

finally controlled my life. I eventually stole to support my habit, and burglary put me in prison for a five year sentence. The excitement and adventure of experimenting with drugs is not worth the price I am paying today, and I would say to you, 'Stop now and don't sell your soul for a temporary high or escape that will bring you and your family nothing but grief.' "

This is the basic message of a 19 year old inmate serving time in the Texas Department ofCorrections to an assembly of high school students. Throught the Community Education Program, inmates have delivered their message to young people all over the State in an effort to stem drug abuse and juvenile crime.

"Operation Kick-IT" was established throught the Governor's Criminal Justice Council in May, 1970. A panel of three to five inmates was formed to travel throughout Texas to tell their life stories in an effort to educate, warn and inform the public, specifically

"I got hooked on drugs as a teenagers, about the dangers young teenager, and the habit and consequences involved in the illicit use of drugs. In 1971, a second panel was formed in order to meet the demand of bookings, so great was the public acceptance of this program's name was changed to the Community Education Program.

"Community Education Program (CEP) panels will appear anywhere in the State they are invited," states George Lively, Project Administrator. "We traveled over 50,000 miles during 1975, and averaged five programs a day on our week of long tours. During the first quarter of the year, the panelists spoke to over 35,000 young persons in 95 appearances, and they will speak to between 100,000 and 125,000 in a full year."

Primarily, the panels appear before junior and senior high school assemblies, but they also speak to church groups, civic organizations, drug abuse workshops, juvenile institutions, and halfway house residents. Additionally, the panels are regularly intervi-

Ignorance and apathy are two benefactors in the rural communities to the widespread drug scene. Let's fight this evil by educating our young people, and ourselves, to the results of drug use.

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to permit banks to establish and operate unmanned teller machines within the county or city where the banks are located and to share the use of teller machines on a basis consistent with antitrust laws, if it finds such operation will serve the convenience of the public. The Legislature has already passed enabling leg-

appeal of certain pretrial rulings of a trial court in a criminal case by either the state or the accused."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 98 proposes a constitutional amendment that would require a single appraisal of all property subject to ad valorem taxation and would provide for a single board of equalization within each county. The con-

stitutional requirement that the county commissioners court sit as a board of equalization would be eliminated, and elected officials of the county or governing body of the taxing unit would be prohibited from serving as members of the board of equalization.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The

constitutional amendment requiring a single appraisal and a single board of equalization within each county for ad valorem tax purposes."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 18 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to authorize the conduct of bingo games by certain specified groups for charitable purposes, subject to the limitations that operation of the games must be approved in local option elections and that all proceeds must be spent in

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional

amendment to authorize bingo games on a local option election basis if the games are conducted by a church, synagogue, religious society, volunteer fire department, nonprofit veterans organization, fraternal organization, or nonprofit organization supporting medical research or treatment programs and if the proceeds are to be spent in Texas for charitable purposes of the organizations."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT




