Here I am lost. My thinking just does not stretch to such heights. Make our peace with China! How? I can make peace with a robber by letting him steal my worldly goods. I can make peace with a rapest by sacrificing my wife's honor and probably her life. Now, I have made my peace and I have neither worldly goods, a family, or very little Christian charity left. Is this the peace that the addlepated. double domes of higher learning want?

Communist China is a ravening beast; it has forsaken the merest pretext of Christian understanding. It is an insatiable government gobbling up the rights and privileges of its citizens and robbing them of the very basis of human dignity. Its word is valueless, its morals are non-existant. The only integrity it has is to the communist dream of world domination. Make our peace like Chamberlain made peace with Hitler? No, I for one am ready now to risk war to destroy this world demigod. I do not believe that Russia would risk certain destruction to aid China. If she did I would rather die to preserve freedom and opportunity for my posterity than hand them a life of serfdom. I am not an apostle of life at any price. I do not believe that our Christian religion is founded of fear, comprise, and retreat from our sacred beliefs.



out giving attention to regular additions or residues gradually lowers the organic matter in the soil. The level may become so low that maximum production cannot be obtained. A soil test will show the organic level in the soil.


Habitual Criminal
