## Coronation, Game Climax Texico Homecoming

Wolverine spirit is alive and well at Texico Schools this week as the entire student body and faculty have been caught up in the "Sports Illustrated" theme and activities of Homecoming Week 1982. The special week will be highlighted with the coronation of the 1982 Football Homecoming King and Queen just prior to the football game between the Wolverines and the Melrose Buffaloes Friday night. The crowning of the new royalty will take place at 7 p.m. with the ball game to follow at 7:30.

Homecoming Royalty candidates include Ruth Scott, Tammy Powell, and Allan Hadley, seniors; Kevin Akers, Kevin West, Dana Morris, Tobin Tate, Chary Jesko, Brad

Steward, and Terri Fenn, juniors.

The new king and queen will be crowned by last year's honorees. Lisa Crooks is the 1981 Homecoming Queen, and the 1981 Homecoming King is Kent Harding. In the event that Harding is unable to attend the homecoming game, the queen will be crowned by another 1982 graduate, Neal Snipes.

Crownbearers will be Dara Jenkins and Michael Coffman, first graders. Flowers for the homecoming court will be provided by Clovis Floral, and the winners will receive plaques furnished by the Student Council.

Following the coronation, the Wolverines will put their unbeaten record on the line again, taking their Number One state ranking into a game with the Melrose Buffaloes to climax this year's homecoming event.

Also on tap today (Friday) which is Green and White Day, is a huge pep rally in the gym at 9 a.m. Winners of the various contests held during the week will be held at this time and the mini-parade will take place.

Starting at 5 p.m. the Wolverine Booster Club will be serving a Chuck Wagon Barbecue supper at the east side of the football field. (It was previously announced that the location would be the south end of the field.) Advance tickets are \$3 for adults and \$2.25 for children nine years old and

under, with tickets at the supper going for \$3.50 for adults and \$2.50 for children nine and under.

Persons who have not picked up their homecoming mums prior to the game may pick them up at the concession stand.

Ending the evening will be a Homecoming Dance sponsored by the Junior Class Parents. The dance will be in the Jaycee Building in Farwell following the game, from 10 p.m. to 1:30 a.m. MDT. A disc jockey from the rock group Voltz will provide the music. Among those sponsoring the dance are Mr. and Mrs. Roger Jesko and Mr. and Mrs. Donnie Morris.

All alumni are urged to register and also to attend a reception in the high school library immediately following the game.

Contests and events which have kept the halls humming this week have included various modes of dress days, including Backward Day, Halloween Costume Day, Dress-Up Day, and Green and White Day; Spirit Link Contest in which the cheerleaders have sold links for 10 cents each with the person whose name is on the link which is broken at the pep rally to receive two free pizzas;

Also, the mini-parade, the annual poster contest, and the new feature this year: the Sports Illustrated Magazine contest in which junior high and high school students have

taken pages which had a pre-designated football or volleyball term that had to be illustrated for the page of the magazine.

Thursday's activities included a pep rally at 1 p.m. for the volleyball girls who were hosting the Melrose teams starting at 4 p.m.

Decorations of green and white spirit chains were to decorate the volleyball court and football field for the week's sports action, with each elementary school class having made a 15-foot chain to be used.

The Wolverine Marching Band along with the Rifle and Flag Teams will perform at halftime of the homecoming game with their numbers to include "Mirada," "We Got The Beat," "Pac-Man Fever," and "I Got The Music In Me." There will also be a parade of the royalty and the mini-float parade.

All Wolverine fans, friends and exes are urged to come out for the homecoming events today and tonight and help cheer the Mean Green Machine on to victory.

### Farwell School Board Has Public Hearing

Farwell School Board met Tuesday night, Oct. 12, for a public hearing on a proposal to increase total tax revenues from properties on the tax roll in 1981 by 7.27 percent.

School board members present were Wilbert Kalbas, Joe Hughes, Maxine Williams, Floyd Coates, Darrell Stephens, Richard Haseloff, and Edward Corn. Also present were W.M. Roberts, superintendent, and James Craig. No one else attended the public meeting.

The board voted to meet on Monday, Oct. 18, at 8 p.m. in the superintendent's office for the purpose of setting the tax for 1982. This will be a public meeting.

### Absentee Voting Underway In Parmer, Curry Counties

Everyone eligible to vote but unable to do so in the General Election on November 2 should apply at the county voter registrar's office to vote absentee.

In Parmer County, absentee voting began October 13 and the deadline for voting in person is Friday, Oct. 29, while absentee ballots will be accepted in the mail as late as November 2. Those wishing to vote absentee may apply at the county clerk's office during regular office hours, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the courthouse in Farwell.

In Curry County, absentee voting deadline, is Thursday, Oct. 28, at 5 p.m. Deadline for mailing out an absentee ballot is Saturday, Oct. 23. Voting may be done in person at the county clerk's office during regular office hours, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

To qualify to vote absentee, a person must be absent from the county of residence on election day, or be unable to appear at the authorized polling place on election day due to sickness, physical disability, or religious belief.

In Texas, every House, Senate and Congressional seat is up for re-election, along with nearly every statewide office and most county offices.

