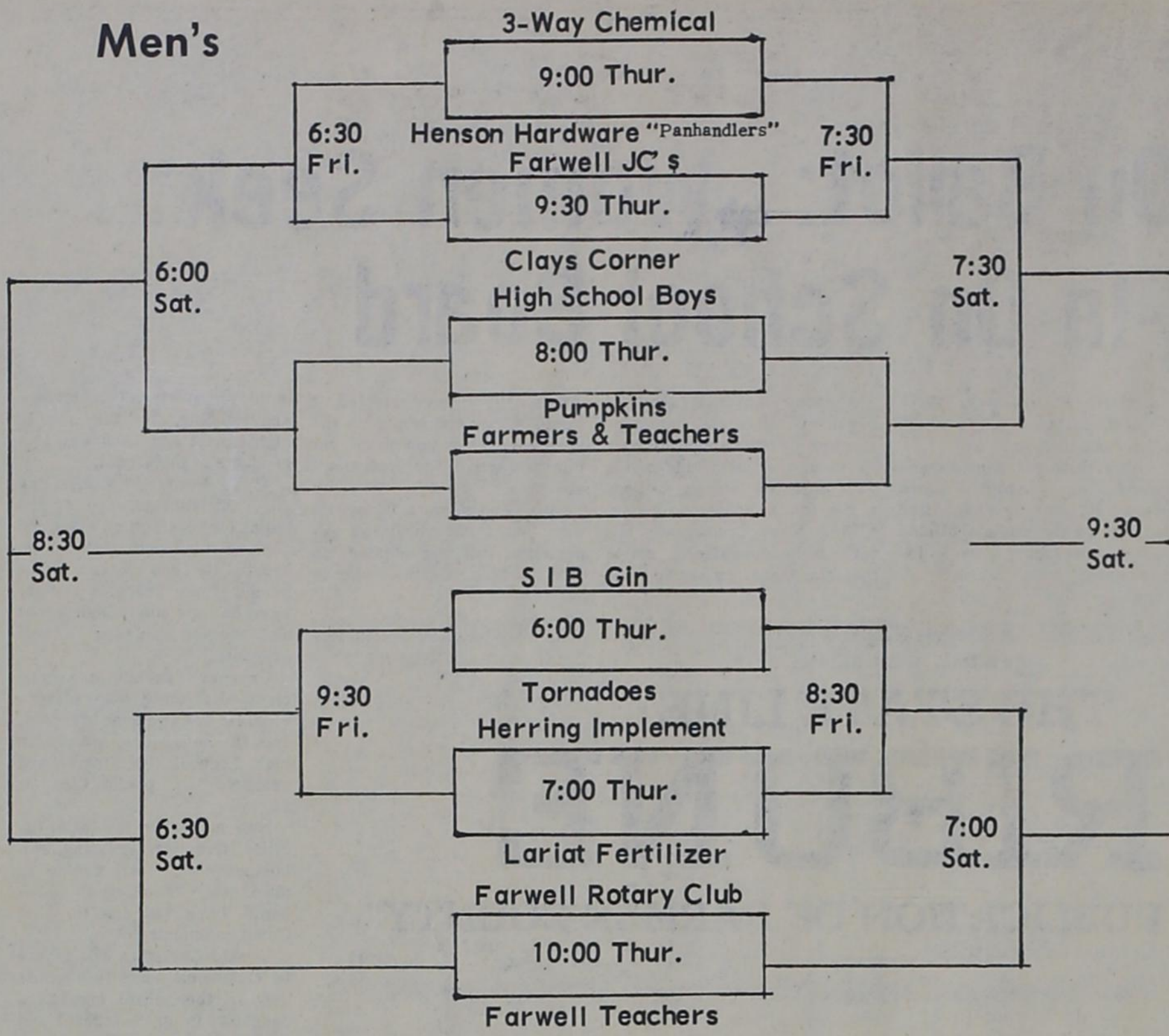

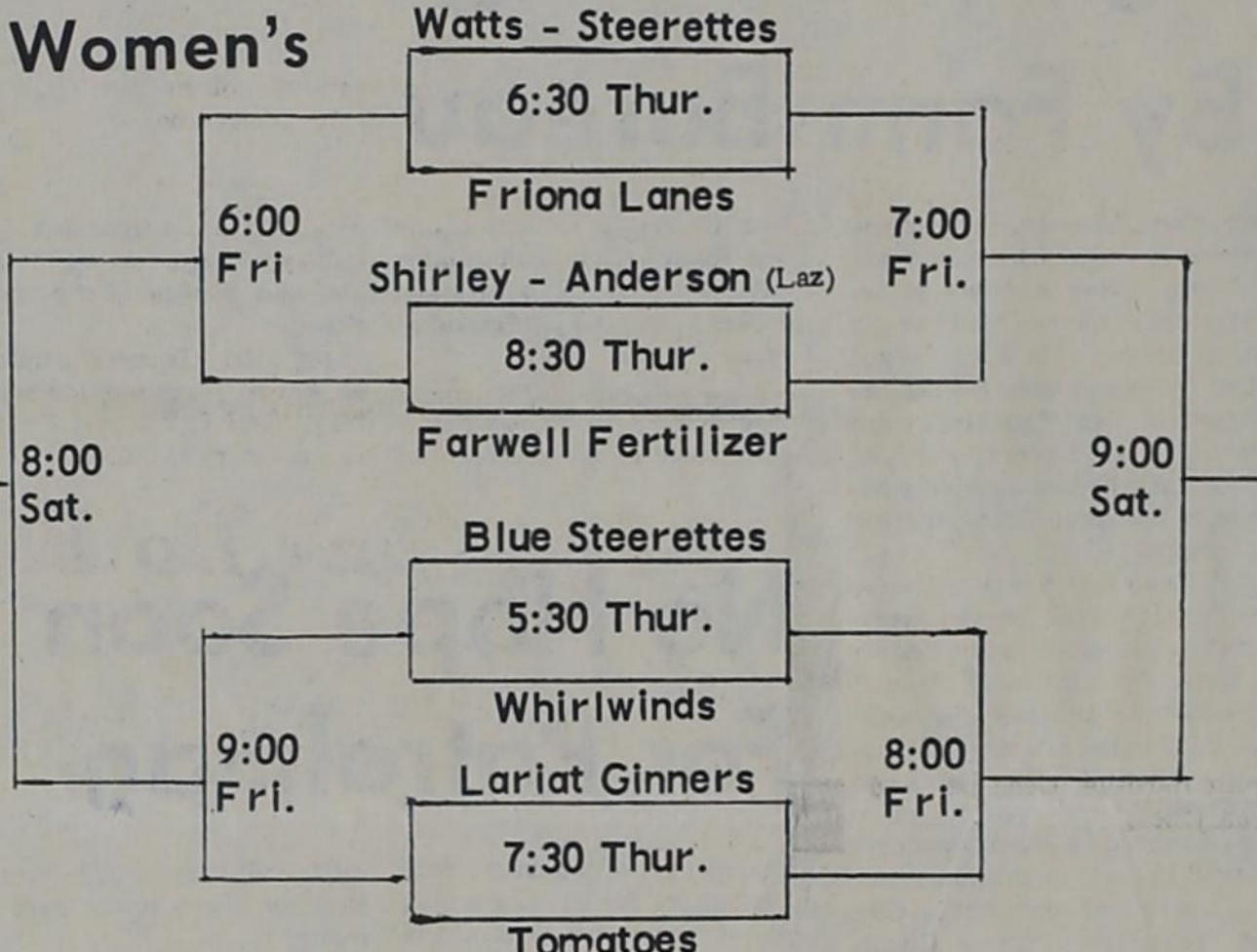

### Texas Vehicle Inspection Stickers Due April 15

Colonel Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, reported today that some 1,500,000 Texas vehicles have only until Wednesday, April 15 to be inspected as state law requires.

"In the remaining three and one half weeks of the inspection period, it will be possible for the state's 5,100 licensed inspections stations to handle the last minute inspections only if motorists take their vehicles in immediately so there will be no delayed periods between inspecting one vehicle and the next," he said.

"From now until the deadline, every minute of the inspection station's time will be at a premium, and waiting lines will become general throughout the state as it approaches unless vehicle owners act now".

Garrison urged Texans to avoid the delay and inconvenience of waiting in long lines to get the safety inspection sticker for 1964 by taking immediate action.

"Beginning April 16, officers will be obliged to begin handing out tickets for non-compliance with the Motor Vehicle Inspection Law which requires an annual inspection," says Garrison.

