

Election Set March 1 In Texico

Next Tuesday, March 1, is date for the Texico Town election, at which time a municipal judge will be elected for the township. Names appearing on

the ballot for the position of municipal judge are those of Sam Lewis, incumbent, and Norma Lee Sanders, who is making her first political bid.

The positions of mayor and the two trustee positions have been filled by Declaration of Election, a New Mexico statute which provides that if there is only one candidate for each office and position, that candidate shall be declared elected without a vote upon certification by the municipal clerk.

Under this statute, B. A. Rogers and Perry Winkles have been elected to serve four-

year terms as trustees of the township and W. D. Howard Jr. has been elected to serve a two-year term as mayor. The mayor and two new councilmen will begin their terms of office on March 1, 1968 and the trustees terms ending March 1, 1970, after their successors have been duly elected and qualified.

March 2 Deadline To File For School Board

Persons desiring to have their names appear on the ballot for a place on the Farwell School Board have until March 2 to file.

Blank forms for filing are available in the office of Supt. W. M. Roberts, at the school.

The names of Harry Sheets and Pat Patrick have been selected, by a committee composed of Bill Meeks, Clay Henson, Woodrow Lovelace, Melborn Jones and Ray Ritchie, to appear on the ballot as candidates for the two vacancies on the board.

Karl J. (Smokey) Gast has also been petitioned as a candidate.

Pat Patrick is presently on the board and has consented to have his name appear as a candidate for the position for a second term. Bill Prince, the other board member whose term is expiring, declined to be a candidate.

Date for the school board election is April 2.

Somewhere, somehow, we must find the Divine wisdom and the Christian fortitude to vigorously do the right as it is given to us to see the right.

Liberty itself will find in such a government, with powers properly distributed and adjusted, its surest guardian. ... likewise, that the habits in a free country should inspire caution in those entrusted with its administration to confine themselves within their respective constitutional spheres, avoiding in the exercise of powers of one department to encroach upon another. ... of all the dispositions and habits which lead to political prosperity, religion, and morality are indispensable supports. ... as a very important source of strength and security, cherish public credit. ... it is our true policy to steer clear

Revaluation Of Property In Farwell School District

At the last regular meeting of the Farwell School Board the board voted to go into a contract with McMorries and Company, Inc., and Valorem Tax Consultants, of Amarillo, for a revaluation of property in the Farwell Independent School District for school tax purposes.

This program will be worked out as soon as possible, but will not be put into effect until 1967. This move by the school board was instituted because of the protests brought before the Equalization Board by the Santa Fe Railroad, Pioneer Gas Pipeline Company, El Paso Natural Gas Pipeline and Transwestern Pipeline Company. They claimed that property values in the district were unequal and two of the companies, Santa Fe Railroad and Pioneer Natural Gas Pipeline Company, refused to pay their school tax until such an agreement was made.

According to Supt. W. M. Roberts, McMorries and Company are a competent firm headed by J. W. McMorries. The firm has done this type of work for many school districts over the area as well as other parts of the state. They also do this

type work for cities and counties. Supt. Roberts said, "It is not a matter of the school district needing more money to operate, but a problem of unequal tax values over the district."

Roberts of the Farwell school revealed that the school board has leased five acres of land, located north of Nickels Gin, to the Farwell Community Arena Association for a 10-year period. The Arena Association has an option to renew the lease at the end of that time.

Other work is progressing according to schedule and completion date is set for August 15, in time for the beginning of the fall term of school.

