

Mustangs Clinch District Title

The Wheeler Mustangs scored four times from long range in the first quarter in route to a 49-14 victory over the Claude Mustangs last Friday night on Nicholson Field and clinched a district championship for the second year in a row.

The Mustangs let the visitors from Claude know early that there wasn't to be a repeat of the '84 tie that marred the Mustangs record and after building up the 28-8 first quarter lead, really just coasted to their ninth straight win of the year.

Wheeler lost some of their intensity in the second quarter and went scoreless but came out after the halftime break and put 21 more points on the scoreboard before Claude scored a couple of touchdowns in the final 12 minutes.

Friday night's win left the Mustangs only one game shy of a perfect record on the regular season and after taking advantage of an open date this week, they will close district play next Friday night in Gruver against the Greyhounds.

There was no catching Dickie Salyer on the Mustangs first touchdown when he broke loose at the Wheeler 13

and raced down the sideline leaving the pursuit behind. Richard Smith kicked his first of 7 straight PAT's and Wheeler led by seven at 5:04 in the quarter.

Wheeler's first Flea Market will get under way Saturday morning at the Wheeler County Show Barn on the north edge of Wheeler. The two-day affair—Saturday and Sunday, November 9 and 10—will feature a wide variety of items for sale. You can eat and drink while you enjoy the modern technology of television via satellite, shop for Christmas items or look through garage sale items.

The Wheeler Chamber of Commerce will have a booth of items donated by the local merchants and individuals. These items will be given away on Sunday afternoon to a number of lucky individuals. With each \$1 donation, you have a chance to win one gift. It is not necessary that you be present to win; if your name is drawn and you not present, the gift will be taken to the business making the donation to be claimed at your convenience. The value of the items varies, but exceeds \$10. The names will be placed in the hopper all day Saturday and Sunday afternoon. On Sunday afternoon at 4:00, the drawing will begin.

Activities will be underway for two days. The booths are open at 10:00 a.m. Saturday and close at 6:00 p.m. On Sunday, the booths will open at 1 p.m. and remain open until 5 p.m.

Businesses, individuals and groups of individuals or clubs will be given the opportunity to display items for sale. Items for sale may be arts and

