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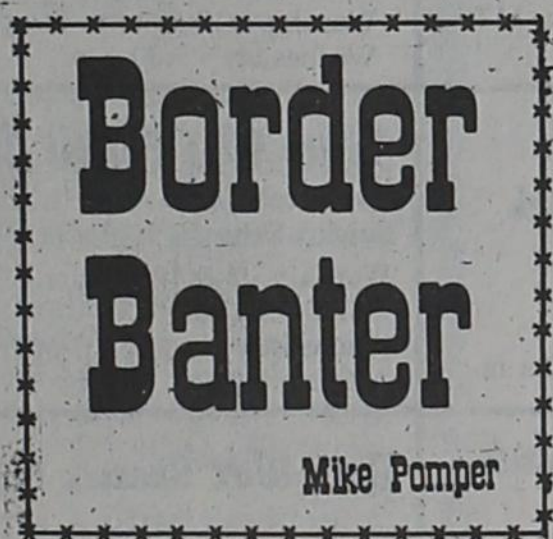

As folks who have read this column for some time know, I don't put the highest premium on winning. And I know this puts me at odds with some folks here.

Don't get me wrong, I like it when our teams win. In a couple more years, my boy will be at the varsity level and I sure hope his team is a winning one.

But I view school athletics in terms more than just the number of wins. I believe ath-

letics can teach our youths a lot, including sportsmanship, discipline, conditioning, determination, teamwork.

Teamwork. That single word characterizes this year's Farwell Steer team, which if you measure it in terms of victories, is the best basketball team the community has ever produced.

Or if you want to measure it in terms of teamwork, I think it's still safe to call it Farwell's

best ever. Its' hard for me to see any better teamwork than I've seen displayed this year, which has seen 30 victories so far and includes the first regional title ever gained by a Farwell basketball squad.

When I see those beautiful passes from one player to another for the easy bucket, or the way the ball is thrown around the horn, or the way the "cutter" is hit coming across the lane, I can only shake my head. That's college

ball we're seeing.

Add to that the fact that three of the Steer starters are sophomores and you can't help but be amazed by the maturity shown.

It's never done much for me to watch a schoolboy squad which features a big man and all you see is the guard flipping the ball to him so he can shoot the turn-around jumper. Or a team which

The action to change the date was made by unanimous decision of the Chamber board Monday.

