





Rerouting of U. S. Highway 67 from Dallas east to the Hunt County line, now in progress, will provide the state one of its safest and most modern highway stretches. The new route, 26 miles long, will be fourlane boulevard type pavement dotted by wide, divided bridges like that shown above. This span is one of seven major bridges already completed. Structural steel in the bridges totalled 2,400 tons and was supplied by American Bridge Company and Virginia Bridge Company, U. S. Steel subsidiaries.
