There is a stirring in the air that is not attributable to the proximity of spring. This "stirring" is the feeling that Farwell needs to "do something" to give a better appearance to the town. The "better appearance" not only includes a general cleaning up of the streets and buildings but also improvement of the business appearance by examining our efforts to attract new businesses and industry.

The last two meetings of the Farwell Chamber of Commerce were attended by about 40 persons each time. This is an unprecedented high watermark in sustained interest and augurs well for the community's determination to better itself.

At the last meeting, several ideas were brought out upon which the Chamber will begin work. One idea that caught the general interest and gained wide acceptance was the possibility of the community, somehow, in establishing a senior citizens retirement home combined with a medical care unit. The Chamber is forming a committee to evaluate this suggestion and to receive suggestions from all concerned in this project.

The problem of unsightly buildings on main street was raised, and several views were expressed on how this effects visitors or others looking at the town. As a consequence of this concern of many, a committee has been appointed to look into the problems of beautification of our downtown area. In selection of this committee, several persons came right out and volunteered, a most unusual thing on Chamber committees. Several other meritorious ideas were mentioned and discussed at this several hour session. These will be worked on as soon as suitable persons can be contacted to serve. Again, there seemed to be a feeling of "here's a problem and I want to help solve it." This must be the attitude if civic progress is to be made. The old idea of "let George do it" will only produce a continuation of the inertia too long prevailing.

We have in the past experienced a wave of civic virtue that soon ebbed. We have the suspicion that this will not happen this time.

Apropos of our awaking civic spirit was a heart warming sight we had the pleasure of viewing last Sunday afternoon. During the Sunday afternoon hours, the local Lions Club sponsored a trap shoot at their facilities along the State Line Road. This faces the new Country Club and golf course. There were many trap shooters clustered around the trap range, and then in the distance the green hills of the golf course was almost alive with busy Sunday afternoon golfers. Seeing this many people engaged in healthful and active recreation in this small community was a sight we will long remember.

As a final reminder, do not forget the Pancake Breakfast sponsored by the Lions this coming Sunday morning. The price of \$1.00 for adults and 75¢ for the kiddoes is very reasonable and the proceeds as usual go to support the many Lions Club local charities and youth activities. The breakfast will be held in Farwell School Cafeteria from 6 a.m. to 9 a.m. This ought to give you plenty of time to attend Church and Sunday School.

## Several Projects Discussed --

### 40 Attend Chamber Meeting

Several matters of importance were discussed at the special meeting of the Farwell Chamber of Commerce on Monday. Some 40 persons were in attendance.

Chamber President John Getz announced that in the near future a committee to study the feasibility of a retirement medical-care facility for senior citizens will be appointed. He also indicated that the Chamber will sponsor a clean-up, paint-up, fix-up week if such a campaign

is approved by the City Council. Plans were also made for the Chamber plans an expanded program to assist with Border Town Days activities, to be held in conjunction with the Rodeo week activities.

The Chamber is seeking more memberships in the drive now underway. Dues are now payable.

Also discussed at the meeting was the possibility of hiring an industrial specialist to assist in drawing new businesses to the

Farwell area. Named as a possible new industry is a canning factory.

No report was given from the Labor Housing project which has been in the wind for some time. Such a report should be forthcoming in the near future.

Also discussed was the possibility of beautifying Main Street, and the necessity of adequate housing (single dwellings or duplex types) for those wishing to rent in the area.

