Mr. Massey has been assigned the territory of the west half of Littlefield, and also Amherst, Sudan and Bailey county Mr. Caldwell will be in charge of east Littlefield, Spade, Olton, Earth, Springlake, and Fieldton. He will also have 100 cases in the Lubbock area.

## 1,000 Fans See Mules Grab 25-13 Win Over Seagrave Eagles Team

SEAGRAVES, Oct. 10 (Special)—A classy Muleshoe Yellow Jacket team thumped the Seagraves Eagles, 25-13, here Friday night in a non-conference game witnessed by approximately 1,000 fans.

Bob Dale went over for a Seagraves touchdown early in the second quarter and Jack Hale added the extra point to give the Eagles a 7-0 lead, but Muleshoe bounced back for six points when Bobby Goss plunged over from one yard out to climax a scoring drive. The Yellow Jacket try for extra point failed, leaving Seagraves with a 7-6 lead at halftime.

In the last half it was all Muleshoe as Coach Durwood Green's team opened up for 19 points. Teddy Lawler and Goss sparked the visitors' attack. Lawler turning in touchdown runs of 16 and two yards and Goss notching a touchdown and an extra point.

Dale Houlette scored Friona's first touchdown on a 20-yard sprint over tackle, with Laceywell converting. Amherst came right back to even the count at 7-7 when Billy Wright went over on a four-yard plunge. Roy Bryant converted on a quarterback sneak.

Friona took the lead in the second quarter when Roy Lee Jones went 40 yards off tackle to score, with Laceywell converting. Amherst came back to even things up with Bryant passing to Connie Baird for 32 yards and the score. Bryant again plunged for the conversion.

The Chiefs took a lead just before the half ended when Laceywell swung around end for the score and converted to make it 21-14 at the intermission.

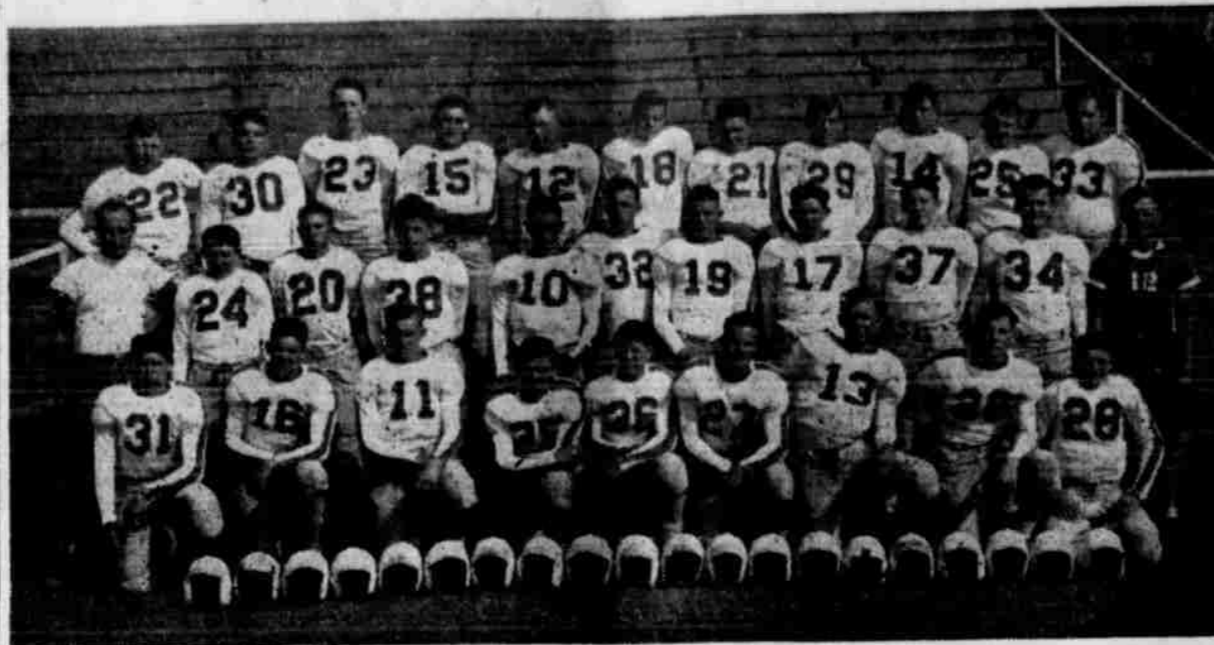

## Cats Win Impressive 47-7 Victory Over Brownfield

### Steven Brock, With Good Blocking, Stages One-Man Scoring Spree

The Littlefield Wildcats rolled to an impressive 47-7 victory over the Class AA Brownfield Cubs in a one-sided affair played at Seely stadium Friday night. The game was the last non-conference affair for the Wildcats this year.