Also on the Texas ballot are six proposed constitutional amendments.

Only 24 percent of those eligible voted in the May 1 Texas primary, the lowest in 30 years for a gubernatorial primary election.

In New Mexico, most county and state offices are also up for re-election including a

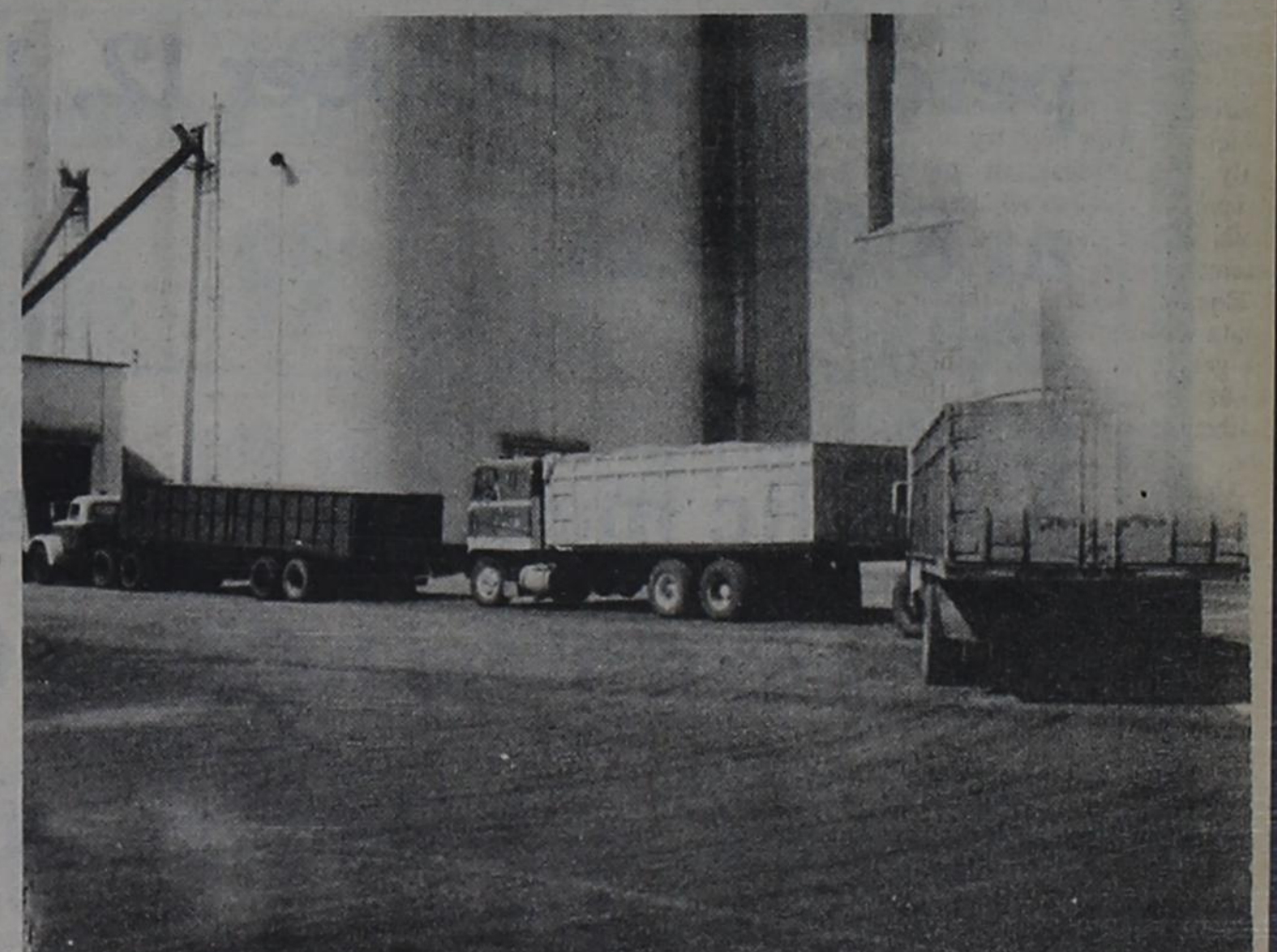
heated gubernatorial race, as well as seven proposed constitutional amendments, a bond issue question, and a decision on Sunday liquor sales for Clovis residents.

The question on whether to allow the sale of alcoholic beverages on Sunday will be placed on the ballot for only those voters who reside in the Clovis city limits.

All the counties in the state

with the exception of Curry and Roosevelt counties will vote on the bond issue question.

The bond issue question is on the issuance of general obligation bonds by Curry County to secure funds for erecting a new law enforcement complex to be an addition to the existing courthouse and jail, and including the purchase of land.

Good Grief! We missed it again. Yup, Ole Christopher Columbus came swishing through town last Monday and closed up a few businesses, and we didn't even know it. In our own mind, we have no idea why in the name of Amerigo Vespucci, Congress for all its lapses of sanity designated a National Holiday for him. It is said with some justification that Columbus didn't know where he was going, didn't know where he was when he got there, and didn't know where he'd been when he got back, and did it on borrowed money.

