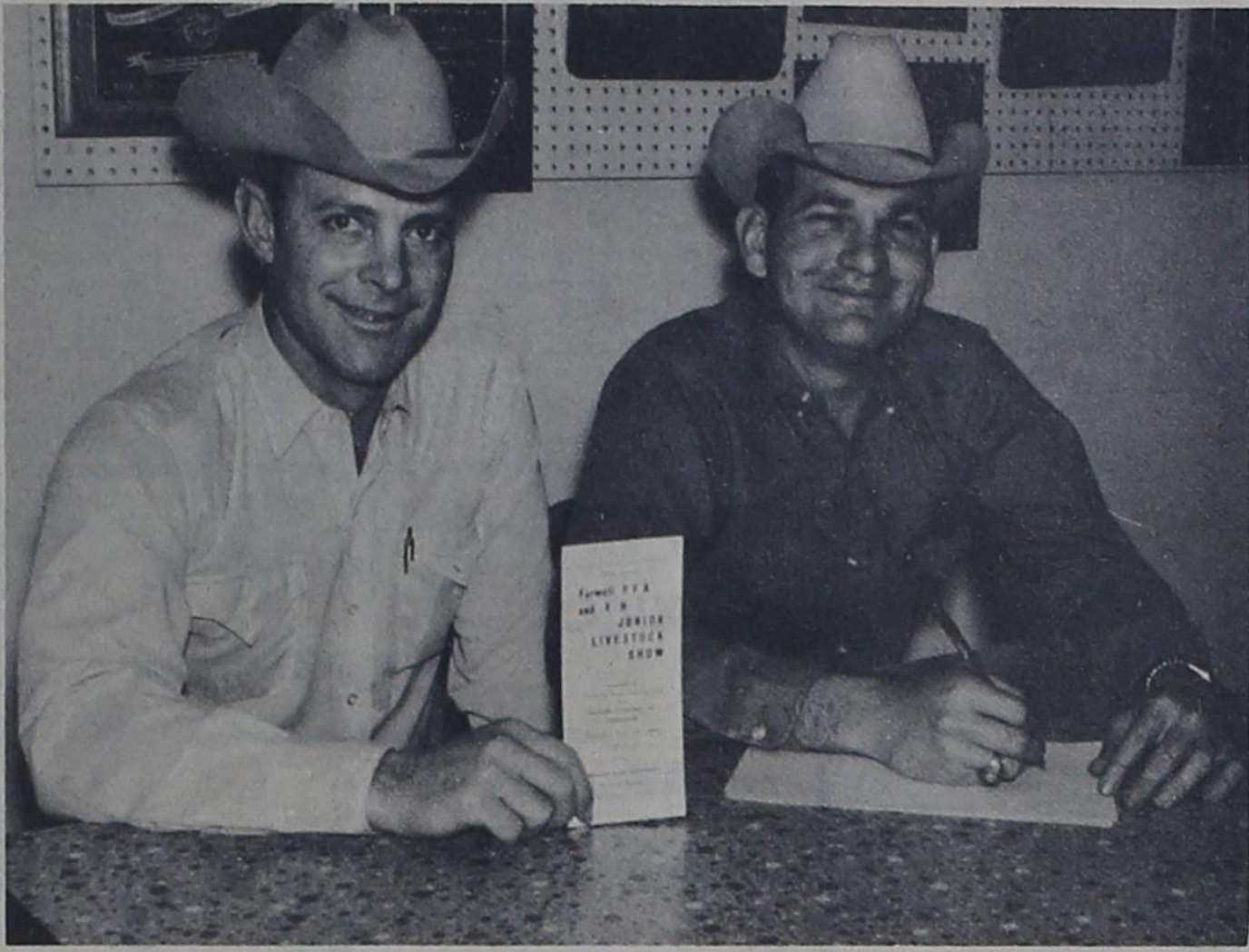
Texico-Farwell is the meeting ground of the two fastest freight trains in the world. Recently, Santa Fe inaugurated a freight train designated the "Super C". This train recently ran from Chicago to Los Angeles in 34 hours and 35 minutes. This was at an average run of a little over 63 MPH. The schedule will call for a 40-hour run between these two points. Ed Farmer, our local Santa Fe agent, informs us that at approximately 8:40 a.m. CST, these east bound and west bound trains pass each other at this junction.