### Revival Begins Sunday

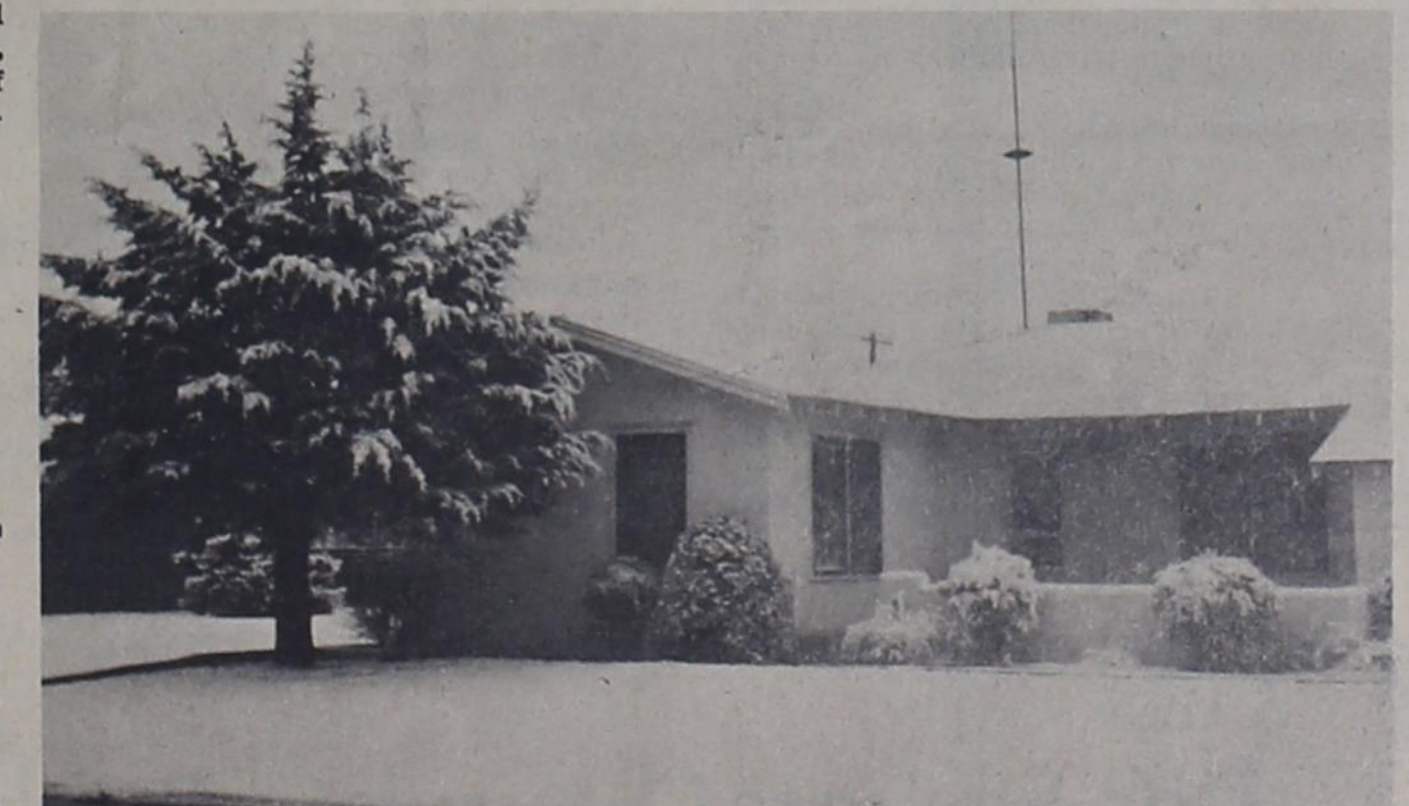
Spring revival at Farwell First Baptist Church is scheduled to begin this Sunday, March 24, and continue through Sunday, March 31.

### Crim Sets Annual Weather Forecast

J. W. (Indian) Crim, who has been making an annual weather forecast in these parts for the past 44 years, will give his official prediction for the 1968 crop year today (Friday) March 22.

At sunrise Crim will light a fire and read the smoke signs and give his official prognostication. All friends and neighbors are invited to attend the ceremony at the Crim farm in the Lazbuddie community. Family members assist Crim with preparations for the fire and annual weather forecast. This is the 16th year in which friends, neighbors and newsmen have been invited to be present for the affair.

Crim says it makes no difference if the sun is shining or not, but that the reading "must" be made at the precise moment the sun should appear in the East.

Should the smoke be carried from the west it should be a bumper crop year; north-northwest calls for an average year; and west, south or southwest indicates a poor crop year. Don't fail to be present for the official forecast Friday morning! Coffee will be served.

### School Board Election Set April 6

April 6 is date set for Farmer County School Board elections, according to Judge Archie Tarter. On that date, voters in all four of the county school systems will go to the polls to elect two school board members and name a county trustee at large.

Name appearing on the ballot for the Farmer County Trustee at Large is that of Wendell Christian, of Oklahoma Lane. Gene Smith of Lazbuddie is a candidate for County trustee from Precinct 4, Lazbuddie.

In the Farwell precinct, the names of Darrell Norton, J. W. Herington, Clarence Johnson and Melborn Jones appear on the ballot for places on the school board. In Friona, Dr. Paul Spring and Louis Welch are candidates for the board; and at Lazbuddie, W. G. Harlan and Don McDonald are candidates for the school board positions.

Election judge in Farwell is Albert Smith and election clerks are Mmes. Norma Christian, Nell Walling and Carol Smith.