Steven Brock, 157-pound senior, put on a dazzling one-man show for the eager spectators as he rolled up four touchdowns for the Cats, running two 40-yard runs for touchdowns, taking a pass for another, and then turning a pass interception into another six pointer. He was also a standout on defense, as he has been all year.

Littlefield kicked off to Brownfield and the Cubs made only three yards in three tries, and then punted to Littlefield's 28-yard line. Gage fumbled on the second play recovered on Littlefield's 35-yard line. But Brownfield could only make four yards in three tries and punted out on Littlefield's five-yard line.

Anyone wishing to donate their used clothing or shoes, may bring them to the Lutheran parsonage, at 1319 West Tenth street, in Littlefield, Texas.

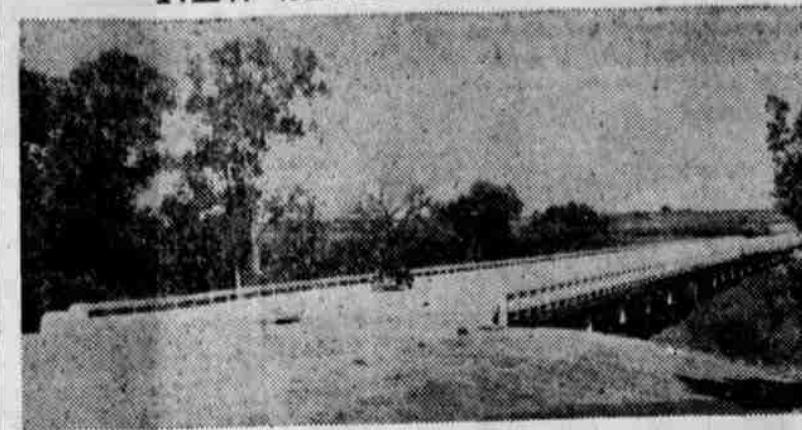

## NEW SPAN ON U. S. 67



Rerouting of U. S. Highway 67 from Dallas east to the Hunt County line, now in progress, will provide the state one of its safest and most modern highway stretches. The new route, 26 miles long, will be four-lane boulevard type pavement dotted by wide, divided bridges like that shown above. This span is one of seven major bridges already completed. Structural steel in the bridges totalled 2,400 tons and was supplied by American Bridge Company and Virginia Bridge Company, U. S. Steel subsidiaries. The first 16 miles of the new highway, in Dallas County, is scheduled for completion next spring. The final 10 miles through Rockwall County will be on a future Texas Highway Department program. General contractor for the above bridge was Austin Bridge Company, Dallas.

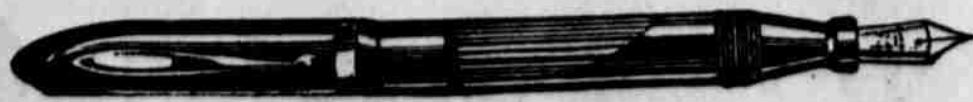

**Editor's Note:** The Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Bull Lake seems a little mad this week, but he'll get over it.

Dear editor:

More and more, I been reading about mechanical cotton pickers and how the day ain't far off when most cotton except a little around the turn rows will be picked by machines, and the other afternoon while I was wandering around out here enjoyin the October sunshine I stumbled on a copy of a newspaper which I picked up and took home with me and after supper I looked it over and noticed an article by a man opposing the mechanical cotton picker on the grounds it would throw a lot of people out of work.

Now this ain't the first time I've encountered such an argument or the first time I've had something to say about it, but such a contention still floors me.

In the first place, while most farmers don't grow cotton for the benefit of cotton pickers but mainly to try to make a profit at it, which we won't go into whether

they do or not, even if the aim of the farmer was to provide work for cotton pickers, and if a mechanical picker could do the job cheaper than hand pickers it would still be better to use the machine and pension the pickers. Of the two, pickin cotton by hand or lettin a machine do it while the pickers watched, I believe most pickers would take the latter. It's easier and more fun and they can do it in the shade.