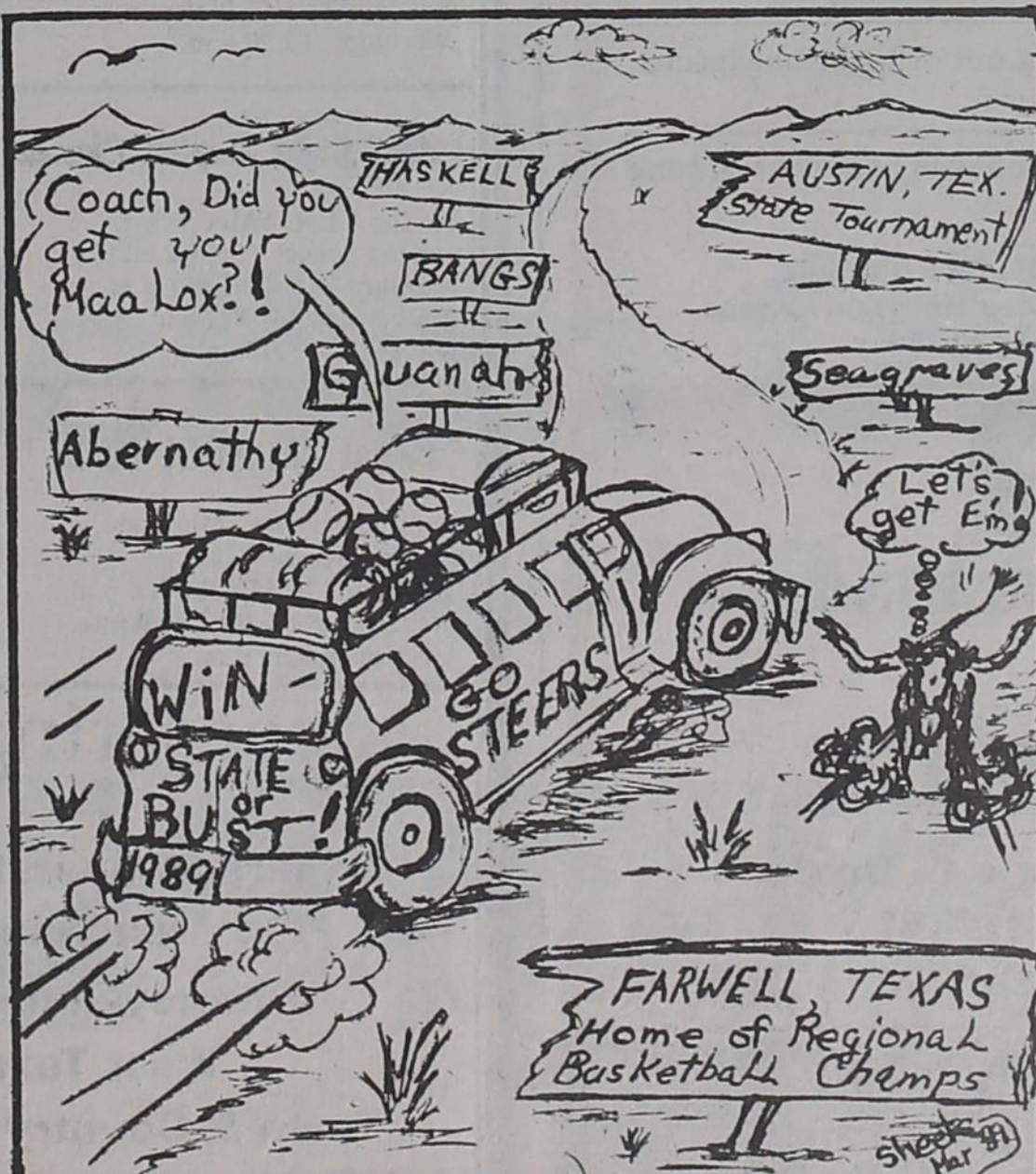
The board also voted to spend \$250 to help send the Steers to the state tournament.

Add to them Hardage, Chisom and Haseloff, and you have a smooth team.

None of these players are among the top 25 in the nation. But each is an excellent ball player who fits together with the others into a finely-tuned machine. Add to that an excellent coach, Larry Gregory, and you have success.

My favorite ball club of all time was one coached by Johnny Wooden during UCLA's halcyon days. If you recall, there was a one year hiatus between the Kareem Abdul-Jabbar era and the Bill Walton era.

That year featured a Bruin squad with no player taller than 6-5. And this was a time when every college had two or three big men over 6-8. But that year's ultra-short UCLA team won the NCAA championship.

Why? They had an excellent coach. They had outstanding teamwork. They boxed out on the boards. They didn't have depth but they were tenacious on defense and had great quickness. And they full-court pressed.

Sure sounds like the Steers, doesn't it?

**Texico seeks state funds for streets**

The Texico City Council is serious about going after state financial aid to improve its streets. A public hearing was held Monday at City Hall as part of the process to seek a 1989 Small Cities Community Development Block Grant. No one showed up except for council members. And they discussed street paving estimates they had Lydick Engineers, Clovis, draw up for them. The estimate, which totaled nearly \$192,000, looked good to the council. As Mayor Steve Chancy said, any state funds Texico may receive toward the work would be better than nothing.

If any part of this state aid is approved, Texico must match with 5%. The amount of street work done would be governed by how much state aid is received, if any.

Councilman Butch Tharp pointed out that some street repairs would have to be made before such work is done.

Lydick provided estimates for this work:

1. Construct 24" concrete curb and gutter at a width of 32 feet back to back.
2. Trim the existing asphalt paving to a width of 18 feet, the construct 6" base, prime with asphalt and pave with a 5/8" second course penetration type pavement.
3. Construct a 3/8" penetration type pavement over the entire street width between the curbs, that being 28 feet wide.

It was noted that city streets now are about 24 feet wide, meaning some would be widened.

The estimate also included about \$1,700 to remove and replace concrete driveways. But the council believes they have received a legal opinion stating that such cost would be borne by the property owners and not the city.

