TCAO deserves credit

I would like to congratulate the Texico Community Activities Organization on getting the state grant of \$200,000 for a new community center.

The TCAO is an excellent example of citizens working for the betterment of their community.

It took nearly three years before the TCAO got this project funded. But they stuck with it. And meetings TCAO members attended in Santa Fe before legislative committees were a key to their victory.

At first, I didn't think the TCAO had much of a chance to get a grant for a community center, since the state's "wish list" is normally topped by water and sewer projects.

But when the state showed a huge surplus and a lot of projects were being funded, I hoped Texico stood a chance. And it did.

The TCAO doesn't have a lot of members, but, as is often the case, a group works harder when it just has a few members.

Folks should learn from what the TCAO accomplished: Citizens can make a difference.

As always, I enjoyed attending the annual Friona Chamber of Commerce banquet Saturday night.

It has a real vibrancy.

There are 166 Chamber members and that's an excellent total. It tells me how active this group is.

What really was great this year was hearing Ken Wyatt, an outstanding after-dinner speaker. The quips he made tickled everyone's funny bone.

The theme of this year's banquet was "Friona - the Economic Heartbeat of Parmer County." And the placemats followed that theme, listing several of the pluses of that area. Some examples were:

- Hi-Pro Feeds, 65 employees; Excel Corporation, 1,714 employees; and Friona School District, 90 employees.

- The Parmer County Community Hospital has 35 beds. The Friona Rural Health Clinic has 3 doctors and a physician's assistant.

Also given out at the banquet was a referral guide to Friona businesses and services. It was very well done.

I'd like to congratulate the Friona Chamber - it's obviously a hard-working and successful organization.

Some odds and ends that may be food for thought:

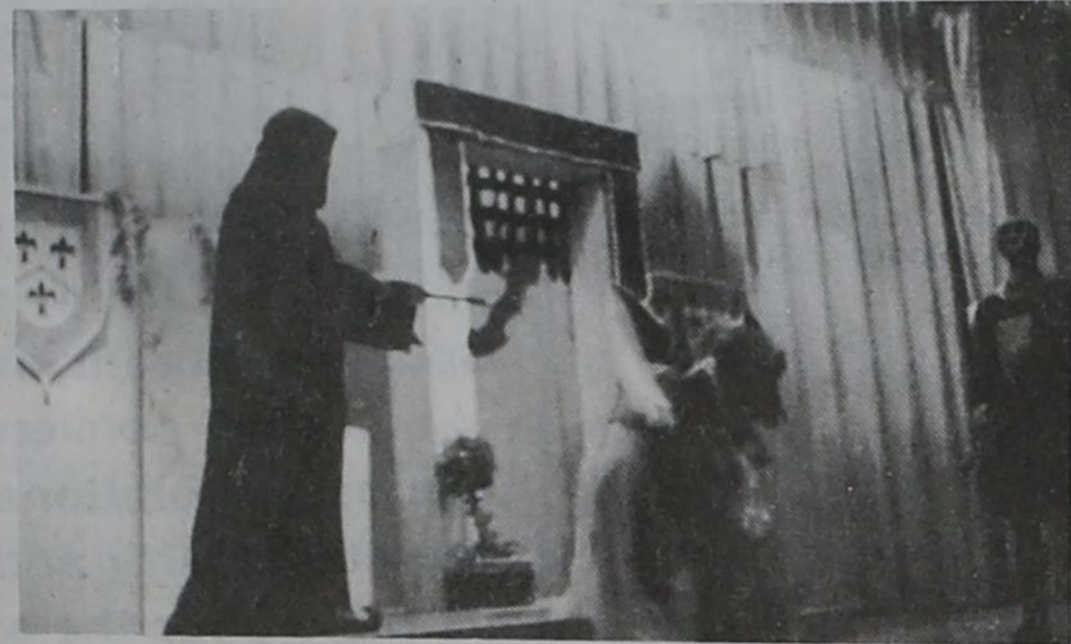

Easter Pageant to be performed

The Texico-Farwell Community Easter Pageant, "Sacrifice of Glory," will be performed by a combined choir and orchestra made up of members of several local churches.