We are at the center of the finest combination of rail and highway transportation systems in the country. You would think GM or Ford with their better ideas would discover us and build a big plant here. Someday, someone will discover this natural site and then we will really boom. In the meantime, take time out to see the world's fastest freight, even if it doesn't stop -- yet.

Last fall we aired our views on the Administration's request for an increase in the income tax. Equally understandable, from standpoint of the tax and inflation-poor wage earners, is the fact that a member of Congress who hopes to saddle even more taxation on our backs simply does not deserve to remain in Washington, no matter what his reasons for voting in favor of a bigger tax bite. Yes, this issue will separate the men from the boys in this Congress.

The third annual Livestock Show will be held in Farwell this Saturday, Feb. 10, according to Jerry Mathis, agricultural advisor.

Animals shown will be those of FFA members and 4-H Club members in the Farwell area. The show will be held at the agriculture barn, located in east Farwell, beginning at 2 p.m. Prizes for each class will be awarded with cash prizes and ribbons going to the winners of the first five places in each group. Grand champion of each division will receive \$10 and a trophy. Reserve champions will receive \$5 and a trophy.

General Superintendent of the show is Darrell Norton, Business firms in Farwell have contributed money for the prizes and the Rodeo Arena Association is assisting with the show.

Jerry Mathis announces that more steers will be shown than in previous years, with two classes of steers on the official schedule. Seven classes of barrows, one class of gilts, and one class of lambs will also be shown. Included are Berkshire, Ches-

ter White, Poland China, Duroc, Light Hampshire, Heavy Hampshire, light mixed breeds and heavy mixed breeds.

## Cross, Billingsley Vie For Mayor's Post

Two men, Howard Billingsley and Don Cross, are now in the race for mayor of Texico; and two others, Manford Turnbough and Bob Dollar, have filed for the trustee positions. Sam Lewis, incumbent, was the only person filing for the police magistrate position.

Deadline for registering for one of the trustee positions, mayor's post, or police magistrate position was Monday, Feb. 5, at 5 p.m. At the same time, registration to vote in the town election came to a close; however, persons who wish to vote in any given election have until 30 days before such election to register, according to Mrs. Clara Wiehl, town clerk.

Mayor Howard declined to file as a candidate for reelection.

Present mayor is W. D. Howard and trustees are Perry Winkles, B. A. Rogers, Bob Dollar and Howard Billingsley. The terms of Dollar and Billingsley are expiring, as is the term of W. D. Howard. The term of Sam Lewis, police magistrate, is also expiring.

Mayor Howard declined to file as a candidate for reelection.

## Weed Control Short Course Set

A weed is defined as an obnoxious growth, a plant growing where it is not desired. This actually is a mild definition of a weed, according to County Agent Ronny F. McNutt.

A short course in weed control will be held on Wednesday, Feb. 14, at the Bovina High School Cafeteria, to bring farmers, chemical dealers and other interested persons up to date on the latest weed control recommendations. The short course will begin at 2 p.m.

Dr. Allen Wiese, professor specializing in weed research at the Bushland Experiment Station, will present the short course. Dr. Wiese is recognized as the leading weed control authority for the Panhandle and South Plains area. According to Dr. Wiese, more time and emphasis will be placed on chemical weed control recommendations for the major crops grown in Parmer County.

Weeds in crops cost Texas farmers 260 million dollars per year and farm losses from weeds on a national basis are approximately 5 billion dollars per year, according to Wiese. One-third of the total losses from pests to agriculture is caused by weeds. Consequently, controlling weeds is a very important part of the farm business.

Following the presentation of the short course a question and answer session will be conducted.

## Ford Seeking State Position

J. Frank Ford, a Deaf Smith County farmer and businessman, has announced as a candidate for State Representative in the 72nd District, subject to the action of the Republican primary. The district includes Deaf Smith, Parmer, Castro, Bailey, Lamb, and Cochran counties.

Ford is a native of the Texas Panhandle-South Plains area, and is a 1955 graduate of Texas A&M. He served in the U. S. Army during 1956, 1957, and 1958. He was an Honest John Rocket Battery Commander and attained the rank of captain.