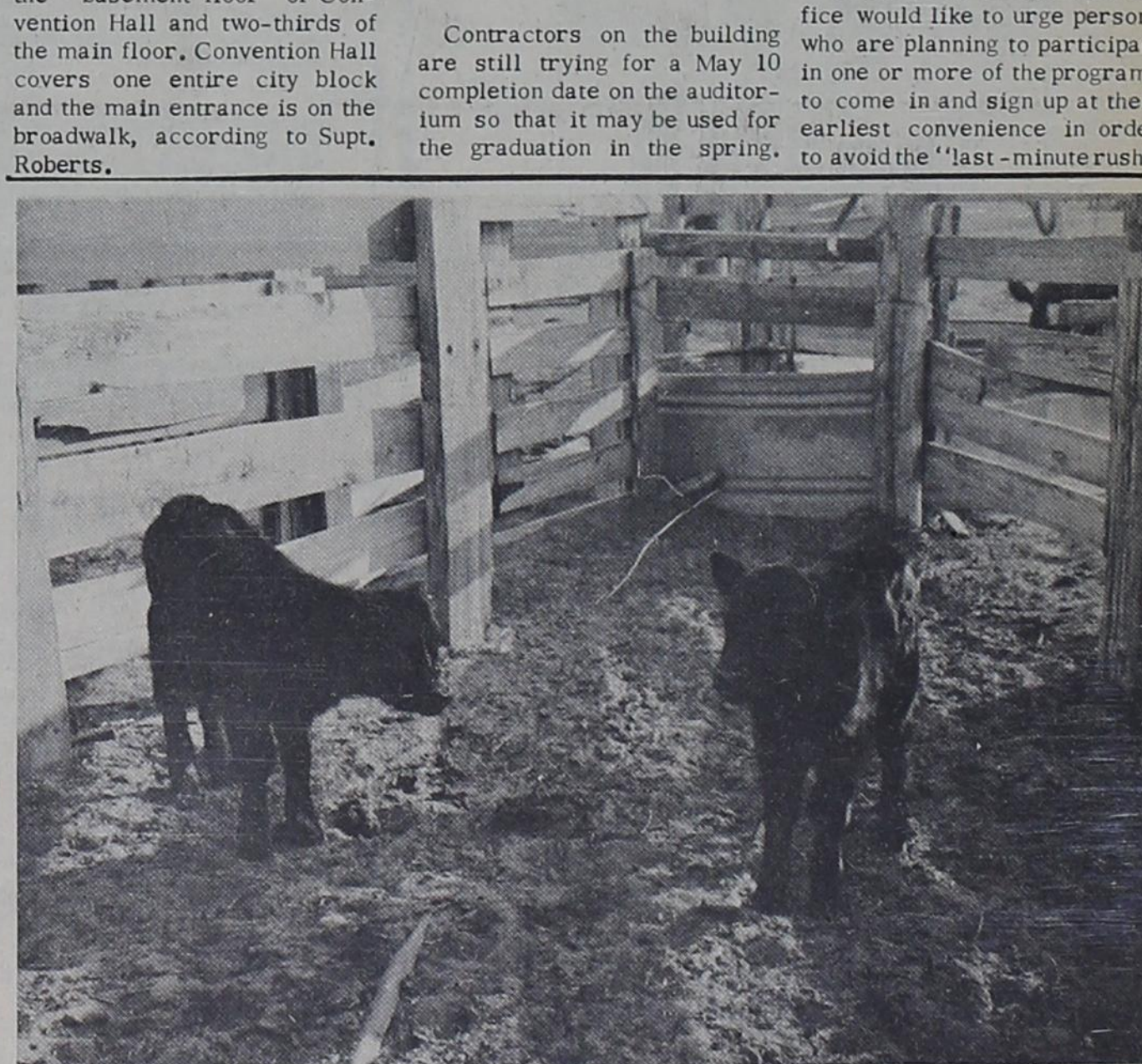
Speaker for the banquet will be Wes Izzard, Amarillo columnist. Officers for the coming year will be installed at the banquet.