We haven't studied the fuzzi on a caterpillar this fall but have felt that an early fall was due. But, inasmuch as procrastination is the thief of time, our planter box was not prepared for the nip in the air Saturday night. We wonder if anybody else's foliage felt the chill of the unseasonable cold.

We have no idea at this time about the situation surrounding the placement of the MX missile system. However, a reasonable assessment of the criteria for the placement of the system indicates that this area must be high on the planner's list of possible sites. We also think that the final decision is not in the hands of any local or even State authority; therefore, the engendering of intense antagonisms among the local population is counter-productive. Whether it comes or not, those of us with our roots here will have to live with each other, and it is better to live as friends rather than with festering animosities.

With or without the MX, the area of our Twin Cities is a place of great potential growth. The High Plains in general and the area of Clovis, Texico and Farwell in particular has the natural attributes that will foister such future expansion. The story of this area just has not been widely enough advertised.

We read a column the other day by an area publisher enumerating all the pluses in his area. We think we have his town beaten in a number of significant ways.

Our particular community is the hub of one of the very best transportation networks in the entire Southwest. Industry and commerce thrives on transportation, and we have it. We are extremely well situated in regard to energy. Of an immediate nature, Southwestern Public Service Company has two large plants within a stone's throw and has plans for even more generating capacity. It has industrial power to spare. Natural gas is available to us in quantities not possible in other parts of the country. Even the more exotic forms of energy such as solar and wind are inexhaustible local resources. We have a climate which will allow industry to not only invest less in plant properties but spend less in both utilities and long term maintenance.

Equally important, this climate will allow the employees to get to work and go home 99.99 percent of the time without loss of plant productivity.

Also of prime importance is the hard to define but always sought after thing known as "quality of life." This "quality" right now is bringing more and more people to the Southwest and our immediate area.

So with or without the MX, we envision a bright future for the Twin Cities. Let us not spoil this future with arguing between ourselves over something we very probably will have no voice in anyway.

We have long ago discovered that there are three things about writing a column. One is what you meant to say, two is what you actually said, and three is what somebody else understands you to say. We

## Farwell City Council Okays New Tax Rate

Farwell City Council met in regular session Monday night in city hall and discussed the city tax rate which calculations show that the tax rate may be set at 33 cents per \$100 valuation.

After discussion and review, the city fathers approved and set the new tax rate at 33 cents per \$100 valuation for the 1982 tax year.

This is not a tax increase, emphasize the council members. Based on the new appraised valuations from Parmer County Tax Appraisal District, this new set rate will bring in the same amount of money as last year's rate did.

In other action by the council, members renewed the Cemetery CD in the amount of \$12,939 plus interest, and agreed to install a master water meter on City Well No. 4

in order to keep a better check on how much water the well is pumping.

Also, council members accepted the city audit reports compiled by Mark Ryburn of the local accounting office, and approved water superintendent Dee Hammit's attending a water school in Lubbock Nov. 24.

Present at the meeting were Mayor Walter Kaltwasser, councilmen Fred Chandler and Jerry Monk, city clerk Janie Bowery, Hammit, and Ryburn.

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## Commissioners Name Election Officials

Parmer County Commissioners met Monday, Sept. 27, in regular session and again on Friday, Oct. 8.

At the September 27 meeting the Commissioners approved election officials for the county's voting precincts, and later in the day, approved the 1983 budget after conducting a public hearing.

Approved as election presiding judges and alternate presiding judges were Pct. 1, Black, Mrs. Glyn Hamilton, Mrs. Joan Euler; Pct. 2, Friona, Fred Florez, Mrs. Fred Florez; Pct. 2-1, Friona, Danny Kendrick, Mrs. Bruce Shafer; Pct. 2-2, Friona, Jerry R. Lewis, Mrs. Mary Ford;

Also, Pct. 3, Bovina, J. E. Sherrill, Jr., Mrs. Gloria Atchley; Pct. 4, Farwell, Mrs. Billie Blain, Phil Garrett; Pct. 5, Lazbuddie, Alton Morris, E.A. Parham; Pct. 6, Oklahoma Lane, Clarence Johnson, Harold Carpenter; Pct. 7, Rhea, Raymond Schueler, Carl Schlenker; Pct. 8, Lakeview, J. Dee Willard, Mrs. Russell O'Brian.

In other business the Court approved payment for a subscription renewal to the Revenue Sharing Bulletin in the amount of \$42; a bill for \$35 for physical examinations of two children picked up by the Texas Department of Human Resources; two bills for court reporting in District Court in the amount of \$191.30; and \$4900 to Brown, Graham & Co. for their work on the annual audit and proposed budget.

After a discussion concerning the fees of office and service of citations for the county sheriff's office, it was voted to double the existing fees of office for the sheriff's department, effective November 1, 1982.

Judge Porter Roberts reported that he had received a letter from the Texas Justice Court Training Center stating that Parmer County Justices of the Peace Albert Smith, Frances Euler, and Wayne Spears had successfully completed their course.

Action was tabled on a letter received pertaining to the

building being occupied by the Bovina Neighborhood Center.

According to minutes of the meeting, the Commissioners drove to Precinct 1 to check some trees that had been reported as damaged by fire.