The following street estimates include engineer's fees:

- Lamar Street, Mildred to Craig, \$11,614.
- Anderson Street, Mildred to Craig, \$11,861.
- Garwood Street, Eunice to Craig, \$23,532.
- Turner Street, Mildred to Craig, \$13,639.
- State Street, Eunice to Craig, \$24,756.
- Craig Street, State Line Road to College, \$65,057.
- Rose Street, city limits to Ave. D, \$21,206.
- Florence Street, city limits to ave. D, \$20,206.

**Longhorns fall in regionals**

The Lazbuddie Longhorns ended a fine season with a loss to a tough Vega squad, 67-56, at the Class 1-A regional. Friday at Levelland College.

The Longhorns finished at 18-14, having come on strong at the end of the year. Scoring were: Wes Jarman, 24; Brian Glover, 8; Michael Williams, 5; Scott Miller, 12; Kevin McGehee, 3; Chad Waddell, 3; and Holt, 1.

Lazbuddie was only down by 2 points at the end of the first quarter, before Vega used a strong second quarter to take a lead it didn't relinquish. At the half it was Vega ahead, 33-24. The teams played evenly the second half.

The refs called a lot of fouls, with six players fouling out. They included four from Lazbuddie - Eddie Zamora, Williams, Glover and Jarman.

Vega finished at 18-13 after losing to undefeated New Home in the regional final.

It was the first time in more than 20 years that a Lazbuddie team has made it as far as the regional, reported Coach Richard Luscombe.

"We didn't play as well as we could against Vega," he said. "We were down by 18 at one point and closed it to 5 or 6. But Vega played very well."

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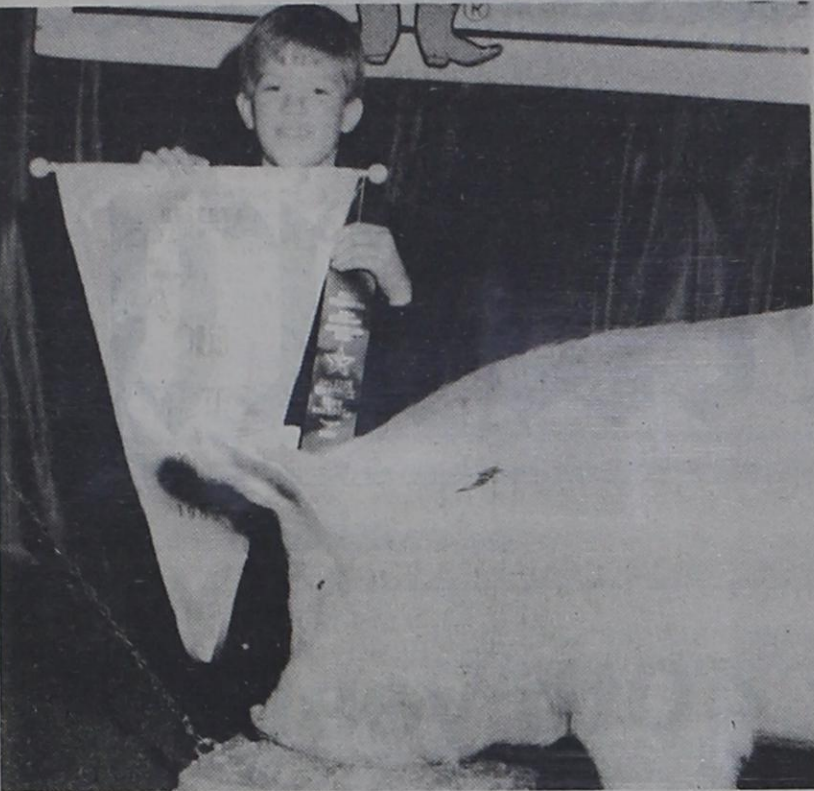

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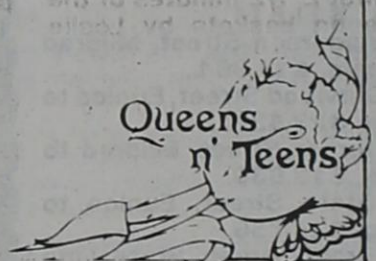
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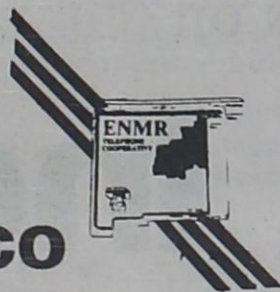
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# Texico second in state!