The hour-long musical, directed by Randy Anderson, will be performed twice on Palm Sunday, March 27 - at 6:30 p.m. at Farwell High School and at 7 p.m. mst at the First Baptist Church of Texico.

Pre-concert music will be provided by a choir directed by Farwell Band director Pat Henry. Many of those who participate in the pre-concert music are Farwell High School choir members.

The setting of "Sacrifice of Glory," is the Apostle Peter's prison cell. He writes of the events of Jesus' life, death, and resurrection from the perspective of an eye-witness to these miraculous events.

The story is brought to life through exciting choral and orchestral arrangements as well as the moving drama of the life of Peter, played by Texico resident Glenn Keim.

In addition to the choir and instrumental ensemble, the musical will feature the solo abilities of several community residents including Lillie Christian, Ricky Rice, Lora Hill, Chuck Tipton, Randy Egan, Carl Goettsch and Karen Austin.

- Needs an operator for the municipal pool this summer, if interested, contact Sharp.

- Heard Fire Chief Lewis Cooper suggest that four more hydrant plugs be placed along Anderson Street after the new well is completed.

- Discussed buying property south of the city property along Griffin Street (across the street from KKR Park). This property will be the site for the new Texico Community Center and the city would like a larger area for parking. City Attorney Duane Hamar will contact property owners involved.

- Discussed appointing a committee to plan for the new \$200,000 community center. The council wants it to be a communitywide venture. If interested in serving on the committee, contact Sharp.

- Heard city employee Matt Meeks report on recent water quality tests at KKR Park. No traces of carbon tet were found. Some other chemicals were found in the tests but they were well within the safety limits.

- Purchased a used pickup from state surplus properties.

- Held an executive session to discuss possible pending litigation.

- Received a report on Lions Park. Weed killer has been put down. It will be seeded again in April by the Texico-Farwell Lions Club.

- Heard councilwoman Carolyn Burrows report on the Curry County Crime Stoppers, of which she is a member. Fund-raisers are planned.

- Heard councilman Ronnie Warmuth report on a state meeting he attended.

No one files for Farwell City Council

Farwell City Council

Nobody - that's right, nobody - filed for the three Farwell City Council seats in the upcoming election.

Incumbents Martin Kube, Royce Bethel and James Chadwick did not file for re-election.

Write-in candidates have until 5 p.m. on April 7 to sign up for a spot on the ballot.

City Clerk Cynthia Thigpen said if no one files for election by April 7, a special election will be scheduled. If at least one person files for election by April 7, the City Council may appoint persons to the other open positions, and no special election is needed.

Farwell School Board

There will be a contest for the Farwell School Board as four candidates signed up for three posts.

Mike Woods, and incumbents Steve Kaltwasser, Katherine White and Teresa Ancira had filed for re-election.

Hospital District Board

There will be four positions on the ballot for the Farwell Hospital Board.

They are currently held by Frances Kube, Troy Christian, Bert Williams, and Tom Nichols.

Signing up for them were Peggy Sudderth and incumbents Troy Christian, Bert Williams and Tom Nichols.

Incumbent Frances Kube is not seeking re-election.

Lazbuddie School Board

There will be three seats open on the Lazbuddie School Board.

Tommy Martin and incumbents Gail Morris and Randy Thomas filed.

Incumbent Bobby Redwine didn't file.

Write-in candidates may file for election until 5 p.m. on April 7.