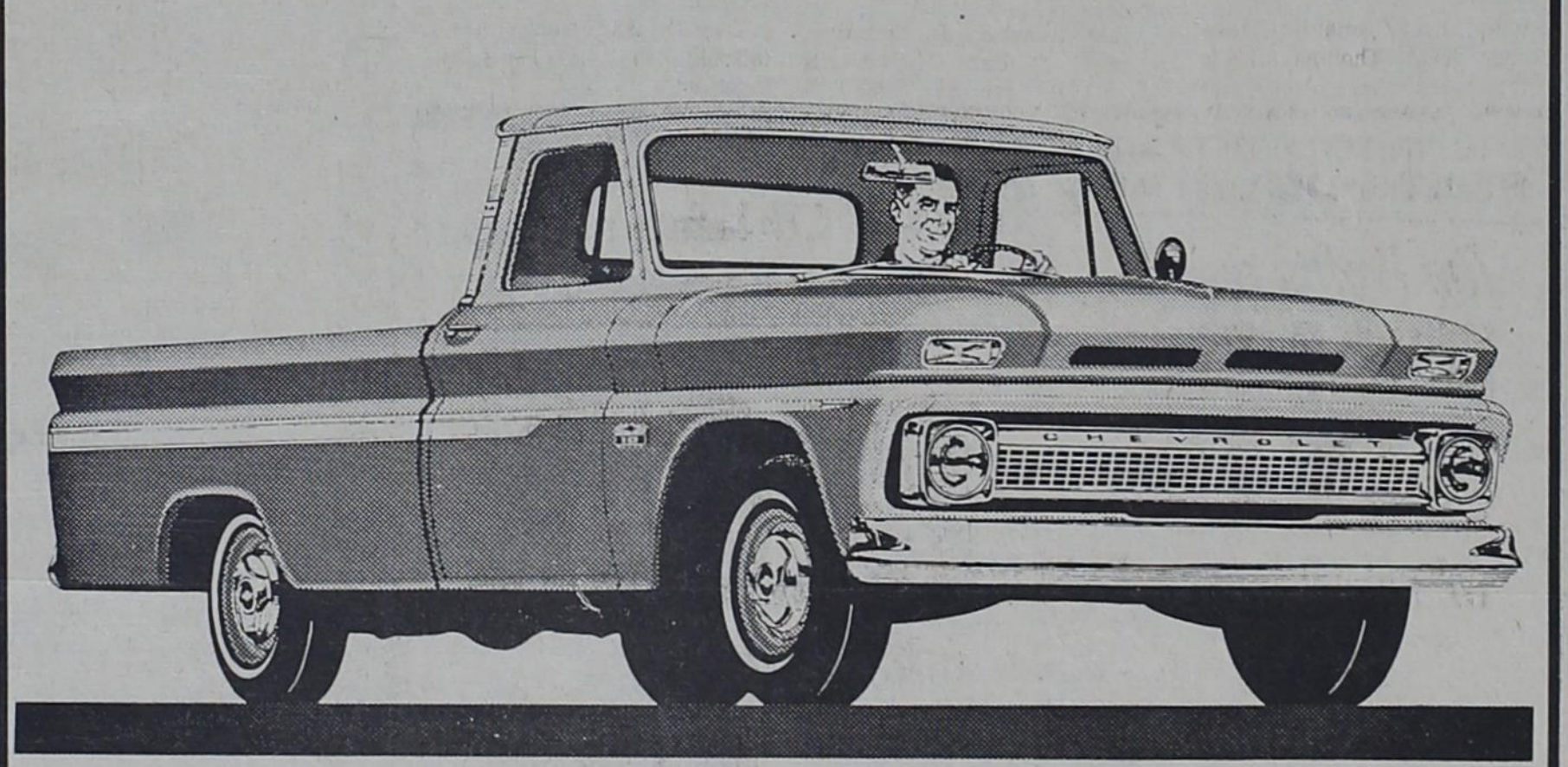

ORGANIC MATTER

Just what is organic matter and what part does it play in a productive soil? These are questions that I often hear discussed by farmers.

Organic matter is the storehouse of plant nutrients in the soil. It results from the decomposition of plant and animal materials by soil organisms. On the average it contains about 56 per cent carbon and 5 per cent nitrogen.

Organic matter improves soil structure and its ability to take in water and hold it in storage for later use by plants. It also improves soil aeration, loosens dense, compact soils and granulates loose, open sandy soils to give them a fairable crumb structure.

