Art prospers

From wife Judy: Recently, I read a quotation by a fellow named John Naisbitt. He said: "Mass production and mass consumerism have contributed to a decline in artisanship and the transmission of culturally valued crafts from generation to generation."

But there are many folks out there who do some terrific art work. And they also teach their skills to their children.

I wonder if Mr. Naisbitt has been to an arts and crafts show recently. There are some fantastic crafts being done, and some of them are being done at very reasonable prices so many people can enjoy them. Today the average American can have artistic items in their homes which only the rich could have owned in other generations.

Modern artisans take advantage of improved tools, patterns, molds, and materials. They can copy outlines of their favorite designs easily and cheaply. And, they can watch skilled role models demonstrate their techniques on videos.

Machine-made component parts simplify many arts and crafts projects. A clock or a music box, which would have only been made by a very skilled artisan in the past, may now be purchased ready made and added to a craft item. This encourages ordinary people to attempt difficult projects.

Lace, for instance, was once woven by hand using up to 100 bobbins filled with thread at one time. Each thread was twisted and knotted into place using a very exacting pattern. It was very expensive, and it was used only by the very rich and very clever. Today machine-made lace can be purchased at a much cheaper cost than it was in the past, and added to many arts and crafts projects.

Things that ordinary Americans take for granted were once very, very rare because only a few people had the skill and the interest and the time to manufacture artistic items. That is still true today in some respects, but more people have the opportunity to try today.

What may have changed is the fact that some culturally valued crafts are now shared by the world instead of one culture. Who among us has failed to see the beauty of an Italian Renaissance painting or a 10th century French stained glass window?

The decline in artisanship that Nesbitt bemoans isn't quite accurate. Ordinary people are able to achieve higher levels of accomplishment today than every before. Their production of beautiful artifacts has increased dramatically.

What has decreased is the financial benefit for the truly gifted artist to achieve beyond the level of ordinary artisans today. There are very few patrons of the arts left in the world today.

I attended the estate sale at Carl Davis' home recently.

Mystery solved

It's a story almost out of "Unsolved Mysteries." And it happened in Farwell.

The story began six years ago when Peggy Goetsch, of Farwell, was playing volleyball at the city park. She took off her diamond wedding ring and put it in her jeans before playing.

Afterward, she discovered the ring missing. She and her husband, Mike, got a metal detector and went over the park but were unable to locate it.

Now to the present:

Clint Tidenberg, a Clovis resident who retired as area manager for the Gas Company of New Mexico, goes metal detecting as a hobby. In early October, he was practicing his hobby at the Farwell City Park - and came across a diamond wedding ring buried about two inches beneath the grass. He found it a few feet north of the basketball court.

He called the Tribune and asked us to put a small note in the paper. We did, putting this note in "The Latest" - "Some old rings have been found in Farwell's city park by a metal detector fella. They may have been lost for quite some time. If you can identify them please send a note to the Tribune."

The note appeared in the Tribune's Oct. 8 issue. Colleen Stover, a friend of Peggy's, spotted it first and called Peggy, knowing that she had lost her wedding ring years before.

Peggy immediately brought over detailed information about the ring to the Tribune. But it couldn't be confirmed quickly because Tidenberg had gone on vacation to Nevada for a couple of weeks.

Tidenberg returned Oct. 21, and we called him, reading the information that Peggy had given us. It matched perfectly. We gave the good news to Peggy, a legal secretary at the firm of Aldridge, Aycock & Actkinson (next door to the Tribune), and she also talked with Tidenberg.

The next day Tidenberg went to his safety deposit box to get the expensive ring, which he had cleaned at LaRue Jewelry. Then he brought it to Farwell where it was reunited with its very happy owner. And that night Peggy surprised her husband with the good news.

