"Freedom is a group of young Marines standing on a deck, waving, leaving San Francisco for Destination Unknown.

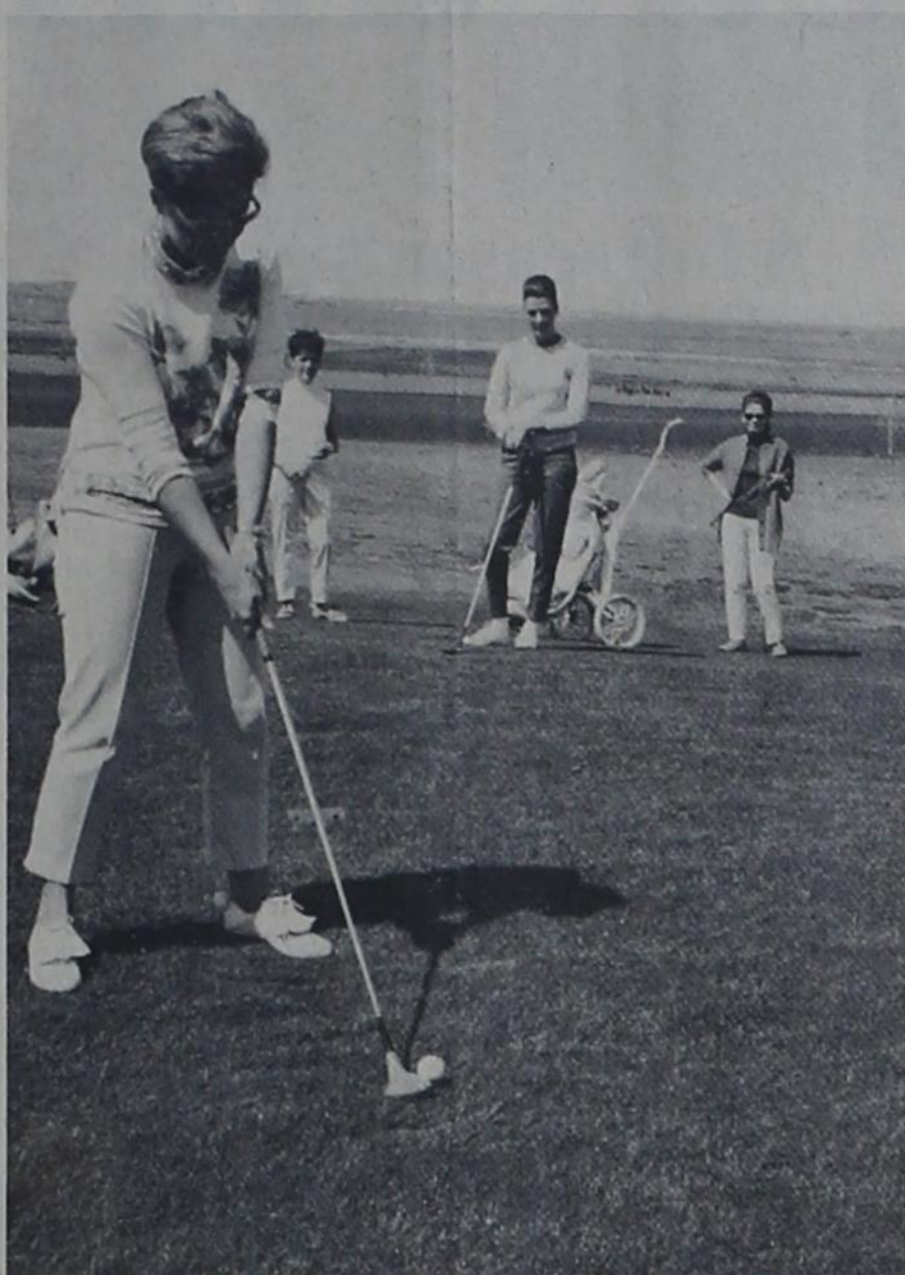
"Freedom is golfers laughing on the eighteenth green.

