



Agribusiness leads the way in Parmer County

Parmer County extension agent Benji Henderson has provided statistics showing how valuable agribusiness is in Parmer County and how high the county ranks in various state categories.

For example, Parmer County ranks 3rd in overall gross cash receipts, 2nd in ensilage, 3rd in dairy, and 7th in corn, fed beef and cow-calf/stockers receipts among all Texas counties.

Parmer County ranks 4th nationally in the value of cattle sales and 12th in overall value of livestock, poultry and other products.

The county's ag value exceeds \$604.9 million. Its 4,065 ag-related employees account for 86.5% of all private sector employment. This analysis does not include the impact of agriculturally related public sector employees or the 796 farm and ranch operators.

Most of Parmer County's 882 sq.-mile land area is used for ag purposes, with 437,000 out of 564,480 acres under cultivation including 124,000 acres in pasture.

Crop production generated an average of \$153.2 million annually over the 2008-2011 time period.

Parmer County ranks 2nd among Texas counties in ensilage production, 7th in, 9th in hay, and 12th in sorghum. Corn sales lead crop receipts, with \$46.4 million average annual sales from 2008-2011.

The county also produces \$10.4 million in other crops which include vegetable production like green beans, black eyed peas, pumpkins and other short run vegetables.

The county has more than three times as many acres in cropland than in

pasture, but the value of livestock sales is greater than crop receipts. Over one third, \$124.5 million, of the \$352.4 million in livestock receipts are from fed beef.

The county's dairy industry added \$152.2 million in cow-calf and stocker operations contributed \$58 million in ag receipts, ranking 3rd and 7th, respectively, among all Texas counties.

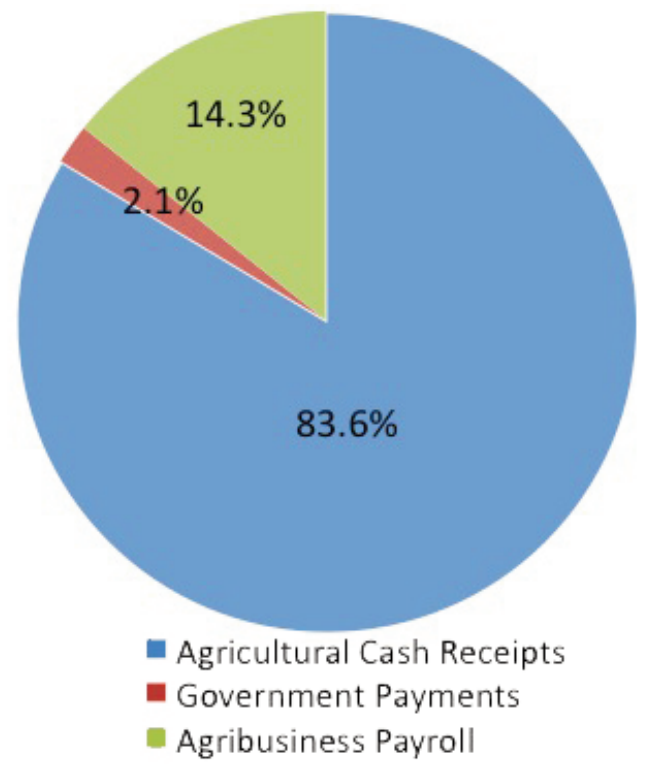
Parmer County also ranks 17th in in other livestock production. Almost all of the \$17.5 million can be attributed to a growing poultry operation in the county.

Agribusinesses take many forms, including manufacturing, retail trade and food service, wholesale trade, agricultural services and transportation.

A total of 2,143 people were employed in Parmer County agribusiness during 2007 with an

associated payroll of \$61.9 million. Also, 1,922 people were either employed full or part-time on local farms, ranches, and confined livestock operations earning \$24.6 million annually.

It should be noted that the impact of agriculture on the Parmer County economy is underestimated, since the economic contributions of the public sector employees working in agriculture and the 796 farm and ranch operators are not considered. Also, the values used were the most recent available and cover from 2007 to early 2011.

Besides the usual varsity boys and girls tournaments, which include the Texico, Farwell and Friona teams, a JV Tourney has been added.