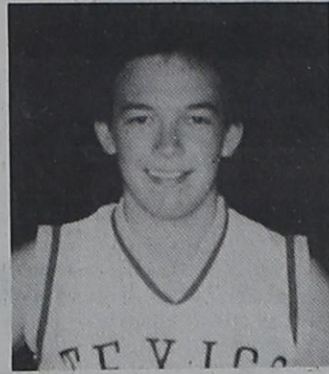

Askew picked up her third foul 3 minutes into the quar-

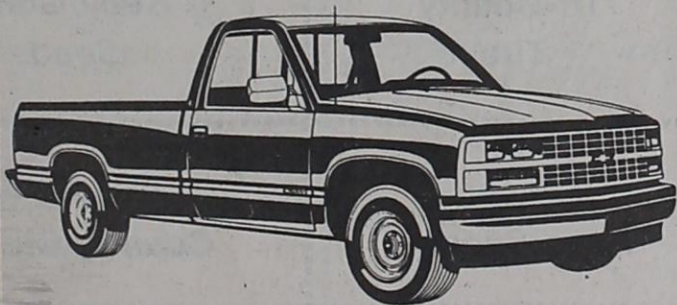

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# Steers upset Haskell; earn state berth

The Farwell Steers made history Saturday; they won the first regional basketball championship in the city's history.

The Steers, 30-6, upset the favored Haskell Indians, who finished their season at 27-6. The Class 2-A regional was played at Big Spring, Texas, before almost 400 Farwell fans.

Here's the schedule for the state tourney in Austin:

Farwell faces Edgewood, 28-8, at 10 a.m. today (Friday). That game is immediately followed by China Spring, 30-3, vs. El Maton Tidehaven, 29-6.

The winners play for the state championship at 2:30 p.m. Saturday.

The teams with the best records were seeded No. 1 and No. 2. Thus, China Spring was seeded first and Farwell second.

Then a coin was flipped to determine the third and fourth seeds. Edgewood thus became third seed and El Maton fourth. The 2nd and 3rd seeds vie, and the 1st and 4th seeds vie.

Tickets are \$4. Dolly Villarreal, high school secretary, was expected to get in a bloc of 250 tickets this week.

The Steers, the smallest Class 2-A school in Texas (among 239), were a definite underdog.

Haskell was rated 3rd in the state, and Farwell was rated 10th.

Haskell had an almost all-senior lineup, and Farwell started three sophomores.

Haskell had been in the

state finals the year before, and Farwell hadn't made the state playoffs - in Class 1-A.

Haskell had two mobile post players at 6-4. Farwell's tallest player is 6-1.

Haskell had good depth, while the Steers had to go with their starting 5 virtually the entire game.

But Coach Larry Gregory shocked the Indians when the Steers went into a full-court press from the opening tip-off. It paid off.

The other keys to Farwell's stunning win were:

Farwell was quicker.

Strong blocking out under the boards.

Clutch shooting in the final minutes by Michael Day.

A collapsing zone defense to keep the ball from coming in to the Haskell big men. This forced Haskell to change its game plan and shoot from outside.

The Steers, with a lack of depth, stayed out of foul trouble.

As in the opening game against Bangs, Farwell hit its first three shots - one by Delgado and two by Greg Actkinson - and jumped out 6-0 before Haskell called a time-out.

After a pair of Indian buckets, Farwell surged ahead, getting baskets by Jeff Actkinson, Stewart and Monty Delgado. Haskell's shooting was ice cold as Farwell moved up from a 6-4 lead to a 13-6 lead to a 22-10 lead at the end of the first quarter.

A key to that surge was the shooting of Delgado, who canned 9 points, including a 3-pointer, in the first quarter alone.

The first part of the second saw both teams cold. Except for 2 points by both teams, there was no other scoring the first 3 1/2 minutes.