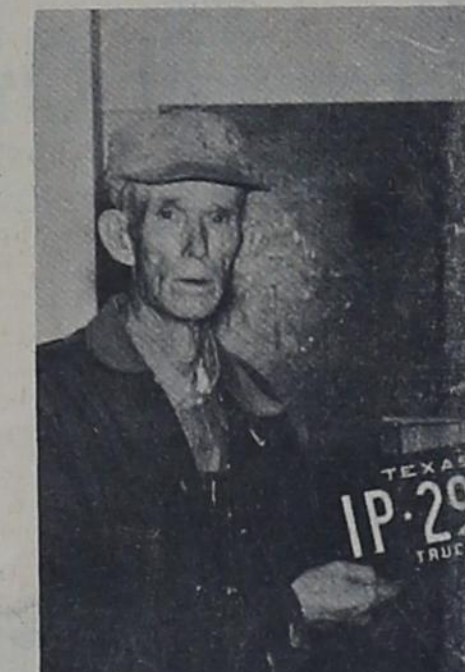
"We are all concerned about the rapid increase in taxes, crime rates, and the general unrest which we see now in our country," said Ford in announcing his candidacy, "and the best way we can stop this trend is to work harder to make our state and communities better places in which to live. It is my desire to see more responsibility placed at the state and local levels, rather than in Washington, D.C."

"I consider vocational training as a high priority item for progress in Texas. Skills and training for our youth must be matched with the jobs which will be available in the next two decades. The 1969 session of the legislature will be the most important one in many years in the field of education."

"In matters requiring state-federal cooperation, such as the importation of water to this area, I will work closely with our congressman to insure that our cities and farms have adequate water for the generations to come."

Ford worked in the legal division of the State Board of Water Engineers in 1959, and served as bill clerk for the 56th Legislature that year.

He and his wife, Margie, live in Hereford with their four children, Davi's, 10, Cindy, 7, Dan, 5, and Susan, 4. They are active in the First Methodist Church. Ford has been Scoutmaster of Boy Scout Troop 52 for seven years; recently completed a year as president of the Hereford migrant ministry, and is currently vice-president of the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce. He is president and manager of Arrowhead Mills, Inc., a stone grinding flour mill in Hereford.

I believe voters of Precinct 3 will support and elect a local candidate on the Republican ticket as evidence of their stand on state and national issues."

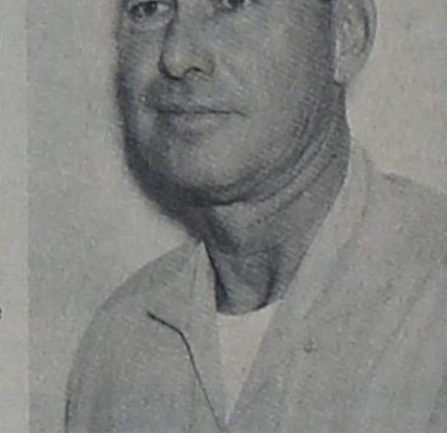

**Editorial**

**Need For A Change --**

Over the years there have been numerous proposals for revision or elimination of the electoral college system under which the President of the United States is elected. Some proposals have called for pledged electors selected by the people within district, others for a direct popular election, and still others for a proportional plan of casting electoral votes.

Hearings have been held by the Constitutional Amendments Subcommittee of the Senate on these various plans for electoral reform. But to date no action has been taken beyond the hearings. Additional hearings are planned by the Subcommittee and when they terminate, it is believed that some form of reform proposal will be approved for consideration on the floor of the Senate.

We would favor improving the modus operandi of the electoral college rather than abolishing it altogether. The faults of the present method supply compelling reasons for a change.

It is time for a Constitutional amendment under which the electoral college system would more genuinely reflect the difference of opinion and the preferences of those voting within each state with respect to the election of the President and the Vice President.

The most effective plan would be the District plan introduced by Senator Mundt (R-S.D.). A plan that provides for the election of presidential electors by the people within single-electoral districts that would be established by the state legislature.

