3rd place, Jarrod Franse, a color TV.

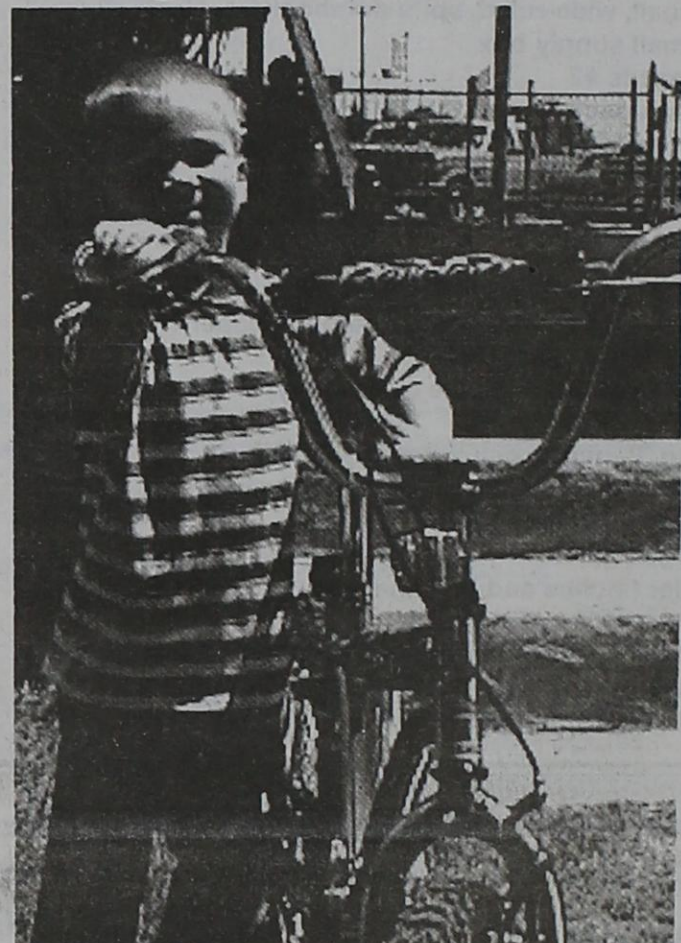
Antique Tractor

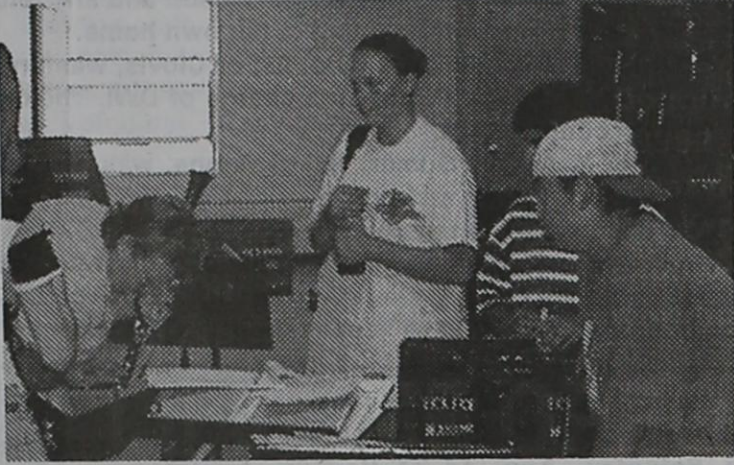

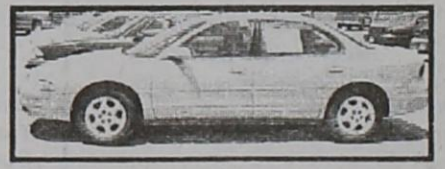

Farmers: Be on the lookout for greenbugs

South Plains farmers should keep a close eye out for greenbugs in their grain sorghum crop, said a Texas Agricultural Extension Service integrated pest management agent. "Overall, grain sorghum insect counts have been relatively

low in recent weeks, but producers should keep an eye on their crop," said Johnna L. Patterson, Extension integrated pest management agent for Castro and Lamb Counties "With the wide range of grain sorghum planting dates we've seen this year, infestations of insect such as greenbugs probably will vary considerably."

ing lodging after plants reach the boot stage."

The best way to scout for greenbugs is to examine at least 40 randomly-selected plants per field each week. Greenbugs will not be evenly distributed in a field, so it is wise to examine plants from all parts of a field. Try to avoid examining only plants along the field border, Patterson said.