But what riles me up is that some smart bird is always contending the farmer ought to hold back on progress just to give work to somebody, although you don't see many of these city people arguin against mechanical refrigerators so more ice men will have work or many city editors throwin out their type-settin machines so more printers can have work.

It burns me up to have some city man tell a farmer what he ought to do in the way of goin broke so somebody else can have work to do. Personally, you wouldn't say my farm out here is a model of efficiency, but any time anybody has a idea on how I can save some labor, mine or the hired kind, he's welcome to develop it. The farmer has enough to do tryin to feed the world without furnishin it spendin money too.

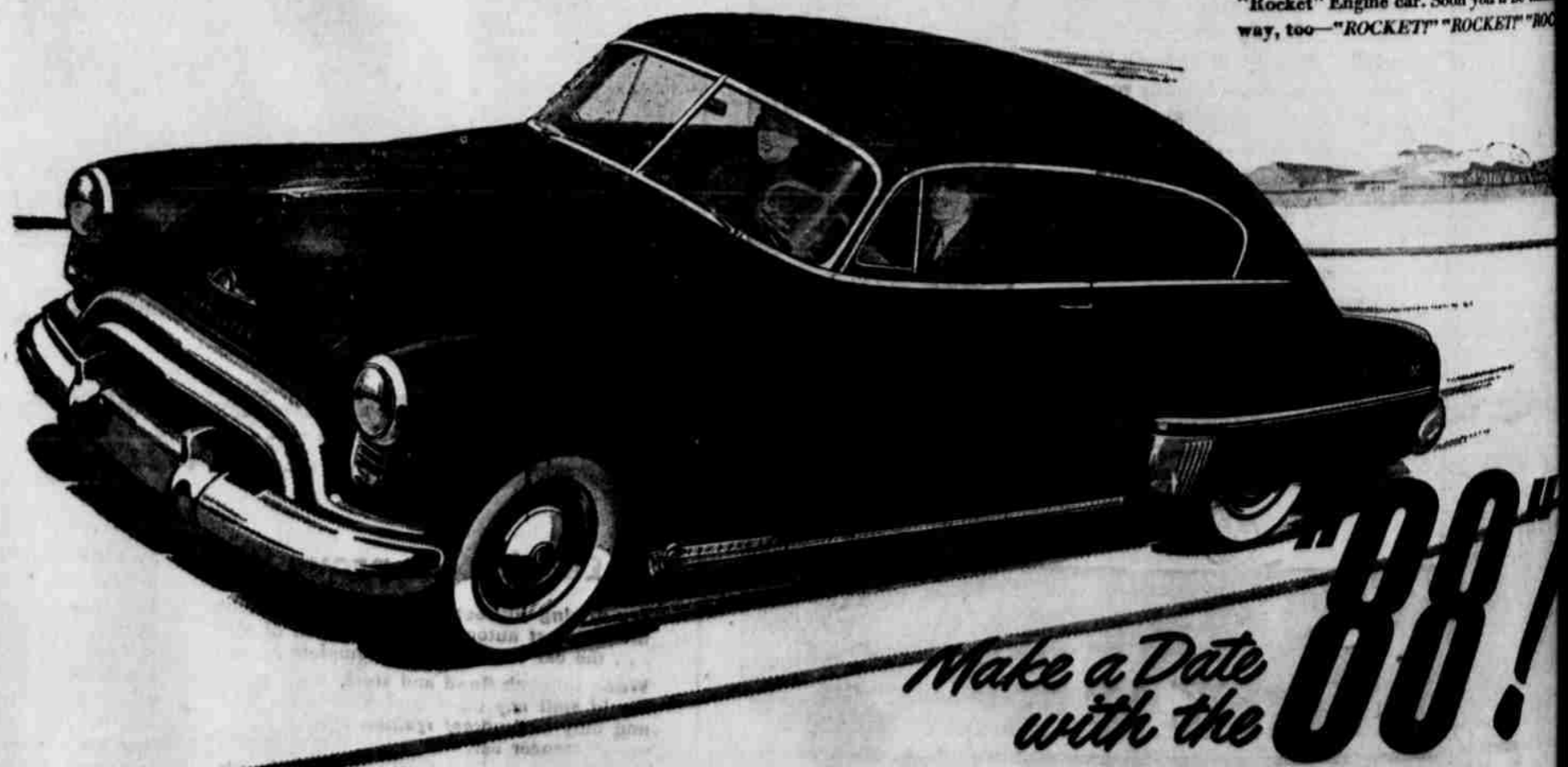

The American Legion gave vigorous leadership again this year to combating of communism and other subversive elements within the United States. Not only did the Legion support legislation to control alien influences and agencies, but it also gave intelligent leadership to its membership in combating the inroads of alien philosophies. It sponsored special school of instruction on how to cope legatly with disloyal forces and how to expose them. These schools were called seminars at which authoritative information was furnished specially selected Legionnaires qualified for leadership by legal training and law-enforcement experience.

### Community Service

American Legion posts continue to perform tremendous numbers of community services. They sponsored health clinics and day nurseries; provide ambulances and iron lungs; donate public drinking fountains, playgrounds, parks, traveling libraries and countless other betterments to community life.

attention of The American Legion as an organization with national ramifications, in position to supply men, money and materials to the task of speedy and effective relief in stricken areas. For instance, more than 50,000 Legionnaires in hip boots and boats saw service on the water fronts during the great 1938 floods in the Midwest. Tremendous quantities of food, clothing and medical supplies were sent by the American Legion posts to help the flood victims. Local disasters like the recent floods of the Pacific Northwest and the tornadoes of the Midwest found American Legion posts on immediate duty as community organizations.

### Repatriation of War Dead

Long before the government started its vast program of repatriation of American World War II dead, the 17,000 posts of The American Legion were mobilized to take an outstanding part in rendering final honors at the gallant soldiers and sailors who gave their all for God and country.

