Texico Chamber presents awards

Lazbuddie interactive TV set up

A "celebration event" was held at Lazbuddie School on April 13 to herald the interative TV classroom.

Lazbuddie is part of the "FACT" (Five Area Communi-Telecommunications) consortium.

Also participating are South Plains College, Region 17 Service Center in Lubbock, and Threeway, Sudan, Olton, Springlake-Earth and Muleshoe schools.

Starting this summer, students at each of those schools can take some college and/or high school classes that have the teachers at other schools.

Lazbuddie's new interactive TV classroom has seats for 18 students, each with his own computer.

There are two large TV screens. One monitors the classroom; the other originates from where the teacher

At each seat is a microphone and a push button that allows the TV to zoom in on the student. Also in the classroom is an ultra-sensitive microphone that can pick up virtually anything being said.

This summer, Sudan Schools will offer a history class, and Olton Schools will offer college algebra through the program.

That means any students in the other high schools can take those classes -- while staying in their own communities.

For the fall, South Plains College will offer over a dozen classes through the project, including English, speech, algebra, art history, history, psychology and "marriage and the family."

This means that Lazbuddie students will now be able to take college-level courses without having to travel.

The "celebration event" on April 13 featured all the schools participating to join together and demonstrate how interactive TV works.

On hand for the event were Texas Speaker of the House Pete Laney (at Muleshoe), and Sandy Vandevender, 5 Area manager.

At each school were the superintendents and school board members, plus teachers and media.

Some background on how the program got under way was given. It was begun for former Five Area Telephone Cooperative manager Hubert Kidd and the area school superintendents.





Here is a poem that describes our Educator of the Year.



I have received several calls concerning insect and disease ridden trees. Pests, which include insects and disease, are more attracted to weak, stressed trees and shrubs. If you find these pests affecting your tree, it is commonly a secondary problem. Here are some factors that cause trees to become stressed and susceptible to secondary pests:

Court of Appeals rules Ragland reinstatement

The Associated Press reports that the New Mexico Court of Appeals has ordered the reinstatement of Randy Ragland, former assistant football coach at Texico School, who was fired in 1998.

The court on Monday overturned decisions by the Texico School Board and an independent arbitrator. The arbitrator said Ragland's use of profanity constituted insubordination.

Ragland taught at Texico for 5 years. He currently teaches at Dimmitt.

The Court of Appeals, according to the AP report, said there was substantial evidence that Ragland had a verbal confrontation with a black student and was later cautioned about using racial epithets; that he was warned to avoid "bad" language in parent-teacher conferences; and that he used unacceptable language with football team members. But the judges said insubordination must be based on a willful refusal to follow orders and there wasn't evidence of that.

There was no written policy on profanity in effect during Ragland's employment, the court said. Whatever unwritten policies existed, they were not uniformly enforced.

So the court ruled that Texico Schools violated state regulations when it gave Ragland notice less than a month later that it intended to fire him. The district didn't give Ragland enough time to correct his performance as state rules provide, the court ruled, said the AP.

It is unknown at this time whether the Texico School Board will press the case further in the legal system.

Watering -- Improper watering (or lack there of) is an important stress factor. To properly water your trees draw an imaginary line from the branch furthest from the tree to the ground. This is where the feeder roots are seeking water. Applying water directly under the tree is not reaching these feeder roots. Drip lines are not recommended for large trees.

Planting -- Further investigation of these tree problems also revealed some planting specifications that are not being met. When planting trees and shrubs be sure you or the individual doing the planting removes the tree or shrub from its container, and also removes all root ball coverings, this includes all wire and string.

Trimming -- It is also important to remember how harmful tree topping can be to your tree and take years off your tree's life span. Tree topping also exposes trees to harmful slime flux bacteria. To properly trim your trees only trim branches in the way, sprouts, limbs rubbing or growing the wrong way, and dead limbs, no topping is necessary. Taking proper care of your trees will help them remain healthy and free of pests. If you think watering is just too expensive, consider the cost of replacing your trees and the time it will take them to grow to provide adequate shade or windbreaks.