"The consensus of opinion of the Commissioners was that some trees had been damaged but as best they could tell, were putting on new growth. The extent of any damage to the trees could not be determined because of the head high growth of weeds around the trees," said Judge Roberts.

The following soil conservation work was approved and ratified and is to be done when the machines are in that area and not demanded for use on the roads: Pct. 1: Jesse Lane, Ed Clark, Hollis Horton, Ralph Wilson, Floyd Reeve, Kenneth McLellen, James Anthony;

Also, Pct. 2: Norvell Strawn, Don Fortenberry; Pct. 3: Gene Hardage, Bruce Billingsley; Pct. 4: L.M. Smith.

At their meeting on October 8 the Commissioners voted to increase the county's share of the rent for the building housing the Bovina Neighborhood Center. Lawrence Krieger had informed Judge Roberts that he was in the process of repairing and renovating the building and asked that the rent be raised. The county's share of the rent will be \$86 per month, effective Jan. 1, 1983.

A discussion was held pertaining to equipment needed for the Bovina ambulance, but action on the matter was tabled.

The county extension agent for agriculture was given approval to have needed

repairs made to the county pickup to increase gas mileage.

County Treasurer Benna Felts presented the quarterly report of the county finances and it was voted to have the report printed in the three county newspapers.

Boarding care bills in the amount of \$1,110 for county foster children were approved for payment. This amount will be reimbursed to the county.

County agents Laura Jacobs and Seth Ralston gave short reports to the Court prior to adjournment.

Farwell School Board met in regular session Monday night, Oct. 11, for a routine business meeting. Board members present were Joe Hughes, Maxine Williams, Floyd Coates, Darrrell Stephens, Richard Hasehoff, Wilbert Kalbas, and Edward Corn.

Also attending were W.M. Roberts, superintendent; James Craig, Don Malone, and Jerry Owen, principals; Bruce Dolar, athletic director; and Otto Lingnau, Marcia Pena, Judy Pena, DeeAnn Curtis, and Sheila Smith.

The board went into executive session at 8:15 p.m. to discuss the suspension of driving privileges for Carlos Pena. Marcia Pena and Judy Pena discussed this matter with the board and the meeting was opened again at 8:20 p.m.

It was decided that the driving privileges of Carlos Pena remain in suspension at the discretion of high school principal Don Malone. The suspension was because of a violation of rules set out in the Student Handbook on page 9,

section 6.

The board also approved the refunding of \$48.96 to Otto Lingnau on 1981 taxes, due to a miscount of cattle. Board vice-president Joe Hughes presided and Wilbert Kalbas, president, abstained from participation in the decision.

Students participating in 4-H Club activities under the supervision of the County Agent and/or the County Home Demonstration Agent will be excused from classes and counted present at school.