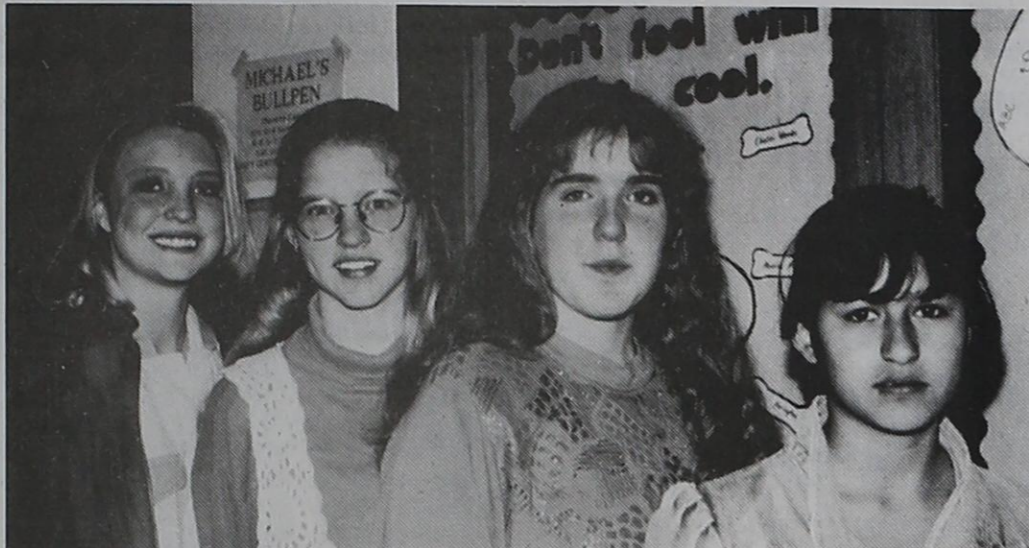

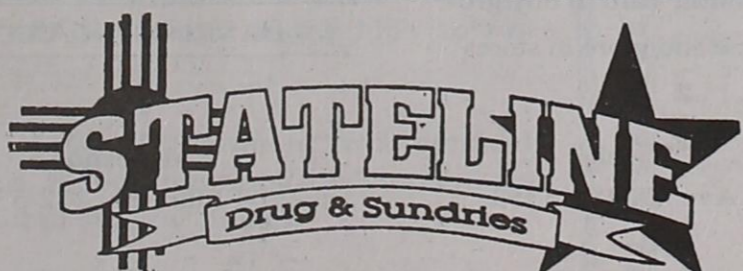
In 1972, the National Center for Health Statistics noted that the number of deaths reported due to household chemicals in children was 216. In 1990, that number was 49 - a 77 percent decline.

Adults may jokingly comment that children can more easily open "child-resistant" containers than they can. However, the Consumer Product Safety Commission's act requiring child-resistant packaging on aspirin products reduced the number of deaths in children attributed to aspirin from 46 in 1972 to only 1 in 1990.

Child-resistant packaging should always be used properly. Products, such as over the counter and prescription medications, required to be in special packaging should never be transferred to other containers.

If you have trouble opening child-resistant containers, and have no small children in your home, just ask for "easy open" closures from your pharmacist.

