ring on a roller). It took five weeks to fix that.
Anyway, we got it going and were
able to open Jan. 2 as originally planned. Then came the pressure. jobs done asap? When other printers I had talked with said that to me, $I$ figured. they were joshing. They
weren t.
But we do the best we can. And,
fortunately, we have two very fine printers in Betty Jean Castleberry and Barbara Franse.
When we began thi
When we began this venture, we
all knew about the same - not all knew about the same - not a
whole lot. So we have been able to help each other and learn, learn, learn. How is it put? Experience is the best teacher. I believe in that
credo. The nice thing about the past two
months is that we've had a variety
of work such as 3 vpart statements, paddded memos, sales bills, letter-
heads, envelopes, etc. It's helped us heads, envelopes, etc. It's helped us also has shown the versatility of our press. and downs. I've learned that baling ire is a great all-around fixer. But I had a pin break that held a shaft and gear together. I couldn't get another pin in, so I temporarily"
fixed it with wire. That lasted about a month and the wire busted. So I
was going to put another piece of wire in but the broken-off wire was odged within.
I had a hecku out. Tweezers saved the day. So I tried a pin again, with no success. Hardware gave mewart at Farwell suggested twisting the cotter pin
after it was in partially That worked beautifully. Thanks, I realize that problems will de-
velop with the press, as they do with any machine. And some will be of the type I can't fix. But we have good mechanics and machinists in our area you can count on.
It's also been interesting up accounts with various wholesalers in nearby Amarillo and Lubbock, to places in Alabama. I'm still reeling my way to find out which
give the best deals. Saving money give the best deals. Saving money
for our local folks is most-import-

One more thing we've learned about printing. When we started out, I was afraid the big companies
in Amarillo and Lubbock, for example, would be able to offer cheaper prices because of their volume. I was thinking of large I have found $t$ true. Local printers, whether it's us or ones in Muleshoe and Clovis, are less expensive. I want to stress that using a non-local printer, please check for quotes from your local printers; these are times when you need to save money.
One area where I still have a lot to
learn deals with computer This is an industry where more and more supplies will be used. I think
those kids who learn those kids who learn about com-
puters in school are lucky; it's puters in school are lucky; it's
harder to learn new things when you get older.
Our little print shop is just for our
local area, Texico, Farwell and local area, Texico, Farwell and
Bovina. There are Bovina. There are many fine print-
ers in Muleshoe, Clovis and Hereford, and we don't plan to compete with them. Whenever I walk into
one of those print shops, I wist shake one of those print shops, I just shake
my head in wonderment at all the my head in wonderment at all the
fancy machines they have. Maybe some day.

Back in June, several members of the First Baptist Church contrib-
uted funds for the purchase uted funds for the purchase of
Vacation Bible School material and sent it to the school in a private plane. "The government does not allow anyone to bring in books of

many fishing boats. They visited the shops and the hospital there.
