Olton Tops Cats, 13-7

Olton's ball control offense, directed by premier Quarterback Steve Stockdale, and an inspired defense led the Mustangs over Littlefield's Wildcats, 13-7, at Olton Friday night.

The important District 3-AA clash juggled the standings, leaving Olton and Floydada in the driver's seat with 2-0 records.

Littlefield joined Lockney, Abernathy and Dimmitt with a 1-1 mark in district play, still very much in contention.

The Cats stopped May for no gain, but Stockdale executed perfectly on the quarterback draw and raced the distance almost unmolested. Steve kicked the extra and Olton had its 13-7 lead with 2:01 left in the third quarter.

THE TD gave Olton the momentum, and the Mustangs didn't let the Cats out of Littlefield territory the rest of the game.

In fact it was Olton driving again early in the fourth quarter, as Stockdale hit Workman again on a play that covered 38 yards to the Littlefield 26.

Mrs. Jarmon Real Collector

Mrs. Charlie Jarmon likes old things, and many of the things in her house are older than she is.

"And I'm 78-years-old," she said. "I think I do quite well for a person my age. See all that garden," she said, pointing out the back door. "It goes clear back to there, and I do all that work myself. We've got a little tractor out there and I can drive it as good as anybody. I can even ride a horse," she added. "My horse died a year and a half ago, but when we go to my husband's brother's ranch I still ride."

Mrs. Jarmon, or Ida, as her friends call her, agreed that a picture of her astride a horse would be something. Then taking an old-fashioned picture from a cabinet filled with antiques, she said, "I want to show you the prettiest thing in here. That's me when I was 16. And that's one of my fellers," she added with a laugh and a youthful twinkle in her eyes.

Mrs. Jarmon's garden is filled with flowers, fruits, vegetables and novelty plants. Because she just likes to keep busy, her cellar shelves are lined with more than 300 jars of canned food and a large deep freeze is filled with the harvest from her backyard.

"Oh, I don't mow the grass," she said. "That's supposed to be Charlie's job. But he hires his work done," she confided with a school girl giggle, "and he's younger than me."

Mr. and Mrs. Jarmon have combined several of their "old things" in a bedroom. A washstand and a dresser belonged to Jarmon's mother. A hand-carved wood and leather upholstered rocking chair that's been in the family 180 years, a wash bowl and pitcher and an antique light fixture are among the furnishings. But the real conversation piece is a china bed chamber, complete with an out-dated catalogue such as was common before the days of toilet tissue.

"That pot was once under President Eisenhower's bed," Mrs. Jarmon said. "Before he was president."

The "slop jar" was given to one of Mrs. Jarmon's relatives years ago when he herded cows for the President "from sun-up to sundown for a \$1 a day."

The Jarmons moved to Lamb County in 1925, and for many years Jarmon farmed 10 miles north of Littlefield. The couple moved into town about 25 years ago, and Jarmon is still active in a flying service business of crop dusting and spraying.



UNTIL NOW, Mrs. Charlie Jarmon hasn't had her picture in a newspaper. "I'll bet I look pretty with my pot," she said, referring to the old-fashioned bedchamber at her feet. The relic was once a fixture under former President Eisenhower's bed, and the chair she is in is 180 years old. Still spry at 78 years of age, Mrs. Jarmon holds reddish-brown locks of Russian cotton, one of the novelty plants she grows in her back yard at 701 S. Sunset.

600 People Make 'Freeze' Guesses

More than 600 persons had entered a guess in the Security State Bank's "Freezer" Contest through Friday afternoon.

Only one guess per person is allowed, and some dates guessed have passed.

One optimistic soul, probably with cotton planted in late June, forecast the first freeze date as late as Dec. 19. But bank employees said most of the guesses are for the last two weeks in October.

The earliest freeze ever recorded came on Oct. 7 last year, and by this date a year ago, the Littlefield area had received snow flurries and the temperatures had dipped to the mid-twenties.

In 1969, the first freeze hit Oct. 13, dropping the mercury to 25 degrees.

Seventy-seven years of temperature records show earliest freeze in this area averages coming on Nov. 3.