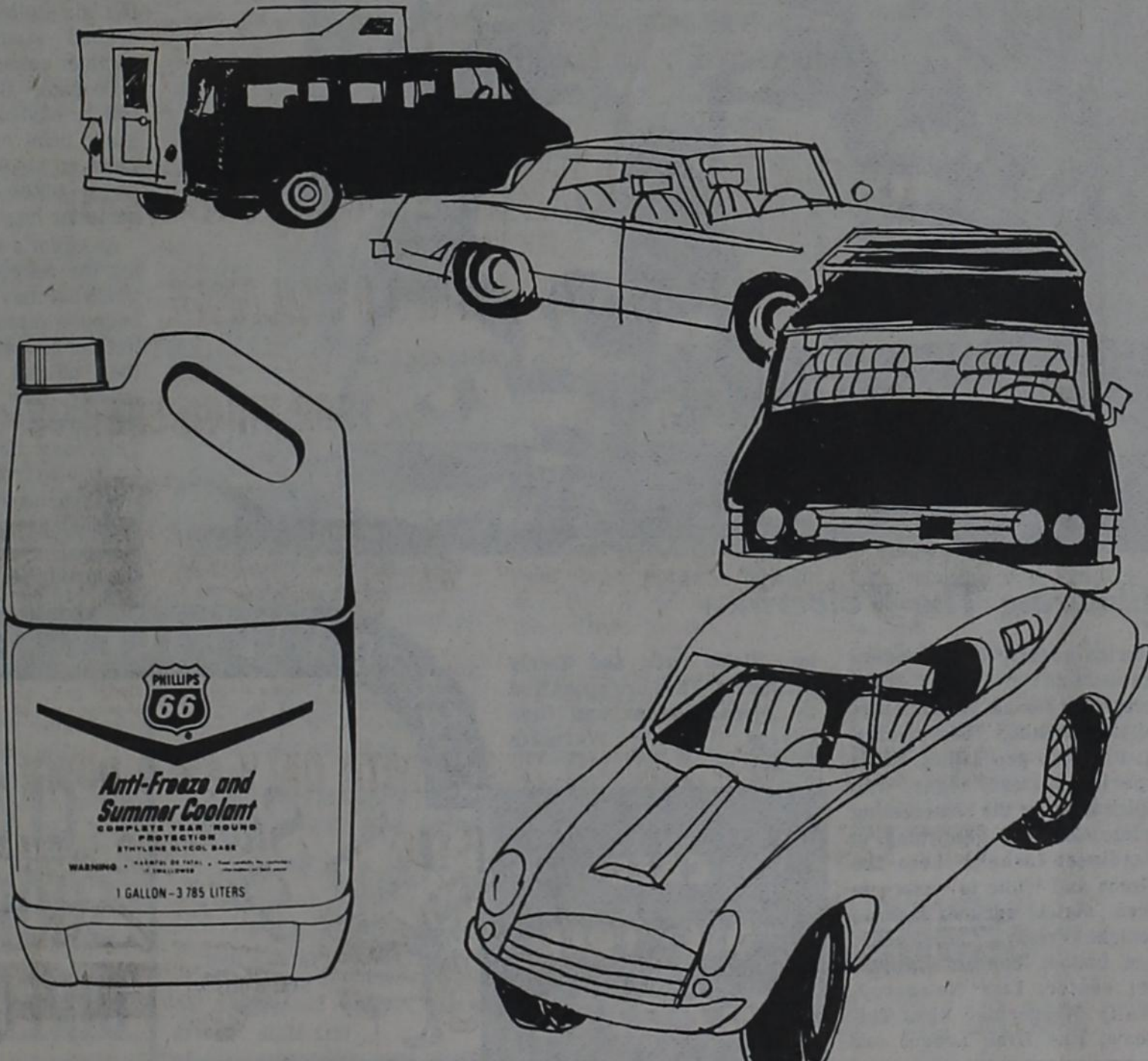

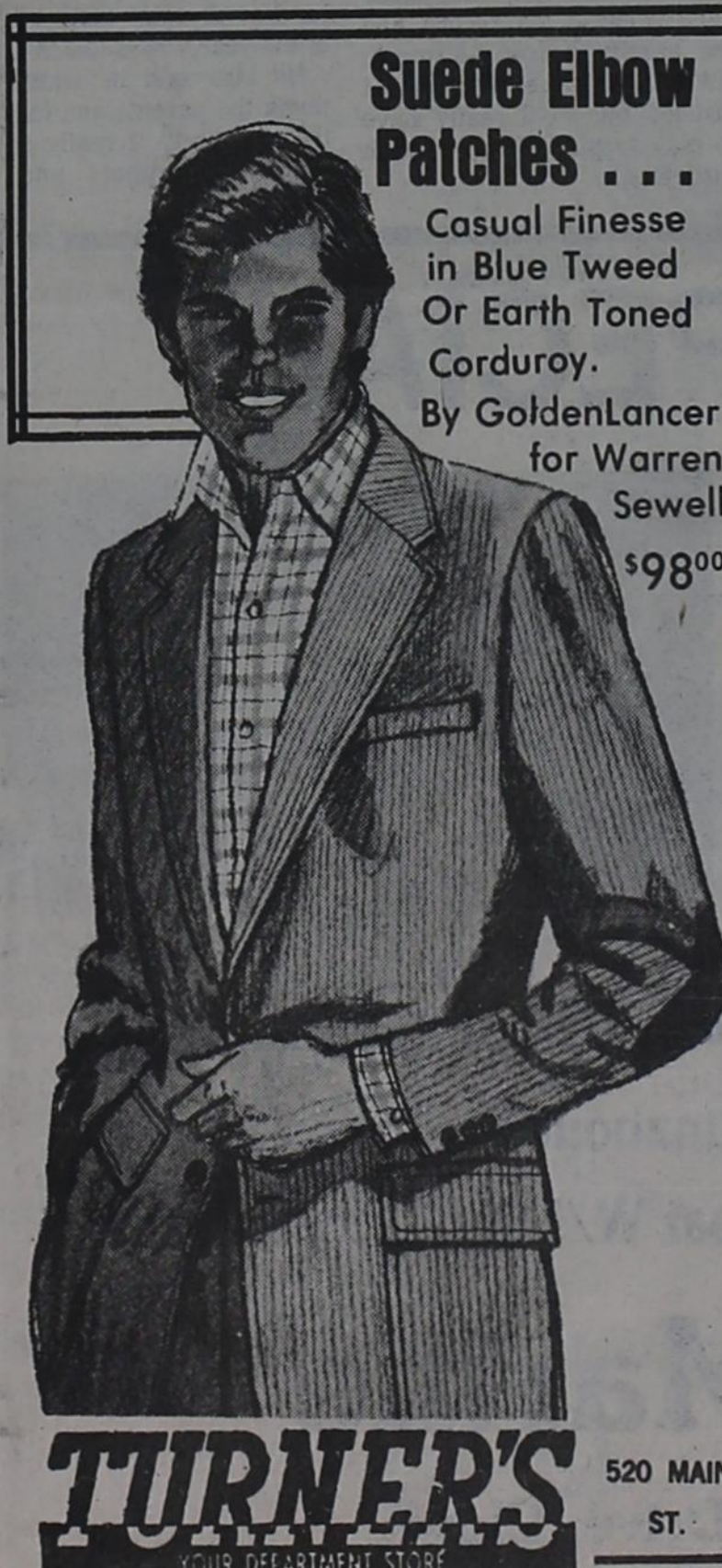

# Texico Beats Hagerman For Second Time Ever!

The Green and White warriors of Texico High under the direction of David Lynn and crew upped their current victory streak to five Friday night by downing the Hagerman Bobcats 21-8, only the second time in history that the Wolverines have beaten the Bobcats, and the very first time that they have defeated them on their home territory.