That's what is great about Texico-Farwell -- we pull our weight!

Greenbugs are aphids that damage sorghum plants by sucking out plant juices. They also damage plants by injecting a toxin while feeding. Adult greenbugs are light green in color, about one-sixteenth of an inch long and have a darker green stripe down their back.

These winged and wingless pests also have small stalks (cornicles), or tail pipes, protruding from their posterior. The tips of the cornicles and the tips of their legs (farthest from the body) are black, the agent said.

"Female greenbugs produce living young (nymphs) without mating. Under optimum conditions, greenbugs can complete a full life cycle in only seven days. Each female can produce up to 80 offspring during a 25-day period," Patterson added, "They feed in colonies on the underside of leaves and leave behind a substance called honey dew. Sorghum in the seedling, boot or heading stage will be most affected by greenbug feeding."

"Infested plants will have reddish colored leaf spots - caused by the toxin greenbugs inject while feeding. Damaged leaves will turn from green to yellow to brown as they die. Larger plants are more tolerant of greenbugs, but they can reduce the crop's yield potential - especially during booting, flowering and grain development. the extent of yield loss hinges on greenbug number, ho long they have been feeding and overall plant health. They can also reduce yield by caus-

A Teacher

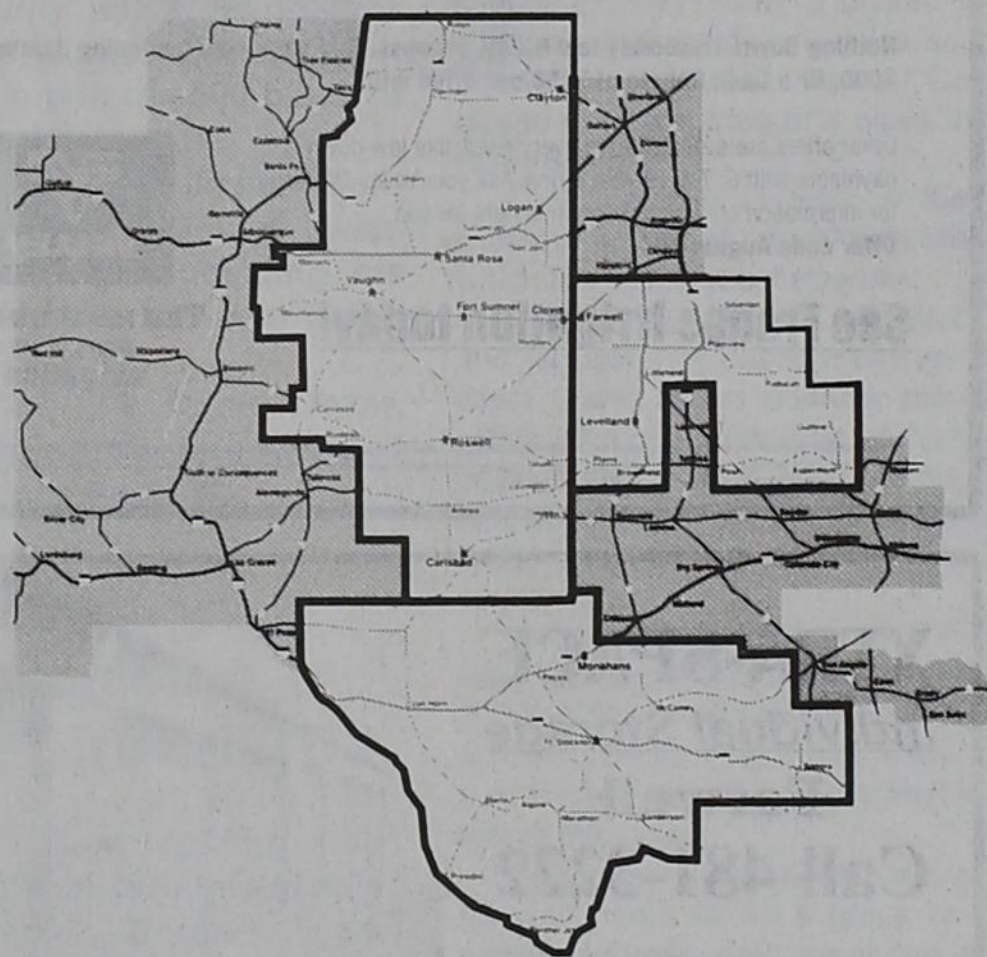
Once I had a teacher named Mrs. Franse

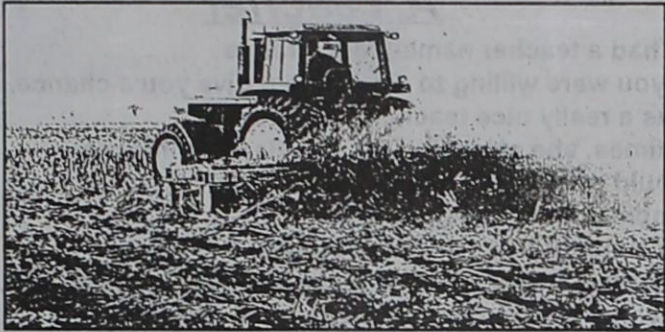

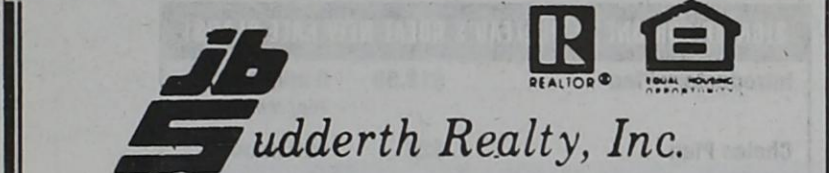

CONTESTED CASE HEARING. The TNRCC may grant a contested
 case hearing on this application if a written hearing request is filed within
 30 days from the date of newspaper publication of this notice. The Ex-
 ecutive Director may approve the application unless a written request for
 a contested case hearing is filed within 30 days after newspaper publica-
 tion of this notice.

To request a contested case hearing, you must submit the following:
 (1) your name (or for a group or association, an official representative),
 mailing address, daytime phone number, and fax number, if any; (2) ap-
 plicant's name and permit number; (3) the statement "[I/we] request a
 contested case hearing;" (4) a brief and specific description of how you
 would be affected by the application in a way not common to the general
 public; and (5) the location and distance of your property relative to the
 proposed activity. You may also submit your proposed adjustments to the
 application or permit which would satisfy your concerns. Requests for a
 contested case hearing must be submitted in writing to the Office of the