# Conservation, Elimination Of Tailwater Are The Same

Conservation and the elimination of "tailwater" is one and the same, according to a recently given report by officials of the Farmer County Soil Conservation District. "Of course you wouldn't say that an irrigation well isn't worth money, but the apparent disregard of some of the farmers for the tailwater problem would indicate that these same farmers had no regard for their irrigation wells," said the conservationist. Certainly, all tailwater can-

not be eliminated, but with proper soil and water conservation practices the problem can be controlled, according to Jimmy Smith, Work Unit conservationist, of the Soil Conservation Service. "It would be well for all those who have tailwater to drive to the south or southwest parts of the Plains or even, just to the east in the southeast part of Deaf Smith and east parts of Castro counties and look at some of the "old" good 8" wells," said Smith,

pointing out that some of these wells are now down to a 3" stream and that can only be pumped at night. "We don't see much tailwater in this area. As we all know, the less water we have, the more it is worth," said Smith. Reduction of tailwater to a minimum can be accomplished by consideration and use of the following points. 1. The greatest cause of tailwater is MAN. If we are going to turn the water on and then go to town, then we are ask-

ing for tailwater and not trying to prevent it. True it may cost money to prevent it, but it also cost money to run water out the end of the row. It is probably costing us more than we will ever know until it is too late. 2. Consider the soil type, slope of the land, length of the run, the time we run water, and what condition the soil is in before you ever turn the water on. These have a great effect on the amount of water we need to apply.

The soils in the northern half of the county are going to take all the water they are going to in the first two to four hours of the irrigation, but by length of run you can still have a 12 to 24 hour set; however a man is needed in the field. The south half of Farmer County will take water rapidly for some two to four hours and continue to take water as long as we put water on it. This soil should be watered with what is known as a "cut back head," or use a large stream to get

your water almost out and then cut the amount of water in about half until the desired amount of irrigation water is applied. Your time of irrigation should be from eight to 12 hours; however in all cases a man is needed with the irrigation at all times. All rows will not get out at the same time. If adjustment is made continually, these rows can be made to get out at the same time. "If we will follow these rules there would be less reason to

construct structures to "re-use" tailwater, because there is no reason to have that tailwater in the first place." Why pump extra water out, into a pit, and back on the field when it is just as easy to pump

from the well the amount you need to irrigate? "Reuse structures for the tailwater are profitable only when it is your neighbor and not you who is furnishing the (Continued on next page)

# Grain Sorghum Layout 32 Pct.

The 1964 Feed Grain sign-up is now over. The tabulations are in and the result is that farmers have signed up to divert (lay-out) more acreage in this county than last year, by approximately 25,000 acres, according to Prentice Mills, ASC office manager. This year's diverted acreage figure as signed up will be 86,596 acres. Of 1290 farms,

1171 signed up to divert acreage. Broken down into percentage of diverted for each Feed Grain Crop we have: 79% of all corn acreage has been pledged for diverted, 32% of all grain sorghum acreage, 84% of all barley acreage. These figures when averaged give 33% of the feed grain acreage in Parmer County to be diverted from production for the 1964 crop. These diverted acres will pay the farmers of this county \$3,-237,857 this year. Of the above figure, \$1,295,000 has been added to the Parmer County economy at this time. The diverted acre payment as averaged amounts to \$37 per acre.