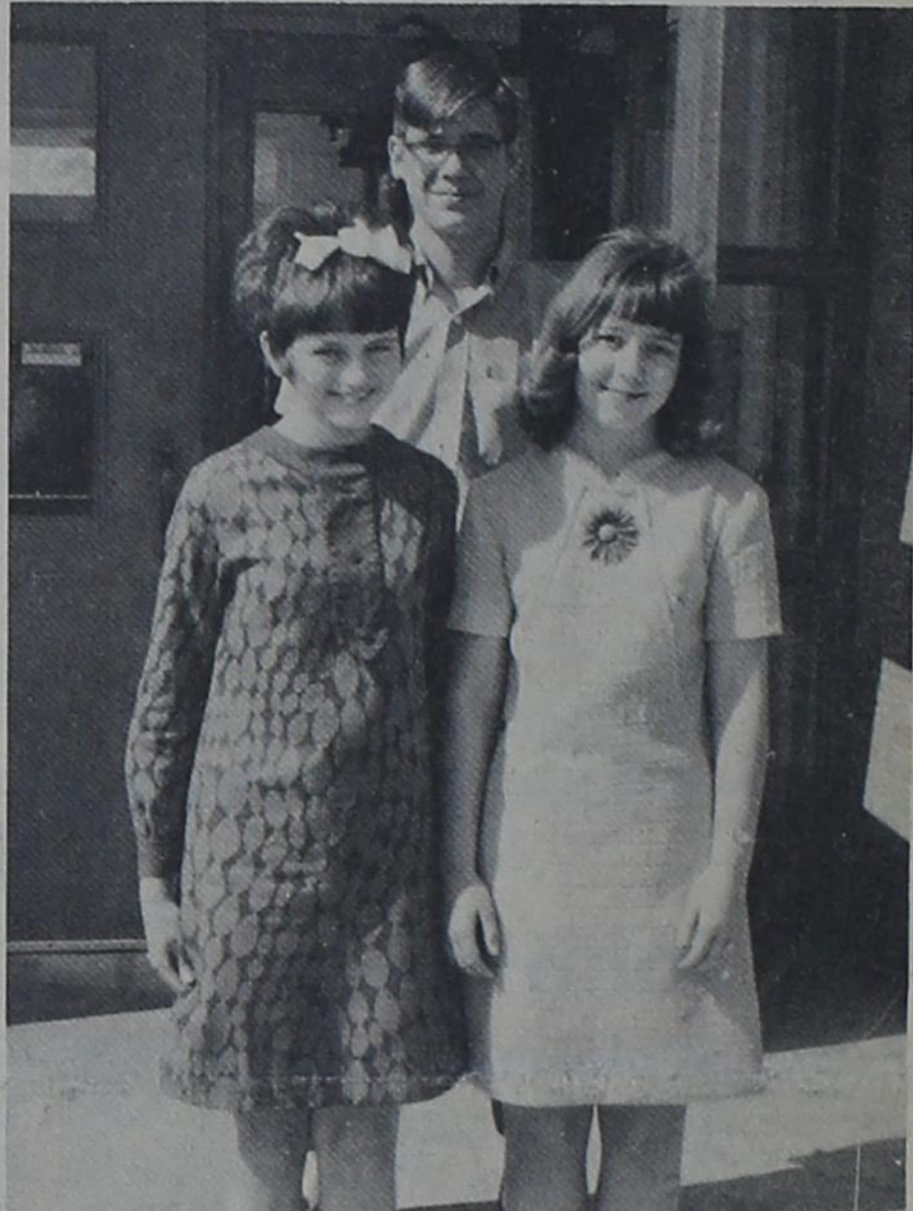

Commencement exercises for the class will be May 22. Honor guards for the group

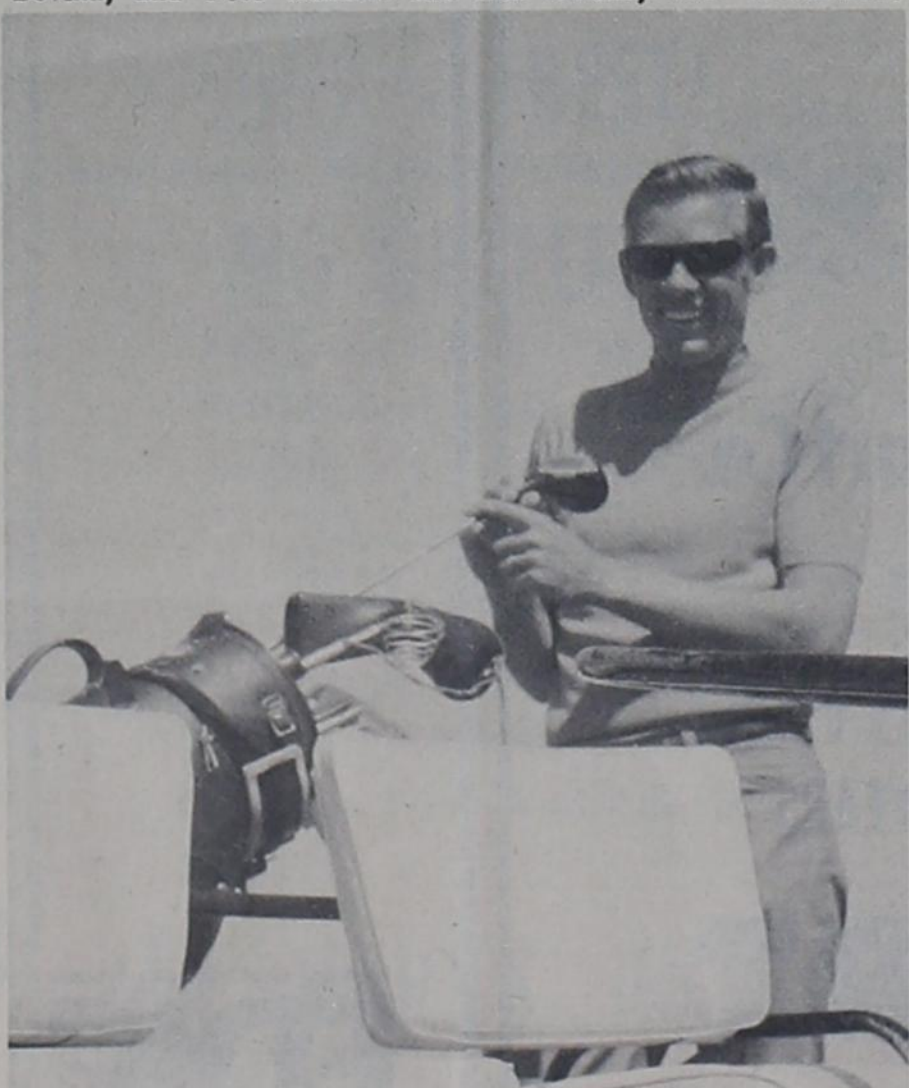

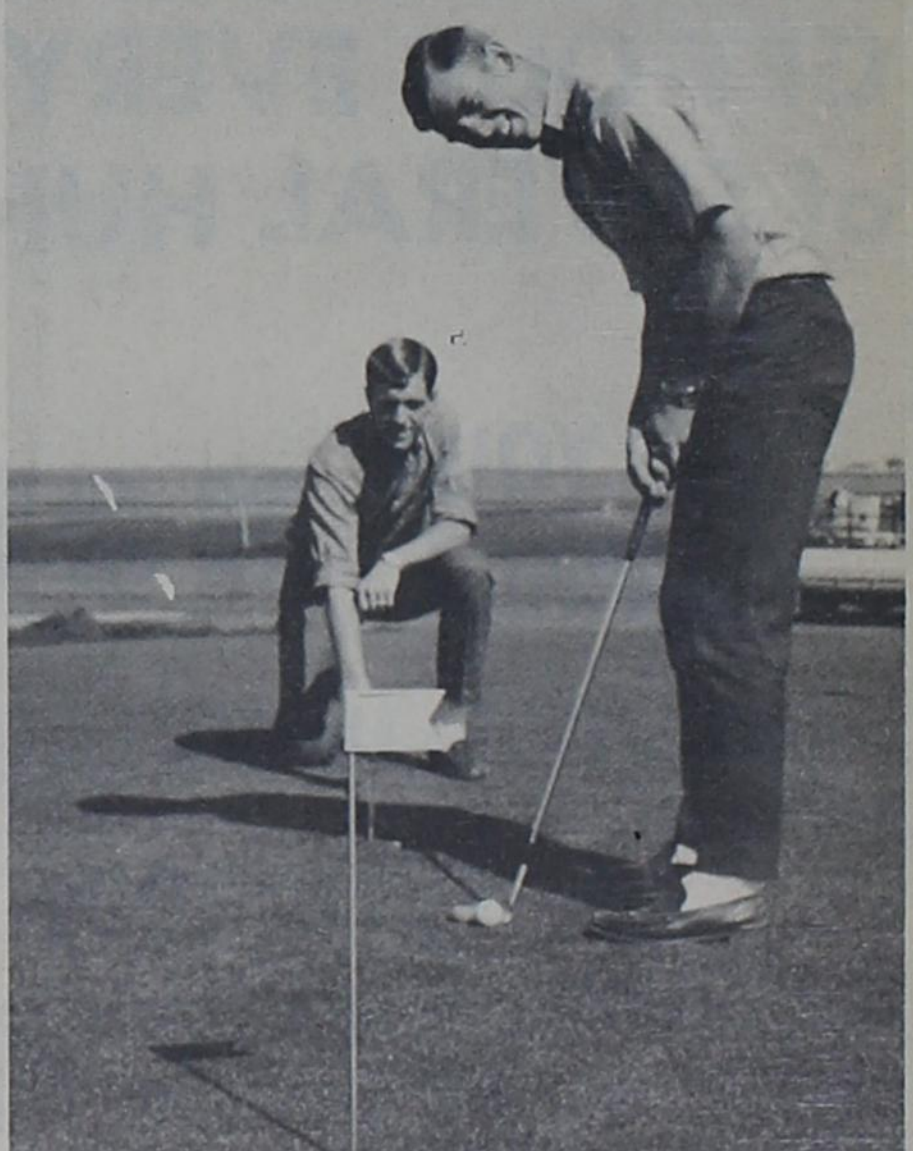