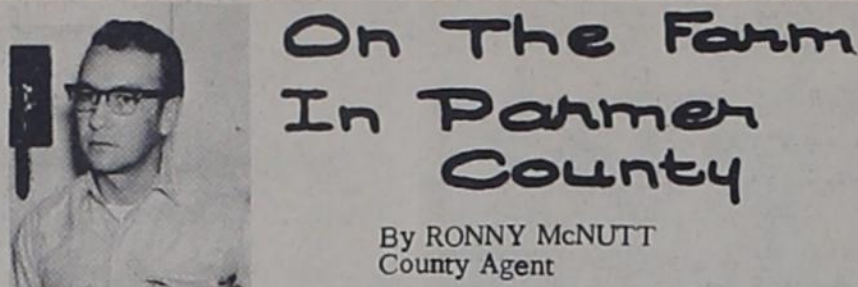

Daniels found that malathion and dimethoate applied as low-volume aerial sprays were not effective in greenbug control.

Methyl parathion, applied by air in a water carrier, gave excellent control. Dimethoate and malathion, as well as other insecticides, applied as water-emulsion sprays with ground equipment, gave satisfactory greenbug control.

**SOIL TESTING**

James H. Valentine, Area Soil Chemist, reports that during 1967 only 201 soil samples were tested from Parmer County. This number compares to 629 in 1965 and 522 in 1966 that was tested at the Soil Testing Laboratory at Lubbock.

It is still not too late to have your soil tested for the 1968 crop. If you have not soil tested, make plans now to do so.

**Fire Alarms Answered**

Two alarms were answered by the local fire departments over the weekend. On Saturday, around noon, the Farwell department went to the home of J. B. Sudderth where the grass was on fire and a wood pile had also ignited. The fire was soon brought under control.

On Sunday night the Texico department answered a call to a building on the Clovis Highway only to find that it was a false alarm. The supposed fire

was only the result of wood burning in a wood stove, creating a large amount of smoke.

### Doctor in the Kitchen

#### FISH AND SEAFOOD

The former custom of including a fish course in a dinner has largely died out in the United States, except on very formal occasions. It is still common practice in Europe. Meat is not as plentiful there, and it is more expensive. As a result, Europeans enjoy a dietary delicacy that many Americans miss. The approach of the Lenten season should help to emphasize the importance of fish at all seasons.  
Years ago, peoples who lived closest to the sea or to fresh waters naturally had the best chance of appreciating fish. Before the days of refrigeration, quick-freezing and rapid transport, delicate foods like fish and milk were difficult to ship. This gave rise to the mistaken belief that fish and milk should not be eaten at the same meal, because spoilage of one or the other could cause illness.  
Now, due to modern packaging and processing techniques, fish and milk can be shipped safely, so that fear can be eliminated.

**CONTINUE THOU**

"Evil men and seducers shall wax worse and worse . . . but continue thou" (II Tim. 3:13,14).

These were among the last words of the great Apostle Paul, written in view of his approaching martyrdom. To Timothy, his beloved son in the faith.

Circumstances, outwardly, were anything but encouraging. It seemed that the last days of the dispensation of grace were indeed at hand. The apostle had borne many "persecutions" and "afflictions" and now "suffered trouble, as an evil doer, even unto bonds." There were those who, like Jannes and Jambres, had "resisted the truth" (Verse 8). "Alexander the coppersmith" had done him "much evil" and had "greatly withstood his words" (4:14, 15). "Evil men and seducers" had risen on every hand and were to "wax worse and worse, deceiving and being deceived" (3:13).

There was even defection among his own brethren in the faith, so that now, from his Roman prison, he had to report: "All they which are in Asia have turned away from me . . . Demas hath forsaken me . . . only Luke is with me" (1:15; 4:10,11).

And what, now, is his parting advice to young Timothy? Does he say: "Perhaps I have been too intense. My methods have made many enemies. I advise you to be more diplomatic and tolerant than I have been"? Hardly, for the records show Paul to have been of all men most tactful and considerate. His sufferings were not the result of a contentious spirit, but of his faithfulness in proclaiming that message which so embarrasses and enrages "our adversary, the devil," that message which is God's gracious response to man's need and His answer to Satan's slander--the gospel of the grace of God.

