Designed to provide extensive guidance information for education and career planning, the well known ACT 'Assessment Program is recommended for use by student applicants at nearly 2,700 colleges, universities, and scholarship programs.

Wheeler High School students will have five opportunities during the 79-80 school year to make use of the national program, which consist of four tests and a two-part questionnaire. Students 9-1 complete the questionnaire at 9-2 home as part of the program's registration process, and then take the battery of tests at area 9-3 test centers on any of five weekend national test dates, said Dewey Shepard, Counselor with 9-5 the Wheeler ISD.

Shepard said the test scores provide an assessment of general educational development and the questionnaire information focuses on academic and nonacademic accomplishments and interests, anticipated needs, as well as career and educational interests and plans. The basic student fee for using the ACT Assessment Program this year remains \$7.50. In addition to being used by students and their high school counselors, the extensive information provided by the ACT is also used by colleges for academic advising, admissions counseling, course sectioning and placement, student services,

Antelope Numbers Stable In Area

The anterope herds are monitored each year by personnel of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and a recent aerial count in the Texas Panhandle found the herd population up a little from 1978.

"Antelope are open-country animals which makes them easier to count from the air and we tallied 2,256 animals on a recent aerial survey in the Panhandle," said David Dvorak, project wildlife biologist.

"The P&WD will probably issue the same number of anteloper permits to the area landowners as were issued last year which was 353," Dvorak contin-

The wildlife biologist noted that the traditional antelope range observed during the survey was in excellent condition with plenty of forb plants available to the animals.

The survey crew also counted 142 covotes while flying the

Safety Is Part Of **Hunting Trip**

The enjoyment of a safe hunting trip cannot be measured by less act or misjudgment on the part of the shooter, and the trip will be remembered for many

Comparisons of the number of accidents and fatalities between 1978 and previous years indicate that a small number of hunters are continuing to violate the rules of safe gun handling.

"Texas recorded 83 accidents in 1978 and 19 of these were fatal," said Theron D. Carroll, P&WD hunter safety coordin-

"Only 30 of the 125 persons involved in these accidents were under 17 years of age which indicates that our volunteer hunter safety program is working," Carroll continued.

Of the 10,890 students certified in 1978 by the P&WD, over 57 percent were in 12-17 age bracket.

Hunting accidents occured every month of 1978 with December recording a total of 20. Deer, dove, and rabbit were the three species of wildlife envolved in the majority of the hunting accidents. These three species require continual judgment on the part of the shooter as to the correct time to shoot, identificaa tion of target, and zone or area of

Visible identification in the field is necessary for both the shooter and other hunters. This is normally accomplished by the wearing or displaying of bright colored clothing such as hunter blaze orange.

Of the 23 hunting accidents occuring in 1978 dealing with hunter judgment, none of the victims had any bright colors displayed.

All shooters should review their firearms handling procedures and remember the 12 commandments of shooting safe-

1. Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun. This is

the cardinal rule. 2. Guns carried into camp or home must be unloaded and

cased. 3. Always be sure that the barrel and action are clear of

obstructions. 4. Always carry the gun so the direction of the barrel can be

controlled. 5. Keep the safety ON until you are ready to shoot.

6. Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger.

7. Never point a gun at anything you don't want to shoot.

8. Unattended guns should be unloaded. 9. Guns and ammunition

should be stored safely beyond the reach of children. 10. Never climb a tree or a

fence with a loaded gun.

11. Never shoot at a flat, hard surface or the surface of water.

12. Do not mix gunpowder and alcohol. Drinking alcoholic beverages slows the reaction of the hunter and affects the judgement of the shooter.

Teal Duck Season Opens Sept. 15-23 Texas sportsmen will have

another early hunt when the annual teal duck season opens September 15-23 across the

The daily bag limit will be four with eight in possession after the second day. This bag limit may include four green-winged, cinnamon, or blue-winged teal or a combination of the three species.

Shooting hours for teal will be from sunrise to sunset daily which is different than other migratory birds such as dove. Legal firearms for the teal hunt

are shotguns plugged to a three shell capacity. Bot teal and dove hunters are governed by the migratory hunting rules set by the U.S. Department of the Interior.

The teal and dove hunters will be required a new 1979-80 Texas hunting license, but the teal hunter will also be required to carry on his person a federal migratory game bird and conservation stamp. This duck stamp can be purchased at most U.S. Post Offices for \$7.50.

The early teal season is a means of harvesting the surplus species of teal that migrate through Texas in September prior to the regular duck season. Reports from the breeding grounds indicate a 20-percent increase in the blue-winged teal population over 1978.

More information about teal hunting is available by contacting the nearest Texas game warden or P&WD office.

Texas quail populations are being driven by personnel of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department across the state.

Each of the 74 census lines being conducted on the High and Rolling Plains of northwest Texas covers a 20-mile line determined by P&WD computer. These roads are driven in early morning or late evening when the quail are out along the roadside. Abundant rains have produced heavy weed cover in many areas Continued Column 7




