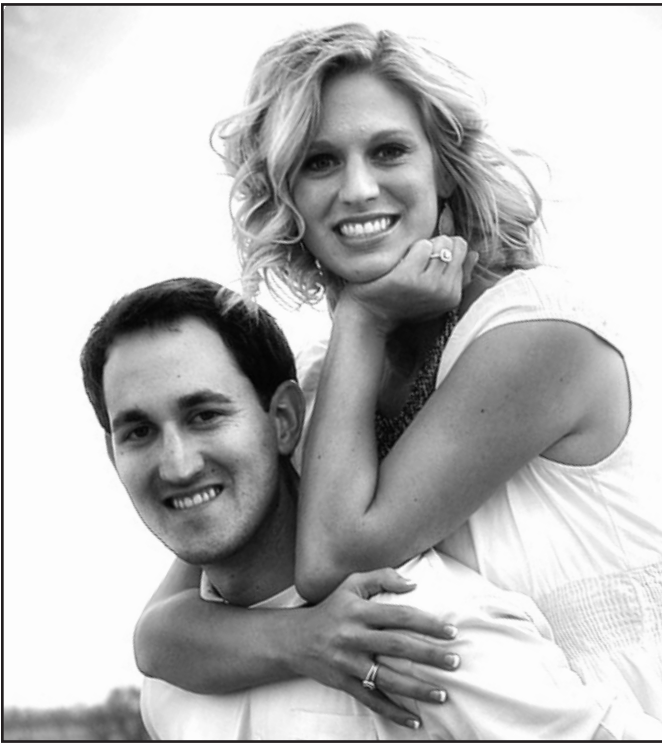

City Manager Buster Poling is working on possible alternatives to rectify the problem which involve pumping a sufficient level of water. He will be discussing the problem with appropriate treatment plant experts.

In other business, the council:

--Agreed to charge the use of the community center by non-profit classes and gatherings the same fee as others.

-- Discussed preparations for the upcoming Cinco de Mayo celebration in and around the community center..

-- Discussed some accidental damage at the community center. Also, the treadmill is reported to be repaired.

-- Tabled the proposal to buy a professional audio system for the community center, which is expensive. The center currently uses a cheaper system.

-- Heard Poling report that Cargill Meat Solutions has contacted him about helping with some type of "desert" landscaping at the corner of the community center site.

-- Heard Poling report that the company the city had been using for cemetery monuments has gone out of businesses and he is looking at alternatives.

-- Heard Poling say that the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality had sent him a notice of violation but it was a minor issue and already has been corrected.

-- Discussed increasing water and sewer rates -- for industrial rates inside and outside the city, and commercial rates outside the city.

Poling will get comparison rates from other cities, then bring it back to the council.

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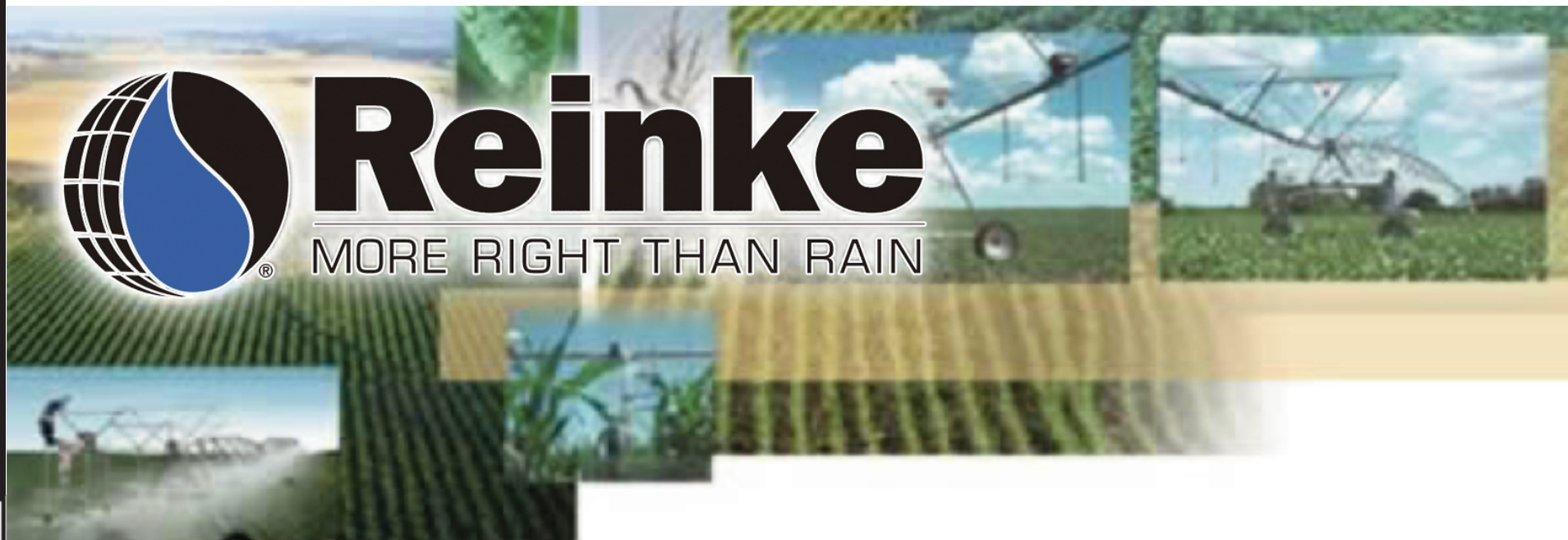

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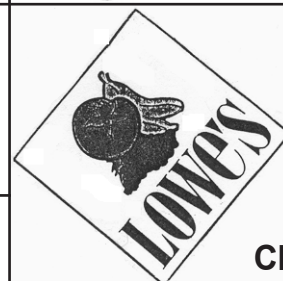


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