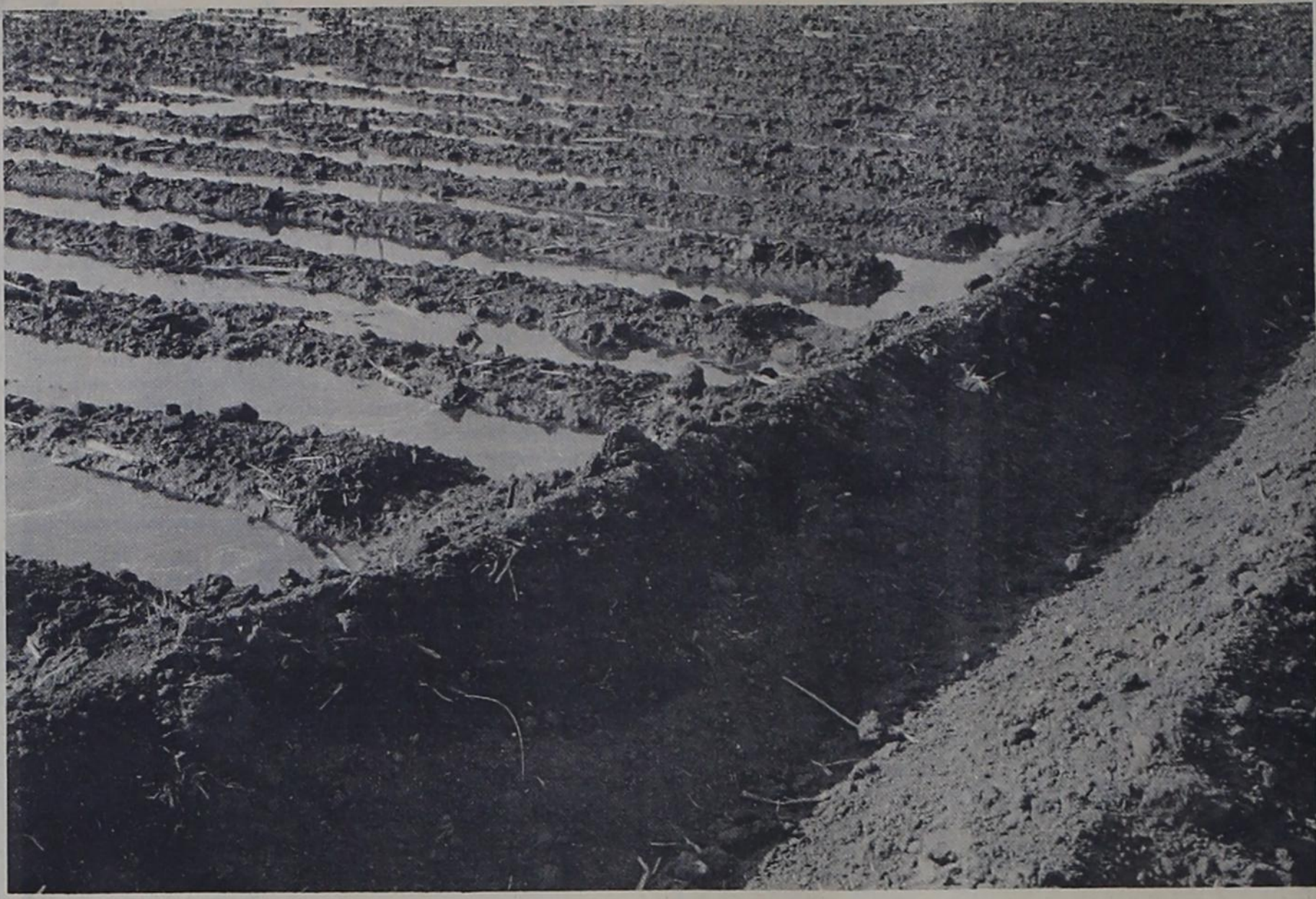

A well landscaped home can very well add value to the property, dollar wise, that is, but the greatest benefits are in the beauty that it adds to the home. Good design in landscape

principles is something that is well worth the trouble it takes to study and learn because like other things, it requires knowledge or some very sad effects are the result. Unless one has a lot of time to care for the landscape, shrubs or ornamentals that are set in the middle of a lawn or along the curb can look mighty ragged when grass and weeds grow around their base. Planning an easy-care landscape calls for a wide open

lawn that may be mowed without having to give special attention to trimming around shrubs or plants-that time and energy does not permit. Do you know that any plant may be grown from cuttings? A cutting bed properly prepared can give you many lovely evergreen shrubs with only a small amount of effort. A leaflet just received in my office "Growing Shrubs and Trees from Cuttings" is available at no cost to those who would like to come by for a copy. My office is on the second floor of the courthouse in Farwell. Some other publications on landscaping are also available. "Modern Pruning Methods" is suggested for those who need to prune. Ask for the material on landscaping principles too. A demonstration on "Planting Trees & Shrubs" was recently reported by the Rhea 4-H Club leaders. This is a very worthwhile project for a 4-H girl or boy and one that the whole family can share in too. These girls and boys are learning to make cutting beds, plan landscape and many other things in this project.

Powdered grapefruit juice, which dissolves easily in water and has a good fresh flavor, is about to be market tested although it is still in the experimental stages. Developed at Winter Haven, Florida, by scientists of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Research Service and the Florida Citrus Commission, the scientist used the foam-mat drying process developed at USDA's Western Utilization Research Laboratory. Already on the market is a dried grapefruit juice powder made by a vacuum drying process, also developed by USDA scientists.

