

# Lisa Hughes Is State Medalist

## Steerette Golfers State Runners-Up

Steerette golfer Lisa Hughes shot a two-day total 174 to win Class A state medalist honors while helping lead her team to the runner-up spot in the Class A state golf championship tournament last week.

Lisa's consistent play in the state meet put her ahead of defending Class A state medalist Tina Foxhall of Memphis who had been state medalist her freshman and sophomore years. She shot a 181 in this year's match.

The Steerettes, who shot 835 to take second place at state, were 39 strokes behind state winner Ganado. Memphis, the team which had edged the Farwell linksters twice earlier this year, fell behind the Blue and White and wound up third with 839 strokes.

Playing state championship caliber golf is not new to the Steerettes who have three state championship trophies to their credit, winning the top Class A crown in 1975, 1976 and 1977. In 1977 Carol Vinton was

state medalist and in 1976 Penny Hughes (sister of Lisa) was second place medalist while Vinton was third medalist that year. The other three members of the team were in the top ten medalist category that year, including Claire McFarland, Kathy Booth and Deana Williams.

Carol and Penny both received golf scholarships to Temple Junior College, Temple Tx., where Carol will be graduating this Sunday. Claire

McFarland received a scholarship and played golf for Midland College for two years.

Steerette scoring in this year's tournament was as follows: First day, Lisa Hughes, 44, 43, 87; Robin Vinton, 49, 50, 99; Janene Berry, 54, 54, 108; Dondra Gerles, 55, 53, 108; Kim Marsh, 60, 60, 120.


Second day totals were Hughes, 45, 42, 87; Vinton, 54, 51, 105; Berry, 59, 55, 114; Gerles, 65, 63, 128; and Marsh, 58, 59 and 117.

"I am proud that we finished second," coach Mike Martin said. "I am very proud of Lisa for being the medalist. All the girls have worked hard this year," he said.

"Going to state is an accomplishment most high school students don't realize. It's an honor in itself," Martin continued. "I would also like to thank all the parents for their help and support this year. Everyone will be back next year and we'll be trying very hard to win state."

Last fall Congress, in a fit of fiscal irresponsibility and psychological ignorance, enacted the Pregnancy Discrimination Act and President Carter signed it into the law of the land. Now the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission is causing all employee insurance benefit programs to provide "pregnancy benefits."

Under our present law pregnancy is now treated the same as any accident (no jokes please or disease as far as employee benefits are concerned. A very very costly concept as far as the consuming public is concerned. Remember - all expenses of doing business are always reflected in the final selling price to the public.

Inasmuch as all major industries have comprehensive hospitalization and sick leave programs this "pregnancy" benefit will add considerably to each industry's cost and the consumer will in the last analysis pay that additional cost in the form of higher prices.

In our view pregnancy is certainly a unique disability. It is a disability that only the females will come down with. Even a reasonable portion of the female population will not be so afflicted; so only a minority of the populace will "catch" it.

It certainly is an entirely preventable "disease." Of course, the entirely preventable angle may not have wide appeal or acceptance. It is a "disease" whose cause is known by all from early puberty to late dotage and one not really caused by ignorance alone.

Every pregnant person (women only) sooner or later realizes the onset of parturition and in most instances will have sufficient time to provide the wherewithal to finance the event. Seldom is the cost of a pregnancy as quickly realized as the cost of an emergency appendectomy for example.

We think that treating pregnancy as a "disease" debases the existence of the family. In past and more Puritan days the existence of the family was predicated upon having children and providing the proper atmosphere for raising the same. Having children calls for great emotional and economic sacrifices by both members of a family. The joys of children and family will eventually repay, many times over, those that follow this traditional route of living. It should not be expected that those who choose not or cannot follow this route to pay for this basic family function.

Let us leave some responsibility to the forming of a family and the repeating of the wedding vows. The government is fast removing the economic reasons for marriage and it is becoming apparent that the church is also losing the spiritual reason.

How long can this nation "under God" continue to survive the assault on Christian morality. It is up to you - good sisters and brothers.

Last summer we thought that the bill for running our refrigerated air conditioner was plumb out of sight. This year it stands to be even higher. We welcome these hints on keeping cool from the Extension Service of New Mexico State University.

It has been estimated that by raising the summer thermostat one degree nationwide the U.S. could save 100,000 barrels of oil per day. Susan Wright, clothing specialist of NMSU, said wearing less and cooler clothing will enable people to be more comfortable under higher thermostat settings.

For example, a woman could raise the thermostat one and one half degrees and feel equally comfortable if she changed from light slacks to a light skirt. A man who removed his jacket and tie and changed to a short sleeved

## Texico Voters Okay School Bond Issue

Voters in the Texico Municipal School District Tuesday approved the financing of a \$200,000 school building program. The bond issue was approved 83-14, with no absentee ballots cast.

