# Farwell may change city tax

Taxes, utility bills and a city police officer were the main topics at Friday's Farwell City Council meeting.

On taxes: Mayor Chris Gikas said state legislation allows cities to change the way its taxes are levied. Specifically, this means that the city can increase its sales tax in order to

reduce its personal property tax. Councilman Fred Chandler supported such a change, noting it would mean that everyone would pay the sales tax, not just property

The council has until May to make a change. It was noted that the entire personal property tax would not be eliminated because that would cause the sales tax to go up too much.

On city police:

Steve Hillock, a certified Texas peace officer who lives in Farwell, presented his resume in case the city decides to create a post of city

Hillock presented information on his professional background and suggested ways he could be hired.

Mayor Chris Gikas indicated that such a post is still in the discussion stage, noting options such as a city policeman, marshal or night watchman. Each title means something

"A night watchman might serve our purpose better than a marshal," Gikas said. "He would be someone to periodically check homes at night. Our primary concern is after dark."

On utilities:

Gikas said Farwell gas bills are going up. But it was noted that Farwell's rates are much lower than Clovis' and that Southern Union offers cheaper rates than other nearby companies.

In other business, the council: -- Heard Gikas talk of plans to put a city park near the sanitation plant. With a small chlorinator, he said pure water can be dumped into the lake there.

-- Bought 100 decals for the Neighborhood Watch program at a \$12

-- Agreed that the sign at the cemetery would note "Farwell, Texas" on it and be called "Sunset Terrace Memorial Cemetery." The new fence is almost complete. City employees will paint it. There's a low spot on the fence due to the land grade and this will be fixed.

-- Received two bids for a new side door to City Hall. The council accepted the low bid of Clovis Glass and Mirror at \$565.

-- Heard Gikas announce that the new sewer plant contract has been okayed by the Texas Water Board. The contract was let to the low bidder, Panhandle Construction, Lubbock, for \$344,848. Work will begin this month.

The city was informed by Sen. Phil Gramm that the Farwell grant money was increased \$43,247 due to inflation. This means that the costs are higher than when the grant was announced three years ago and the state will pay for the increase.

# Farwell school tax rate stays the same

The Farwell School Board Tuesday night voted to keep its tax rate for the coming year the same as this year's -- \$1.1976 per \$100 valuation.

This was a difficult decision for the board because indications are that the schools will face the possible loss of some state funds next

This means that the board may be faced with raising taxes up to 5 percent next year. So the board debated whether to keep taxes the same this year -- and face up to a 5 percent hike next year, or raise taxes 2 or 3 percent this year, followed by a similar hike next

The board took into account the current difficult economic times. and decided not to raise taxes now. And it hopes this won't backfire via

a hefty raise next year. School taxes have not been raised

in three years. In other business, the board voted to start a pre-kindergarten program

as soon as a teacher is hired.

The program is for non-English speaking children and those who qualify for free or reduced lunches. It's for four year olds. Twelve youths have qualified and agreed to participate.

The board voted to change its liability insurance to the Texas School Services Foundation. Its current insurer is phasing out of that area.

The board agreed to put in new theromostats in the junior high and replace some of the gymnasium lights.

The board agreed to contract with the Amarillo Region 16 service. center for a computer system to handle curriculum programs and help with diagnostics. It costs about \$3,700. The first program to be put in

will be math. The schools plan to add part-time helpers in the maintenance and cafeteria areas.

# What to do with captured General Santa Anna?

1836: MONDAY, OCTOBER 17. In a manifesto issued at the northern Mexican stronghold of Matamoros, near the mouth of the Rio Grande River, 25 officers of the army stationed there, including the commander-in-chief General Juan V. Amador, and Major General Adrian Woll, affirmed their loyalty to Jose Justo Corro, ad interim President of Mexico during the captivity of President Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna, and unanimously stated their desire to renew the Texas campaign once the ransom or release of Santa Anna can be secured.

Santa Anna and two aides, Colonel Juan N. Almonte and Colonel Gabriel Nunez, are currently imprisoned at the plantation of Dr. James A.E. Phelps, called Orozimbo. Santa Anna's private secretary, Ramon Martinez Caro, was previously a prisoner, but was released September 13 because of his nonmilitary status. Orozimbo is about 45 minutes above Velasco on the Brazos River, a few miles above Columbia. The prisoners are guarded there by a detail under Captain William H. Patton.

Until October 8 the prisoners were shackled with ball and chain, ordered on August 17 after a plot to rescue them had been detected and prevented. While they were being held at Veslaco, a young Spaniard named Bartolome Pages, who owned a wine shop there, managed secretly to get a letter from Santa Anna recommending him to the Mexican counsul in New Orleans as a means of escape. The counsul advanced him 5,000 pesos to charter a small American schooner, the Pasaic, load if with supplies, and sail for Texas. Pages found that the prisoners had been moved to Orozimbo, and when he tried to contact them there, he raised the guards' suspicions. He was arrested, along with the Pasaic's captain and another passenter. Incriminating papers were found on Pages and he was imprisoned. The others were released. The shackles were then ordered, but with the convening of the First Congress earlier this month, marking the advent of civil government in Texas, ad interim President David G. Burnet felt that it was safe to order their removal.

The military has made two attempts to remove Santa Anna from President Burnet's jurisdiction. The first was on June 3, after Santa Anna had been placed on the Texas ship Invincible for return to Veracruz in accordance with the terms of the Treaty of Veslaco of May 14. He was removed by army volunteers and returned to captivity. Shortly afterward, a contingent under Colonel Henry Millard was dispatched to convey Santa Anna to the army to face a military trial and certain execution. This was abandoned

The United States Congress recently voted to overhaul the nation's federal tax code. This so called "tax reform" legislation will ultimately impact each and every taxpaying citizen.