Then the Steers broke ahead again, as Day, Stewart and Jeff Actkinson connected. The Steers were up by 13 when Jeff Actkinson collected the second of his 3-point plays for the game, pushing Farwell up by 16 with a minute left. A 3-pointer at the halftime buzzer brought Haskell back to within 12.

The third quarter showed both teams scoring, Haskell coming on. Missed free throws by the Steers contributed to the narrowing gap, as the quarter ended with Farwell up by 8 - 52-44.

While Haskell's shooting was poor from the outside throughout the first half, the

Indians started hitting in the third quarter. And it picked up even more in the final period.

Farwell went cold and didn't score the first four minutes of the final period. Meanwhile, Haskell chipped away, scoring 4 points from the charity stripe. The Indians crept to within 2 before Day hit a key shot and Jeff Actkinson followed with 2 free throws, to move Farwell up 56-50.

Two quick 3-pointers by Haskell tied the score. Day put Farwell up 58-56, and Haskell tied it again.

Then Day hit again, at 1:19. Farwell was up 60-58. Haskell missed a chance to

tie and the Steer fast break was on. With 33 seconds left, Delgado flipped a beautiful pass to Greg Actkinson under the basket for a layup. He was fouled on the play and made the free throw. It was now 63-58, and was the end to the

scoring. Scoring for Farwell were: Delgado, 13; Stewart, 12; Jeff Actkinson, 14; Day, 15, and Greg Actkinson, 9. Also contributing with some strong defense was Curtis Chisom.

## Steers beat Bangs

The Farwell Steers hurdled their way into the regional finals with an 84-76 win over the Bangs Dragons last Friday at Big Spring.

The win hiked the Steers' record to 29-5. Bangs finished at 22-12.

The game, played at Howard College, was highlighted by the usual display of brilliant teamwork on the part of Farwell. And excellent free throw shooting was a key, also.

The Steers' lack of depth was heightened due to the absence of sixth man Dustin Hardage, who was ill. However, it didn't prevent the Steers from pressing much of the game.

Scoring were: Jeff Actkinson, 21 (including 9 of 10 free throws); Michael Day, 12; Curtis Chisom, 2; Greg Actkinson, 21; Shawn Stewart, 14, and Monty Delgado, 14.

Farwell collected five 3-pointers - 2 each from Day and Jeff Actkinson, and 1 from Delgado.

The game opened with a tally by Jeff Actkinson off the tip-off. The Steers hit their first three shots, the others coming from Greg Actkinson and Day. After Bangs scored twice, a layup by Delgado off a fast break moved Farwell up 8-4 at 5:20.

Bangs took the lead early in the second quarter as Farwell started to press full court. Down by 4, Jeff Actkinson hit a crucial 3-pointer. Then, after a Delgado score, Stewart's bucket put Farwell up 25-24 - and the Steers were never headed.

Moments later, Greg Actkinson scored a 3-point play as Farwell began climbing ahead. Farwell moved up by 9, but late Bangs buckets closed the gap to 35-30 at the buzzer.

Farwell was in minor foul trouble as Delgado and Stewart both got 2 fouls called on them in the first half. But Greg Actkinson and Stewart were particularly strong on the boards to help Farwell into the lead.

In the third quarter, Bangs was hitting well but a pair of baskets by Greg Actkinson kept Farwell up. Then brother Jeff took over, with a pair of free throws followed by a 3-point play. Farwell also got points from Day, Delgado and Chisom as the quarter ended with the Steers clinging to a 54-48 lead.

Key rebounds by Greg Actkinson helped break the game open in the fourth period. Two minutes into the quarter, the Steers were up 62-51 as the teams began trading baskets.

