School facility study released

The Farwell School Board Tuesday received the feasibility study of facilities and cussing it.

No decisions were made and the board would appreciate community input before deciding which directions to take.

Energy management: There spent about two hours dis- are 3 areas to consider that make a major impact in energy management: window area, insulation and mechanical systems:

> Window area - In this area, it is recommended that the glazing area per classroom on the north exposure be about 50 square feet, with 30 square feet on the other sides.

Consider that if you classroom was 32 feet long, that would allow you 1 foot band of glazing on the south, east

Insulation - It is recommended that the roof have an R-value of 19 and the walls of 11. The walls most likely have an effective R-value of 11. But because of such large masses of windows, the average of the cumulative walls is closer to half of the wall value. Because of the shape of your roofs, it is likely that your roofs have less than the recommended in the walls.

Mechanical systems - It is recommended that all mechanical systems be rated by seasonal energy efficiency ratio of at least 10. Most of your units would rate about

School Supt. John Grigsby stressed that the schools have had an ongoing maintenance program but it gets to a point when major repairs are needed. He noted that the school roofs are 20- and 35years old, while an average roof's life expectancy without major repairs is much shorter, for example.

The study was prepared by **Commercial Industrial Builders** of Lubbock. Here's what they said:

Recommendations

Elementary facilities: The elementary classes are scattered in 3 different facilities and are also in need of additional classrooms. To eliminate this problem, we recommend that Avenue G be vacated in order that the entire campus be tied together.

We also recommend that a 4 room facility be constructed adjacent to the existing facility. A covered walkway to the junior high would give you a contiguous facility with greater flexibility.

There is also a need for an activities facility for the elementary grades that could be satisfied with the construction of a new varsity gym and the subsequent conversion of the existing competition gym to the junior high facility. This would, in turn, free the facility adjacent to the junior high school facility for use by the elementary grades.

Junior High facilities: The junior high facility seems to be in the worst need of repair and remodeling. Classrooms are too small and do not have adequate storage space that generally is provided for with closets or cabinets.

If you determine to add the new classrooms to the junior high facility, you should also consider some remodeling of a few of the classrooms to enlarge them. The remodeling should also include added teacher workrooms and private restrooms.

Another option is to completely remodel the existing junior high facility with




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
Wolverines fall in last minute





Chamber asks city to barricade tracks

The Farwell Chamber of Commerce voted Tuesday to send a letter to the Farwell City Council urging that the the highway be barricaded next to the Santa Fe Railroad tracks.

During the discussion, it was stated that the deteriorating condition of the tracks was injurious to the personal property (vehicles) of Far-well residents and that action needed to be taken.

One member said an act of civil disobedience was needed to get the attention of the authorities.

If the tracks are barricaded, then traffic could be detoured to another street.

For quite some time, repair of the tracks has been expected. Funds have been appropriated by the New Mexico and Texas highway departments and the railroad. But predictions of when the repairs would take place have turned out incorrect.

During the discussion, one member said he heard that Oct. 22 would be the starting date for repairs. Another said the problem was that the railroad officials now wanted the tracks raised higher than they are now. Another said Farwell was not on the list of work to be done.

In other business, Cham-ber secretary Dutch Quickel said several people had suggested to him that the Chamber sponsor a Past Fashions show during the winter. Quickel said it could be held in the Farwell Community Center and talked of the areawide publicity the Chamber could provide for it.

Peggy Haseloff has put on the show during Border Town Days the past two years. She was asked to return to another meeting with an estimate of costs that the Chamber would be needed to handle.

Watch out for aflatoxin

Texas Department of Agriculture officials today cautioned livestock producers in North and East Texas to be on the lookout for feed corn contaminated with aflatoxin.

"We want to stress that this is not an emergency,' said TDA Assistant Commissioner Richard Lowerre. "If producers follow normal precautions, they shouldn't have anything to worry about. But some corn with high levels of aflatoxin has been found and we think producers need to be aware of the dangers."

Aflatoxin is a carcinogenic mold found in some agricultural products, including corn and peanuts. So far, the problem seems to be limited to grain in Northeast Texas.

The TDA officials said the situation does not appear to be bad enough for farmers to demand aflatoxin testing on all corn, but instead, urged that farmers buy from reliable dealers.

"Right now, I think the best thing to do is buy from a reliable grain warehouseman who uses proper drying tech-niques," Tarrant said. "And I don't think I can stress enough that the worst thing to do is buy right off the





Some fields in our area have far more infestation than other fields have. And, the past two weeks have seen a great increase in the numbers of the insect. The decision to treat these pests with pesticides must be done on a field to field basis.

The treatment threshold for cotton bollworms is 6,000 to 8,000 small larvae per acre. For the most successful control, insecticide treatment should be timed to control small bollworm larvae less than 1/4 inch long.


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

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

Harry Baker remembered

The following is a telegram was sent to Harriet Magness and other family members and friends of Harry Baker. It was read at his funeral:

Harry Baker was a 1946 graduate of Texico High School. His accomplishments at Dow Chemicals were many.

To Harriett Magness, family, and friends of Harry Baker.

I certainly regret being unable to attend the funeral, but would like to share with you my knowledge of a subject most of you probably know little about: namely Harry's professional career at Dow. I've known Harry for 22 years and worked closely with him for the last 15 years, so I believe I am qualified to discuss his career.

Harry started in microscopy at Dow when light microscopy was in the early stages of development, and almost nothing was known of transmission electron and scanning electron microscopy. He struggled to learn these difficult technologies and ultimately became Dow's foremost expert in transmission electron microscopy. He, more than anyone else, is responsible for the development of this highlycomplex and useful science within Dow. It is because of his efforts that Dow presently has one of the finest industrial electron microscopy facilities anywhere. He developed more methods and solved more problems through electron microscopy than any other Dow microscopist.

He was a pioneer in relating polymer properties to the polymer microstructure revealed through electron microscopy. His firsts are indeed numerous. He was unique and innovative in his approach to difficult problems. He would try the techniques of the present when they failed to produce results, he would use his vast experience and skill to develop a new procedure which would solve the problem. He would persevere long after others had tried and failed. He taught us to keep trying and that no problem was too difficult. Through his efforts we learned that electron microscopy could be used to solve the most difficult industrial problems.

He was recognized throughout Dow as a genuine expert; folks with the most difficult projects would bring their problems to him. Dow twice awarded him the prestigious V.A. Stenger Award for excellence in Analytical Science. Through his problem solving he contributed significantly to his technology, to Dow's success, and to the improvement

of society. He, with full justification, took great pride in his work. In this time of sadness, please take solace in the knowledge that Harry simply didn't live a life but was truly a contributor and leaves the world better off for his efforts. His career stands as an inspiration for others to follow.

Because he was an eager and willing teacher, we learned much from him, and he leaves us well prepared for future






Texico Booster Club will change its meeting night from Tuesday night to Monday night this year.