The game was the district opener for the Wolverines who still remain the number one ranked Class A team in the state of New Mexico. The Bobcat touchdown in the fourth period was the first score made against the Wolverine defense this season, ending their 19-quarter "unscored on" record. But the No Nonsense Defense still managed to hold the Bobcats to one first down and 50 total yards.

The Wolverines received the ball to open the game, and after an exchange of punts by the two teams, Texico wound up with the pigskin deep in their own side of the field, mainly due to penalties.

Despite the penalties which added up to 115 before the night was over, the Wolverines moved the ball downfield, and with 29 seconds left in the first period, Lynn Tubbs ran the ball in from two yards out for the first Texico TD. The two-point conversion pass from Brad Steward to Tubbs was good and the Wolverines were in the lead 8-0.

Neither team could get moving in the second quarter and the half time buzzer sounded with the score still 8-0, Texico.

In the third stanza, Texico drove behind the offensive line play of Jesse Orozco, Tommy Boardman, Allan Hadley, Bobby Johnson, and Ronnie Dunsforth to another touchdown when quarterback Steward hooked up with Kevin West in the corner of the end zone for a three-yard TD play. Lloyd Williams kicked the conversion to make the score 15-0 in favor of the Wolverines going into the fourth quarter.

In the fourth quarter the Bobcats drove in from the three, ending the string of 19 quarters that no team had managed to score on the Wolverine defensive unit. However it took the Bobcats four plays to go the three yards to paydirt.

The Hagerman touchdown was set up when the Wolverines fumbled the ball at their own three and the Bobcats finally moved it across the goal line on fourth and inches.

The Wolverines came right back and scored what proved to be the final touchdown when tailback Earl Bibbs scampered in from nine yards out. The pass attempt for a two-point conversion was incomplete and the Wolverines took the district victory 21-8.

Brad Steward was lost to his team with a minor hip injury for a part of the second quarter, but he was able to return to play during the second half. The Green and White also played without the services of Jeff Holland, a lineman who is probably out until the latter part of the season with a muscle problem in his arm.

Texico managed 231 yards against the Bobcats while the Brick Wall Defense of the Wolverines shut their hosts down to the one first down and 50 total yards. Texico gained 206 of their yards on the ground in 52 carries.

Yellow flags were prominent all during the contest with Texico being flagged 13 times for 115 yards while the Bobcats were penalized 80 yards on six infractions.

Earl Bibbs picked up 179 yards and a TD while fullback Lynn Tubbs took the ball 40 yards on 11 carries and also made a touchdown. Kevin West hauled in two passes for 15 yards and a touchdown while Lynn Tubbs caught two for 10 yards.

Next action for the Mean Green Machine will be tonight (Friday) when they take on the Melrose Buffaloes in Texico's Homecoming tilt starting at 7:30 p.m. MDT.

"I have a lot of respect for them. They were prepared and they were well," said Coach Dave Lynn about the game. "It seems that everybody plays their best game against us. Hagerman was well coached.

This was probably our hardest physical contact game of the year," said Coach Lynn.

He also said he wanted to thank the parents and fans for their support, "I really appreciate the support and the

players have done all that I asked them to."

When asked about the upcoming game against Melrose, Coach Lynn said, "They're probably gonna play their best game of the year and we've got to be ready. We'll prepare for them just as well as anyone else."

He spoke about two of the outstanding players on the Melrose team, "Jacobs, who is one of the better players in Class A, and Rogers who came in late but has been a big help to his team."

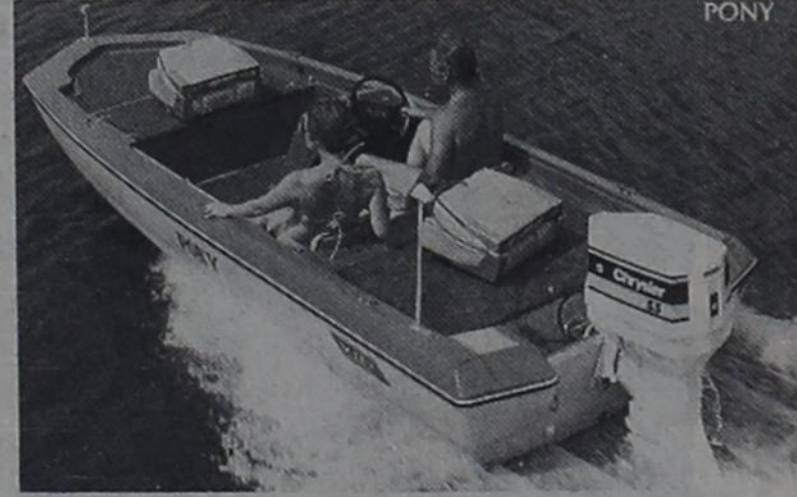
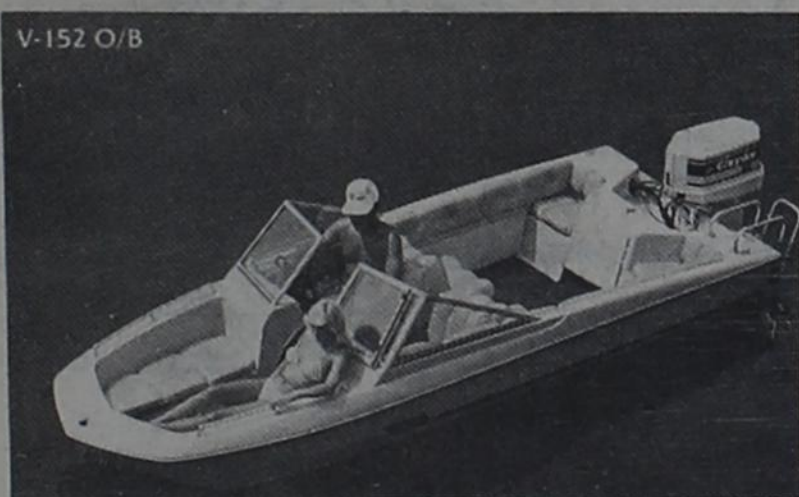