Thus it is that the Apostle urges Timothy: "Continue thou . . . be not ashamed . . . be strong." He well knew that in this sin-cursed world the only hope for the individual is to be found in God's offer of salvation through faith in the redemption wrought by Christ at Calvary.

### KNOW YOUR FABRICS

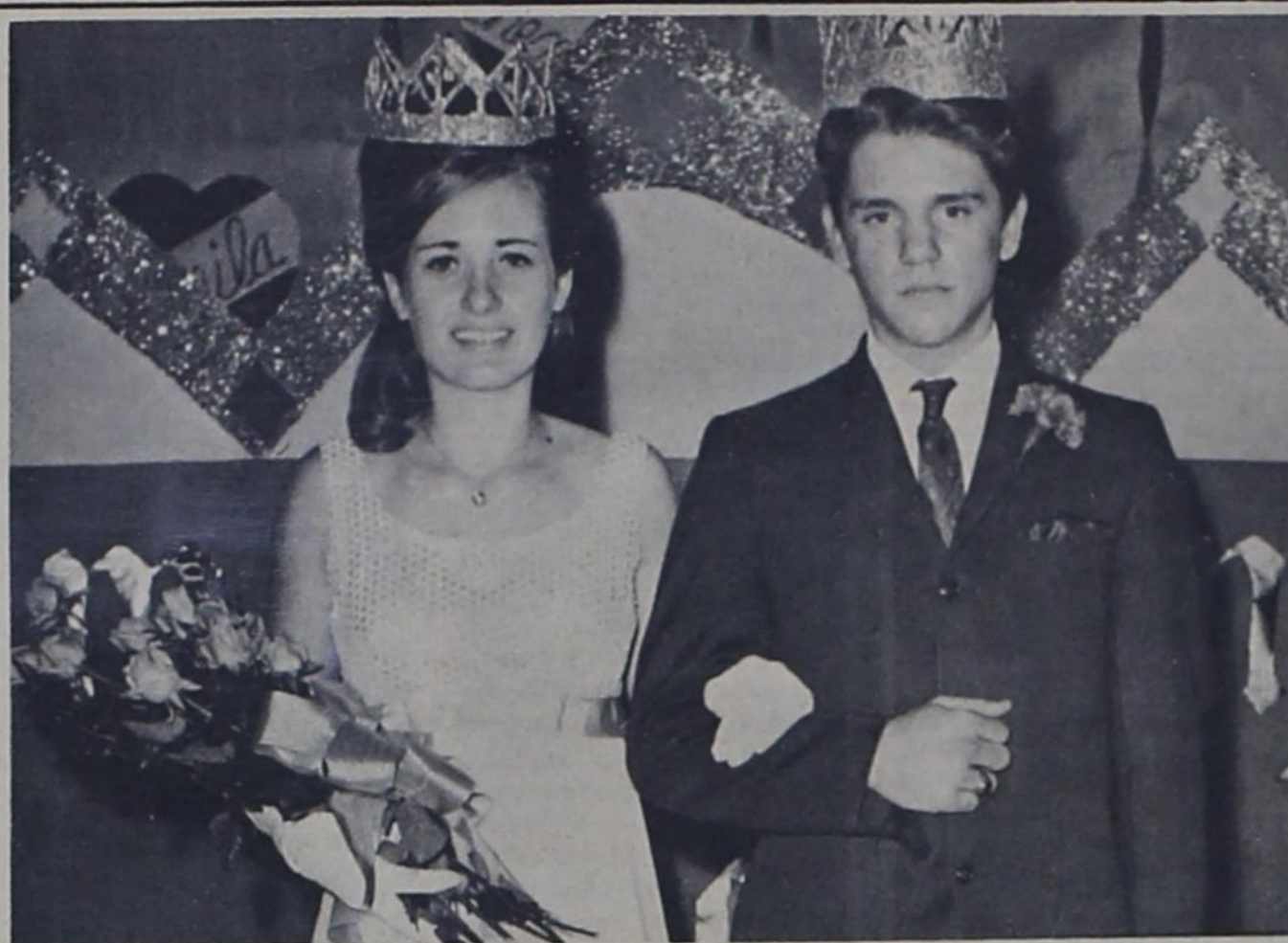