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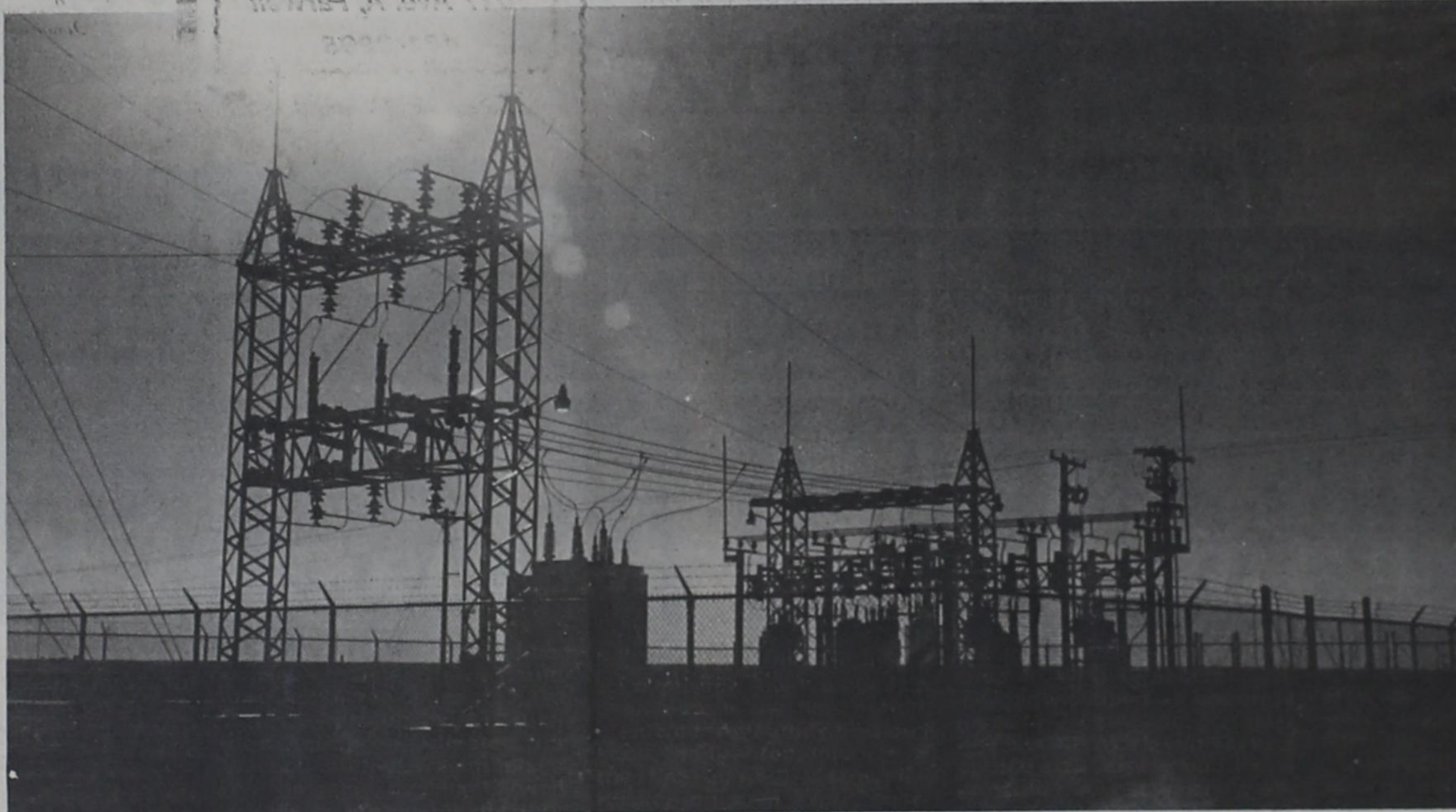

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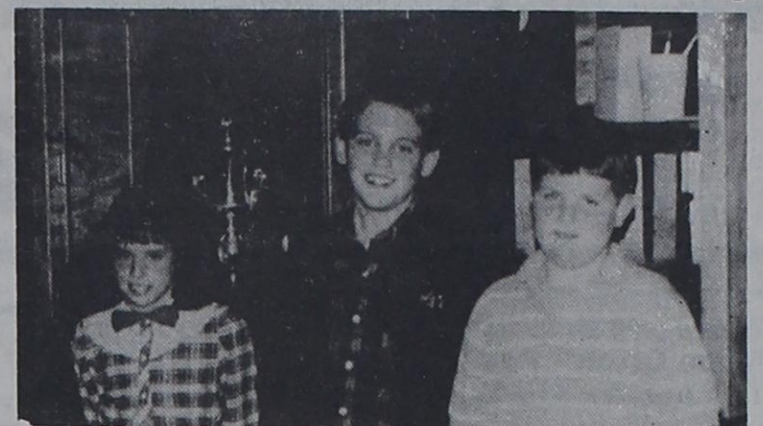

## County residents oppose divvying up school fund

A group of 15 Farmer County residents opposed to the divvying up of the Permanent School Fund met informally with County Judge Porter Roberts March 2 at the courthouse.