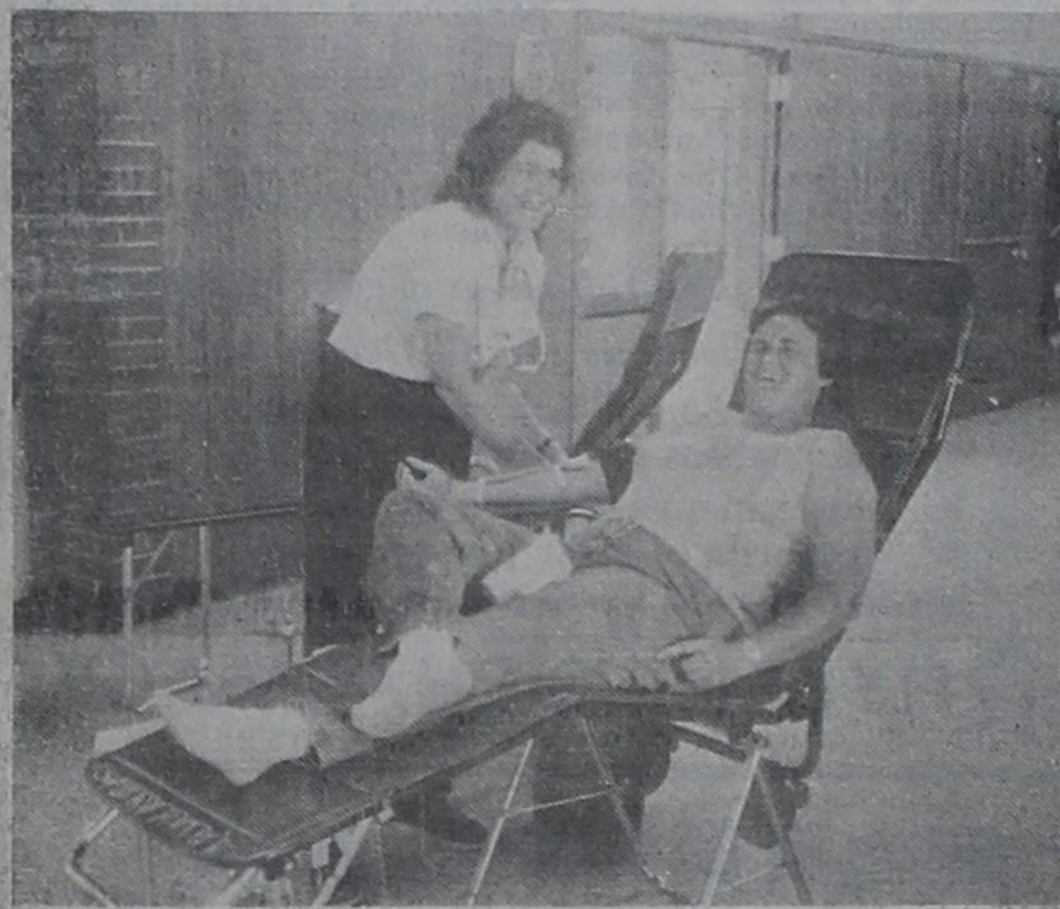

Mobeetie Homecoming Set Sat., November 23

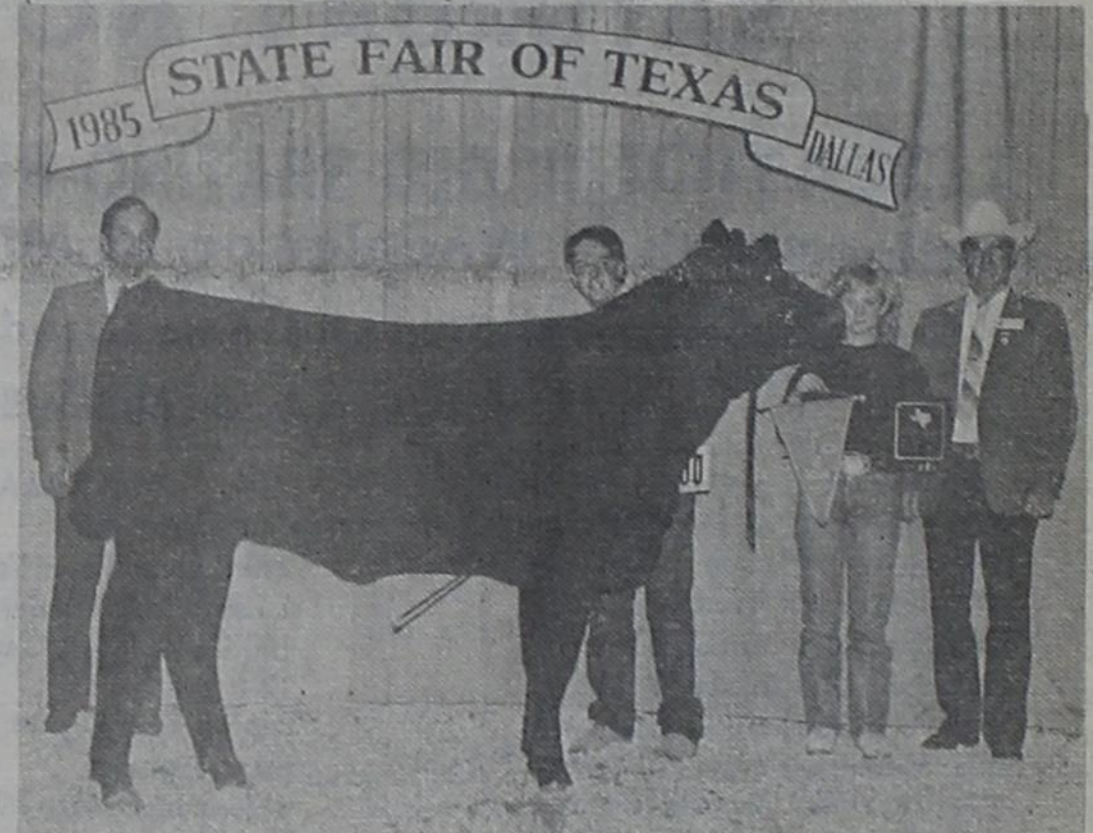

WHEELER TRANSLATOR SYSTEM

Letter To Translator Subscribers

Dear Wheeler Translator Subscribers: The Directors of the Wheeler Translator System thought a letter of explanation of the channel changes pending on your system should be made. The change was not their desire, but was forced by the Federal Communications Commission about nine years ago. The FCC gave the old channel bands (channels 70-83) to two-way radio, the translators were allowed to remain on the old channels until they caused interference to the radios assigned those channels. The formal notice of this interference came from the Exxon Company on channels 76 and 78 about six months ago.

Therefore, we were forced to move or turn these channels off. We have received authorization to move to channels 39, 41, and 43. In addition, this move has required us to purchase some \$9000.00 worth of new equipment.

These changes will necessitate the replacement of many home antennas as your current antenna was probably

Bobwhite Quail Population Report

The bobwhite quail population in Texas diminished significantly during the winter of 1983-'84. Wheeler County was no exception. The dry year that followed was not conducive for quail reproduction. As a result, quail decreased or disappeared from many areas. This past spring and summer were excellent in terms of quail production. The observed broods have been ranging from 10 to 17. Areas that had very few quail last year should have fair to good hunting this year. The areas that were totally void of quail may not have a huntable population. If there were no quail last year, there were no quail produced this year. The only hunting available would be quail migrating from a neighbor. The only way to determine the relative abundance of the quail would be to conduct a census.

One of the best census methods is the call count. About 30 minutes before sunrise, quail utter a covey call. On a clear, quiet morning, every covey within a quarter mile can be located by this call. Thus, one properly positioned observer can census approximately 160 acres. The calls are uttered for 5 to 15 minutes each morning and periodically during the day if a covey becomes separated. After the coveys are counted, an estimate can be made of the population. Several coveys can be flushed and the number of quail recorded. An average number of quail per covey can be determined to use in calculating the population. This average, when multiplied by the number of total coveys, will give an indication as to how many quail can be harvested.

For his efforts against Claude, Salyer was chosen as the Amarillo Globe News Class A player of the week. Salyer netted 180 yards on but 5 carries of the pigskin and had a 77 scoring jaunt to go along with his 87 yarder. He broke free at left guard on the Mustangs first play of the second half for his second TD run.
Going to the air just twice in the first quarter netted the Mustangs two touchdowns with Randall Hugg passing to Salyer for a 54 TD pass and run and on the Mustangs fourth possession of the first quarter, Hugg found Randy Horton in the end zone to complete a 26 yard scoring play. Using the option to perfection, Wheeler got the final points of the period when tailback Toby Collins circled his left end from 25 yards.