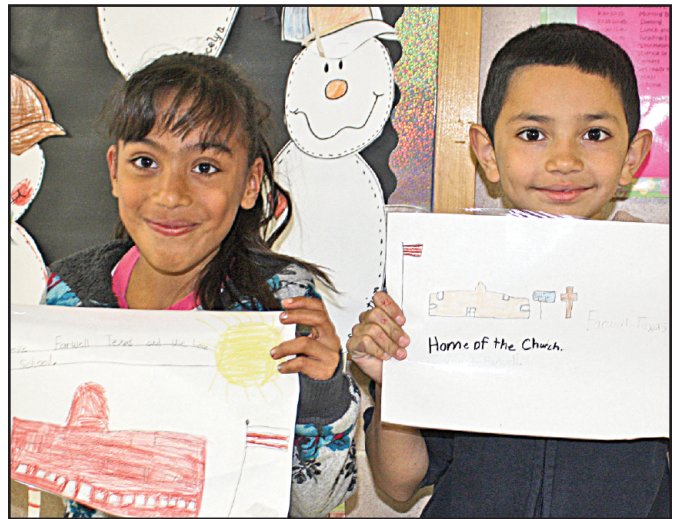

Good food and good fellowship can be found at the Senior Meal Site in Farwell.

Weekdays, folks follow the wonderful aroma of good food to the Farwell Community Center from 11:30 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Along with a good appetite, they also bring along some good stories. Whether it is a "guess who" game with decade old pictures or the latest update on a sick friend, everyone has something to share with the close-knit group.

Lisa Sanders, the Meal Site honcho, said, "We are all a big family. If one of us is missing, we call to check up on them. If someone is sick, we bring them food at home. The Meal Site is not only a place for a good meal, but also a social event. We enjoy the people who come to eat here so much."

Beyond a social outlet, the Meal Site provides a much-needed service to the community. It began about 5 years under the tutelage of Linda Porter and serves over 30 area residents each weekday.

Mary Lynn London expresses it best, "We need this Meal Site for a balanced meal. Most of us don't want to go to the trouble of cooking for just one at home. This way, we are assured of a good, healthy meal and great company as well."

Others feel the same way. Without the Meal Site, some say they would just not bother to cook, but just open a can of soup or make a quick sandwich.

The Meal Site also delivers healthy food to those who cannot drive or are too sick to get out. Each day volunteers show up at the Community Center to pick up meals and distribute them to a needy resident.

Ms. Sanders says more volunteers are needed to deliver meals. Anyone wishing to volunteer just needs to have a little time and a car to make deliveries.

Ms. Sanders has been in charge of the Senior Meal Site for just over a year now. Previously, she worked at the Farwell School cafeteria for 16 years.

Along with assistant Linda Hardy (who used to be her boss when Mrs. Hady was the Farwell cafeteria manager), Lisa arrives at the Community Center around 6 a.m. to begin her preparations for the day's meal.

She emphasizes that you do not have to be a senior citizen to enjoy the cooking here. Anyone is invited to share a meal and a laugh around the table. You can even take a meal to go if you would prefer to eat at home or in your office.

Ms. Sanders hopes more people would give the Senior Meal Site a try.

"We post our menu in the Tribune each week, so everyone knows what is being served. We really need more people to

Wildcats tip Wolverines in State semi-final

The Texico Wolverines fell to the Tularosa Wildcats, 26-21, at home on Friday in the State semi-final game. Texico was ranked No. 3 and Tularosa No. 2 in Class 2A.

Tularosa came out of the gate on fire, converting two 4th down attempts on their first drive. At the Texico 20, John Myers forced a fumble recovered by Shay Harrison.

Wolverine linemen, Zach Madrid, D.J. Girego, Dalton Wren, Daniel Gomez, Uriel Munoz, and Elliott Pelfrey went to work, pushing the Wildcats all over the field.

Texico only needed 7 plays to move the ball 80 yards, capped off by a 66-yard screen pass from Rallin Harris to Justin Rucker for a TD. Harrison kicked the extra point to give Texico a 7-0 lead at 1:04.