During the decomposition process, a continuous supply of carbon dioxide, nitrogen in va-

rious forms, phosphorus and other nutrients so essential to plant growth are liberated. Organic matter serves as a storage facility for mineral nutrients such as calcium, magnesium, nitrogen, and many others making them less likely to be lost in drainage or water seepage.

Continuous cultivation without giving attention to regular additions or residues gradually lowers the organic matter in the soil. The level may become so low that maximum production cannot be obtained. A soil test will show the organic level in the soil.

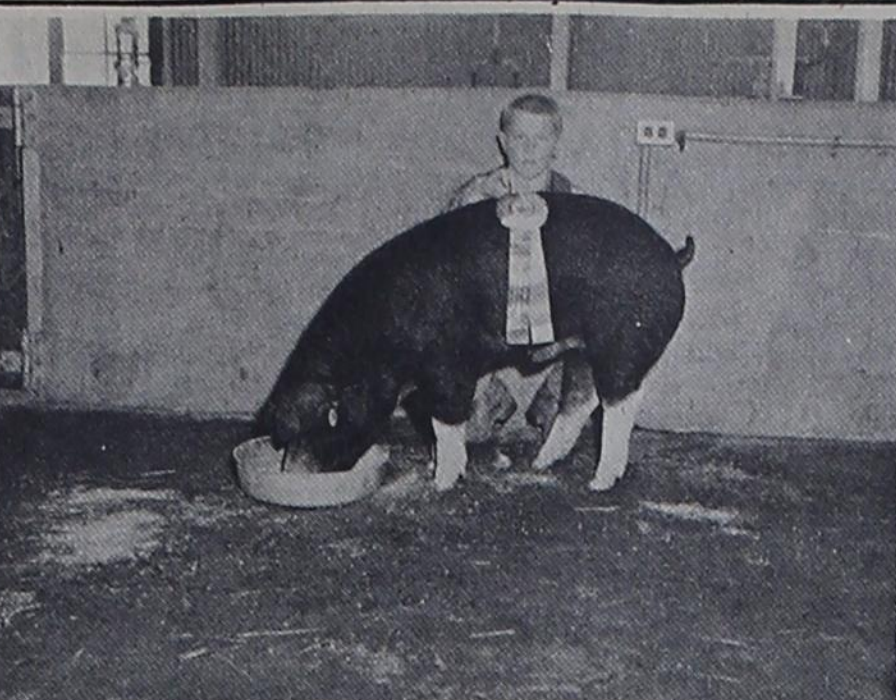

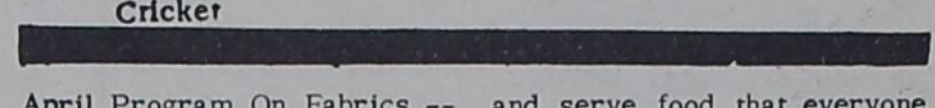

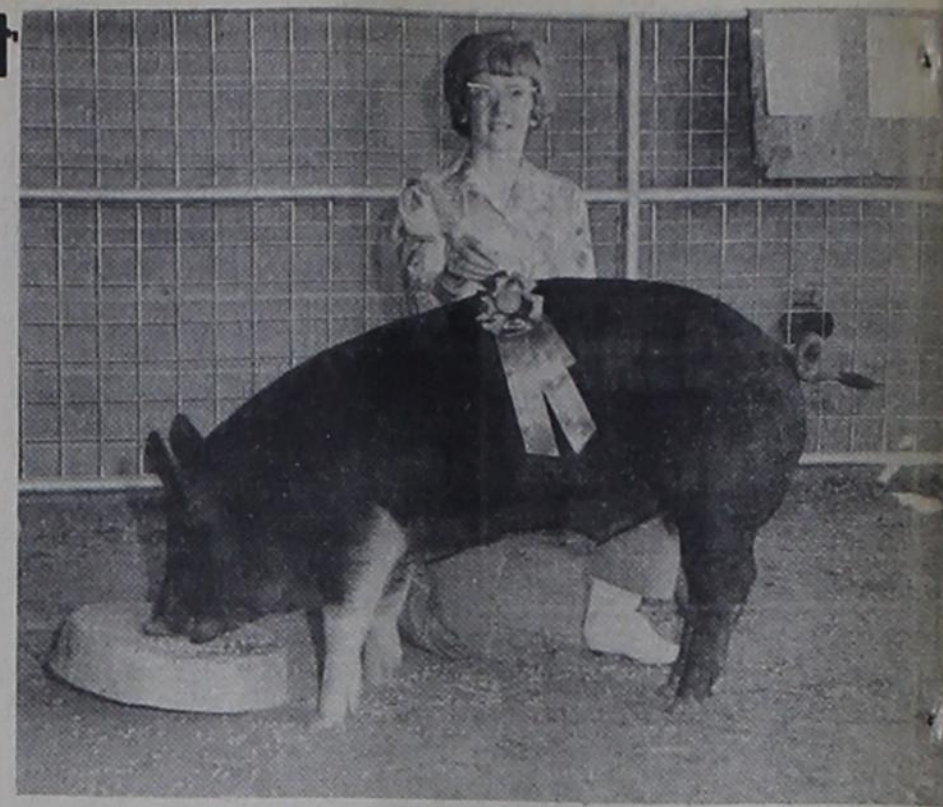

Freddie Deaton Tells About Heart Surgery

Since the month of February is known as Heart Fund Month in America and one hears more and more about the marvelous things which are being accomplished through research and open heart surgery, this reporter decided to talk with a Clovis resident who had open heart surgery some two and one-half years ago.

Mrs. Carl (Freddie) Deaton of 620 John Doe in Clovis had as she puts it, "always been a perfectly healthy person, or so she thought until some four years ago." It was at this time while pregnant with her fourth child that she began to notice a sudden weight gain and short-

ness of breath. She attributed the sudden change to her condition and thought little about the matter until one day while visiting her mother, who was than a patient in the hospital, she chanced to bump into a family physician and friend who had known her for many years.

