

Plane crash claims life of Coy Plott

A crop dusting plane crashed just outside of Lariat on CR 7 and Hwy. 84 a little after 6 p.m. on Sept. 14. The plane was piloted by former Bailey County Sheriff, Coy Plott. Plott was critically injured in the crash and later died as a result of his injuries at University Medical Center in Lubbock.

The crash took place after Plott's plane hit a high watt radio tower at the end of CR 7 and Hwy. 84. The plane just cleared the home of Matt and Kayla Schilling and landed approximately 200 feet behind their backyard in their alfalfa field.

Schilling's farm employee Billy "Mack" Moore and bystander Jay Bowers were first on the scene and were able to pull Plott from the wreckage. Bowers, of Farwell, is a licensed pilot and knew exactly how to release the harness to extricate Plott. The two men were able to get him out of the plane and at a safe distance before the plane burst into flames.

The actions of these two men were nothing short of incredible. In fact the circumstances that surround the whole story after the crash took place are also incredible.

It is a sad fact that Mr. Plott died as a result of his injuries. but the coordinated efforts that took place to stabilize, treat and transport him to the University Medical Center are worthy of explanation. The simple explanation is that three community emergency response systems and several

Texas State Trooper Isabel Carrasco made the largest cash seizure in the history of the Texas Panhandle on Sunday night -- \$2.658.721

About 6:40 p.m., Carrasco stopped a truck just outside the Bovina city limits because the driver was not wearing his seat belt.

Carrasco then interviewed the driver and his co-driver and found that the stories differed, reported Parmer County Sheriff Gary Blair.

So Carrasco radioed for backup. The call was answered by Parmer County sheriff's deputy Terry Timms and Friona police officer Joe Herrera.

Carrasco then got permission from the two men, who said they were driving from Chicago to El Paso (where the truck was registered) to search the semi, said Blair. While Timms and Herrera stayed with the men, Carrasco opened up the back door of the truck. Inside the truck, he found eight cardboard boxes with the money.

Also assisting were other state troopers, Bovina police, and Justice of the Peace Vi Hutto. Then Jeff Steelman, of Bovina's First Bank, ran the cash through the money machine at his bank to ascertain the exact amount. All told, it took more than 9 hours to run the money through the machine.

Blair said the men disclaimed any knowledge of the money and signed a waiver giving it away.

After court hearings, the majority of the money will go to the Texas Department of Public Safety. But a percentage will go to the Parmer County District Attorney's office, which will distribute it to the other police agencies involved.

Blair said this was the Texas Panhandle's largest cash seizure ever. He said about \$2.6 million was seized in the Tucumcari, N.M., area, previously.

At the end of the third quarter, Jayton still had a comfortable lead, 70-54. The Longhorn scores came on runs of 13 and 43 yards by Parham.


But the Longhorns came out strong in the final period, answering with 3 touchdowns while holding Jayton scoreless.


On Sept. 16, Dusty Gee, 28, of Friona, was arrested by Texas Highway Patrol on a charge of DWI. The case is pending in county court.

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

The Texico Lady Spikers took 3rd place in the Cimarron Tournament last weekend. The team won the tournament's Sportsmanship Trophy.


The Lady Spikers are now 7-2 on the season.

Applications accepted Applications for emer-

gency farm loans caused by drought that occurred from September 1999 to the present are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency in Farwell.

Parmer County is one of 11 counties accidentally left off of the original disaster determination recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses from the drought.

FSA Manager Tom Taylor said farmers may be eligible for loans up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent.

As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible, said Taylor.

Farmers participating in the federal crop insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

The application deadline is Feb. 23, 2001.



Airplane crash

"God-sent" bystanders came together to render aid to someone in need.

The technical explanations are really not necessary to go into of the how and why's of the actions taken at the scene. Everything that could have possible been done for Mr. Plott was accomplished by three, very well trained, mostly volunteer, emergency medical technician and paramedic services. The Fire Departments were also vital in their roles at the scene.

The "God-sent" bystanders were Mack Moore, Jay Bowers and a paramedic from Lubbock named Brian Hardin, who just also happened to be passing by on the highway minutes after the crash took place. Farwell EMT Jerry Giesbrecht was the first community EMS official to arrive at the scene.

Bailey County EMS and Fire Department were dispatched by the 911 call. Farwell and Texico EMS and Fire Departments were subsequently dispatched to respond to the scene.

First to arrive were the Muleshoe and Texico units. Farwell EMS members Paul and Aloha Fulcher, Brian White and Teresa Mesman met these units on the scene. The Farwell Ambulance arrived just a few minutes later.

Kem Bales, paramedic with the Bailey Co. EMS, saw that within minutes, this was a multi-systems trauma incident and that every person on each unit would have something vital to perform.

"The way that everyone worked together made a very strong impression on me," Bales stated.

Bales also commented that he, as a paramedic actually involved with the patient's care, never had to go search for any supplies, equipment or assistance.

