



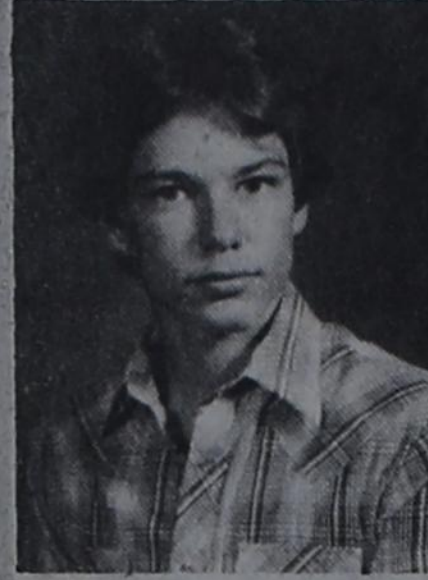

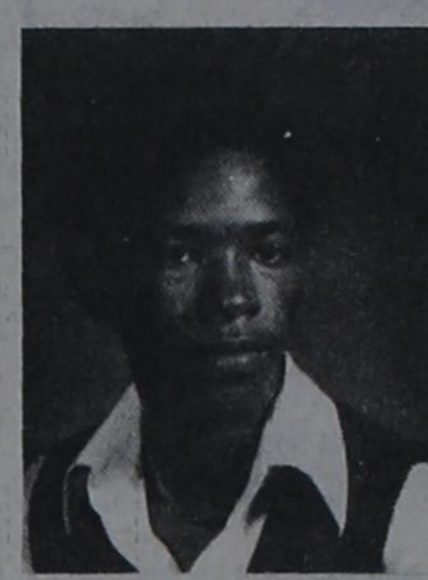

'Sports Illustrated' Texico Homecoming Theme

Last month as we turned another milestone we were remembered with the gift of a book titled, "Real Men Don't Eat Quiche," or a guidebook to all that is truly masculine. We appreciated the thought behind the gift and immediately read through the rather short epistle.

We immediately found out that Real Men don't buy flight insurance, don't smoke low tar cigarettes, don't take guff from French maitre d's, don't floss, don't use Zip Codes, don't have telephones in the shape of Snoopy, etc. It is real entertaining, and if any of you Real Men want to read up on the subject - be our guest.

After reading this guide to Real Men, we can say that Bill Yoeman, coach of the Houston Cougars, is a quiche eater, and that Jerry Moore of the Texas Tech Red Raiders qualifies as a Real Man.

Two weeks ago Tech lost a game to Baylor by one point. Coach Moore went for the two-point win and lost. But he exhibited the guts of the Real Man. Last Saturday, Houston took on the Baylor Bears and their coach kissed his sister with a tie game. No Real Man stuff there.

On the basis of that display of the will to win by Moore and the performance of Tech's players against A&M, it looks as if Tech could be in for a winning season. If not, it won't be because the coach or the team lacked Real Man guts.

The folks in Curry County have a special interest in the upcoming election because they will determine if the County passes a \$4,700,000 bond issue to build a new jail facility.

Fortunately, the Parmer County Commissioners several years ago took advantage of the Federal Revenue Sharing Program then in place and built a new county slammer.

It will be somewhat costly to the taxpayers of Curry County to fund the new jail facility, but could well be the least expensive route over the years ahead. Today it is not the local voters who decide how much money they wish to spend for keeping criminals locked up, Federal Judges tell 'em.

At the present time, Curry County has a lawsuit pending for the way they handled a juvenile. This suit could cost the taxpayers of Curry County from \$100,000 to \$400,000, and they would have to cough up as per a judge's order.

So it looks as if there will be a new jail in Clovis which meets some judge's idea of a detention facility. Not much is left to the discretion of the local folks who pay the bills anymore.

This "taxation without representation" is the result of a more liberally active judiciary and a legislature that has opened the legal doors for this type of lawsuits. This comes about because many voters do not know the past histories of those they install in office.

For example, in New Mexico, Toney Anaya, who is running for Governor, has said he will not have anyone executed while he is Governor. Which means bigger and better jails.

In Texas, Jim Hightower, running for Commissioner of Agriculture, is against the use of many of our chemicals in agriculture. This will cause the price of food to rise.

