GETS THREE-DAY STAY

Jones Reprieved At Last Minute

AUSTIN, Aug. 8. (U. P.)—The State Board of Pardon and Paroles hears pleas today to save W. Fred Jones from his second trip to the electric chair. A few minutes past Saturday midnight a three-day stay of execution was granted the Floydada grocer as he stood literally on the threshold of the death chamber in Huntsville. Unless Jones' attorneys are able to convince the board here today that there should be further clemency, Jones is scheduled to die shortly after Tuesday midnight. The three-day reprieve was granted on the condition that additional information important to the case would be presented today. What that information is has not been made known. The 40-year-old man was convicted in Hale County in 1946 for the shotgun slaying of J. C. Love, Jr., 23, an employee in his grocery store. His death sentence was reversed by the court of criminal appeals and a second trial held in Crosby County. Again Jones was found guilty and sentenced to die on July 8. Jones received the customary 30-day stay of execution, moving the date up to Aug. 7. The three-day stay of execution granted in the last minutes of Saturday night was a drama-packed reprieve from death without precedent in the state. When the word reached the state prison at Huntsville, Jones was standing outside the death cham-

ber—his head shaved and a chaplain praying by his side. The thrilling climax came this way: 5 p.m., Saturday—Jones' attorneys, E. T. Miller and E. A. Simpson of Amarillo, wired the governor's office in Austin. They said Kenneth Bain, ex-district judge of the Floydada district, had information which indicated the execution should be delayed. Gov. Allan Shivers was notified in Woodville and members of the pardon board contacted in Austin. An exchange of telephone conversations continued through the evening. 11:45 p.m.—Pardon Board Chairman R. A. (Smoot) Schmidt and Board Member L. C. Harris began a meeting, via telephons, as a majority of the board. 11:50 p.m.—The governor's office in Austin was notified that the board had recommended a three-day stay with the approval of the governor. 12:02 a.m., Sunday morning—an emergency call to stop the execution was received in Huntsville. A prison employe raced across a court yard to the group of guards and witnesses preparing to enter the death chamber with Jones. 12:06 a.m.—The governor's office was notified that the execution had been halted. 1 a.m.—Final confirmation of the reprieve was received at Huntsville. "Praise the Lord," Jones said quietly. "I give the Lord credit—I was ready."

Methodist Bishop Says Catholics Killed Federal School Aid Bill

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8. (U. P.)—G. Bromley Oxnam, Methodist bishop of the New York area, accused the Roman Catholic leadership last night of killing the proposals in Congress for federal aid to public schools. In a radio interview he said Francis Cardinal Spellman's "personal attack" on Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt was a part of a "coldly calculated plan" of the Catholic hierarchy. He said this plan was "designed to deny federal aid to public schools, unless the hierarchy can get its hands into the public treasury and secure millions for the support of parochial education." Cardinal Spellman recently accused Mrs. Roosevelt, widow of President Roosevelt, of anti-Catholic bias "unworthy of an American mother" after she had opposed the use of federal funds for non-public schools. Mrs. Roosevelt denied any such bias and said God will be the final judge of the worthiness of all human beings. Bishop Oxnam said the American people have recently learned that federal aid to education is dead for this session of Congress, and most of them deplore the fact. Bishop Oxnam also said there is a "striking parallel between the organizational structure and method of the world-wide Communist political party and the world-wide Roman Catholic political party. Both are totalitarian. Both seek control of the minds of men everywhere. Both practice excommunication, character assassination, and economic reprisals." In New York, Cardinal Spellman could not be reached for comment. Friday night the cardinal issued a statement clarifying the position of the Roman Catholic Church concerning the use of federal funds for parochial school children. He said such aid was sought solely for auxiliary services like transportation, health services, and non-religious textbooks, and public funds were neither sought nor expected for teaching services, school construction or maintenance. Bishop Oxnam's interview with Commentator Ed Hart was recorded Friday afternoon in Laconia, N. H., for broadcast last night. Oxnam said of Cardinal Spellman: "It is not milk and medicine, books and buses. What he wants is the support of parochial schools by taxes levied on all the people. The church... must know that to drain off vast sums from public education is so to weaken it as eventually to destroy it. The blunt fact is, that the Roman Catholic Church does not believe in our public school system." Meantime, in another blast at the Catholic Church, the "Protestants and other Americans united for

Another asked for a federal law requiring that "all foreign born persons found to be Communists be deported within 90 days" and that "all naturalized citizens found to be Communists lose their citizenship and be deported within 90 days." Greek Army In Drive Against Guerrilla Force

