W. Bell, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public

Safety for this Region. During the months of November and December of 1968, there were 1164 suspected drinking drivers who took various types of tests to determine the amount of alco-

hol in their blood. Of this

number 957 or 82 per cent took the Breathalyzer test as compared to 207 or 18 per cent who took other types of

Major Bell stated that the Breathalyzer not only will help in convicting a drunken driver, but assists in absolving a person who appears intoxicated, but may actually be suffering from epilepsy, a heart attack, an overdose of insulin, or many other pathological

Bell stated, "It is hoped that the use of the Breathalyzer will hit hard at the problem and help reduce the traffic deaths in Texas."