So the moral of the story is, if you are griping about the cost of jails or food, look to your friendly politician that you have put into office more on the basis of a party than a record.

We read the other day where the Chinese have come up with a short range, low altitude flying saucer. They developed it for use by the police in surveillance work. After all, what's China without cops and saucers?

Texico Wolverine Homecoming Week has been designated as October 11 through October 15 and will be climaxed on Friday evening when the Wolverines host the Melrose Buffaloes for a district football clash.

"Sports Illustrated" has been selected as the theme for the week's activities which will be highlighted by a pre-game coronation next Friday evening.

Candidates in the Homecoming Contest include the following juniors and seniors: Allan Hadley, Ruth Scott, Tammy Powell, seniors; Kevin Akers, Chary Jesko, Terri Fenn, Dana Morris, Brad Steward, Tobin Tate, and Kevin West, juniors. Football players selected the queen candidates, and volleyball

players and cheerleaders selected the king candidates. All juniors and seniors were eligible.

The week will begin with Tuesday as Backward Dress Day; Wednesday as Halloween Costume Day; Thursday as Dress-Up Day; and Friday as Green and White Day. Secret judges will select the "best dressed" boy and girl from elementary, junior high and high school on Backward Dress Day and Halloween Costume Day, with the winners receiving ribbons. All costumes must be appropriate attire for school.

Other contests during the week include a Spirit Link Contest, a Mini Parade, a Poster Contest and a Sports Illustrated Magazine Page Contest. The cheerleaders will

be selling links for 10 cents each for the Spirit Link Contest. Each link will have the purchaser's name placed on it and during the Friday pep rally a blindfolded person will break the chain. The lucky person whose name appears on the broken link will receive a free pizza for two.

All poster entries must be in at the high school office by 3:30 p.m. on Wednesday. The posters must be three feet by six feet and may be designed on anything pertaining to Homecoming Spirit with emphasis on "Beat Melrose Buffaloes" since all volleyball and football opponents for the week will be from Melrose. Any class or club is eligible to enter.

Page Contest are limited to junior and senior high students. The "pages" may be picked up at the high school office. Each page will have a predesignated football or volleyball term that must be illustrated.

Mini floats for the pep rally parade on Friday must be registered in the high school office by 3:30 p.m. on Thursday. The floats must be made on a small order, such as red wagons and tricycles, since the "parade" will be in the gym. Float entries are limited to one per club or one per class, but all levels may participate.

The football field and volleyball court will be decorated by green and white chains. Each elementary class is requested to make a 15-foot chain and turn it in to the high school

office by noon on Wednesday.

Thursday, a special pep rally for the volleyball girls is scheduled for 1 p.m. Then the A, B, and Junior High volleyball teams will meet Melrose Buffaloes at 4 p.m.

On Green and White Day (Friday), a full day's festivities are scheduled, including a pep rally on Friday morning at 9 a.m. in the Wolverine Gym. Winners of each contest will be announced during the pep rally.

At 5 p.m. the Wolverine Booster Club will begin serving a Chuck Wagon Barbecue supper. Advance tickets of \$3 for adults and \$2.25 for children nine years old and under may be purchased at the high school office or from any Booster Club member. Tickets sold at the dinner will be \$3.50

for adults and \$2.50 for children nine years old and under. The menu will feature barbecue, potato salad, pinto beans, cobbler, bread, tea and coffee. The serving line will be closed at 7 p.m.

In the pre-game coronation at 7 p.m., the 1982 Homecoming King and Queen will be revealed. Crownbearers for the ceremony will be first-graders, Dara Jenkins, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Jenkins; and Michael Coffman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Mike Coffman. Flowers for the court will be donated by Clovis Floral and the queen and king will receive plaques furnished by the Student Council.

The Wolverine Marching Band, Flag and Rifle teams will present halftime musical serenades with "Mirada," "We

Got the Beat," "Pac-Man Fever," and "I Got the Music in Me." There will also be a parade of royalty and a mini-float parade.

The class with the largest number of alumni present will be recognized during halftime. A registration table will be set up near the concession stand, and each former Texico student is urged to register before the game.

"If you know of any alumni or Wolverine friend, please invite them to come. Also, if you have any addresses of former Wolverines, please notify us at the high school office," urges Jesse Orozco, Student Council president.

