

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO SOUTHERN UNION GAS COM-PANY, A CORPORATION, ITS LEGAL REPRESENTATIVES, SUCCESSORS, LESSEES AND ASSIGNS, GRANTEE HEREIN, CERTAIN POWERS, LICEN-SES, RIGHTS OF WAY, PRIV-ILEGES AND FRANCHISE TO CONSTRUCT, OPERATE AND MAINTAIN IN THE TOWN OF TEXICO, NEW MEXICO, AS NOW OR HEREAFTER CON-STITUTED, WORKS, SYSTEMS AND PLANTS FOR THE HANDLING, PRODUCTION, MANUFACTURING, TRANS-PORTING, STORING, SALE, AND DISTRIBUTION OF GAS INTO, OUT OF AND THROUGH SAID MUNICIPALITY; AND FOR THE DISTRIBUTION AND SALE TO SAID MUNICIPAL-ITY, ITS INHABITANTS, AND OTHERS, INCLUDING CUSTO-MERS INSIDE, BEYOND AND OUTSIDE OF THE LIMITS OF SAID MUNICIPALITY; AND TO USE THE STREETS, AV-ENUES, EASEMENTS, RIGHTS OF WAY, ALLEYS, HIGH-WAYS, SIDEWALKS, BRIDGES AND OTHER STRUCTURES AND PLACES AND PUBLIC GROUNDS IN SAID MUNIC-IPALITY FOR A PERIOD OF TWENTY-FIVE (25) YEARS; AND PRESCRIBING CERTAIN RIGHTS, DUTIES, TERMS AND CONDITIONS HEREIN MEN-TIONED, AND PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT TO SAID MU-NICIPALITY OF A PERCENT-



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



GRAIN SORGHUM

Generally speaking over the county we have a real good sorghum crop started. Recent rains have helped a little on our irrigation requirements but some areas have already got the first irrigation applied to

During the past two years we have seen a few fields where the heads did not completely bloom and set a full head of grain. We don't know exactly what causes this condition but high temperatures and sometimes lack of water have caused the same condition in greenhouse experiments.

The sorghum head is beginning to form about 35 days after emergence and this is an important time in the sorghum plants life. A good supply of moisture is needed about this time to insure a good seedhead is being formed. If you have adequate water and are shooting for maximum production, don't wait until your sorghum shows a moisture stress to start your irrigation. These top sorghum yields just need a lot of water and don't let these rains fool you into waiting too long to start your sorghum irrigation. Check the moisture conditions in your soil and plan to irrigate when about 50 per cent of the available soil moisture has

Satan knocked on the door, and on Monday, June the 13th, the Supreme Court voted 5-4 to grant him admittance.

I refer of course to the decision by the court pertaining to the safeguards police must observe in questioning suspects. The ruling virtually ties the hands of lawmen everywhere.

Hereafter, a suspect must be given severe notice at the beginning of questioning that he has a right to remain silent. He must be loudly informed that anything he says may be used against him, and that he has a right to have a lawyer present. Furthermore, if a suspect indicates in any way that he wishes a lawyer present, a lawyer must be called before questioning may continue.

Of course, a lawyer will advise the suspect to remain silent and one of law enforcement's most potent weapons against crime is rendered ineffective. One may easily envision how this will affect the conviction rate since approximately 90% of all convictions are obtained by confessions.

We are told by supposedly intelligent individuals that said safeguards will protect the innocent. This borders on the edge of lunacy! The innocent will have nothing to hide, only the guilty will be protected.

How, in view of our soaring crime rate, one may justify such rash action completely escapes me. It is high time we stop worrying about the rights of the criminal and start protecting the rights of the victims of criminal acts.

The prestige of the law enforcement officer has never been at such a low ebb as it is today. The men charged with protecting your rights and mine are constantly being assailed by a thousand nameless agitators, who in the name of civil rights' and freedom of profanity, seek to bring about the downfall of the very system that protects our liberty.

One hears the cry of "police brutality" daily. Every time an officer seeks to remove one of the bathless rightniks who lie in the middle of streets and obstruct traffic, this unfounded charge is leveled against him. Heaven help the poor policeman who is force by these hoodlums to use his weapons to protect his life!

Let's put a halt to this nonsense now! Give the law enforcement officer the respect he so richly deserves and save the punishment for the hoodlum. And while we're at it, we might also give a little prayer that the Supreme Court will someday