On Feb. 13, the Farmer County Commissioners had voted 3-1 to disperse the fund, which currently holds \$982,000, among the four county school districts.

The money has to be used either for permanent improvements or to pay off bonded indebtedness.

In favor of dispersing the money were commissioners Tom Ware, Ernest Anthony and Robert White. Opposed was Raymond McGehee. Although Roberts has the right to vote on the commissioners court, he normally only votes in case of a tie.

When the question of dividing up the money originally surfaced three years ago, the commissioners had voted 3-2 not to do so. Opposed to the division at that time were McGehee, Anthony and Roberts. For it were White and then-Bovina commissioner Tommy Williams. That vote was taken at the request of Friona Schools.

Last month, Anthony said he had spent several weeks polling constituents on their position and concluded that the majority favored divvying up the fund.

At last week's meeting, folks from Farwell, Lazbuddie, Rhea, Bovina and Friona ar-

reas, questioned whether the commissioners had followed the law correctly in voting the division.

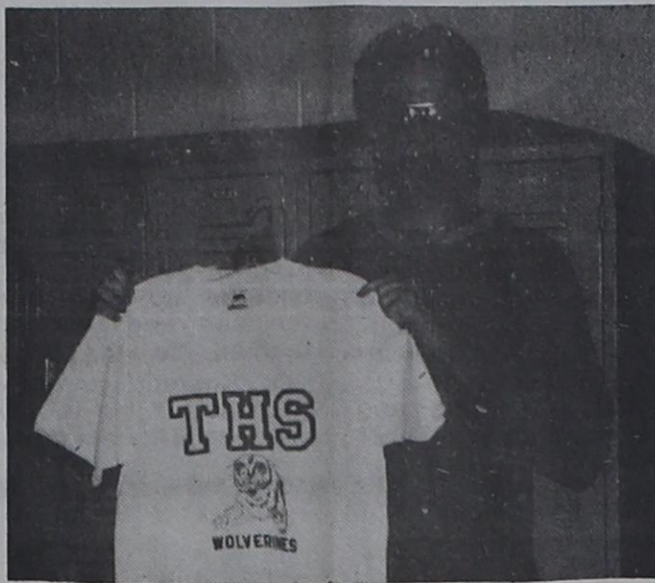
They plan to get a legal opinion on it. In question is the fact that the vote was taken without the school districts formally submitting plans on how they would use the money.

Those present felt that the county was "killing the goose that laid the golden egg." In the last 14 years, interest from the account had totalled more than \$1 million in interest, which is given to the four school districts each year.

The commissioners still have not yet approved the formula for the fund's division. It has to be done on a "scholastic" basis - the school districts must take a census to find out how many persons are eligible to attend their schools. After these numbers are gathered, and plans formulated on how to spend the windfall, then the schools would return with that information to the commissioners.

The fund roughly would be divided like this: Friona, 51%; Farwell and Bovina, 19% each; and Lazbuddie, 11%.

The county plans to keep \$10,000 in the account after the rest of the money is distributed. As this accumulates interest and reaches the \$25,000 mark, then the total above \$10,000 would be distributed in the future.

## GED classes start

Classes for preparation for the General Educational Development high school equivalency exam as well as English and government classes to satisfy permanent residency and citizenship requirements are being taught on Mondays from 7 - 10 p.m. at Farwell High School.

Two aides have been added to the program since it started last fall. Lupe Saenz is assisting with the GED class, and Julieta Garza is helping with the English and Government classes.

The classes have been serving about 30 people. It is not too late to join one of these classes because the students work at their own pace.

The Immigration and Naturalization Service has certain requirements which can be satisfied by attending the ESL class at Farwell High School. Participants are given pertinent information as it is made available by the government.