Polls will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. In Farwell, residents will vote at the courthouse; in Bovina and Lazbuddie they will vote at the schools; and in Friona they will vote at the city hall, according to Judge Tarter, who is also ex-officio county school superintendent. Absentee voting began on March 16 and will conclude April 2, 5 p.m.

## New Mayor Presides At Town Meeting

At the meeting of Texico town council last Tuesday, Mayor Howard Billingsley, recently elected, took over the reins of the town and presided at the meeting. He succeeds W. D. Howard who declined to seek re-nomination to the mayor's post.

Manford Turnbough and Bob Dollar, also recently elected to positions on the town council, were in attendance at the meeting.

The resignation of J. C. Sanford as town marshal was accepted, and Jim Light was hired to fill the position on a 30-day trial basis. Light was employed by the town as marshal in 1962-63.

The council passed ordinance 166 (zoning ordinance) approv-

ing changing blocks four, seven, eight and nine, of the Marshall addition, from zone A to zone B (single family residences to multiple family dwellings).

Councilmen also discussed a general rate increase in the water and sewer department. Most councilmen believe that a change will be necessitated to properly operate the department. Official action will be taken at the next meeting of the body on the regulation governing water and sewer taps.

Fred Brumelow, Clovis teacher who ran the Texico swimming pool last year, was again given a contract for operation of the pool for this summer.

All other business was of a routine nature.

**Kennedy's Halo Slips**

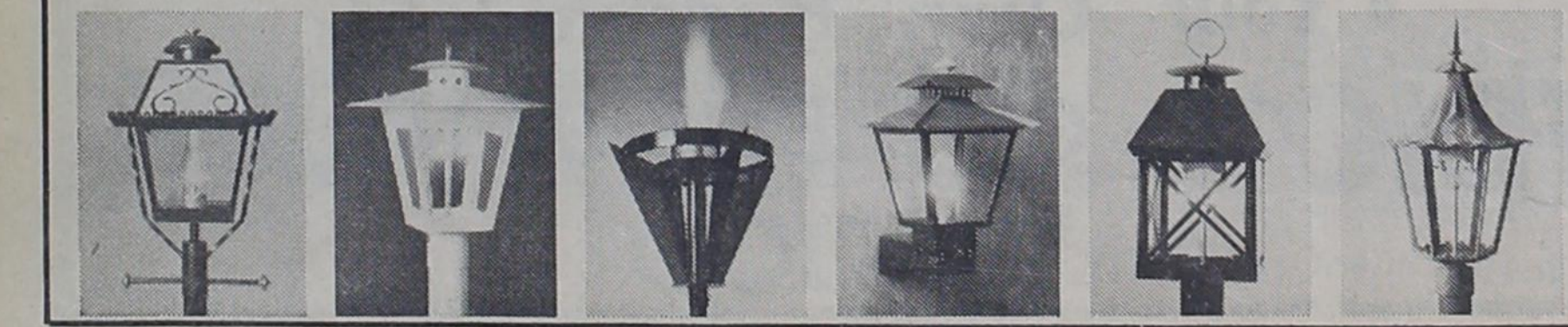

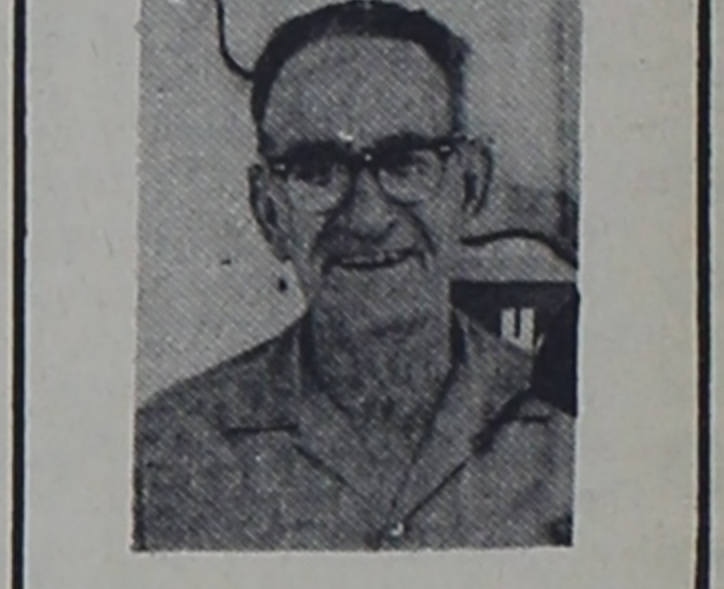