Immediately following the game there will be a Wolverine reception in the high school library.

Other awards presented included the Parmer County

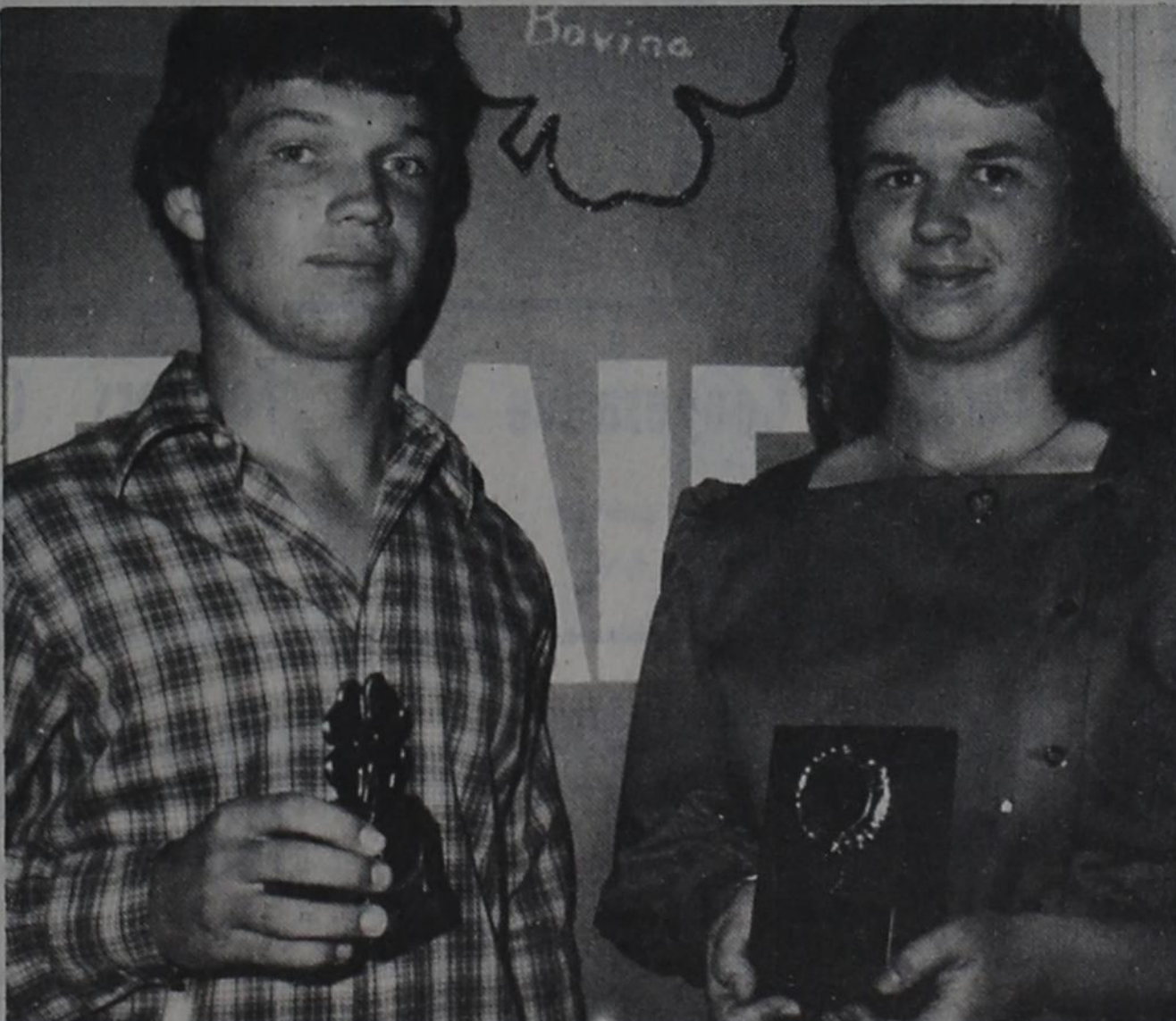

Named as 1982 Gold Star Boy and Gold Star Girl were Kevin Owen of Farwell and Maureen Jesko of Lazbuddie. The two received the awards, the county's highest 4-H distinction,

at the Parmer County 4-H Achievement Banquet Tuesday night at Farwell schools cafeteria. Only two Gold Star awards are available per county and are provided by

Texas Agricultural Extension Service to recognize outstanding achievement, leadership, and contribution to the county 4-H program.