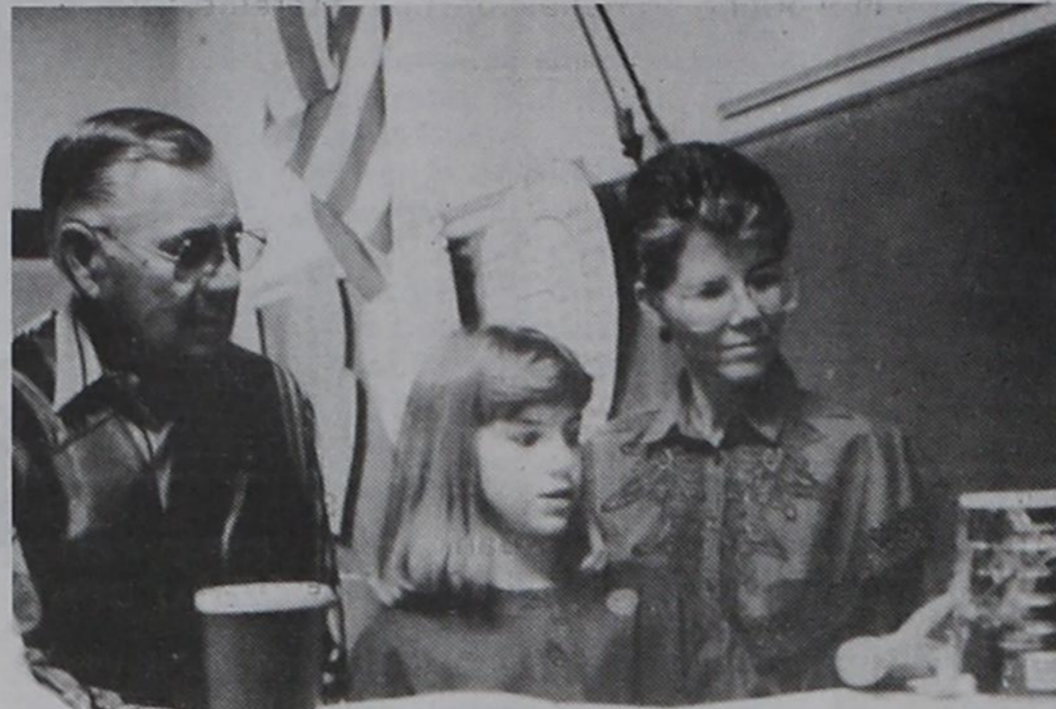

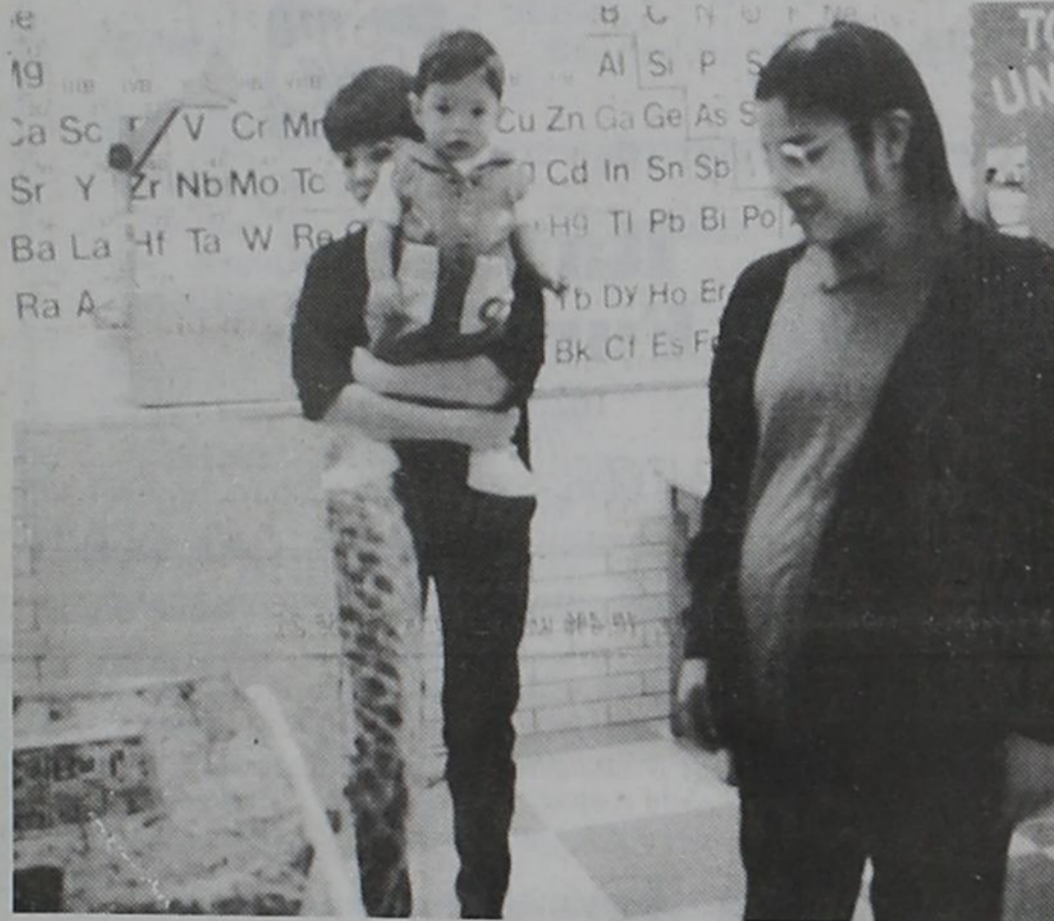

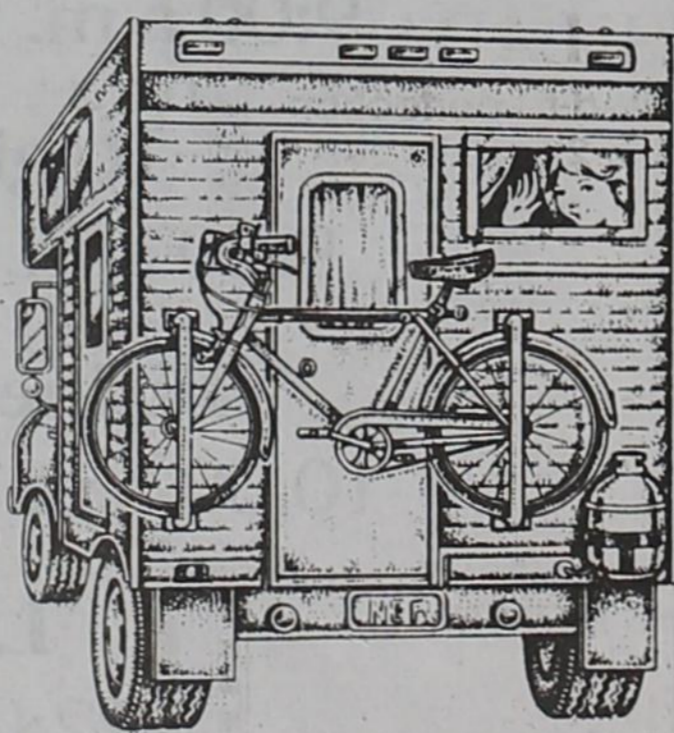

The Chief's Corner

Brady Bill info given

Farwell Police Chief Roy McGaa reports the following information about the Brady Bill. He'll have more information about it later, too.

- A licensed gun dealer is required to contact the Chief Law Enforcement Officer (CLEO) of the purchaser's residence. If the purchaser lives in the city limits, that means the Chief of Police or his designated officer. Outside the city limits, it's the Sheriff of the county, or his designated officer.

- The five day waiting period starts when the CLEO is contacted by the gun dealer. Only business days are counted.

- The gun dealer does not have to wait five days to sell the handgun if he is contacted by the CLEO prior to the end of five days. For example, if the gun dealer sends a fax of the intent to purchase, filled out by the purchaser, to the CLEO and the CLEO telephones the dealer the same day, then the dealer may sell the handgun to the purchaser on the first day.

- The CLEO is prohibited by law from keeping copies of records of firearm transactions for more than 20 days. Also prohibited is the starting of any files or records based on information received from a firearm transaction. The exception to this is when a person is turned down based on a records check.