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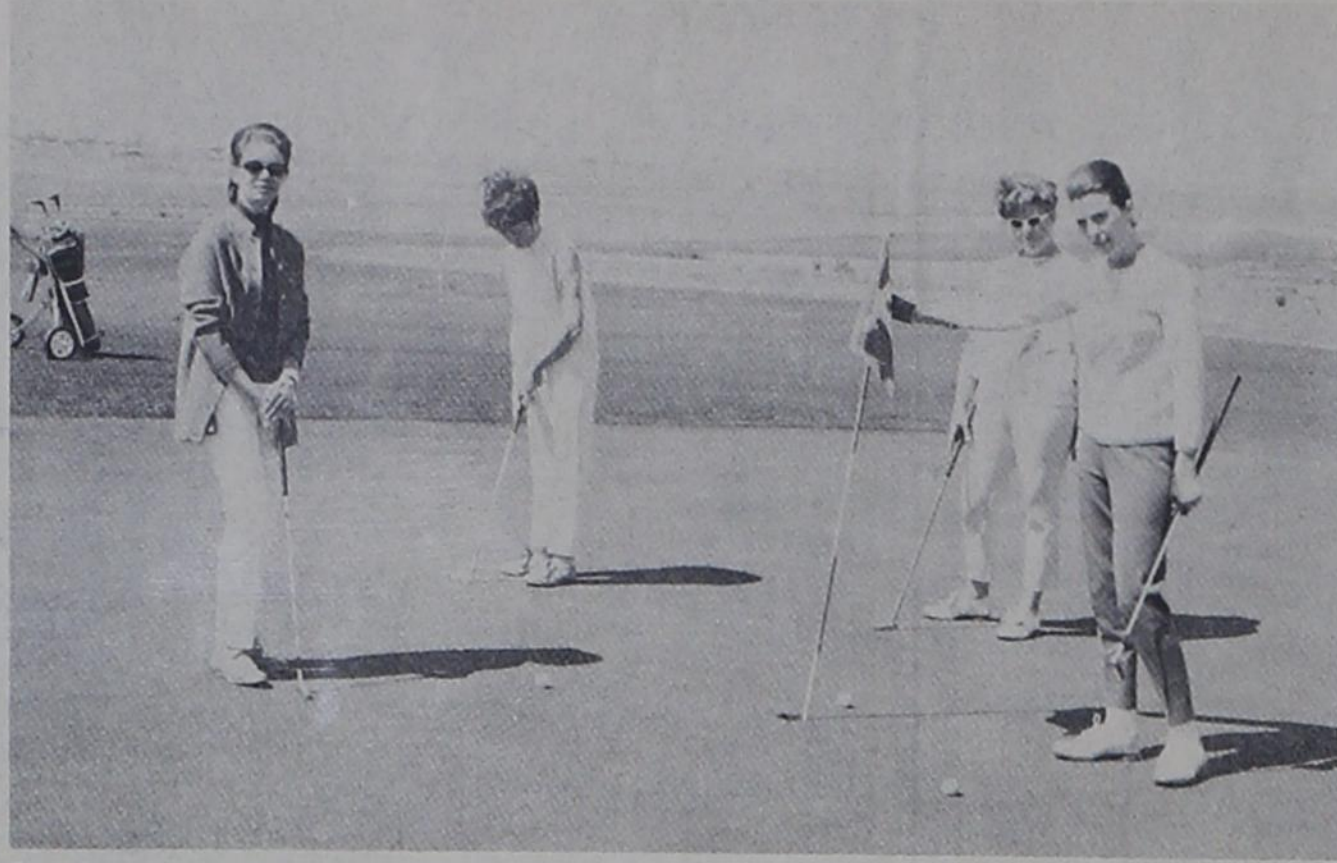

He was treated at Clovis Memorial Hospital for 24 hours but has been released to return home and is in satisfactory condition. However he must remain off the foot for several weeks yet.

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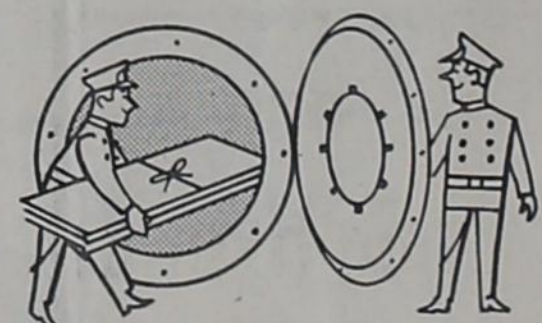