"We pulled all Tylenol capsules off our shelves immediately," says Pudge Rose of Rose Drug in Farwell, "and we found no affected lot numbers," but a sign in the drug store warns, FDA Recommends That No Tylenol Be Used.

The Federal Drug Administration originally warned that no Extra Strength Tylenol capsules be used, and then the warning was issued that no Tylenol products of any kind be used. The latest information, according to Amfac Wholesalers in Lubbock, is that no action has been taken on Tylenol tablets or liquid, but the FDA still warns against the use of any Tylenol capsules.

The alert came a week ago following the deaths of seven persons in the Chicago area after taking Tylenol capsules which were found to be loaded with cyanide. Since that time, one person became extremely ill, but recovered, after taking the capsules which later were found to be laced with strychnine.

McNeil Consumer Products Co., makers of Tylenol products, has said that there is no evidence that the latest discovery in California is related to the cyanide poisoning in the Chicago area.

Benny Haney at Capitol Foods and Vicky Hamilton of Allsup's Convenience Store, both in Farwell, also said that they immediately removed the Tylenol capsules from their

shelves, but that they didn't have any of the affected lot numbers.

Last Friday afternoon, personnel at Cannon Air Force Base called the Tribune in-

forming that they found some of the 50-capsule Extra Strength Tylenol capsules in the batch that was removed from the base shelves with one of the affected lot numbers, but after

testing, none contained cyanide.

The present FDA warning is still that no Tylenol capsules be used, until this crisis is resolved.