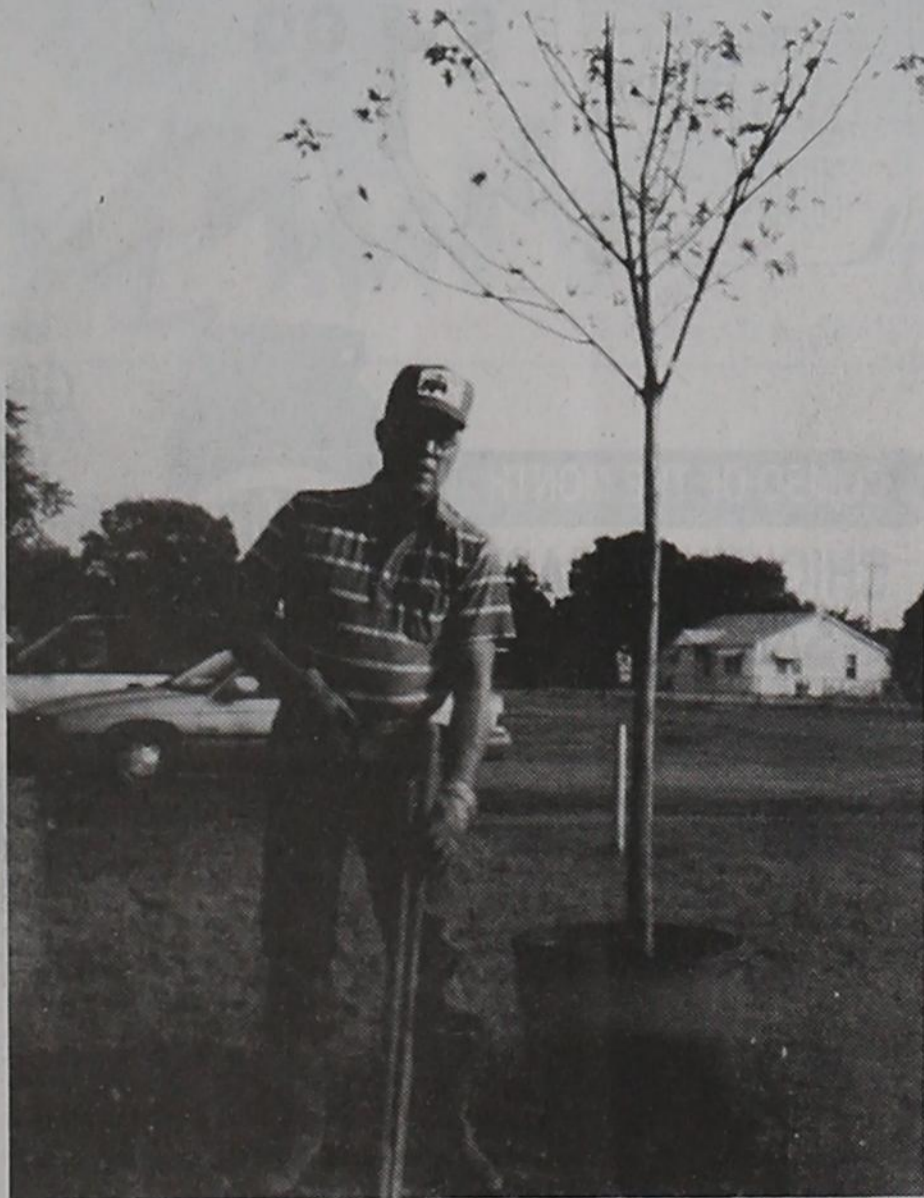
Tidenberg is well known to a lot of Parmer County folks. He graduated from Bovina High School in 1949. Over the past few years, he often visited the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club meetings.

He took up metal detecting as a hobby a couple of years ago. He and two friends go out together often with their metal detectors - Cal Trice, retired Clovis school superintendent, and Charles Dodson, of Clovis, who is the father of Farwell's Sherry Christian.

The trio often makes a day of it, going to parks, playgrounds, old abandoned houses, etc. They always try to get permission first.