I voted against the bill and I would like to tell you why:

Tax reform was born with three basic goals in mind - fairness, simplicity and economic growth. These are goals I share and have worked for since I was elected to Congress Unfortunately in the 22 months that followed, this tax bill became the focus of too much political rhetoric and too little careful review.

Let me say from the beginning that there are portions of this legislation that I like. There is obvious good in tax law changes that reduce marginal tax rates and eliminate tax loopholes and special preferences For us in West Texas, however, the good just doesn't outweigh bad.

Careful vehicle maintenance is one of the many ways we save money and keep

electric costs down. We also use by-products like coal ash as a gravel

I visited with and heard from thousands of people in the 19th District in an attempt to have their input and thoughts about this tax bill. It became evident that Washington, D.C. was caught up in "tax reform euphoria" -- West Texas was not. From Dimmitt to Denver City, main-street merchants, farmers, oil producers and people from all walks of life expressed their fears and opposition to the bill.

I share this concern and believe the tax bill will unfairly penalize us in West Texas. We will lose our state and local sales tax deduction. Farmers lose their income averaging deduction, investment tax credits, and much of their farm equipment depreciation. Those planning for the future lose a sizable portion of their IRA deduction. And as consumers, we ultimately lose by paying higher prices when our shop keepers and store owners are forced to pass along their higher taxes.

Lamar has strongly supported the army's position. He wrote a lengthy and impassioned plea to President Burnet and the Cabinet urging Santa Anna's execution. He had violated "all of the principles of civilized conflict," Lamar charged, with a "revolting policy of extermination and rapine, slaying the surrendering, and plundering whom he slays." He is thus no more than "an abhorred murderer," and "forfeits the commiseration of man-

Because of this pressure, the prisoners were transferred to Orozimbo for greater safe-keeping. Key Texian figures, including Burnet, President-elect Sam Houston and General Stephen F. Austin, are convinced that Santa Anna is worth more to Texas alive than dead. Burnet has stated that even though he believes "no confidence could be safely reposed in a Mexicano," he is convinced that Santa Anna will work for Texas independence after his release, because it is in "his own highest political interests, and the best interests of Mexico, too."

Texian forbearance in the treatment of Santa Anna has brought favorable comment from other nations. U.S. General Edmund P. Gaines wrote to General Houston on August 3: "No inconsiderable portion of your fame, resulting from your late campaign, the great victory at San Jacinto, will be found in your magnanimity and moral courage displayed by you in preserving the lives of your prisoners, and more especially the life of Pesident Santa Anna." On September 4 U.S. President Andrew Jackson also wrote to Houston: "I take the liberty of offering a remark or two upon the report which is current here, that Santa Anna is to be brought before military court, to be tried and shot. Nothing now could tarnish the character of Texas more than such an act as this."

It is understood that Santa Anna is presently urging Burnet and Houston to send him to Washington, that he may assure the U.S. government that the annexation of Texas would not create overwhelming difficul-

Another frightening aspect of this tax reform legislation is that there are predictions and rumblings in Congress of raising the individual rates again in an effort to meet deficit reduction targets. Just one week before the House gnittive avalance, voted on the tax bill, House Ways 19 4 alloy regue 2000 S Minand Means Committee Chairman Dan Rostenkowski (D-III) said,

"We all know that we're going to raise taxes." Mr Rostenkowski did stop there, saying, "I have long been a strong proponent of tax increases to shrink the deficit" and "everyone knows we will eventually need a tax increase...the increase in revenue should come through higher, progressive rates

on income.' Increasing individual tax rates on the heels of repealing individual deductions would result in individuals paying more taxes than ever before. I fear that this tax bill will make it easier to force even higher taxes on the American people. It echoes the old Democrat philosophy of tax and spend, tax and spend.

I do not believe that this tax legislation is the best that Congress can do. If we are ever going to truly reform our tax code we should do the job right. The American people expect more and we in West Texas deserve more from the United States Congress.





# Life Line units installed

The first Life Line Emergency Response Unit was installed Tuesday at the home of Minnie Ramm in Farwell.

Present at the installation were Susan Farrell of the Lutheran Social Services of Texas; Mrs. Ramm's son and daughter-in-law, Ernest and mary Alice Ramm; Ophell McDonald; Pat Rose; Francis Kube and Mildred Haseloff.

Francis, Pat and Mary Alice are training to be installers and interviewers. Their job will be to fill forms, interview applicants and install units.

The applicant also is asked to name responders, people in the family or trusted friends. These responders are given a key to the person's home and notified to go and check on the person in question in case it is not possible for the person to get help on their own.

After the unit is installed, a test is ran to be sure that the unit is working correctly. A call is made to the center in Lubbock to notify them of the test and the recipient of the unit's card is then pulled and

verified.

When the button on the system or the manual button is pushed, this sets off the phone at the center, the phone goes dead on your end, because a computer at the center takes control of the phone line to ensue that the person needs help. A light and buzzer on the system reports that the center has received your message.

If the person does not respond, then a responder is notified. The center will then call back a second time to see if the responder needs help. Responders can all the emergency number and receive help or notify the center. A final buzzer will beep to let you know that they have received the message.

The timer on the system is set morning and night. A buzzer will sound to warn you if the button is not pushed to reset the system.

If for some reason the person is going to be away for overnight or longer, there is a button on the system that will shut the system off. The system has a battery back-up in case of a power failure. The battery will usually run the system for 48

hours. Then it will signal that it is halfway run down so that the batteries can be replaced before they quit working.

This system activates at a distance as far as 200 feet. There is no charge for the installation and the unit is donated by the Lutheran Social Services. The monthly charge is \$21.75 a month.


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