Texico's defense, led by Griego, Myers, Hayden Spears, and Alan Valles held the Wildcats to a 3-and-out followed by a punt. Texico couldn't move the ball, and Harrison punted inside the 10 to pin Tularosa back.

The Wildcats moved the ball a bit, but the swarming Wolverine defense held them to a 4th and 5, where Harris knocked down a pass to end the drive. There was no scoring in the 2nd quarter.

After the half, Tularosa tried inside kicks every time it could. Texico recovered the first one, but a 47-yard interception a few plays later allowed Tularosa to tie the game at 7-all.

Eliseo Arenivaz recovered the next kick at mid-field and Harrison took

just three plays to put Texico up 14-7.

Tularosa ran into Pelfrey and Wren, and Myers broke up another pass, forcing another punt. Texico was held, and Tularosa scored from 4 yards out to tie the game at 14-all.

Wren picked up the inside kick and Texico took the lead again, capped off by a 32-yard run by Harrison. The kick made it 21-14.

Tularosa tried to move the ball, but Gomez had a pair of tackles-for-loss and Wren bulldogged a Wildcat runner down. Then J.J. Tuls intercepted a pass at the Texico 10.

Harrison had his most dominant run of the night as he carried the ball 15 yards carrying Wildcat players. He followed that up with 11 yards up the middle, but Texico had to punt.

Wolverines of the Week: defense - Justin Rucker. And Coach Autrey wants to thank the 12 seniors for the outstanding job they did for the Wolverines the past four years. They were freshmen when Autrey began his tenure as varsity football head coach.

Tularosa quickly scored on a 15-yard pass. They tried a run for 2 extra points, but Rucker stopped it to preserve Texico's lead, at 21-20.

Tuls recovered the inside kick. Harrison danced for 8 yards through the defense, but a penalty kept Texico from converting the first down.

Texico tried a fake punt with 2 minutes to go, but couldn't convert it, and Tularosa scored on their first play, a 51-yard pass to their tall receiver, Coleman. Texico kept the Wildcats from completing a 2-

point conversion. Coleman nabbed 11 passes for 160 yards in the game.

Harris completed a 9-yard pass to Myers into Wildcat territory, but they couldn't complete the comeback.

Team stats: first downs Texico 9, Tularosa 22; rushing yards - Texico 167, Tularosa 168; passing yards - Texico 77, Tularosa 211; and penalties - Texico 8 for 40, Tularosa 5 for 45. Harrison rushed for 166 yards.

Texico ended with a 9-2 record.

A small building was burned down just east of Farwell on Nov. 30 before the county burn ban went into effect.

Texico discusses food drive

The Texico City Council on Nov. 27 discussed a food drive recently started at City Hall.

The city aims to fill the trailer in front of City Hall by Christmas and all the food will be distributed to the Farwell and Texico Baptist churches. Police Chief Doug Bowman said the food will be kept

inside the building at night to keep it from freezing.

In other news, the council:

- Discussed vacating part of State Street south of Highway 84 between Stripes and the state line. The street was once a gravel path and never paved. The landowner is trying to sell the proper-

ty, but they want to use the area held by the street as well.

Texico cannot give them the land because the state has an anti-donation clause, but the city can vacate the property in certain cases, including some situations when they do not want the duty of maintaining the land.

In this case, Texico would rather avoid having to pave the street that goes nowhere.

- Talked about taking the KKR well out of service to get a water sample to check the flouride levels. Texico is currently running on two wells.

- Worked on the city wastewater plant project. The State will allow Texico to keep its existing 5-ft. fences that are already in place around the facility, but any new fences will have to be 6-ft. tall for security reasons.

Referendum held for starting grain indemnity fund

The Texas Grain Producers Indemnity Board is holding a referendum on the statewide establishment of a grain indemnity fund until Dec. 7 across the state.

The grain indemnity fund board may award up to 90 percent of the financial losses suffered by producers of corn, sorghum, soybean and wheat when grain buyers fail to pay for grain due to a financial failure.

The TGPIB was set up in 2011 after a series of grain buyer financial failures in recent years resulted in millions of dollars in losses to Texas grain producers.

