Howard Farms is recognized as one of the top farming operations in this area. W.D. "Dub" Howard and his wife, Beth, started their farm here in 1954. Together with their sons and their families, they farm areas straight north of Farwell and southeast of Clovis.
Son Mark and wife Robin have two children, Bryce and Mason. Son Greg and wife Roberta have two children, also, Melissa and Brett.
The Howards specialize in food corn, sugar beets and, just recently, apples. They are well-known for the top-notch quality of their produce year after year.
Dub Howard, who was recognized as the Agriculturalist of the Year by the Farwell Chamber of Commerce in 1990, has seen several major changes in farming over the years;
-- Machinery has gotten a lot bigger.
-- 48 inch row farming has now become 22 inch row farming. This results in less evaporation, and means that using less water creates better yields.
-- Row irrigation has given way to sprinklers. Howard had one of the first sprinklers in this area when he put one in his fields in 1966. As for the future of corn farming, Howard says this will depend on the water supply. Conservation is essential.