"You never know what you'll find," said Tidenberg. He listed bullets, rings, jewelry, coins, plus junk like pull tabs and bottle caps. He said the men area careful not to make a mess while doing their hobby, even to the point of bringing with aprons to put trash in.

Tidenberg said Peggy's ring was the first diamond ring he had found. He has also found two silver rings, a wedding band and lots of coins. After Border Town Days, he and his friends came up with about \$10 in coins in the park, including a Canadian dollar.

Winning the second place cash prize of \$5 was Mrs. Hart, who was 40 off the tie breaker.

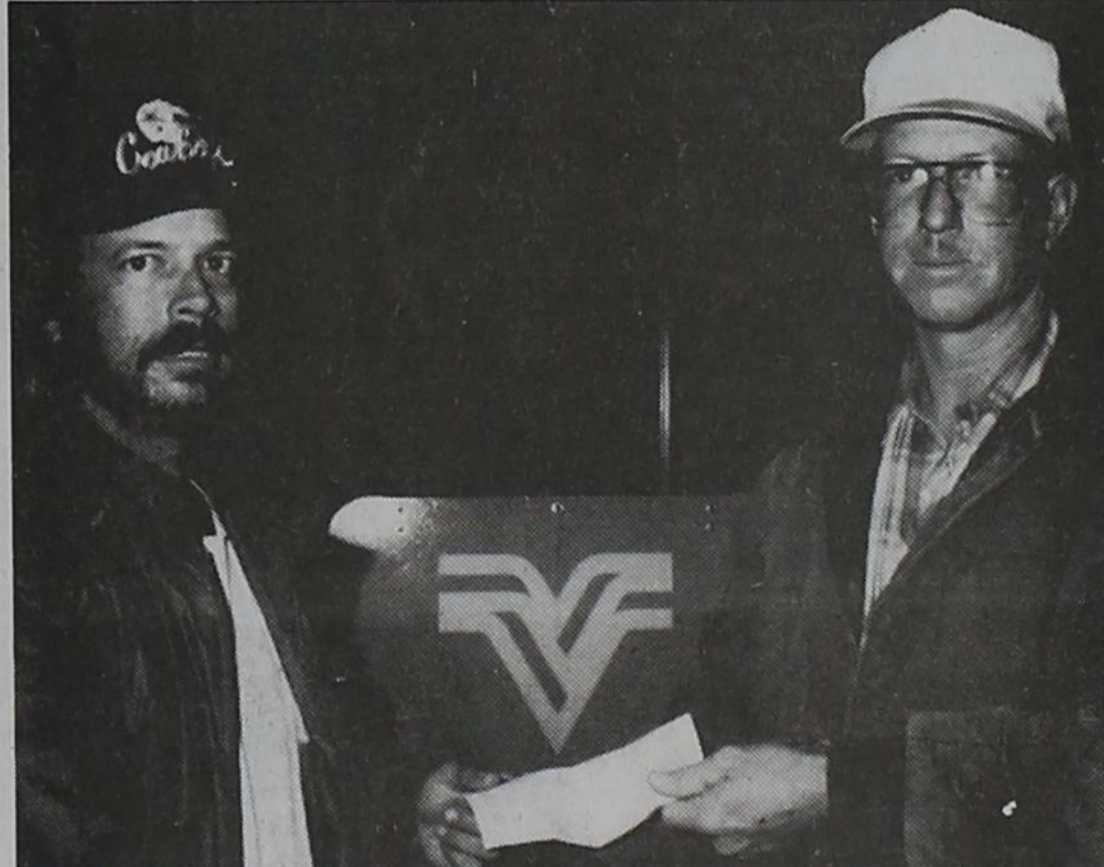

Constitutional amendments proposed

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. - 7 p.m. throughout Parmer County for the Nov. 2 election.