They are cartilage as soft as the gristle of well-cooked chicken. I never get loud, but, I wish that I could about the fact that there should never be any doubt about babies' footwear. If there is even a remote possibility that shoes, sox, or pajama feet will bend the toes, the baby should be kept barefoot. Remember, short shoes are POISON applied externally.

# What's Purpose Of TDA?

The Texas Department of Agriculture achieved a record number of public service inspections during the past 12 months, according to Commissioner John C. White.

A total of more than 1.4 million separate acts of inspection and assistance were rendered in the channels of trade, ranging from crop examinations to retail sales checks.

"Work of the TDA involves direct services to Texans at every point in the marketing chain from the soil to the supermarket," White explained. "A major part of our duties is assuring the consumer of getting full value for money spent. On the other hand, technical assistance and production aides are offered to growers."

Commissioner White pointed out that the state farm agency issues over 11 million licenses, certificates of authority, permits or registrations in trade channels each year. In addition, supervisory work is conducted on over four million acres of crop and range land and at 878,433 points within the channels of trade.

"The Texas Department of Agriculture is a watchdog agency for the benefit of producers and consumers, alike," said White.

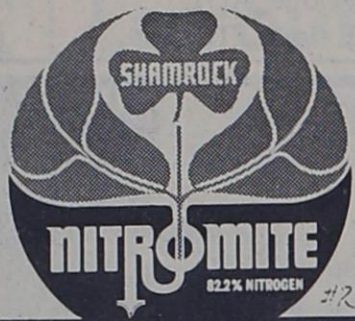
"A great deal of confusion exists in the mind of the public

between the Texas and United States Department of Agriculture," the Commissioner said. "Very briefly, the state agency supervises and enforces the laws passed by the Texas Legislature. The regulations concerning crop allotments, land retirement, and production controls are products of the federal department."

White emphasized that all requests for information or assistance will be acted upon by the state agency or forwarded to the proper authorities if it is outside the jurisdiction of the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Six district offices are located at Lubbock, Stephenville, Tyler, Houston, San Marcos and Pharr or a person may contact the state headquarters in the John Reagan Building in Austin.

