Elvis Wood, 22, son of Mr. Ernest Wood of a mile north of Littlefield, is reported as killed in action in France on August 15.

Wood is also a nephew of Mrs. Wood of this city.

Wood was with the Infantry and had served four years; overseas for 18 months, and in France 30 months when he was reported killed.

The Wood family came here from England, Texas, about three years ago. They have two other children in the service.

Sgt. Elmer Wood of the Army Corps has made 52 missions over enemy territory and is back in States for re-assignment. He is currently stationed at Atlantic City, N. J., and was notified of his brother's death through the local Red Cross office, and arrived home on emergency furlough Wednesday.

Robert Estridge Wood, another brother, was inducted into the Navy on October 1. An effort has been made to locate him, but so far family have not been able to get him.

Wood also leaves surviving a sister, Miss Byna Nell Wood, at Tech college, Lubbock, and a brother, Jimmie Don, at home.

Stone as chairman, solicited the residential section; and the rural area was taken care of through the assistance of the school faculty and students. Although figures are not available at this time, we believe we will have our quota of \$3,600 by Saturday," added Mr. Ware.

The quota for Lamb county is \$9,335.

No figures are available for publication, but it is expected that all quotas will be reached, and that complete totals will be published in next week's Leader.

Pvt. Gus Parish Killed In Action



Pvt. Gus (Boots) Parish, Jr., 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gus Parish of Earth and Spring Lake, is reported killed in action somewhere in the Philippines, according to a telegram received by his parents Friday night. The message also stated that a letter would follow.

Pvt. Parish was a Machine Gunner with the Marines, and was believed to be on Palau Island.

He had attended Spring Lake High school, but was farming when he was inducted into the service on January 10. He was sent overseas May 14, 1944.

The Parish Hardware, Earth, of which Mr. Parish, Sr., is the owner, remained closed Saturday.

Besides his parents, Pvt. Parish is also survived by three brothers and four sisters. They are: Mary Miller, 16; Kenneth Bain, 14; Margaret, 11; Charles, 9; Charlene, 9; Carl Douglas, 7; and Carolyn Joyce, 6; who are all at home.

Also surviving Pvt. Parish are his grandfather, J. A. Parish of Earth; and his maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. M. O. Carter, also of Earth.

Aunts and uncles surviving are: Clive, Clyde and Cecil Parish of Earth; Johnny Carter of Crumb, Texas; Mrs. Charlotte Wilmoth of Plainview, Texas; Mrs. Marie Ross of Ingleswood, Calif., and Mrs. Edwin Warwick of Vanport, Ore.

Pvt. Parish was a member of a very prominent Earth family, who had been residents of that community for the past 21 years, during all of which time his father has been in the hardware business in Earth.

Quotas For Counties Will Be Released About November 10

The Sixth War Loan Drive will get underway in the Nation Monday, November 20, and continue through until December 16. The national goal will be \$14,000,000,000, of which \$5,000,000,000 is to come from sales to individuals and \$9,000,000,000 to other non-bank investors.

Pat Boone, County Chairman of War Bond Committee, Monday announced the date for opening of the Sixth War Loan Drive, stating that the county and various cities and communities would have the same setup as previously for carrying out of the sixth campaign to sell bonds. He stated that about November 10, quotas for the various counties would be released; and that early next month he would call a meeting of all workers in the County, to be held here, probably in the office of the Littlefield National Farm Loan association, for the purpose of organization.

C. O. Stone, who has served so efficiently and with such wonderful success in the past, will again act as chairman of the county's Sixth War

T-Sgt. J. E. Compton Returns To Squadron

Technical Sergeant Jesse E. Compton, 22, son of Arthur Compton, Littlefield, engineer-gunner on a B-24 Liberator, recently released from a Bulgarian prison camp, is back with his squadron, the 15th AAF in Italy.

Sgt. Compton was shot down on a mission to Giurgiu, Rumania, on June 23. His plane, riddled by flak, and out of control, was abandoned by the entire crew on the border of Yugoslavia and Bulgaria.

"I'll never forget my experiences as a prisoner of war in Bulgaria," he said. "We lived under conditions that were pretty bad. Our diet consisted of moldy, black bread, soup, and tea. Most of the time we were jammed into small sleeping quarters which were terribly overcrowded and full of lice and vermin. We were lucky in getting out without contracting any diseases, although almost everyone suffered from dysentery."

"The people of Bulgaria thought we were all gangsters and nobody told them any differently. Some of our boys were disrespected and beaten by the guards for minor infractions. 'I can't tell you how good it feels, just to be clean again.'"

Sgt. Compton is a graduate of Littlefield High school, class of '41, where he tarred in football and basketball. Prior to entering the service in September 1942, he was employed by the Santa Fe Railroad. He has three brothers in the service, Pvt. Alex in the Infantry; Pvt. Edgar with the Air Force, and Cpl. Richard with an anti-aircraft unit.

Pvt. Ray Awarded Purple Heart

Pvt. Marvin Ray, 26, arrived home Monday on a 30 day furlough from McCloskey General Hospital, Temple, where he had been a patient for the past two months.

Pvt. Ray is the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. V. Ray. He was serving with the 38th Infantry, 2nd Division, and was wounded at Hill 192, near St. Lo, in France. His right shoulder was broken, causing his arm to be partially paralyzed.