Following the Steer kickoff, Bovina ran off six plays highlighted by a 23-yard burst by Richard Shepherd. When the Steer defense stiffened, the Mustangs punted to Farwell's 17-yard stripe and the Steers finished out the quarter with a 16-yard keeper by quarterback Eubank and a seven to zip lead.

At the start of the second quarter, the Steer offense was stymied and Bovina took the ball on downs. With a 20-yard jaunt by Shepherd, two completed passes resulting in four first downs, and a goal line sneak by Gilbreath the Mustangs scored their first TD of the evening. Their PAT kick by Jose Gomez was also good and the game stood at 7-7.

Farwell took the Bovina kickoff on their own 20-yard line and began a relentless march to the Bovina goal line. The Steers racked up six first downs in their drive which was capped by a Eubank keeper for the score.

After a series of "Yes it is," "No it isn't," and "I don't know" by the officials, the PAT kick was ruled good, and Farwell took a 14-7 bulge with 2:00 left in the first half.

The hard fighting Mustangs took the Steer kickoff and began a quick series of plays featuring a 15-yard run by Mustang QB Dale Gilbreath

and a long pass to Henderson Griggs. Shepherd broke from the 11-yard line and scored his TD for the evening. The Bovina PAT kick was good and again the score was tied at 14-14, with only 25 ticks left in the half.

To open the second half, Farwell kicked off and Shepherd ran the ball back to the Steer 35-yard stripe. Shepherd counted 26 yards on two carries, Joe Pat Wright picked up 4 more, and quarterback Gilbreath kept the ball twice and bulled over from the one to put the Mustangs ahead for the first time when the PAT kick by Gomez was again good, making the score 21-14.

The Steer offense wasted no time and behind the strong running of Eubank, Armstrong, and Paul Fulcher came back for a dozen plays with Fulcher going over from the 4-yard marker. This time the Steer PAT try failed and the Mustangs still led 21-20. Both teams were ineffective in the 5:03 remaining, and the third quarter closed with Bovina in the lead.

The strong Steer fourth quarter opened with Farwell having the ball at about mid-field. Again the trio of Steer backs pushed the ball downfield when, after three first downs, Eubank again scored from the 12-yard line. The PAT run was no good and the Steers held a risky 26-21 lead with 8:07 left in the game.

The Blue and White defense rose to the occasion and held the speedy Mustang offense in check. The defensive play was anchored by the tackling of Raymond Sierra and the pass defense of Jimmy Bernal.

The Steers then took the ball on downs well inside the Bovina end of the field. Armstrong then danced off two long runs and Eubank kept for the final TD from the one. This time the kick was good, no question, and the Steers held a large 33-21 edge with five minutes left on the clock.

Again the defense throttled Bovina by Todd Christian's

tackling and pass defense. Bernal broke the back of the Mustang drive when he intercepted a Bovina aerial and gave Farwell possession of the ball. The Steers were threatening to score when the clock ended the game with Farwell a 33-21 winner over the highly regarded Mustangs.

"The offensive line played its best game of the year against the Bovina Mustangs," said Coach Bruce Dollar. He had nothing but praise for the Steer offensive line of Todd Christian, Jesse Anzaldua, Frank Cantu, Johnny Daniel, Steve Schilling, and Wade Kent. "They played just great and I'm really proud of them," added Coach Dollar.

The coach named his outstanding offensive players as Robby Armstrong, who gained 170 yards in 25 carries; Paul Fulcher, who gained 130 yards in 24 carries; and Alan Eubank, who gained 100 yards in 23 carries.

When asked about tonight's game with the Kress Kangaroos, Coach Dollar said, "They may be the biggest team we've played this year. They've won only one game, but they started out last year with only one win in four, and then went on to win district." The Kangaroos were listed as one of the top five teams in the state at the beginning of this season, commented the coach.

Game time is 7:30 p.m. CDT. The time of the Farwell games changed from 8 to 7:30 last week when district play began.