On Election Day, the polling places will be:

101, Calvary Baptist Church in Friona; 201, Bovina EMS Building; 202, Friona Community Center; 203 Rhea Community Center; 301, Farwell Community Center, 302, Oklahoma Lane Methodist Church, 303, Bovina Ridgelea School; 401, Lazbuddie School; 402, Friona Fire Station.

The Texas Press Association sent the following information about the 18 proposed constitutional amendments which will appear on Texas' Nov. 2 ballot. They are summarized below:

HJR 3 - Relating to clearing land titles by relinquishing and releasing any claim of sovereign ownership or title to interests in certain counties.

HJR 21 - Abolishing the office of county surveyor in Jackson County.

HJR 22 - Abolishing the office of county surveyor in McLennan County.

HJR 23 - Relating to the denial of bail on certain persons charged with certain violent or sexual offenses.

HJR 37 - Providing for the abolishment of the office of county surveyor.

HJR 57 - Relating to repealing the constitutional provision limiting the consideration for which stocks and bonds of a corporation may be issued.

HJR 86 - Relating to the exemption from ad valorem taxation of real and personal property used primarily for the control of air, water or land pollution.

SJR 4 - Authorizing the issuance of state general obligation bonds to assist school districts in financing facilities and repealing the authorization of certain state revenue bonds guaranteed by the permanent school fund.

SJR 7 - Authorizing ad valorem taxation by county education districts.

SJR 9 - Authorizing the Legislature to provide for the issuance of bonds for the state financing of start-up costs for historically underutilized businesses.

SJR 13 - Relating to adding the Texas State Technical College System to certain constitutionally dedicated funding for public institutions of higher education.

SJR 18 - Authorizing the Legislature to prescribe the qualifications of sheriffs.

SJR 19 - Relating to modifying the provisions for the redemption of real property sold at a tax sale.

SJR 31 - Relating to the duties of trustees of local public pension systems.

SJR 34 - Relating to bonds issued to augment the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund, to fund the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund II, and to provide financial assistance to veterans of the state.

SJR 44 - Providing for an increase in the principal amount of bonds for the support of the Texas agricultural fund that may be

The Lazbuddie Longhorns overwhelmed Whitharral 50-26 last Friday. Lazbuddie, 6-2 overall and 2-1 in district, hosts Silverton tonight (Friday) at 7:30 p.m.

Lazbuddie put away the game early against Whitharral, taking a 24-6 lead at the end of the first quarter and increasing the margin to 32-6 at halftime. At the end of three quarters, it was 42-13 before Whitharral scored two TDs in the final stanza to Lazbuddie's one.

A lot of Lazbuddie players got a chance to play. And Matt Elliott, had a 37- yard field goal in the third quarter, his first of the season.

Among the area 6 Man teams, Lazbuddie is 2nd on team offense, averaging 409.5 yards a game. It's not listed among the top 10 on defense.