Pvt. Ray had been in the service four years. He has been awarded the Purple Heart, which he is wearing, as well as several other service ribbons, including a red and white badge, representing a good conduct ribbon; yellow service ribbon representing a year's service before Pearl Harbor attack; and the green, red and white ribbon awarded for service in the European Theatre of Operations.

Pvt. Ray's entire right arm and shoulder is undergoing special treatment in an effort to restore it to condition where it may be used again.

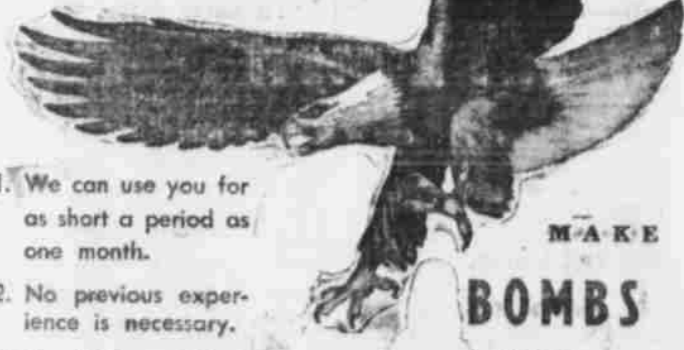



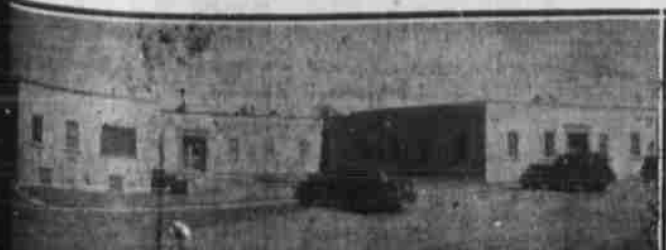

"How's Dal these days? I sure would like to see him and all the rest of you. I bet he is bigger than I am now.

"Well, tell everybody 'Hello' for me.

T-Sgt. J. E. Compton Returns To Squadron

Technical Sergeant Jesse E. Compton, 22, son of Arthur Compton, Littlefield, engineer-gunner on a B-24 Liberator, recently released from a Bulgarian prison camp, is back with his squadron, the 15th AAF in Italy.

Sgt. Compton was shot down on a mission to Giurgiu, Rumania, on June 23. His plane, riddled by flak, and out of control, was abandoned by the entire crew on the border of Yugoslavia and Bulgaria.

"I'll never forget my experiences as a prisoner of war in Bulgaria," he said. "We lived under conditions that were pretty bad. Our diet consisted of moldy, black bread, soup, and tea. Most of the time we were jammed into small sleeping quarters which were terribly overcrowded and full of lice and vermin. We were lucky in getting out without contracting any diseases, although almost everyone suffered from dysentery."

"The people of Bulgaria thought we were all gangsters and nobody told them any differently. Some of our boys were distressed and beaten by the guards for minor infractions. "I can't tell you how good it feels, just to be clean again."

Sgt. Compton is a graduate of Littlefield High school, class of '41, where he tarred in football and basketball. Prior to entering the service in September 1942, he was employed by the Santa Fe Railroad. He has three brothers in the service, Pvt. Alex in the Infantry; Pvt. Edgar with the Air Force; and Cpl. Richard with an anti-aircraft unit.



leased from the hospital, and had been back with his unit in France since September 7.

Mrs. Dick Edwards, however, received sad news from Mrs. C. M. McDonald of Matador, the mother of M. B.'s bunk mate, with whom he went through all his training in the States, and from whom he had never been separated until he (Pfc. Edwards) was wounded, and was sent to a hospital, stating her son (Travis McDonald) had been killed in action. He is believed to have been killed the day that Pfc. M. B. Edwards returned to his unit in France.

Pfc. Edwards also stated that all Littlefield boys who are with him in France, that is, Darrell O'Dell, Frederick Mitchell and Troy Dodd, are O.K.

At an air service command station in England, Cpl. Carlyle G. Akers, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. T. Akers of Littlefield, recently completed an orientation course designed to bridge the gap between training in the States and combat soldiering against the enemy in France.

At this air service command station, Cpl. Akers attended a series of lectures given by veterans of this

command which included instructions on chemical warfare defense and pertinent tips on staying healthy in a combat zone.

His next station will be one from which America's fighting planes cover our liberation of Occupied Europe.

Before entering the Army Air Forces, he was employed as a ship-fitter by the Richmond Shipbuilding Corporation of Richmond, Calif.

Sgt. Travis Jaquess, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. W. Jaquess of Earth, and brother of Mrs. L. M. Brandon, of Littlefield, wrote his sister under date of September 19, the following interesting letter:

"Just a line to let you know that I am still getting along fine, and still getting a good many letters from you. I got one last night. I hear from you regularly, and sure enjoy your letters. They always make me feel better.

"I had a steak dinner today, and have a good hay loft to sleep in tonight. That may not sound so good to you, but it does to any combat soldier in France or Italy. Dyart and I bought some steak for \$1.70. We fried and ate most of it. We got a French lady to buy it for us.

The French people are very nice to us. The steak was a little high and tough, but tasted alright. As for the bed I have slept in lots worse places than a hay loft. I can sleep most anywhere, as long as I am not being shot at.

"How's Dal these days? I sure would like to see him and all the rest of you. I bet he is bigger than I am now.

"Well, tell everybody 'Hello' for me.

"Lots of Love,
"TRAVIS."