ATHENS, Aug. 8. (U. P.)—The Greek army kicked off Saturday on a major offensive in the Grammos Mountains against a Communist-led guerrilla force estimated at 5,000 troops. The general staff reported the guerrillas were supported in battle by Albanians firing from Albanian soil nearby. The Greek guerrillas are compressed in an area of about 225 square miles against the Albanian border west of Neorion and northeast of Kozani. The general staff said several defense points were taken by Greek forces southwest and northwest of the 7,000-foot high mountains in the first fighting despite "bitter resistance." Counterattacks, it said, were repulsed and fighting continues with growing intensity. The army is bringing new forces into combat and said it is entering the main phase of battle. In capturing a height of Alevissa, in the northeast Grammos, Greek troops were fired on from a neighboring height in Albania, the command said, in an attack "supported by Albanians." RIBBON RAMBLINGS

Looking about us, we see three basic faults or traits in most of the people we meet. They are: temper, discouragement and procrastination. But did it ever occur to you, that turned in another direction that these qualities can become very important?

To begin with, temper is something which gets a lot of us in trouble because we lose it on occasions. But, after all, we shouldn't really wish to get rid of temper. Rather, we should learn to control it. Temper, when controlled puts into our lives that desire not to be satisfied with things as they are, that spirit of "fight" which drives us on to really do something about our problems instead of letting them solve themselves. No one ever appreciates a "yes man." All of us like to appear agreeable to those about us and to work and play with our fellow citizens in a united spirit. But we must never allow ourselves to lose our individual thoughts and ideals just in an attempt to be agreeable. Day after day, we need to use a controlled temper, not in anger, but in determination to walk the path of every day living as we see fit. Some people call such an attitude, "a stubborn faith."

All of us are easily discouraged. We "get in the end of our ropes" and we want to "call it a day." It is easy to get discouraged and discouraged we get into a humbling spirit. We should look over our situations now and then just to see how far we haven't climbed. The best path to humility is to look in the mirror. But we should never allow humbleness to turn to humiliation. We should learn the difference between humbleness and humiliation, between ego and self-confidence.

Our third enemy is procrastination. We find ourselves dreaming dreams which we do nothing about and wasting time in foolish planning which is worthless if left uncompleted. It is well to put off other things in the dreaming of dreams if you put those dreams to work.

Slayer Sought By Vigilantes

CYRSTAL BEACH, Fla., Aug. 8. — Armed bands of vigilantes spread out today for a killer who stabbed a 70-year-old man to death yesterday and shot, slashed and mauled four others.

Dead of stab wounds was Norman Browne, who was found tied spread-eagled on his bed in a secluded home in this Florida west coast community. His throat, stomach and wrist were slashed.

Officers described the killer as intoxicated or crazed.

The slain man's 60-year-old wife, Mrs. Annie E. Browne, was critically harmed by a blow on the head, apparently made with a shotgun butt. She also was slashed.

Miles Crum, 31-year-old grocer, was wounded in the stomach when he and his wife and child came to call on the Brownes.

Mrs. Theima Crum, 29, was felled by a blow from the shotgun butt as she tried to run away with her eight-month-old baby, Judy.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Crum were reported in critical condition early today at a hospital.

The child apparently received only glancing blows and was not seriously hurt.

From what the injured victims were able to tell, Patrolman Carl Cassels and Peace Justice J. S. Register said the killer was after money. After tying the Brownes in their garage, he rifled the house. Later he took them in the house and tied them in their beds.

The Crums described the man as about 30, five feet 11 inches tall, weighing 170 pounds with black, bushy hair. They said he drove off in a black 1937 model car.

Large Tumor Taken From Tot's Chest

ANN ARBOR, Mich., Aug. 8. — Two-year-old Judy Rae Carpenter today was given better than an even chance to live following removal of a tumor as big as a man's head from her tiny chest.

The tumor, said by University hospital staff members to be the largest of its kind they had ever seen, was removed last week. It had the bodily components of another child.

The disorder, according to Dr. Vernon L. Boersma of the hospital pediatric department, is known to doctors as "the included twin." Its cause, he said, has not been determined.

If there had been a normal development Judy would have had a twin, physicians believe.

The pilot, the sole occupant of the light plane, Arthur Rapps, 33, of Milwaukee, was killed. None of the 20 passengers or three crew members of the airliner was hurt.

The twin-engine DC-3 and the single-engine plane collided 1,000 feet over Maitland Field, Milwaukee's lake front airport. Rapp's ship spun into a parking lot near the field and was demolished.

Capt. Jack Belieh, of Detroit, guided the crippled airliner into a safe landing at Billy Mitchell Field, some six miles south of where the collision occurred.

Belieh said he did not see the light plane, and added that the impact "was quite a jolt."

Stewardess Shirley Davidson, of Coldwater, Mich., said she was standing in the aisle when the planes collided.

"There was a dull thud," she said, "but it didn't throw me at all."

"I had no idea what happened. The passengers were very much at ease. At first they didn't even realize what had happened, but then all of us saw the torn wing."

"Even then, there was no panic," she added.