Through a special arrangement with the armed services, national headquarters of The American Legion furnished all departments with advance lists of those whose remains were being returned. Department headquarters in turn alerted their local posts.

As a result of many months of planning and preparation, The American Legion has participated in more funeral rites for the returned war dead than all other organizations combined.

### Foreign Relations

While The American Legion is a champion of national security through a "peace through strength" program, it is advocating this course largely on the principle that American strength—military, economic and spiritual—is the only sound and practical foundation for inter-national teamwork to prevent the recurrence of war.

The Legion is an ardent supporter of the ideals of the United Nations. It supports and endorses the Marshall Plan and the North Atlantic Pact.

It believes in a firm and resolute foreign policy which means what it says and has the military strength to back up what it says. It is unalterably opposed to appeasement in any form of Soviet Russia and any other aggressor nation.

The American Legion is the author of a practical plan to strengthen the charter of the United Nations. That plan is now part of the official policy of the United States. It calls for the elimination of the veto power in all matters involving aggression or preparation for aggression. It calls for a more representative council of nations. It calls for an effective world police force.

Finally, The American Legion is committed to all-out opposition to communism at home and everywhere in the free world.

### National Security

Being composed of realistic fighting men and women, the Legion from its birth has been and still is the foremost champion of national security. The Legion was largely responsible for the enactment of the National Defense Act of 1920. During the lunatic decades when marathon dances, flagpole sitting, Tom Thumb golf, and goldfish swallowing had more followers than preparedness for national defense, The American Legion almost

## 57 Bales Cotton Burn at Sudan

A fire, aided by a wind-swept field adjoining Shannon elevator at about 11 p. m. Saturday, destroyed 57 bales of cotton at Sudan. The cotton, valued at \$20,000, was insured only Saturday.

Approximately 147 bales of cotton also piled in the field were saved by firemen and who brought the blaze under control a half-hour later.

The bales represented the first cotton ginned in the county.

The gin is owned by the county and was not damaged by the fire.

The fire was the most affecting cotton on the Plains this week. A McDonald Gin company house at Lamesa, Texas, destroyed the building, 60 bales of cotton, estimated \$20,000 loss.

