





### Iron chlorosis strikes area plants

This year's growing conditions on the High Plains, which resulted in early growth, have accelerated the onset of iron chlorosis on trees, turf grasses, and ornamentals, said Dr. Michael Hickey, soil chemist and director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service Soil Testing Laboratory in Lubbock.

Hickey said the condition is usually caused by alkalinity of soil and water. West Texas soils and water fall in this category, and the presence of early growth has made the problem more widespread this summer.

"The leaves of chlorotic plants range from light green to yellow to almost white,

Bermuda grass, flowers, and ornamentals and some shade trees are usually attacked by iron chlorosis. "This summer we're seeing chlorosis on trees we haven't seen it on before," Hickey noted.

Hickey recommended foliar applications of iron sulfate copperas or iron chelate. For spraying lawn and turf grasses, iron chelate should be mixed at a ratio of three level tablespoonfuls of iron chelate per gallon of water; for ornamentals, one level tablespoon of iron chelate per level tablespoonfuls of iron in 1987.

chelate per gallon of water. By adding one or two drops of dishwashing detergent, the iron chelate spray will cling to leaves. Plants should be

sprayed until thoroughly saturated. Results will be noted in several days.

For more complete instructions, see your county agent.

### Deficiency payments due

Sorghum farmers will receive the balance of their 1987 sorghum deficiency payments this fall.

The payment will be approximately 43 cents per bushel (77 cents per cwt.) times the farm yield in 1987. Deficiency payments will only be made to farmers who participated in the 1987 sorghum program. Eighty- four percent of the base sorghum acres gallon, and for fruit trees, two were enrolled in the program

The deficiency payment is the difference between the basic loan rate which was \$2.17 bu and the local loan (Findley amendment) of \$1.74 bu. national average. These payments are not subject to the limitation of payments.

The weighted average received by farmers for the year (Sept. 1, 1987- Aug. 31, 1988) was \$1.60-\$1.70 per bu. Final calculations will be made in October and there is a remote possibility that they will raise the final average above the \$1.74 level. This would reduce the pay-



They urge local producers to contact their congressmen and senators about this issue. The federal government is already the biggest landowner in the nation.