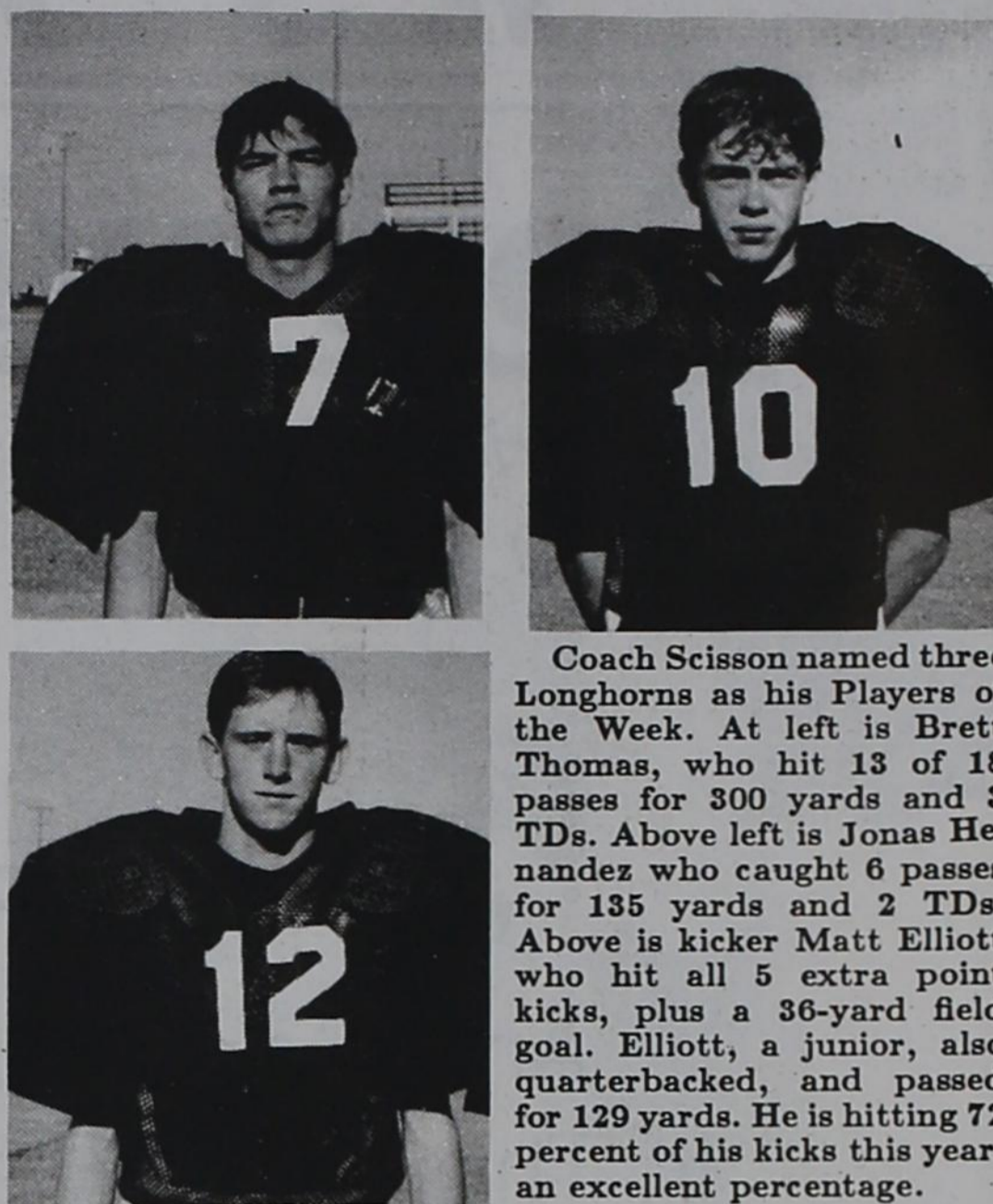

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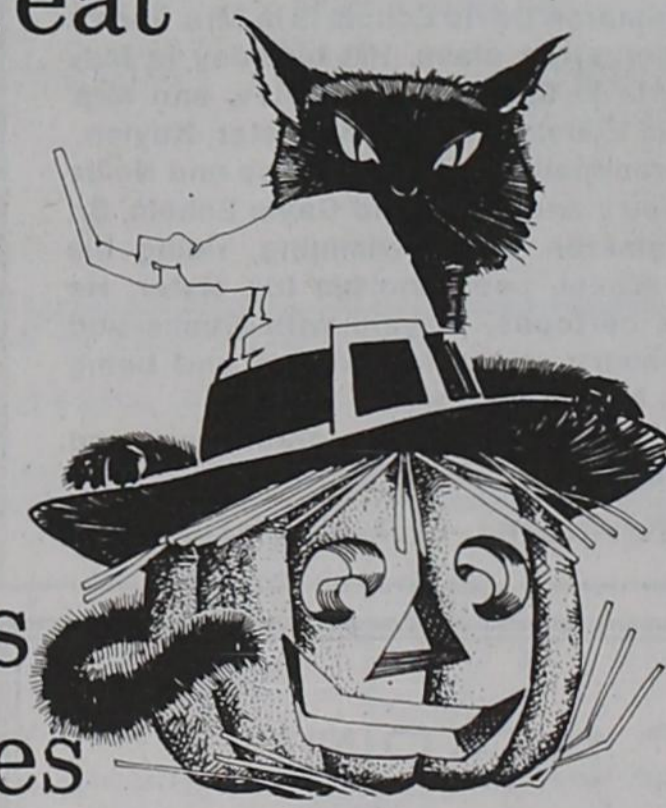
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Steers nip Bovina in last minute