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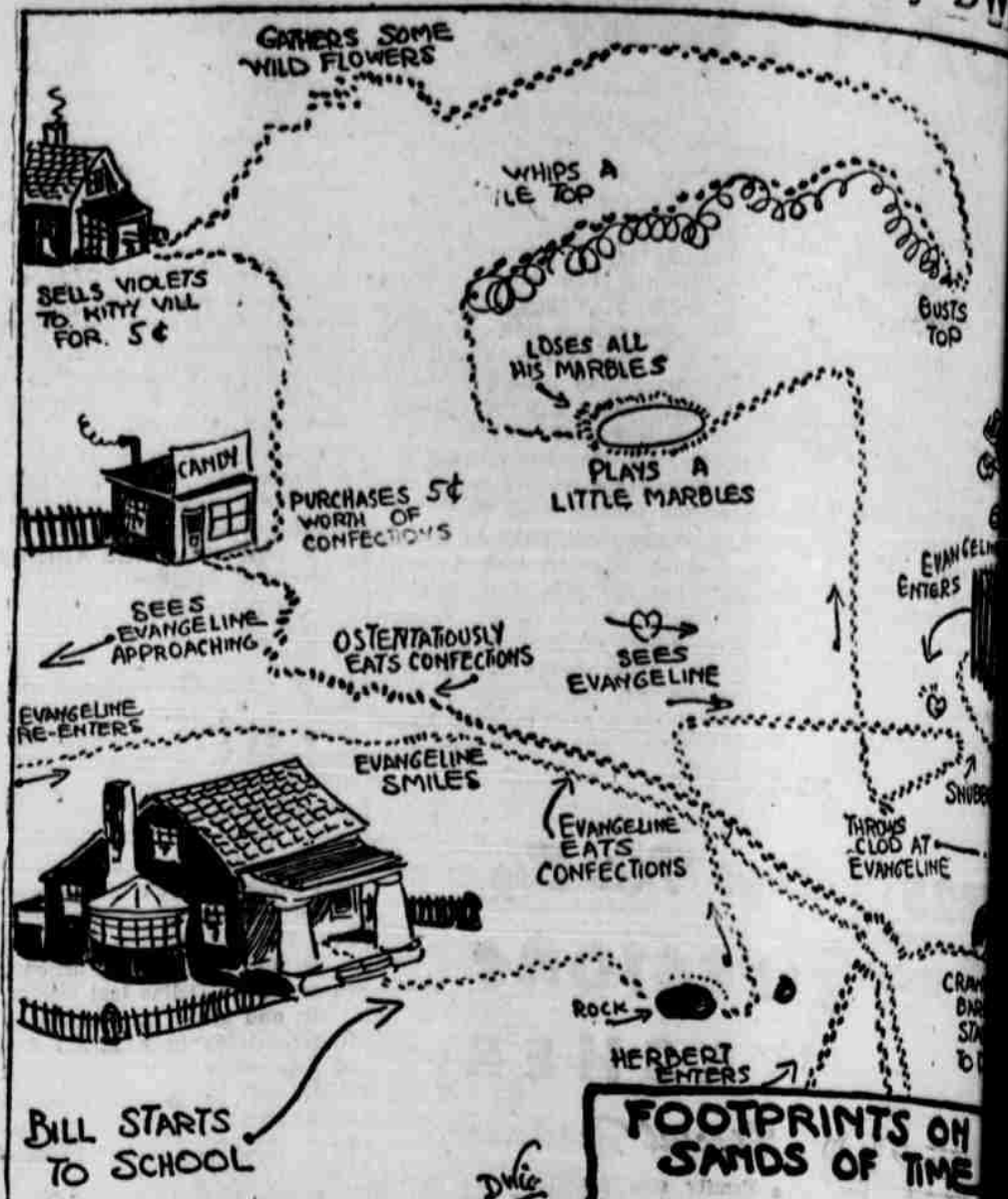

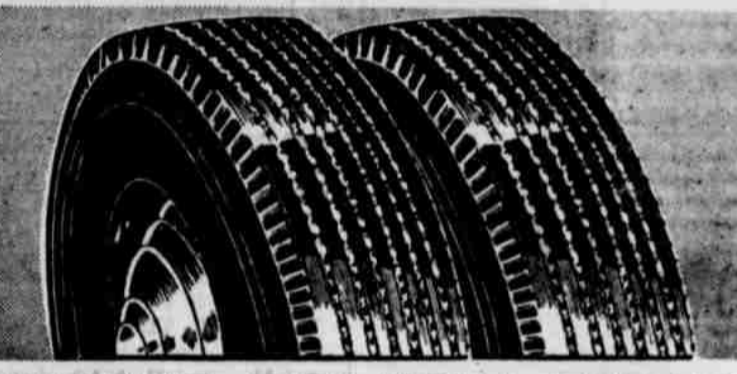