Eligible voters in the referendum will vote to establish an assessment rate within a range of 0.2 percent to 0.6 percent of the final sales price of grain. The assessment, which will be set each year by the TGPIB, will be collected and remitted to the TGPIB effective Feb. 1, 2013.

Any producer who has produced corn, sorghum, soybeans or wheat within the last 36 months is eligible to vote. This includes owners of farms on which grain is produced or an owner's tenant or sharecropper engaged in the business of producing grain or causing grain to be produced for commercial purposes.

The referendum will be held by mail ballot. Ballots are available at extension offices.

Texas law changes for cattle ID regulations

A requirement for adult cattle in Texas to have an approved form of permanent identification in place at change of ownership will go into effect Jan. 1.

The Texas Animal Health Commission amended its rules last June to enhance the effective traceability of beef cattle movements in Texas, which is the cornerstone of disease control activities.

Implementation of the changes was delayed by the Commission to ensure cattle producers understood the rules and prepared for the

changes. The amended rule permanently cancels the brucellosis test requirement for adult cattle at change of ownership, which was unofficially suspended in the summer of 2011.

Although testing of adult cattle is no longer required with the rule change, all sexually intact cattle, parturient or post parturient, or 18 months of age and older changing ownership must still be officially identified with Commission approved permanent identification. This change primarily

affects beef cattle, as dairy cattle in Texas have had an even more stringent identification requirement in place since 2008.

Live Cattle prices broke down late last week when cash trade really didn't materialize. It looked like there were a handful of cattle which traded around \$126 late Friday, but not much more. Prices have dropped down into what should be fairly strong support around the \$130 level basis the February contract. If this level does not hold, then next support lies around the November low at \$128 level.

Feeder prices also took a hit last week and held support around the \$145.50 level on Friday. The market opened below this level on Monday and prices traded back up, but the market will need to close higher today and move higher tomorrow to confirm a short term low. If this does not occur and prices take out support, the next level to be tested would be the early November low made at \$144.25 basis the January.

Soybean prices have seen a fairly strong move up over the last couple of week with prices now coming into some fairly strong resistance between \$14.52 up into \$14.75 basis the January contract. There is also some trendline resistance around \$14.60 which is being tested today. South American crops remain in good shape for now. Short term trends remain higher while long term trends are still pointing down.

Corn prices dropped off their \$7.68 resistance level last week basis the March contract. There was a bounce back up on Monday, but the market has moved lower since making their highs on the Sunday night trade. Overall, the corn continues to trade inside a sideways range with prices moving back and forth from the high side and back down to the low side. There is no strong direction in prices at this time.

Wheat prices have been inside a trading range since last July. Prices are trading right in the middle of this range today with little news to drive the market in one direction or the other. This has been the case for a very long time with this week acting no differently. For now, it will take time or some major event to force prices to choose one direction or the other. World wheat is still reportedly in good shape.

Cotton prices have drifted higher over the last few weeks and have now traded back up into the high side of a declining channel. The March contract has traded lower, but inside a channel and has yet to break out of either side. There seems to be some strong resistance around the \$74.35 level. A breakout above this level could push prices higher, but very little news at this time which could help kick start this market.

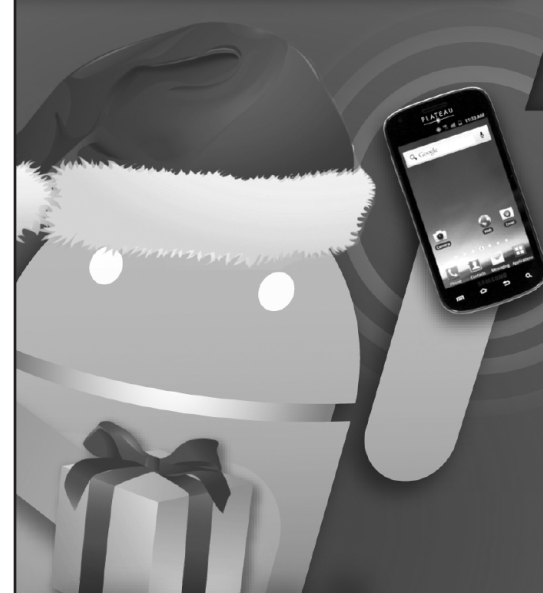