Farwell Junior High and Farwell High School have released names of students making the honor rolls for the first six-weeks period of the 1982-83 school year.

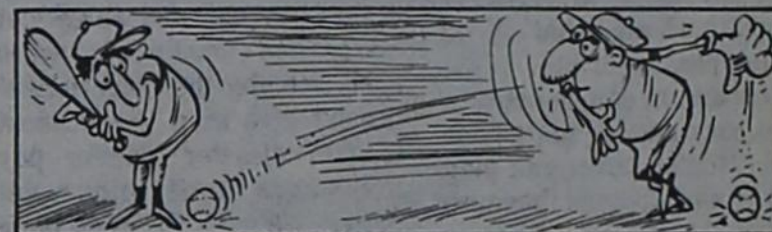

"They did a good job in the game, but we had two of our backs out and the rest of the running backs were inexperienced," the coach stated.

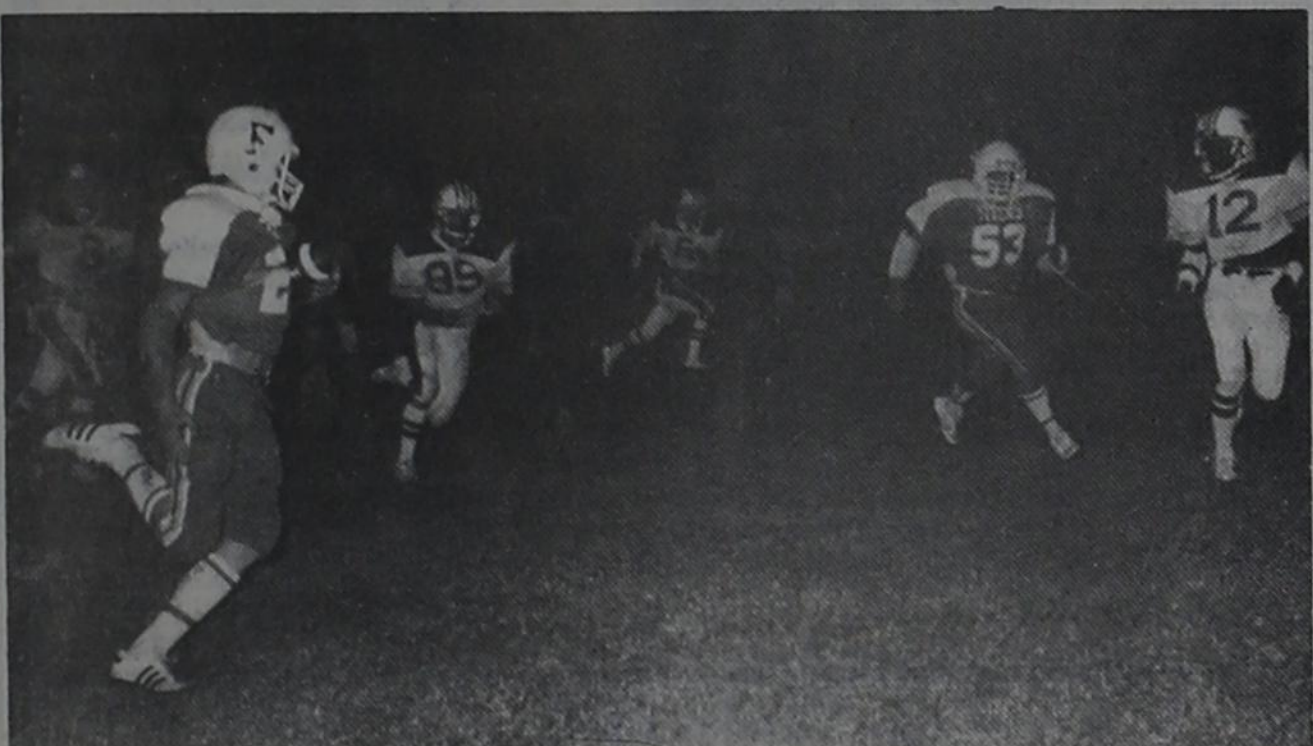
Next outing for the JV will be Thursday, Oct. 21, when they host the Olton JV in Steer Stadium with games beginning at 5 p.m.

Bovina are Richard Shepherd and Henderson Griggs. The Steers beat the Mustangs, 33-21.

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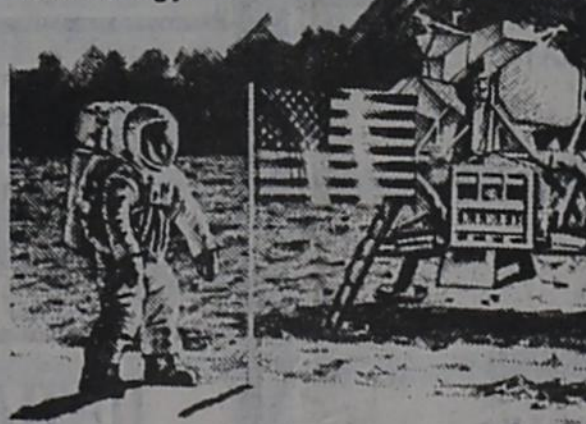