Recipe of Week

Caramel Apples

4 -5 medium apples
wooden sticks
2 pkg. (14 oz. each) caramels
water
chopped peanuts

Wash and dry apples. Insert a popsicle stick into each. Unwrap 1 package of caramels and add 2 Tbs. of water. Microwave on high 2 1/2 - 3 minutes or until smooth, stirring after each minute. Dip each apple into the hot caramel sauce, turning each apple until it is coated. Place on waxed paper and cool in the refrigerator for an hour or so.

Repeat the process to add a second layer of caramel sauce.

Roll in chopped peanuts when second layer cools.

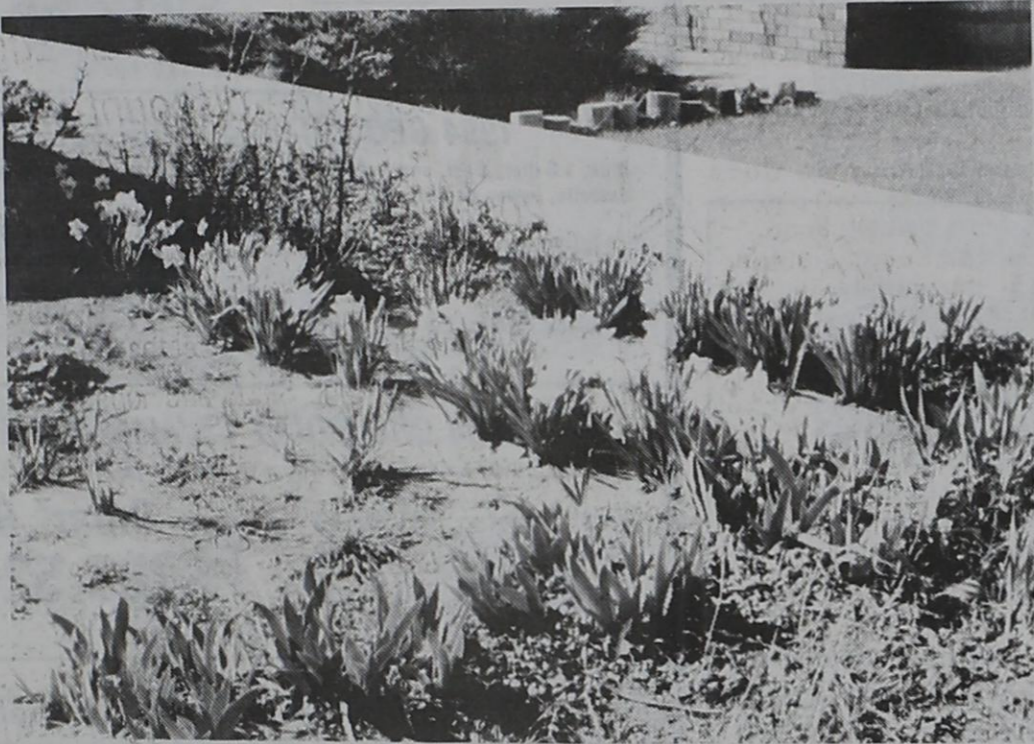
The concert is sponsored by the Farwell Convalescent Center Auxiliary as a fundraiser.

Thursday, April 7, 1994, is the day to register children for next year's Farwell kindergarten and pre-kindergarten / Head Start classes. Registration will take place in the Elementary Library Thursday, April 7, from 1:00 - 4:00 p.m.

All children who will be four and five years of age by September 1st and live in the Farwell School District need to register for next year's classes.

Pre-K / Head Start requirements

To be eligible, a child must be 4 years old prior to September 1st, is unable to speak or comprehend the English language, or is from a family whose income, according to standards set by the State Board of Education, is at or below subsistence level (eligible for free or reduced-price lunches) and is a resident of the Farwell School District.

Head Start requires proof of participants meeting Federal Income Guidelines so income verification, such as check stubs, should also be available for review. Verification or other types of public assistance should also be available for review.

Head Start also extends its services to handicapped children. Texas school districts are required to provide Pre-K if 15 or more students are identified.