The physician immediately noticed the unnatural weight gain and shortness of breath as he visited casually with Mrs. Deaton. When she left the room minutes later, he immediately advised her mother to persuade Mrs. Deaton to come in for a checkup. After thinking the matter over, Mrs. Deaton visited the doctor and was advised that she had a heart condition and was told to visit a specialist in Amarillo for further diagnosis.

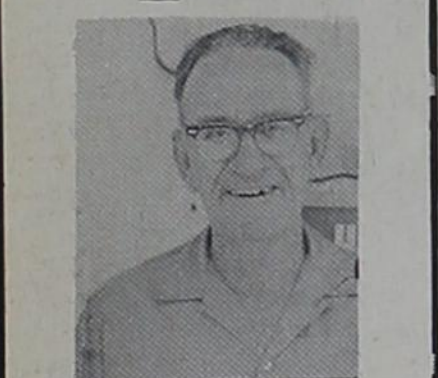
The heart specialist upon further examination told Mrs. Deaton that she was suffering from a closure of the "mitral valve" which if left unattended would eventually completely close and cause heart failure, this causing death.

She was at that time only three months pregnant, therefore the specialist gave her a rigid diet, and medication to see her through the remainder of the pregnancy. She was a semi-invalid for the next several months while she awaited the birth of her child. Mrs. Deaton stated that, "From the time I was four months pregnant until after the birth of the baby I never saw the top floor of my home," a new one which the family had only moved into when the illness was discovered.

Her older children took over management of the home for the next several months while their mother spent most of the time in bed. Although the doctor had expected complications to arise at time of delivery, no problems arose and Mrs. Deaton delivered a normal baby boy. When the infant was two and one-half months of age Mrs. Deaton was sent by the Amarillo heart specialist to Denver where she was thoroughly examined by other specialists at the University of Colorado Hospital.
