What will '94 be like?

Well, it's time to look ahead to the New Year - 1994.

What will it bring? Overall, as usual, I'm optimistic.

The economy seems to be rebounding, according to statistics of the number of Americans working. But as I've written, the more important statistic concerns their income - and the government doesn't promote that stat, with good reason.

Large companies will continue to "downsize" (I hate that word) in 1994, causing a continued decline of the middle class as those folks losing well-paid jobs will get part-time work as clerks, etc.

But as I said, I'm optimistic. In the long run, things should work out, as the government is forced into playing a larger role in supplementing workers' salaries, such as through national health care.

It will be the second year of Bill Clinton's presidency, and I don't see any major changes coming, other than what already is being pushed. It will be a year of peace in the U.S., although companies will wage war on the international economic front.

Speaking of the international front, that's where things are a bit less stable.

I figure the war in Bosnia will ground to a halt, and that's good. I'm not happy about what has been happening there. Some of those folks should be considered war criminals for the atrocities that have been committed there, but it will be difficult bringing them to justice. They may get away with their crimes now, but God knows...

It will be a tough year in Israel and Palestine, as both sides grapple with the new "peace agreement." Palestine will continue pushing for more land, and Israel will be reluctant to give it. It won't be fun there.

There are good chances for peace in Ireland and South Africa in 1994. And that's good.

But the one place that really worries me is Russia. The U.S. is making light of the recent parliamentary elections there that put the right-wingers in front, since the new constitution gives enough power to the president (Boris Yeltsin) to overcome any parliamentary opposition.

It's a sign, though, of the reaction to the hardships imposed by the transformation of Soviet society from Communism to democracy. And it doesn't bode well.

You have to remember that virtually every Russian citizen has never lived under anything else except Communism for his or her entire adult life. You don't just understand democratic concepts overnight. If you are taught to blindly follow for your whole life, under threat of punishment for doing otherwise, you don't become a leader quickly.

So I'm afraid that the popular shift back toward a dictatorship in Russia will continue - and that spells trouble for the U.S. Those folks still have a lot of nuclear capability, and a fascist leader wouldn't be afraid to use it. Remember what Hitler did?

Oops! In the Tribune's article about the trip that Rev. Rick Sullivan took to Brazil we said that the population of the country is mostly in the northern highlands. After looking at a map it is obvious that the population is located mostly around Rio, which is located on a delta in the southern part of the country.

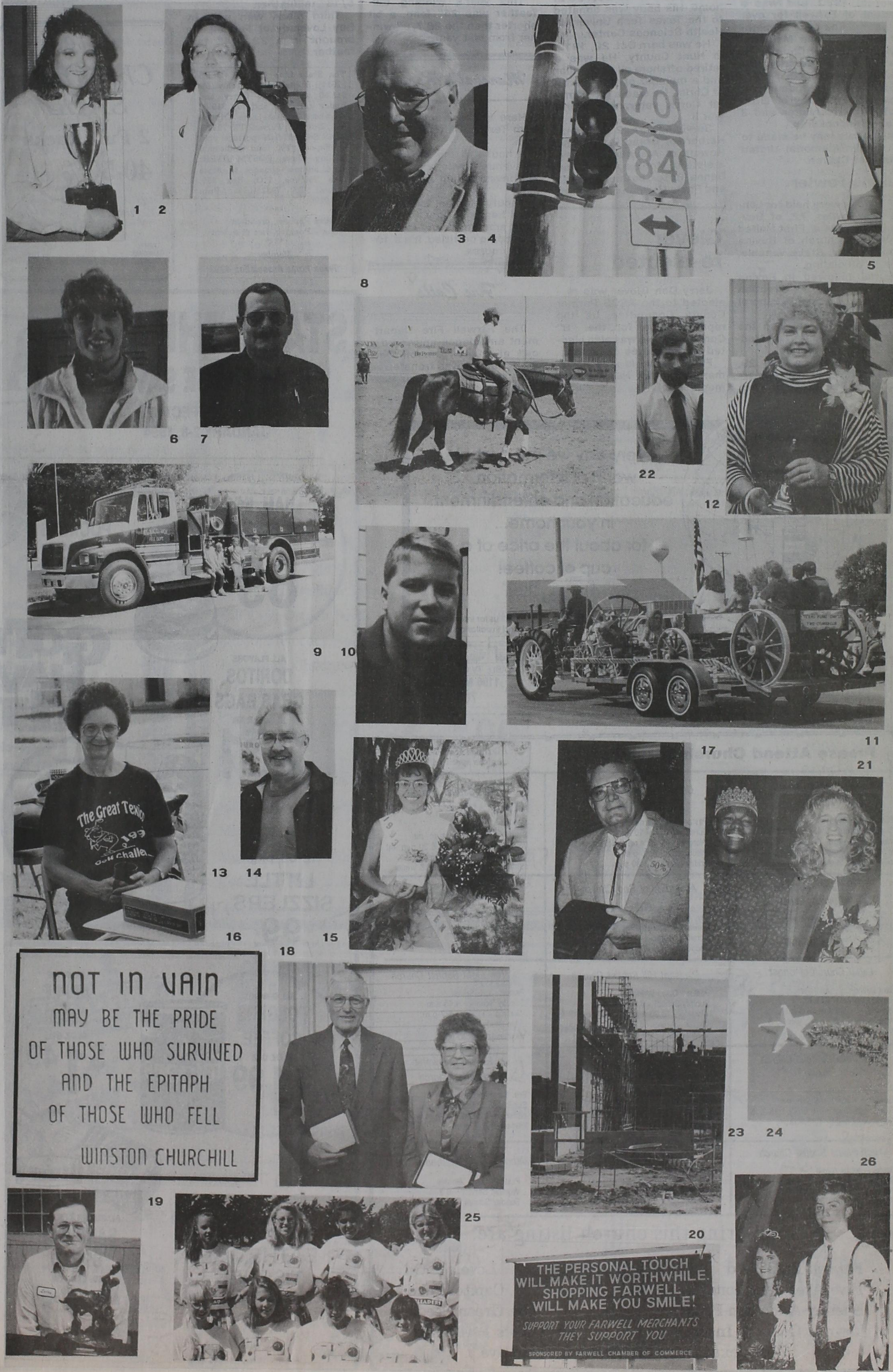

Tuesday is Texico deadline

Jan. 4 - Tuesday - is the date for Texico candidates to file for office.