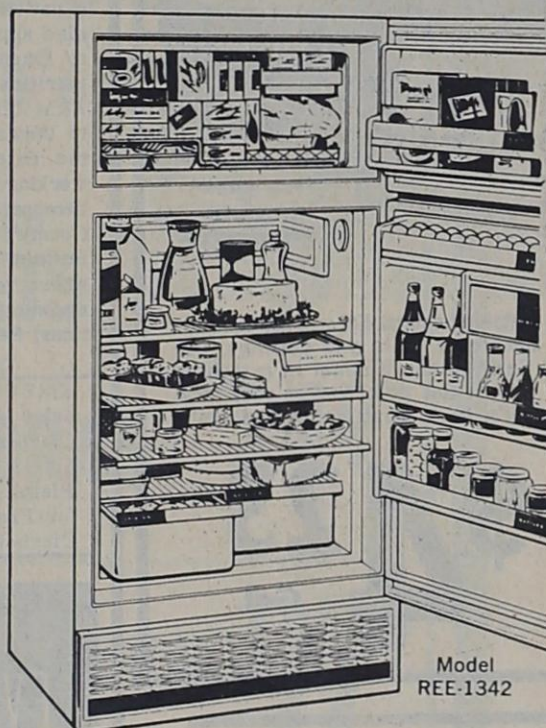

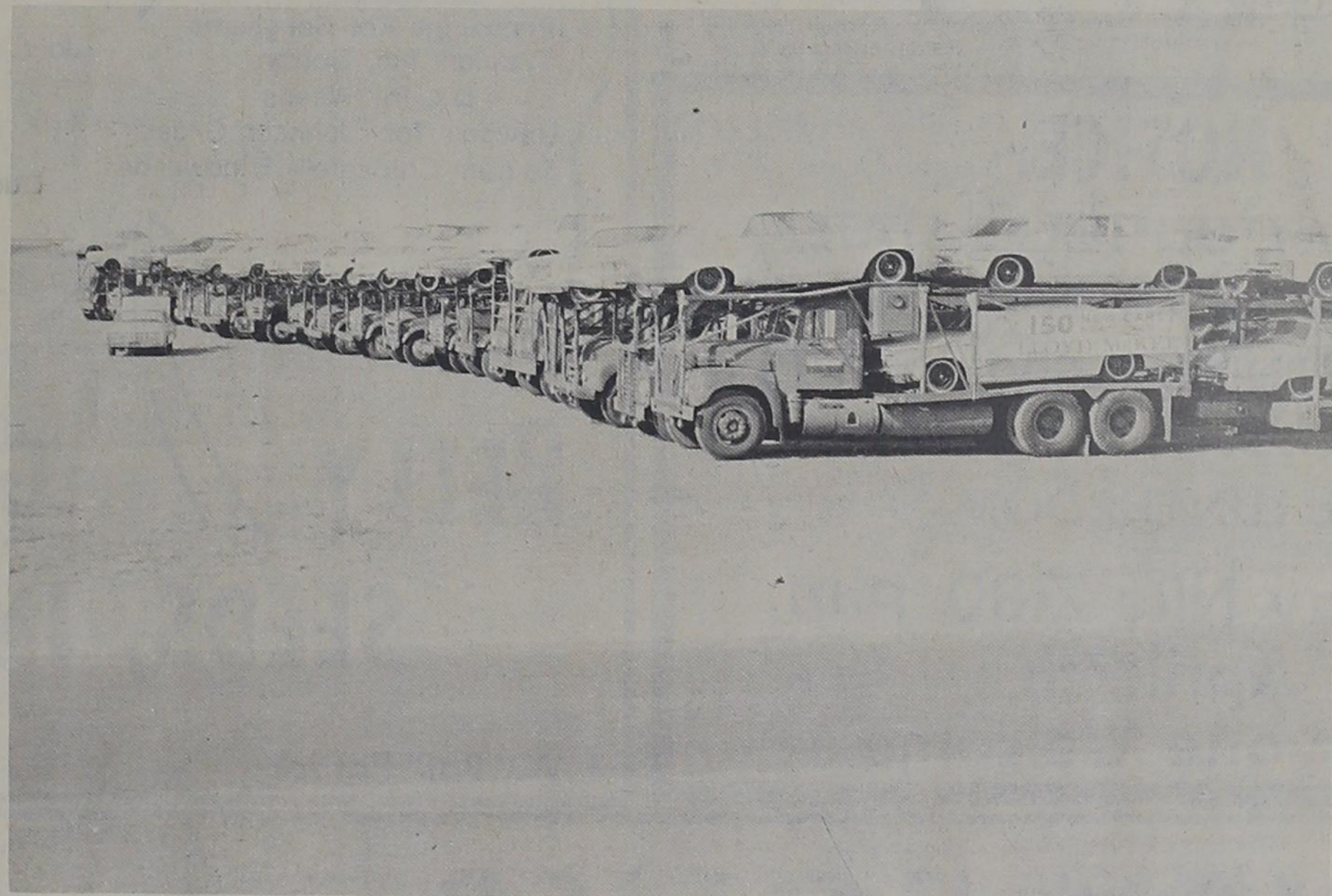
Texico did not have a team

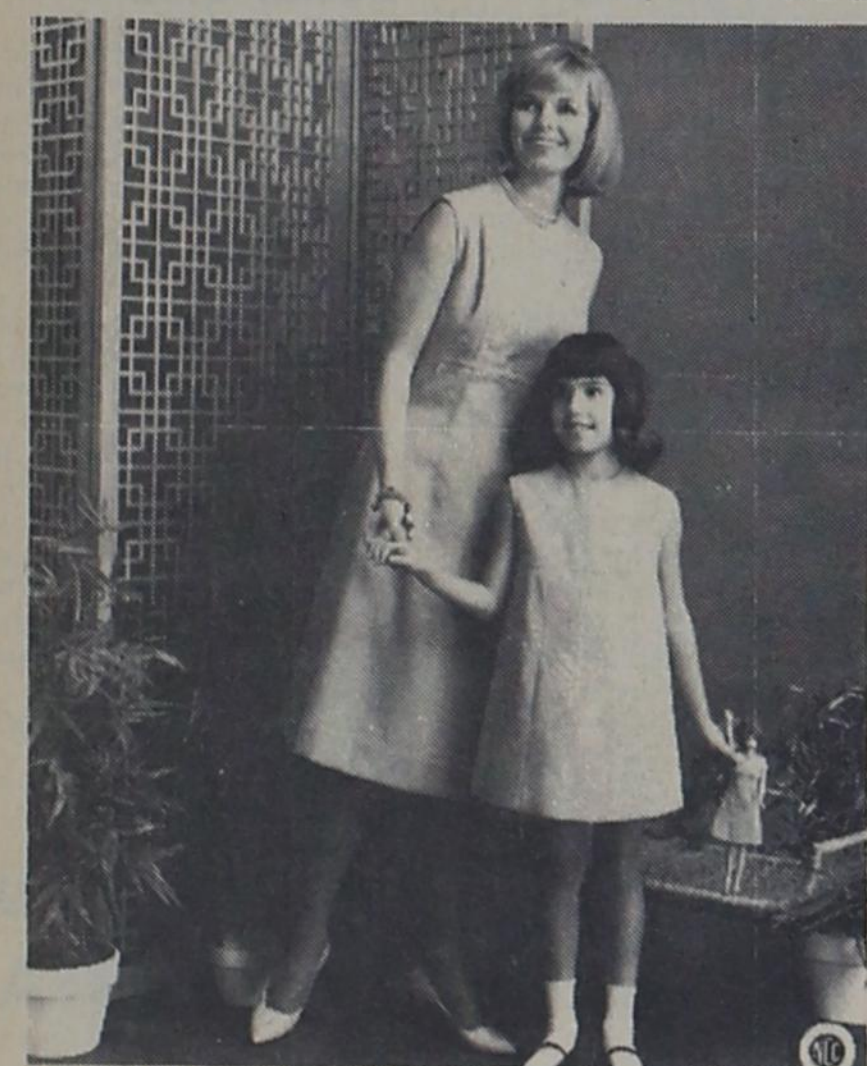
The families who live in Anchorage had not been heard from since the earthquake which shook Alaska last week until late Tuesday night.

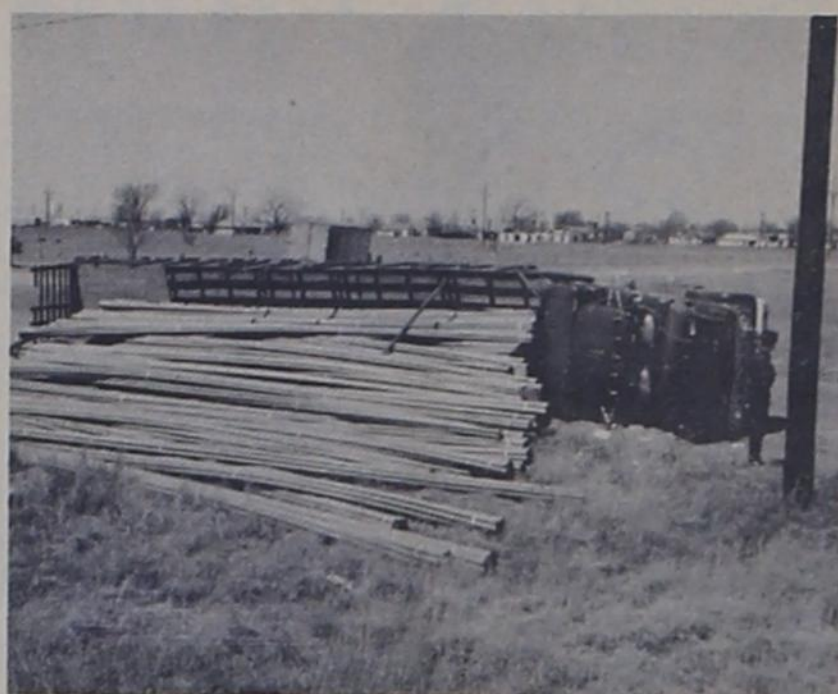

### Postmaster Issues Reminder

Postmaster J. R. Smart reminded residents of Farwell that an effective date of April 1 has been set for new domestic parcel post rate increases.

The parcel post increase -- approved recently by the Interstate Commerce Commission and averaging about 13.1% -- is expected to yield about 75.4 million annually.

Catalog rates will be increased approximately 13% and will produce added revenue of about \$2.4 million if 1962 volume is maintained. The higher rates do not affect air parcel post or international parcel post.

Postmaster Smart said he has been advised by Postmaster General John A. Gronouski that the decision of the ICC will assist the Post Office Department in carrying out its objective of reducing the drain on the Federal Treasury by \$100 million.

The last parcel post increase was on February 1, 1960, the postmaster pointed out.

To illustrate the effect on the new rates here, Smart noted that a six-pound parcel -- which is the average weight -- for local area delivery will cost 37¢ instead of 32¢.