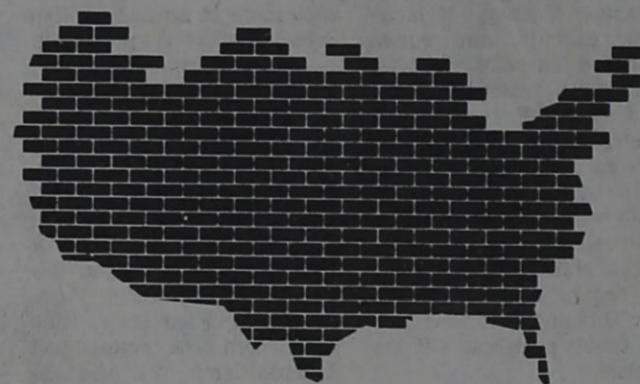

Wyatt Carpenter Pastor At Okla. Lane Baptist

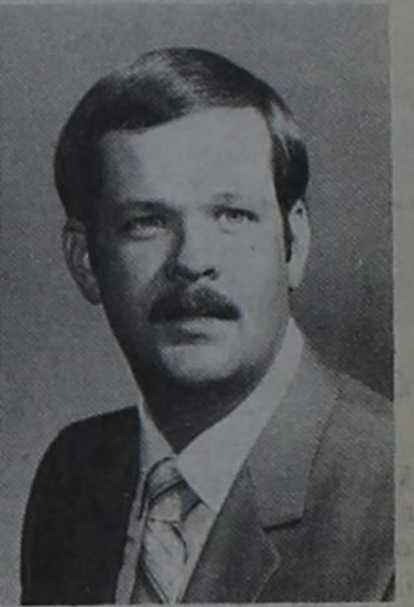

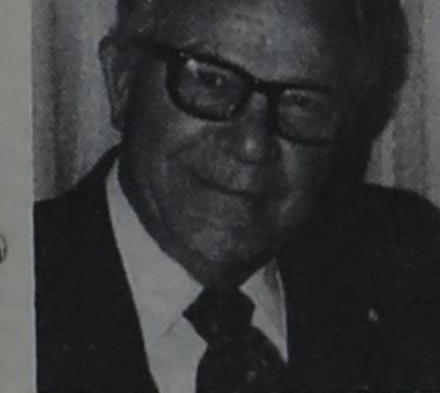
Rotary Hears Dist. Governor

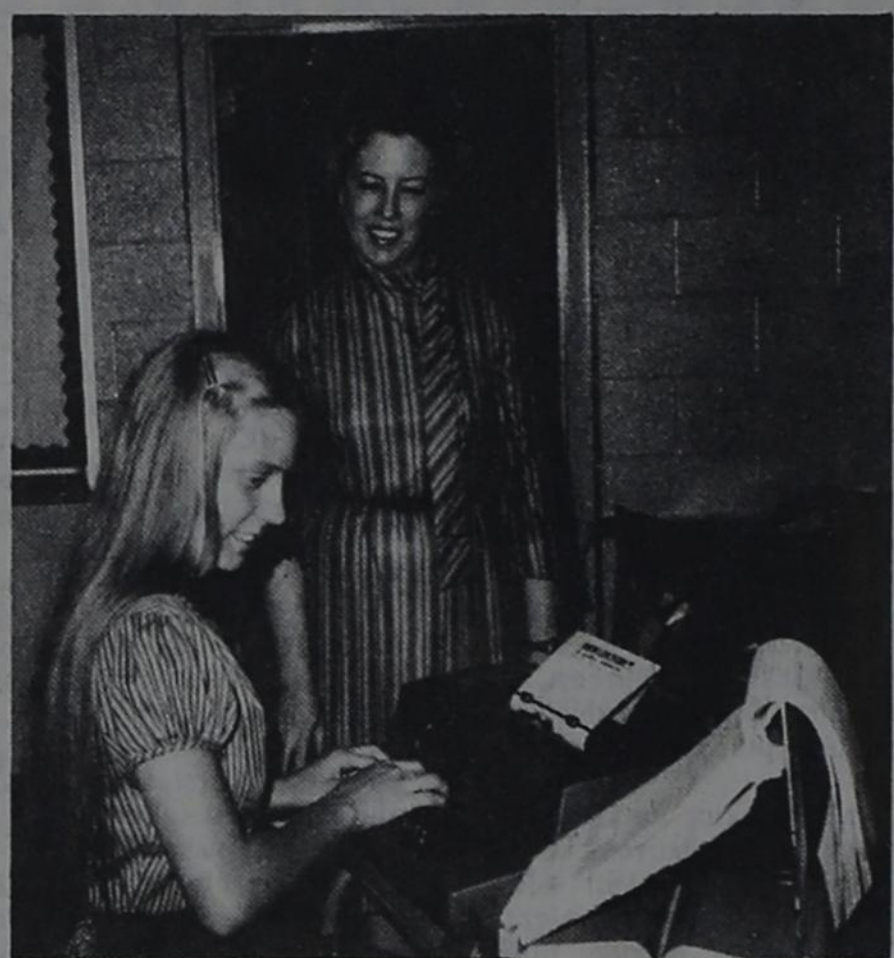

Steer Fumbles Costly, Friona Takes Win 27-10

Farwell's three fumbles in the final stanza proved too costly as the Friona Chieftains capitalized on the Steer miscues to outscore the Blue and White by a 27-10 count Friday night at the Chieftain field.

The Chieftains received the ball to open the game, and were promptly stopped on the 42-yard line on fourth down by a Robby Armstrong tackle.

The Blue and White took over at that point but were also unable to move the ball. The game was a defensive standstill until late in the first period when Farwell took control on a 45-yard scoring march aided by the running of Santiago Lucio and a 20-yard pass completion from Alan Eubank to Roger Robertson. Lucio hauled in a 10-yarder from Eubank for the touchdown for the Steers' initial score. Raymond Sierra kicked the extra point to put the Steers out front 7-0.

The early part of the second quarter proved to be another defensive battle between the teams. The Steers held Friona with big defensive plays by Johnny Daniel, Lucio, and Steve Schilling.

Later in the period, however, Friona's offense proved its skill

when they marched downfield and scored on a run from the one-yard line. The Chieftain kick was good and the game was tied at 7-7 which was the score at halftime.

Farwell received the ball to open the second half but were held on downs and were forced to punt.

On the next set of downs, the Steers recovered a Friona fumble and advanced downfield. The drive opened with Eubank completing two passes to Robertson. Runs by Eubank and Armstrong and another completion to Robertson for 13 yards set up a Sierra 16-yard field goal to put the Steers ahead 10-7.

In the fourth quarter Friona took advantage of a Farwell fumble which set up a 47-yard run by a Chieftain back to make another touchdown for the home team. The kick was good and the Chieftains led 14-10.

