Farwell buys fire truck

It was Mike Camp to the rescue at Tuesday's Farwell City Council meeting.

The special meeting had been called to decide whether to buy a new fire truck. Two previous meetings had been cancelled when not all the councilmen showed up. This time everyone was there.

A sticky point in the discussion was reached when councilman Prentice Mills wanted to know how much the city's insurance cost would climb if a new truck was bought. He was concerned it might add \$10,000 or more.

Camp operates Town & Country Insurance in Farwell, which has the city's insurance contract.

So Jimmy Curtis, assistant fire chief who was present at the meeting, was asked to call Camp and find out exactly. Camp wasn't home so Curtis took off in his pickup to try to find him.

Curtis found Camp at the pens, and Camp rushed back to his office to check the statistics. Meanwhile, the council sat quietly waiting.

When Camp got to the meeting, he was able to report that the extra cost would be about \$1,000 a year. So the council was able to figure out a debt schedule to handle the purchase without worrying about needing more funds.

The council unanimously voted to buy a pumper truck from Daco, Lubbock, for \$127,-975. In addition, the fireboys will spend about \$5,000 for some upgrading in addition to what was included in the bid

Greg Howard's No. 3 in the U.S.

Greg Howard had a tough time deciding where to harvest corn for the irrigated division of the National Corn Yield Contest last fall, because the corn in the entire section looked to be extremely uniform.

In the end, the strip he entered in the contest, sponsored by the National Corn Growers Association, yielded an impressive 15,612.8 pounds (278.8 bushels) per acre. That yield was the best in Texas, and third best in the United States last year.

But even more impressive, Howard believes, was that the entire circle averaged nearly as much, at about 15,600 pounds (278.57 bushels).

"It was the best yield I've ever had, which was surprising considering the hot, windy weather season we had," he said. Greg, his brother Mark, and father W.D. (Dub), produce corn and a few sugar beets on seven center pivot irrigated sections on either side of the Texas - New Mexico border.

Texico cleanup group buys planter box flowers

The Texico Cleanup Committee met April 18 to continue planning for another year of beautification.

Recently, the Texico Chamber of Commerce put planter boxes near City Hall, Mr. Marcos, Citizens Bank and Crossroads Motel. These businesses agreed to water the flowers to be placed in them.

Mae Stone was charged with the task of getting red geraniums and junipers and/or evergreens for planting in the boxes. The cost is expected to be about \$130. The committee has raised \$479 so far.

"Our average for the whole farm was about 13,300 pounds (237.5 bushels) per acre," said Greg. His winning hybrid was Pioneer ® brand 3162.

Howard said after the wind stopped blowing and it cooled off a little, there were a lot of people who thought the corn crop wouldn't amount to much last year.


His center pivots are equipped with water conserving low pressure drop nozzles. "We didn't have more than 2 inches of rain all summer, so we irrigated more than ever. I put on 29 acre inches of water in all," he said.

Howard used anhydrous, knifed-in prior to planting, and liquid 10-34-0 applied with the planter, to feed his crop. "In total, we put 280 pounds of actual nitrogen on the corn. We also fertilized with dry broadcast applications of phosphate, sulfur, magnesium and zinc, based on soil test results."

For weed control, he applied Atrazine in a 10 inch band over the row and cultivated twice. "Cultivation also helps water infiltration, so we feel it helps to make our irrigation efforts more effective."

In the fall prior to planting, he chisel plowed the field in preparation for planting corn. In the spring, he schiseled again, injecting anhydrous at the same time, disked twice and planted, at a rate of 35,000 seeds per acre.

Howard said the only thing he'd do differently with his contest corn is harvest earlier. "We didn't get in to harvest the corn until mid-October, and it was very dry. We had a little header loss because of that."
