Agriculture celebrated

A guest column today, from the Texas Farm Bureau:


The contributions Texas agriculture has made to preserve and nurture our environment will be celebrated during National Agriculture Week March 16-22.

The concern for the environment, which is so strong throughout urban America, is equally reflected in the agricultural sector. Just as urban families recycle glass, newspapers and aluminum cans, farmers are recycling chemical containers, feed bags and food by-products.

In Texas agriculture, however, the concern for the environment goes well beyond recycling programs. There are satellite seminars dealing with air quality and programs dealing with how to prevent soil erosion. Dozens of agricultural associations and groups have created programs and seminars to deal with environmental needs in areas such as air quality, water quality and soil erosion.

Technology has given farmers and ranchers effective tools to protect the environment. Farmers are practicing contour farming and planting crops around hillsides instead of up and down, to keep soil from washing away. About 26 million acres of U.S. farmland are managed this way by farmers.

U.S. agriculture has also re-

Judge allows Gustin to be in UIL contest

U.S. District Judge Mary Lou Robinson agreed Monday to issue a temporary restraining order in Charlie Gustin's favor against the Farwell School District pending the settlement of his court action.

The request was made last Friday by the American Civil Liberties Union, the attorneys for Mary and Donnie Gustin, of Farwell. Their son, Charlie, a Farwell High senior, has refused to go along with the school district's new drug testing policy for students participating in extra-curricular activities, saying it was unconstitutional.

On Monday, the judge held a telephone discussion with attorneys on both sides.

Judge Robinson's order says the Farwell Schools cannot use its procedures to prohibit Charlie from being a stage hand in the One-Act Play or from participating in UIL computer science competition, and he cannot be barred from graduation ceremonies.

A court date on the lawsuit has been set for October. Farwell's suit may be heard at the same time as a similar suit against the Tulia School District. Farwell's drug testing policy was modeled after Tulia.

Charlie had said he expected earlier to have a prominent role in the One-Act play. He will not compete in the UIL math competition. He is expected to be on the school computer science team in UIL competition.

In the Gustins' motion to seek the temporary restraining order, it's noted that Charlie ranks 3rd in his class and is active in extra-curricular activities. The suit claims the drug testing procedures violates Charlie's rights under the Fourth Amendment; that the testing procedures weren't adopted to

"No, you certainly didn't. I observed the whole ridiculous ritual and I know for a fact that you chased three ashes and missed every one of them."

address any drug related discipline problems within the Farwell Schools; and were not adopted based on any suspicion of drug use by Farwell students during school or any school related functions.

The Gustin's motion further claims that irreparable injury was caused because Charlie had been withheld from participation in extra curricular activities, losing a lead role in the UIL play; and that the Farwell Schools' interest in preserving order in its school is clearly outweighed by Charlie's constitutional rights.

The motion goes on to claim that Farwell Schools have "shown no evidence of its compelling need to conduct mass, suspicionless and degrading searches for drugs because there are no major drug problems at Farwell High School. On the other hand, Charlie has proven himself to be a responsible and extraordinary student at Farwell High who should not have to undergo a humiliating drug test to prove he has committed no crime."

In the Gustins' brief, submitted along with the motion seeking the temporary restraining order, their attorney discusses the U.S. Supreme Court's decision (the Veronia decision) to allow drug testing of student athletes. The Gustins' brief argues there are substantial differences in the circumstances involving athletes vs. students in extra-curricular activities.

The Gustins' brief says that during the Farwell High School principal's five year tenure, there have only been two drug related disciplinary problems and both involved the same student. The brief further says that Charlie, "an excellent student with a 4.06 grade point average who is very active in school activities, has never had any disciplinary problems at school. He has never given school officials any reason to suspect that he uses drugs at school or during school related activities. Neither have any of the other students involved in extracurricular activities had any drug related disciplinary problems or given school officials any reason to suspect that they are using drugs at school or during school related activities."

Much of the Gustin's brief focuses on the Veronia School District decision that the Supreme Court ruled on (involving the athletes) and says that school district was addressing a student athlete drug problem of epidemic proportions. "Applying the Veronia balancing test, it is clear that the (Farwell) search is unreasonable and hence unconstitutional under the Fourth Amendment," it states.


Martin and his wife, Wynona, have lived and farmed in Parmer County for many years.

-- Heard Tharp report that he attended a Mayor's Coalition meeting in Santa Fe recently on highway improvements throughout the state.


Very little was achieved. The governor didn't attend and very few state legislators showed up.

Dub Howard, who was recognized as the Agriculturalist of the Year by the Farwell Chamber of Commerce in 1990, has seen several major changes in farming over the years;


-- Machinery has gotten a lot bigger.

CRP decision time nears

CRP sign-up-15 has been announced by the Secretary of Agriculture, and will be conducted through March 28, 1997. All signatures must be present on the CRP-1 (contract) by the close of business March 28, in order for the offers to be submitted for National Ranking.

Parmer County NRCS office personnel will be working with FSA personnel at the FSA office location throughout the 15th CRP sign-up period to assist you in making your offer (bid).

Offers (bids) will be made by tract, rather than by farm number. All eligible offers are scored by local NRCS personnel according to the ranking factors of the national ranking plan. County FSA offices will calculate the maximum rental rate (formerly called the bid cap) for each offer before the participant submits the offer. In order to be accepted, eligible bids will be ranked at the National level, not by the local FSA/NRCS offices.

Due to the short sign-up period and the number of producers wanting to sign-up into the conservation reserve program, all interested parties should contact the Parmer County FSA Office for an appointment immediately at (806) 481-3311. CAT Insurance coverage is the minimum coverage offered by FCIC that will qualify you for USDA program benefits. In 1997, coverage with CAT will be equal to 50% of your approved APH at 60% of the established price. Only CAT coverage may be purchased at the Parmer County FSA Office. However, either CAT coverage or additional coverage insurance may be purchased by your local multi-peril insurance agent. The final date to obtain insurance (CAT) is March 17, 1997 for canning beans, cotton, corn, dry beans, grain sorghum, hybrid sorghum seed, potatoes, soybeans, sugar beets and sunflowers. March 17th is also the final date to cancel insurance on any of the above listed crops.




And laughter?

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