It was probably one of the most miraculous finishes in Farwell Steers' football history last Friday, when Farwell stopped the Bovina Mustangs, 18-12.

With Bovina ahead 12-3 late in the final period, it appeared it would be a happy Homecoming for the Mustangs. But it was one of those games where "the breaks" played a big part, and Farwell capitalized on them.

Both teams entered the game without a win on the season. Bovina played very well and it certainly looked like they would be the victor. Farwell was handicapped because its top running back, Brent Harrison, couldn't play due to a leg injury. However, two other starters, Justin Mahaney and Brock Anderson, were back in the lineup after missing last week's game due to injuries.

Farwell is now 1-3 in district and 1-7 overall. They play at Hart tonight (Friday) at 7:30 p.m., then wrap up the season by hosting Kress next weekend.

The game opened with Bovina kicking off. Farwell was held and punted to midfield. But Farwell kept the ball when an unsportsmanlike conduct call was made against Bovina. Again Farwell couldn't move the ball and punted to the Mustang 13.

On defense, Anderson had a pair of good tackles. Bovina punted - but a roughing the kicker penalty gave the ball back to the Mustangs at the Steer 38. Kip Atwell had a good tackle. Nash Armstrong tackled a receiver who caught a pass at the Steer 11. Another pass put Bovina at the 1. And at 3:49 of the first period, Bovina scored. The pass for extra points was broken up by Jeremy Ortiz and it was 6-0.

Blaze Hardage had a good return of the kick to the Steer 35. On its first place, Farwell lost a fumble at its 30. Mahaney had a good tackle, then Armstrong intercepted at the Steer 37 as the first quarter ended.

Penalties helped stall the Steer advance and Bovina took over. On defense, Derrick Haseloff had a good tackle as Bovina was held and punted to the Steer 45.

Farwell's offense began moving. Anderson gained 6, then ran for 24. Farwell stalled on the Bovina 10 and Lupe Garza kicked a 27-yard field goal at 5:22 to close the margin to 6-3.

Farwell kicked to the Bovina 22, as Steve Miller tackled the receiver. Hardage had a good tackle. But a long run by the Bovina QB put the ball at the Steer 36. On 4th and 7, Bovina made a first down. But then on a 4th and 1 play, Bovina was stopped on a combined tackle by Armstrong and Ortiz. Farwell took over at its 16. The half ended soon after.

Farwell kicked to the Bovina 27 to open the third quarter. A Mahaney tackle caused a 4-yard loss. Michael Phillips had a good tackle, forcing a Bovina punt. But the Mustang snap on 4th down was bad and Phillips tackled the kicker at the Mustang 18. Bovina put up a stout defense and a Steer run on 4th and 5 failed up the middle.

Bovina was held and punted. Hardage returned it to the Mustang 35. Runs by Anderson and Haseloff got a first down at the Bovina 23. Then Hardage gained a first down at the 9. Farwell was held and Garza tried another 27-yard field goal, which was wide.

After Haseloff broke up a pass, Anderson intercepted near midfield, but Farwell lost a fumble at the Bovina 40. Bovina was held and punted to the Steer 33 as the fourth quarter started.

Anderson broke loose for 25. In Bovina territory, the Steers went for it on 4th and 9 but a pass failed. Bovina hit a pass play good for 54 yards, before Haseloff knocked the receiver

out of bounds. Mahaney and Phillips had good tackles but Bovina scored on a 4th and 6 play at 7:54. The pass for extra points failed and it was 12-3.