It had been incorrectly reported in the Tribune two weeks ago that the deadline was Jan. 8.

Three posts are on the ballot - the mayor's spot, held by Butch Sharp; and two council posts, held by Max Winkles and Oran Jay Autrey. Autrey said he plans to run again.

Tharp and Winkles said they are not running.

Persons interested in these posts must be registered at their current addresses. Also, when they sign up at Texico City Hall (during regular business hours Tuesday) as candidates, they must have a certified copy of their voter registration.

If no one signs up for the post held by Winkles, then the council will appoint someone to that position.

If no one signs up for the mayor's post, then Sharp remains mayor until he resigns. When that occurs, the council appoints a new mayor to serve until the next election.

Warren to run for district clerk on GOP ticket

Sandra Warren, of Oklahoma Lane, announced Wednesday she will seek the post of Parmer County District Clerk on the Republican ticket.

She is the first candidate to announce on the GOP side. Marjorie Watkins, incumbent district clerk, is seeking reelection on the Democratic ticket.

Parmer County GOP Chairman Phil Garrett believes Mrs. Warren will be the only GOP candidate to announce by Monday's deadline.

Mrs. Warren and her husband, Alan, have two children, Bailey, 5, and Aaron, 2.

She worked in the District Clerk's office for seven years. Currently, she is employed in the Extension Office where she works with the local entomologist that serves Parmer and Bailey county farmers.

"I know I can bring to the District Clerk's office professionalism and dignity," said Mrs. Warren. "All people having business with this office will be treated with courtesy. Your support in the upcoming primary and general election will be appreciated and I would like to thank all the people who have already told me of their support."

Anyone interested in running for a Parmer County office needs to file their intention to run by Jan. 3. They need to file in the Parmer County clerk's office and pay a filing fee.

Besides Mrs. Warren and Mrs. Watkins, the only other candidates to announce so far are incumbents: Bonnie Clayton, county judge; Louise Hancock, Justice of the Peace, Farwell area; Bonnie Warren, county clerk; Jack Young, District Court judge; Anne Norton, county treasurer; Raymond McGehee, county commissioner, Lazbuddie area; and Tom Ware, county commissioner, Bovina area.

Candidates interested in running on a partisan ballot also need to file their intention to run for office with the county chairman of their political party.

Parmer County Democrat Party Chairman Wendol Christian said all the incumbents have made their intentions known to him. He said he has had some inquiries from other potential candidates who have not held office before. So far, none of those folks have filed.

Beef prices' forecast given

Consumers can look forward to slightly lower retail beef prices in 1994, thanks to ample supplies of beef and other meats. "Increased beef and poultry production will cause 1994 retail beef prices to drop 1% to 2% from the \$2.95 average in 1993," said Jim Gill, market director for the Texas Cattle Feeders Association (TCFA) in Amarillo.

"Beef production in 1994 will be near 24.2 billion pounds, 2% above the record production of 23.9 billion pounds in 1993. This will be the seventh consecutive year of record

beef production, putting per - capita beef consumption at 67.2 lbs. retail weight for 1994," he said.

"Pork and poultry will continue to offer stiff competition for beef prices," he predicted. "For 1994, pork production is forecast to exceed 23 billion pounds, compared to 22.1 billion pounds in 1993- the 19th consecutive year of production increases."

For cattlemen, Gill predicted that fed cattle prices will trade in a narrow range in 1994. He estimated first quarter prices will range from \$72 to \$76 per cwt.; \$74-\$78 in the second quarter; \$70 to \$74 in the third quarter; and \$73 to \$76 in the fourth quarter.

Cattlemen's big concern in 1994 is feed prices. Gill said corn production for 1993 will be near 6.5 billion bushels, down sharply from the record 9.5 billion bushels in 1992.

Grain sorghum production is also down to 620 million bushels, a sharp decrease from 884 million bushels in 1992.

"Corn prices during the first half of 1994 will average higher than the \$5.05 per cwt. in 1993, but may trend lower in the second half due to larger plantings," he said. "The same trend will be seen in grain sorghum, with first - half prices higher than the \$4.41 average for 1993, but breaking lower in late summer and early fall."

With increasing feed costs, cattle feeders are not expected to be aggressive bidders for feeder cattle in 1994. Feeder steers weighing 650 lbs. will likely average \$87 to \$89 per cwt. in 1994, down slightly from the \$89 average in 1993, Gill predicted.

However, feeder cattle supplies should grow slightly, he said. "Feeder cattle supplies will continue to increase slowly as the beef cow inventory gradually grows," he said. "On Jan. 1, 1994, the beef cow inventory will be near 34.5 million, about 2% higher than a year ago. Slow growth to around 36.5 million is anticipated by 1996-97. Along with the larger cow herd, calf crops are expected to trend slightly higher."