"I would just state what was needed and from over my shoulder, or to my side, it was handed to me," he said. "That is very rare for a paramedic to have that much help at a scene and I never had to doubt that someone would be there for assistance."

Doug Scioli, Texico EMS director, felt that this incident just proved that the people that are trained in emergency medicine are true professionals whether they actually touched the patient or not.

"I was proud that I knew where my people were at all times and that we all worked so well together. Whether it was running supplies to the paramedics and EMT's treating the patient or keeping the trucks and bystanders in the safe zones, we all worked in just the right way to keep everyone safe and to assure the best treatment to the patient," Scioli said.

"It also wasn't about which unit was in control and that it was anyone's particular territory," Scioli explained. "We were all there to help a very critically injured patient and we all fell into line together to help him."

Bailey County Fire Dept. were the first responders to the airplane fire. Texico Fire and Farwell Fire Departments were on standby for assistance.

Farwell EMS Director Aloha Fulcher was very proud of the Farwell EMS volunteers that arrived at the scene.

"This type of accident is one that doesn't occur very often. I was very impressed to see the professionalism and the quick



thinking that was displayed by all the responders," said Fulcher.

"The fact that the volunteers that were working behind the scene (actually treating the patient) so well and so efficiently, made me very proud," she said. "We never had to doubt that the supplies and the scene were under complete control."

All the unit directors would like to thank the bystanders and EMS and Fire Dept. responders for their help and understanding.

"We don't get together to work scenes like this one very often; we don't ever practice together for calls like this one; but even though many of us didn't even know each other at all, we were able to pull together and work out every detail just like we were one big unit, and that is very encouraging to be part of a big 'team' like that," Paul Fulcher, Farwell EMS EMT stated.

The AeroCare flight paramedic/nurses that responded were also impressed at the number of units and responders present at the scene.

"All of the people that were involved at this incident are to commended and praised for their efforts," Kem Bales stated.

Responding from the Farwell EMS and Farwell Fire Dept. were Jerry Giesbrecht, Aloha Fulcher, Paul Fulcher, Ricky Armstrong, Duane Haseloff, Brian White, Darrell Schmidt, Craig Nichols, Lawrence Giesbrecht, Wade Cargile, Berny Mesman, Teresa Mesman, Lee Hutchins and several others who I didn't get a chance to see.

Texico EMS and Fire responders were Doug Scioli, Josh Scioli, Travis Herrington, Lewis Cooper, Kelly Holiday, David Kube, Jerry Johnson, Lynn McDaniel, Rhonda Foreman, and several others I didn't get a chance to see.

Bailey Co. EMS responders were Kem Bales, Joe Lazano, Robbie Young, Jennifer Patterson and Julie Mason.


Lazbuddie EMS also had representation by Nicky Nickles.

Kayla Schilling told all the responders during an afterincident diffusing and prayer circle that it was a great comfort to know that so many people would respond to help a person in need.

"It makes me feel very safe and I know that we're all in good hands with each of these caring people so willing to give of their time," she said.

Brian Hardin, the paramedic from Lubbock that just happened to be driving by at the time of the accident should be made an honorary member of the three units as well because this is the second accident he has "just been passing by" when they took place, in almost the exact same location along the highway.

"I feel a part of these EMS units and they all made me feel a part of them because we worked together, side by side, just like one unit," Hardin stated. "Believe me, this was truly a remarkable response and this kind of cooperation is very rare."



Farwell passes comprehensive truck prohibition ordinance

on Tuesday approved a comprehensive ordinance prohibiting trucks from using most city streets.

The ordinance was for vehicles over 12,000 pounds.

It designated truck routes and granted exemptions for vehicles going to the Farwell Grain Exchange and acquiring water at the city well on 3rd Street.

Trucks will be prohibited from street parking.

Truck routes will be Avenue A, 9th Street, U.S. 6, and Avenue A south on 1st Street to Avenue D, turning west to the State Line Road.

Violations will mean fines up to \$200.

The complete ordinance, with all the details, will be published in the Tribune's Sept. 29 issue.

In other business, the council:

-- Held a hearing for public input on the drought contingency plan required by the state. No one attended.

Water Supt. Dee Hammit reported that the city has six working wells, with five currently being used.

Two of the wells are old and production is dropping rapidly so the city is looking for new sites for wells.

The drought contingency plan outlines what the city will do if water capacity runs into a problem or the total water demand becomes too great.

Stage 1 calls for voluntary water conservation. Further stages call for

elimination of non-essential water use.

-- Held a hearing on a variance request by Lupe Saenz Texico Band 2nd at state fair

-- Okayed a proposal by Mitch Walls to buy tax delinquent property -- Block 16, Lots 17-19.


-- Changed the rules on the city cemetery. Councilman Wayne Gruben put in changes regarding vaults and monuments.

The Texas High Plains forecast was lowered some 270,000 bales from 3.47 on Aug. 1 to 3.2 million bales on Sept. 1.






On defense in this quarter, Gregory had a touchdownsaving tackle, and Christian and Hernandez had good tackles, too.

This constituted about a 15.8 percent turnout.








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