Another Farwell fumble set up a 69-yard sprint for the goal with only three minutes left in the game. The PAT was successful and Friona was out in front 21-10.

The Steers made one more effort, but also made one more fumble which the Chieftains used to set up their final score, making the count 21-10, Friona.

The extra point try was stopped by Schilling to end the game at 27-10.

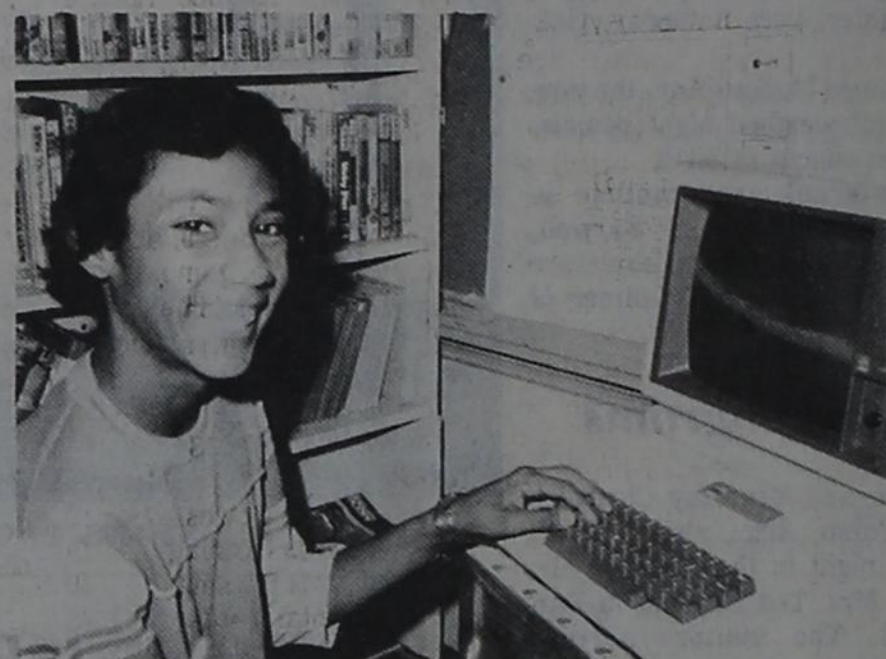
Junior High Student Names New Farwell Computer

Permit numbers will be restricted so that hunters will have a good opportunity to bag their limit.

STANDING, WALKING AND RUNNING FOR GOD

In a way the Christian life is a stand; in another, it's a walk; and in still another a race.

In I Corinthians 15:1, the Apostle Paul writes of "the gospel... where-in ye stand," and in Romans 5:2, "this grace wherein we stand," while in Galatians 5:1 he bids us: "Stand fast therefore in the liberty wherewith Christ hath made us free."

Perhaps all this is well summed up in his appeal to his beloved Philippians:

"Therefore, my brethren, dearly beloved and longed for, my joy and crown... STAND FAST IN THE LORD, my dearly beloved" (Phil. 4:1).

But the Christian life is more than a stand. It is a walk (which in Scripture refers to conduct).

Once, says Paul, we walked "in trespasses and sins" (Eph. 2:1,2) but having been saved by grace, through faith in Christ, we are now to "walk in newness of life" (Rom. 6:4). Thus the Apostle bids us to "walk worthy of the Lord" (Col. 1:10), to "walk circumspectly, not as fools, but as wise, redeeming the time, because the days are evil" (Eph. 5:15,16).

But the Christian life is even more than a walk; it is a race. Sad to say, many Christians whose "walk" is consistent and commendable have never come to look upon the Christian life as a race. These never put enough into it so that it might be said of them that they are running. Yet the same great Apostle wrote, by divine inspiration:

"Let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us" (Heb. 12:1).

The word "patience" in this passage points up the fact that the Christian life is not a short "hundred yard dash"; it requires much endurance. Thus we should put into it all that we have. "They which run in a race," says the Apostle, "run all," but they do not all receive the prize. Hence the admonition: "So run that ye may obtain" (I Cor. 9:24).

Those who have not trusted Christ as Savior have not even begun to stand or walk, much less to run a race for Him. These might as well forget rewards until they first accept "the gift of God... eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord" (Rom. 6:23).