If there was no ice skim on the water trough this morning, there may still be time to get in on the guessing game.

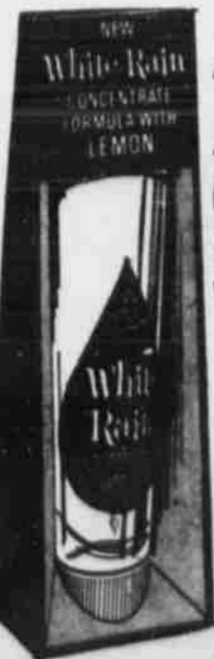

Petroleum Production

Petroleum production continues to play a significant role in the economy of Lamb County with a direct input of \$968,131 last year.

According to the latest compilation of Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Assn., the county in 1970 produced 269,376 barrels of crude oil valued at \$888,941 and 542,396 thousand cubic feet of natural gas valued at \$79,190. It ranked 172nd in value of petroleum production.

In addition, the county received the stimulation of \$121,016 in royalty payments to landowners and others with mineral interests.

"Lamb was one of 187 Texas counties that had petroleum production valued at more than \$125,000," says Kenneth E. Montague, Texas Mid-Continent president. "Its ability to produce helped Texas meet a record demand with record production of both oil and gas in 1970. This demand again diminished Texas petroleum reserves as additions failed to offset draws. In Texas, we only drilled wells—the smallest number since 1964. Texas state government beefed up production taxes on crude oil and on natural gas."

Drilling expenditures in the totaled \$145,233 with \$7,328 being dry holes. Drillers completed one and one dry hole. One dry well was drilled.

Also adding to the economy of Lamb county is one petrochemical plant. The Texas Employment Commission shows 14 persons were directly employed by the oil and gas industry in the county with an annual payroll of \$73,852.

Original Postal Fixtures Go To Tech Museum

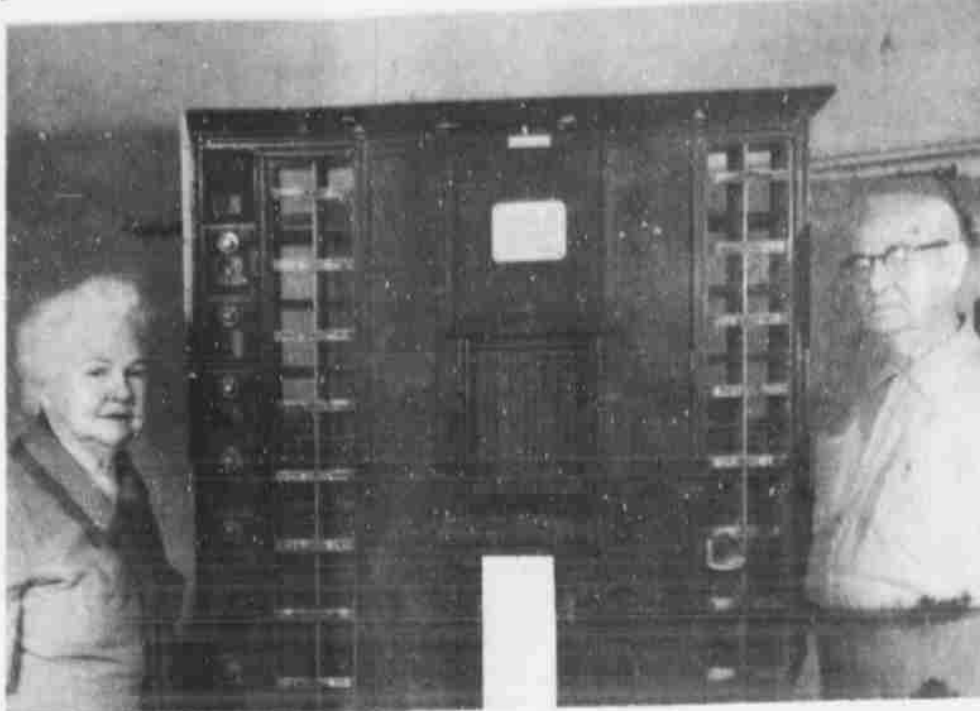