 Chief Clerk at the address provided in the information section below. If a
 hearing request is filed, the Executive Director will not issue the permit
 and will forward the application and hearing request to the TNRCC
 Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission hearing

 scheduled Commission meeting. If a contested hearing is held, it will be a
 legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in state district court.

Many people limit the study
 of their investments to watch-
 ing market values fluctuate.
 But if you want to know WHY
 your stock or mutual fund per-
 forms the way it does, check
 out its semiannual or annual
 report.

First, look for the report to
 shareholders. This is a "state
 of the company" address by
 the CEO or president explain-
 ing to you, a shareholder and
 owner of the business, events
 that influences your com-
 pany's performance in the past
 year.

This report typically relates
 economic and political condi-
 tions to your investment, at-
 tempts to explain why the mar-
 ket reacted the way it did, and
 compares your investment's
 performance to that of similar
 investments.

Reports to shareholders not
 only review past and current
 conditions, they also discuss
 circumstances that may affect
 your investment's future per-
 formance. These valuable dis-
 cussions allow you to evaluate
 the reasoning and thought
 process of management.

In a mutual fund report, the
 statement of investments pro-
 vides a detailed list of financial
 holdings, organized by asset
 category: common stocks,
 corporate bonds, government
 securities, etc. These catego-
 ries are further divided by in-
 dustry. Here you can see the
 names of all the individual se-
 curities, the number of shares
 held and the market values at
 the end of the reporting period.
 This section reveals exactly
 what you own and illustrates
 the diversification you enjoy
 from your investment.

Similarly, company annual
 reports include a section
 called "Products and Subsidi-
 ary Business." Here you can
 see the diversity of your com-
 pany's products, and you may
 even discover profitable sub-
 sidiaries you might not have
 been aware of.

Finally, look for the per-
 formance summary. This sec-
 tion provides the dollars and
 cents on company perform-
 ance and investment value.
 Mutual fund annual reports of-
 fer an easy-to-read summary of
 their average annual and cu-
 mulative total returns over dif-
 ferent time periods. Typically,
 there's also a line graph com-
 paring your fund's perform-
 ance against one of the widely
 accepted benchmark indexes.

Annual reports are a must-
 read for any investor serious
 about financial success.