Anderson returned the kick to the Steer 26. Bovina intercepted a long pass and returned it to the Steer 44, Hardage on the tackle. Michael Foster had a good tackle. Bovina attempted to punt but another bad snap gave Farwell the ball at the Mustang 17.

Runs by Haseloff and Anderson gained a first down, before Haseloff bulled over from the 1 for a TD at 4:22. Anderson ran for the extra points and Farwell was down 12-11.

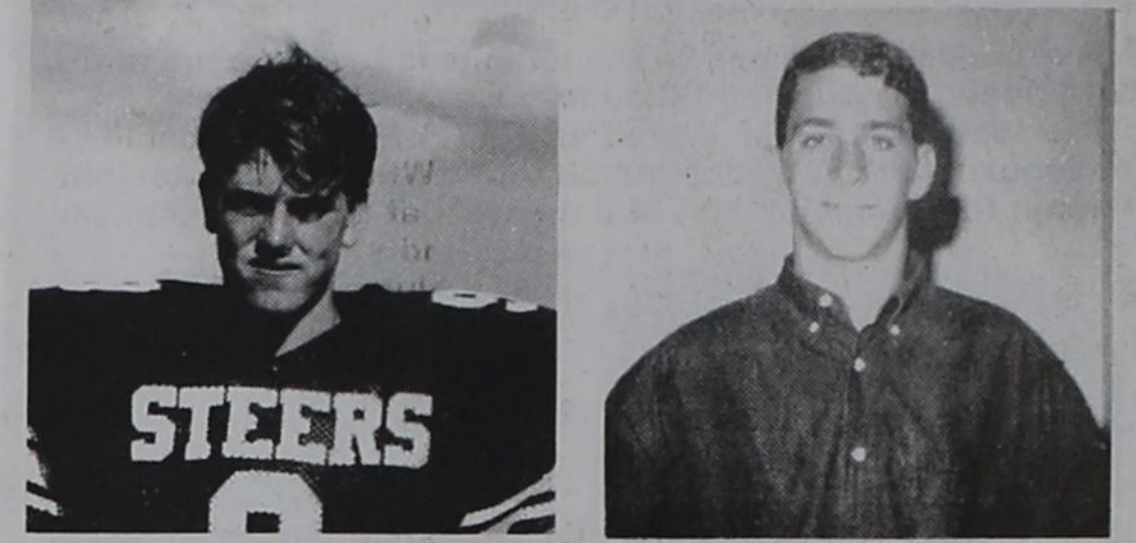

Farwell kicked to the Bovina 20, where Anderson had a good tackle. The Bovina quarterback broke loose on a keeper around end to score an apparent 80-yard TD run - which was called back due to a clipping penalty. 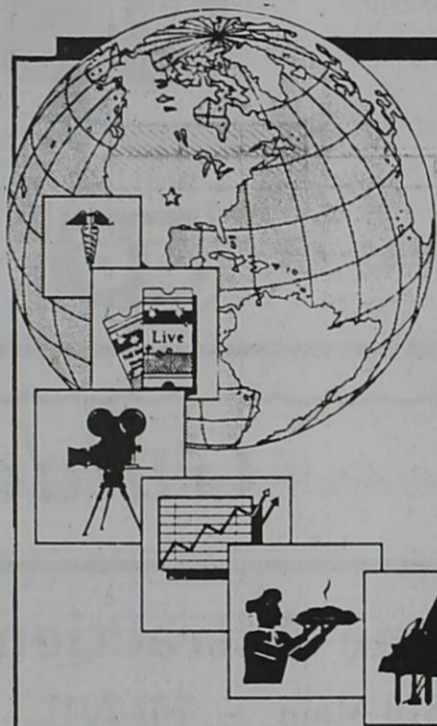