The improvements include approximately 1500 square feet to be added to the present Vocational Agriculture Shop Area which will double its size. The new shop area will allow students room for constructing

wood and metal projects at the same time.

A dressing room will be added to the Wolverine Gymnasium, raising the number of dressing rooms to two for boys and two for girls. During the school year the fourth dressing room will also be used as a training room for both boys and girls.

The Board of Education has adopted a six-year repayment

schedule for the bond issue which will not raise taxes, according to a brochure distributed prior to the election.

The brochure also states that the bond issue requires a smaller average payment annually for principal and interest than is being paid this year and that the tax base or the assessed valuation of property within the school district has been increasing each year.

Texico and Farwell each have ordinances requiring that pets be vaccinated and registered. In Farwell, registration tags for dogs and cats are \$2. In Texico, registration tags for dogs cost \$1.

Since rabies is one of the most serious animal diseases that can be transmitted to man, it is important that all pets receive the rabies vaccine.

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## On The Farm In Parmer County



Young tomato and pepper plants usually wilt to some degree soon after being transplanted into the garden. Imagine the shock to a tender tomato plant that began life in a warm, humid greenhouse, when it is suddenly uprooted from a pleasant environment, planted in cold soil, buffeted by strong, dry west wind all afternoon and "treated" to 12 hours of temperatures ranging from 40 to 50 degrees.

It is no wonder that its stem turns purple, its leaves droop and it gets that ragged look. This plant may take weeks to recover and begin to grow again.

Next to a spring frost, wind is the worst enemy of young vegetables, especially tomatoes and peppers. Contrary to popular belief, the tomato plant cannot be hardened to cold or to wind desiccation. So, it makes sense to give it all the protection that you can until the weather calms down.

There are many ways to protect transplants and seedlings from the wind and cold. Hotcaps are reinforced waxed paper domes which are set over young plants or newly seeded crops like squash and melons and anchored down with soil around the edges. You must cut a little hole in the side of the hotcap away from the prevailing wind to keep the temperature from rising too high inside the hotcap.

A cage can be constructed

from concrete reinforcing wire and wrapped in plastic film, then placed over the tomato plant to shelter it from wind, cold, and hail while letting in most of the sunlight.

Placing tin cans (with the top and bottom cut out) over the plants is not recommended because the sides of the can shade the plant. Only the upper leaves get enough light. The plant stretches toward the light coming through the top of the can. Soon, the leaves reach the rim and are whipped about by the wind.

Empty plastic bottles (the transparent kind used for milk and distilled water) make good plant covers. Be absolutely sure to cut the top off just above the handle to allow ventilation during the day.

Just breaking the force of the wind will be very helpful to the survival and early growth of newly set vegetable plants or seedlings that have just recently emerged. Shakes (the kind used on roofs) or shingles stuck upright in the soil about six inches to the southwest of a newly set plant will shelter it from the hot, dry afternoon wind. Rows of temporary windbreaks can be set up in small gardens using shakes, snow fence or scrap lumber.

The idea is to stop only about half of the wind volume and let half pass through the windbreak. Each successive rank of windbreak material will further slow down the wind speed.

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
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
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## Lutheran Youth Win Amarillo Olympics

Craig Horne set a new record in the 880 yard run with a time of 2:16.74. Terry Rolan had set the previous record of 2:18 in 1976.

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





**FULNESS OF JOY**  
About 3,000 years ago David wrote in Psalm 16:11: "... In Thy presence is fulness of joy..." He was right, for there is no greater joy than personal fellowship with God. Yet David could not know the fulness of joy now spoken of in Paul's epistles, for he did not know Christ, who later came into the world as God, manifested in the flesh, to die for our sins. He did not know that Christ would make full satisfaction for sin and be raised from the dead to confirm our justification. Nor did David know that believers would be given Christ's resurrection life, and a position, and "all spiritual blessings in the heavens in Christ" (Eph. 2:4-6; 1:3).  
When Paul wrote that God has called believers "into the fellowship of His Son," he referred to a spiritual, heavenly fellowship, far more intimate and precious than any previously enjoyed by mortal man. This fellowship is to be enjoyed by faith, but it is faith based on fact, the fact that Christ indeed died our death and rose again from the dead that we might partake of His life and enjoy a position at God's right hand in Christ. This is why the Apostle Paul urges believers of this dispensation of grace to "seek those things which are above, where Christ sitteth on the right hand of God" (Col. 3:1).  
Peter and John both came to know much of this fellowship through communion with Paul, who was sent to Jerusalem "by revelation" to make known to the leaders there "that gospel which I preach among the Gentiles [Nations]" (See Gal. 2:2-9; II Pet. 3:15-18). This is why John writes in I John 1:3, 4: "Truly our fellowship is with the Father, and with His Son, Jesus Christ. And these things write we unto you, THAT YOUR JOY MAY BE FULL."






